Forgery Suspect Winds Up In Jail

A suspect was charged with forgery and a checkbook belonging to a Tahoka man recovered this week after a check for \$382 was forged and passed at a Lubbock County liquor store.

Arrested Monday by Tahoka Police Dept. was Clifford Donnell Sims, 20, of Tahoka, who was charged with "forgery by making" and who remained in jail this week in lieu of \$10,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton.

The checkbook, which the Tahoka man had not missed until the check was passed, was recovered. An attempt also had been made to cash a \$1,000 check on the man's account at Wilson State Bank, which refused to cash the check.

A suspect was in custody this week following a Crime Line tip regarding theft of firearms from two pickups burglarized in Tahoka during the day of the Harvest Festival, Oct. 1. A .22 rifle owned by Leighton Knox was recovered, and officers expected to recover shotguns stolen from the vehicles of Knox and Donald Williams this week. Charges had not yet been filed Wednesday. Sheriff Stanley Krause said a Crime Line reward of \$200 would be paid in the case.

Tahoka police answered a call in the city Saturday night involving a fight that had broken out over a game of pool. No one was arrested, however.

Last Thursday, police investigated an accident in the parking lot of 1700 S. 1st that involved a 1976 Chevrolet 2-door driven by Ynes Moreno Aleman of Tahoka and a 1977 Buick wagon driven by Ira Calvin Dorman of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police answered several family disturbance calls and one prowler call during the past week.

Four persons were sentenced by 106th District Judge George Hansard after pleading guilty Monday of offenses. They were:

Benito Moya of Brownfield, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, three years in prison, probated.

Freddie Salazar, 28, of O'Donnell, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, three years probated, plus

\$1000 fine and court costs. This was in connection with the shooting of Joe Castro Jr., 22, of O'Donnell.

Juan Vargas, 27, of O'Donnell, forgery by passing, three years probated, \$500 fine plus costs and restitution.

Jose Pedro Alvarez, 54, Tahoka, murder, 10 years, probated. Alvarez admitted the fatal shooting of Guadalupe Cano, 45, of Tahoka, on Jan. 1.

Lost: A Good Friend

The people of Lynn County lost a truly good friend and solid citizen this week when Frank Hill, longtime publisher of the Lynn County News and unofficial historian of the county, died as the result of a tragic accident in the city of Tahoka.

We at the Lynn County News always relied heavily on Frank Hill for information about anything that happened here in the past, because we knew the information would be accurate. He provided valuable assistance in writing weather stories and stories of historical nature for us.

For many years, Frank Hill was the newspaper publisher in Tahoka, faithful chronicler of all events of importance, and a champion of the community. He was highly respected in journalism circles throughout the state and people still ask us about him when we go to state press meetings.

I recall that after I had been publisher of the News for several months, a woman told me teasingly: "You keep trying, and someday you may be another Frank Hill." I told her in all sincerity that this would be the finest compliment I could receive.

Stenholm Farm Measure Approved

The U.S. House of Representatives has approved a measure by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) to protect American farmers from the threat of grain embargoes.

Stenholm offered the measure as an amendment to the Export Administration Act (EAA), a bill governing

U.S. foreign sales. The Stenholm amendment, passed by voice vote, ensured that the EAA does not affect the 270-day contract sanctity for farm exports which Congress passed last year.

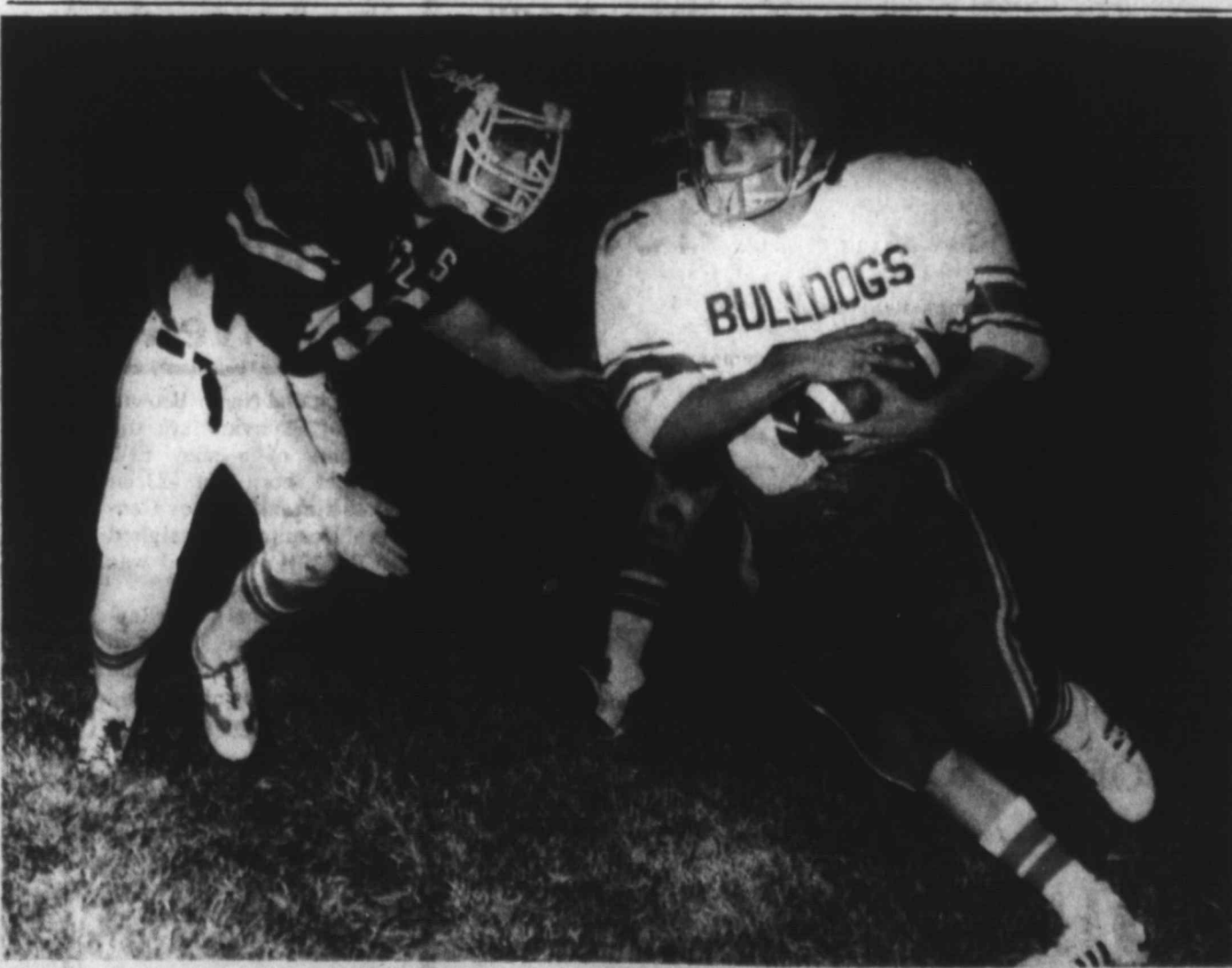
"There was a real danger that the EAA would compromise contract sanctity," Stenholm said. "This would have made our foreign customers lose confidence in our reliability as a supplier, and thus cost us export sales. In turn, that would have meant lower prices for American farmers."

Frank P. Hill

Frank P. Hill, 81, former publisher of the Lynn County News, died Sunday in Lubbock Methodist Hospital of injuries from an Oct. 6 collision of his car with a truck on West Lockwood in Tahoka. Services were held Tuesday afternoon in First United Methodist Church, Tahoka, with the Rev. Newton Starnes of Longview and Rev. Gene Wisdom, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home. Hill had been associated with the Lynn County News for 44 years when he retired in 1967. He began his career with the News on Nov. 1, 1924, when his father, E.I. Hill took over the newspaper. He became publisher in 1939 when his father retired. On April 1, 1967, he sold the News, but continued to live in Tahoka. In June, Hill was presented an award from the U.S. Weather Service for 30 years of service as official weather observer in Tahoka. A native of Temple, Hill moved to Lynn County in 1924 from Canyon. He attended school in Roscoe and at West Texas State University. He married Mae Howard on May 31, 1924, in Plainview. He was a member of the United Methodist Church here. He had served as director or president of several organizations, including the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, the Tahoka Independent School Board of Trustees, the Lynn County Library, the Tahoka Pioneer Museum, the T-Bar Country Club and the Tahoka Rotary Club. He was a steward at his church. Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Patricia Jacobs of Lake City, Colo.; two sisters, Berta Hill of Seguin and Myrtle Rochelle of Lubbock; a brother, E.I. of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; three grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were Winston Wharton, Pete Hegi, Harold Green, Jack Fenton, Clint Walker and Meldon Leslie. Honorary pallbearers were Dr. K.R. Durham, Truett Smith, Buel Draper John Henderson, Donald Hancock, S.M. Hanson, Ernest Spradlin, Dr. Richard White, Jim Bob Porter, field, Ross Smith, and V.F. Jones.

Services for J.W. 'Woodie' McMillan, 65, of Tahoka were held at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 22, at White Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. L.C. Landers, pastor of Sweet Street Baptist Church, officiating. Born in Desdemona Feb. 11, 1918, he moved with his family to Lynn County in 1923. He attended T-Bar School in Lynn County. The World War II U.S. Army veteran married the former Elaine Austin April 20, 1946, in Lubbock. He was a retired farmer. Tamera Pope, who says she's proud to be a farmer's wife, recently was awarded the purple rosette and ribbons of "Best of Show" in the culinary division at the Panhandle South Plains Fair. Although the homemaker has won various other awards, signifying culinary excellence, this one was specially satisfying.

"An important reason I wanted to win was for a sentimental reason. While I did change and add individual touches, the original recipe came from a neighbor, the late Mrs. Edna Carpenter, who used to bake the cake when children in our family had birthdays and I feel fortunate to have received her legacy of the recipe," Mrs. Pope recalled.

Growing up in the New Home community where

she and her husband Jim continue to live, the homemaker likes living near relatives of the close-knit family.

"As I was growing up I watched my mother (Mrs. Ronnie Dulin) prepare meals for our family.

When I had difficulty with a recipe, there was always my grandmother (Mrs. Bonnie Smith) who lived nearby to help. And, my other grandmother, Mrs. Leo Dulin, Tahoka, taught me to sew, knit and crochet. So, living near relatives has more than the usual benefits!"

Mrs. Pope notes "always enjoying" cooking. As a youngster she participated in 4-H and took home economics in high school. When it was time to attend college, she chose Lubbock Christian College because of its excellent home economics department. Currently, she is working towards a masters degree.

While strongly believing in academic training to acquire culinary basics, the prize-winner also be-

lieves in practice and self-teaching.

"Learning basics is important, but then most people need to get in the kitchen and learn to cook. In addition, 'trial and error' and plenty of practice or perseverance is required."

Mrs. Pope says she's never been unnerved about trying new recipes. And, she enjoys developing her own recipes.

"I wouldn't want any-

body to think that I never make mistakes. As an example, another of my entries — a Red Velvet Cake — didn't place high. Because of illness in the family, I was hurried and believe I baked it too long. There's nothing worse than taking the moisture out with overbaking!"

To be considered for "Best of Show," an entry must have won a first-place award in one of the more than 10 categories (white layer - iced; pumpkin, banana layer and others). The entry is then re-judged in competition against all the first-place winners.

Mrs. Pope's prize-winning entry was a white, three-layer cake; sour cream was an ingredient of the cake. She iced the cake between the layers with a favorite Seven-Minute Frosting. Also, between the layers were a filling of pineapple, pecans and coconut. The final touch was to ice the entire cake with frosting and top with more coconut.

As a final tip to would-be winners in next year's Panhandle South Plains Fair, the talented cook says, "Prepare your entry to have it as fresh as possible for judging."

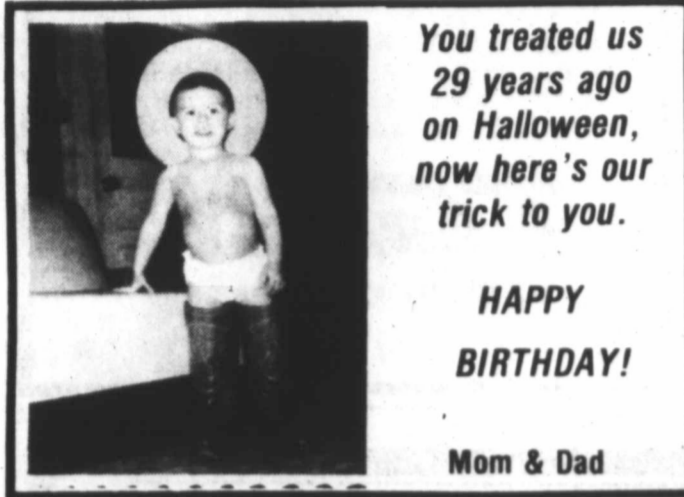

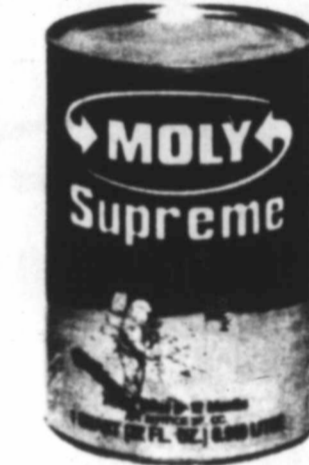

LEAVE CROP RESIDUE STANDING—Shown here is snow caught by standing grain sorghum stalks. The adjacent area with skip row cotton caught very little snow. Shredded grain sorghum stalks would have caught very little snow. Standing stalks break the force of winds at the surface of the soil. This allows snow to settle here and the stalks also keep the soil from blowing. This is also true of cotton stalks. They do give the soil some protection against blowing winds. What happens to a good standing residue crop when various cultivation practices are carried out? Research shows that tandem disk or chiseling leaves about 75 percent of the residue; lister, 20 percent; moldboard plow, 10 percent and stubble mulcher about 90 percent. The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service recommend that residue be left standing or at least left on the soil surface for as long as possible to protect the soil from wind and water damages.

Storms Halt Harvesting

The 1983 "hard-luck" High Plains cotton crop suffered another set-back Oct. 16 when high winds, heavy rain and hail knocked a large volume of cotton onto the ground. Record October rains followed the Sunday storm and left most cotton fields flooded and much cotton strung out of open-bolls.

Prior to Sundays weather, growers had chemically defoliated several thousand acres, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services office at Lubbock. Samples from early harvested ginnings were arriving at the rate of 3500 to 7000 per day. The backlog of samples was building fast enough to start a second shift last Friday, Bennett continued. Gins continued operating during the heavy rain, and by Wednesday a third classing shift was established. "This around-the-clock classing made USDA history," Bennett said. This was the first three-shift cotton classing operation ever attempted by USDA.

Lubbock's Marketing Service had classed about 17,300 samples by late Monday, Oct. 17. This compares with about 650 classed by the same date last season. The season's predominant grades were grade 42 to 40 percent, grade 32 was 24 percent and grades 41 and 52 amounted to nine percent each. About six percent was reduced one grade because of bark and two percent for grass.

Predominant staples were staple 30 at 13 percent, staple 31 accounted for 22 percent, staple 32 was 19 percent and staple 33 amounted to 15 percent for an average of 31.4 thirty-seconds of an inch. Micronaire 35-49 accounted for 73 percent, 33-34 was 13 percent, 30-32 was nine percent and 27-29 amounted to four percent for a season's average of 37. This season's average HVI breaking strength

was 24.7 grams per tex. Growers sold early harvested mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30-31, mike 35-49 at about 1135 to 1300 points over the 1983 loan rates. Gins paid High Plains growers \$160 to \$170 per ton for cotton-

seed. Spot cotton prices were higher during the week. Trading was limited mostly to southern markets where harvesting was most active.
