Lynn Schools All In New Districts

Tahoka and O'Donnell dropped a notch in the University Interscholastic League classifications released last weekend, and all four schools in the county wound up in new districts for competition starting with the 1984 school year.

Classifications are made bi-annually on the basis of high school average daily enrollment, and both Tahoka and O'Donnell have had declining membership during the two-year period.

The UIL says 3A schools with enrollments of 275 to 649 in high school; 2A is 135 to 274 and 1A is 134 or less. A high school with fewer than 90 students may enter six-man football.

Tahoka's enrollment figure for the two years averaged 236.75 and

O'Donnell's was 130.48.

Next fall, Tahoka will be in District 5-AA, with Plains, Seagraves, Shallowater, Morton and New Deal.

Wilson and New Home stay in Class A, but will move to a new district of 12 teams, which also includes the other county school, O'Donnell. Other teams in the district, 7-A, are Sands, Forsan, Klondike, Lorraine, Meadow, Roby, Ropesville, Roscoe and Garden City.

The north zone of the district will be Klondike, New Home, O'Donnell, Meadow, Ropes and Wilson. The number one team in each zone will play the number two team in the other zone.

Tahoka will play football games next year against the other five district teams, after non-district games against Stanton, Hale Center, Coahoma, Abernathy and Roscoe, in that order. They will open the district schedule against Seagraves, followed by Plains, New Deal, Shallowater and Morton.

Fingerprinting Of Children Set On Nov. 18

Parents who wish to have a copy of their children's fingerprints on file may do so through a program sponsored jointly by the Lynn County Sheriff's office and Vocational Office Education unit of Tahoka High School, Friday, Nov. 18, in the North Elementary School Gym between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Pre-school, high school, and junior high students are welcome either before school starts that morning or in the afternoon just after school.

Fingerprints taken will be for parents use only, according to Joe Bryan, Chief Deputy Sheriff. The fingerprints will not be on record at the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. or any Criminal Justice Dept., Bryan said. The purpose of the fingerprints will be to aid any law enforcement agency in the event a child becomes lost or kidnapped.

The fingerprint cards will be sent home on the 18, by the child, for parents to put in a safe place. The Lynn County Sheriff's Department and/or Tahoka ISD cannot be responsible if the cards are lost by the child. Parents are welcome and may enter through the west door of the gym.

Bulldogs Lose 28-13

The Tahoka Bulldogs gave a better effort than in the previous week, but they still couldn't quite do the job last Friday night as the visiting Cooper Pirates threw passes everywhere to win the game 28-13.

It was Tahoka's eighth loss in nine games this season, and they will be big underdogs again this week as they close out the regular season at Wolfforth against Frenship.

The Dogs actually led Cooper at two times in the game last Friday, but they were finally done in by the pass-happy Pirates in the last half.

Tahoka scored first in the first quarter when fullback Johnny Morin burst through the middle for 21 yards and a touchdown after Tahoka had been set up on the 21 when Lupe Aleman hit a Cooper ball-carrier, he fumbled and Morin recovered. The point try was no good, but Tahoka led 6-0.

Cooper came back on good running by Ricky Mendez, who finally scored

from the 6 late in the first period. Scott Smith converted and Cooper led 7-6. The second quarter was scoreless, although Tahoka drove to the 10 of Cooper, then missed a field goal. The drive featured good running by Steve Pierce and two complete passes. Tahoka also threw more passes in the game than ever before, completing 8 of 16, mostly for short yardage. Cooper, on the other hand, passed 29 times, completing 12, and several pass plays were rubbed out by penalties.

Cooper held Pierce to just 39 yards from scrimmage, in 16 carries, but Pierce did put the Bulldogs back ahead by taking the second half kickoff and running 90 yards for a TD. Morin, who wound up as Tahoka's leading rusher with 52 yards in just 7 carries, kicked the point and Tahoka led 13-7.

Long Drive

Cooper came right back with a long drive featuring passes of 20 and 23 yards and again Mendez scored, from the 1. Smith's extra point put Cooper ahead 14-13 with 7:19 left in the third. After the kickoff, Cooper recovered a fumble at the Tahka 20 and Bobby Mendez passed 20 yards into the end zone to Chris Kemp for another TD, then passed to Ricky Mendez for 2 points to make it 22-13. Tahoka retaliated with a drive that collapsed on the Cooper 18.

Cooper scored the final TD on a 21-yard pass, Mendez to Alan

Vinson, midway of the fourth. Tahoka did make a comeback effort, with Jerry Alvarado catching passes of 33 and 22 yards from QB Trey Teaff, but this drive also fizzled out.

Harvey Hallmark at defensive half-back turned in a good game, and he, Teaff and Alvarado made some saving plays on pass defense.

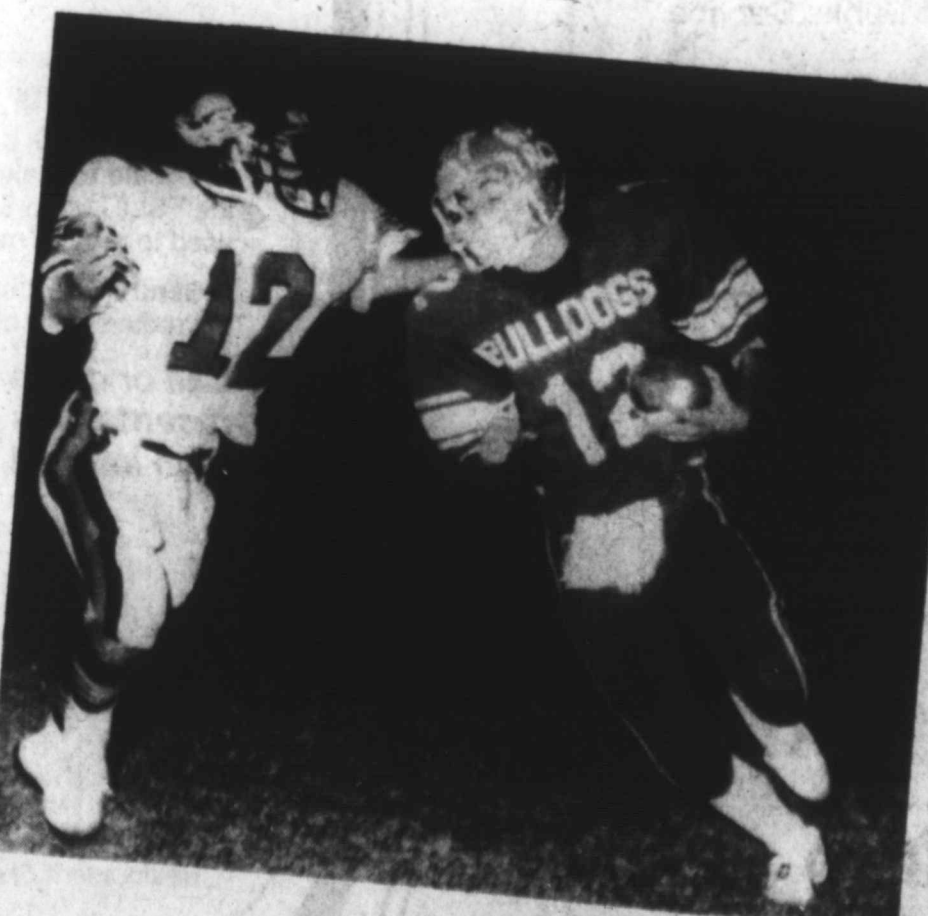
Thanksgiving Dinner Slated

Carriker Discusses Proposals On Ballot

Steve Carriker, State Representative for this district, spoke to seniors from Tahoka, Wilson and New Home schools at the THS auditorium Thursday morning and again to Tahoka Rotary Club at noon.

Carriker discussed the 11 proposed amendments which Texans will vote on next Tuesday, and answered questions from the floor.

At the Rotary Club meeting, Carriker briefly discussed each amendment and gave his own views on them. The proposed amendments:

1. Authorizing fewer Justices of the Peace and constable precincts in counties under 30,000 population. Carriker favors this measure.
2. Limiting homestead in town by size rather than value. He explained that present law limits a homestead in town to \$10,000 value, which is not practical, so he favors No. 2.
3. Relates to deductions from farm products to be used in research and promotion. He said farmers are divided on this amendment.
4. Provides for succession of public office during time of enemy attack. Carriker said he does not believe the amendment is needed.
5. Use of permanent school funds to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. Carriker favors this, seeing an advantage to school districts in getting lower interest rates on any bonds issued, and therefore saving

the taxpayers money.

6. Garnishing wages for child support payments. The representative said Texas is one of only two states which do not permit garnishing wages, and although he sees some negative aspects, he favors the amendment as it relates only to child support ordered by courts.

7. Issuing state bonds to support veterans land and housing assistance programs. He favors No. 7.

8. Authorizing taxing units to exempt property of fraternal and veterans organizations. He favors this.

9. Assignment of judges to different courts. Carriker admitted to no strong viewpoint on this one, but said the plan is supposed to help alleviate crowded court dockets.

10. Allow cities to spend public funds and levy assessments for sewer work. He explained that this relates to fringe areas which grow up outside a city, and he generally appeared to favor the measure.

11. Taking pardon and parole power from governor and giving it to the state board. Carriker told Rotarians this is needed.

The representative, introduced by Mrs. Thalia Burks, said he and some others also had favored putting another amendment on the ballot, but it did not get done. This would replace the school property tax with a one-cent sales tax.

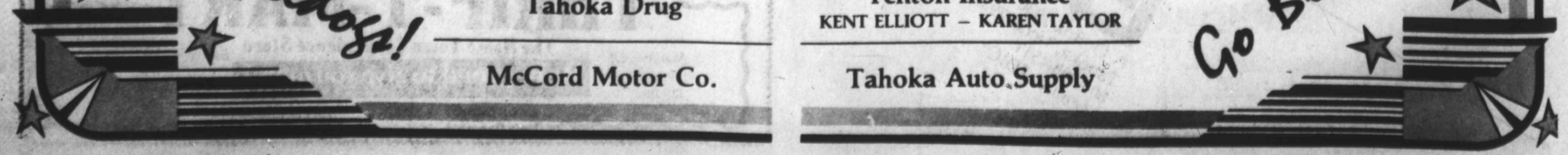

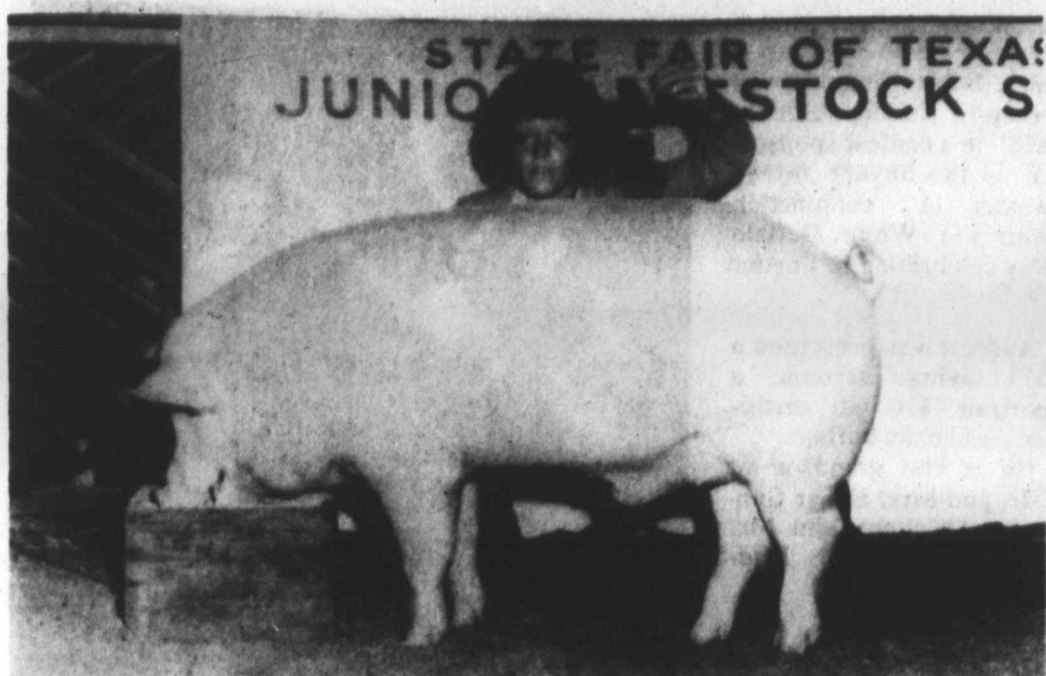

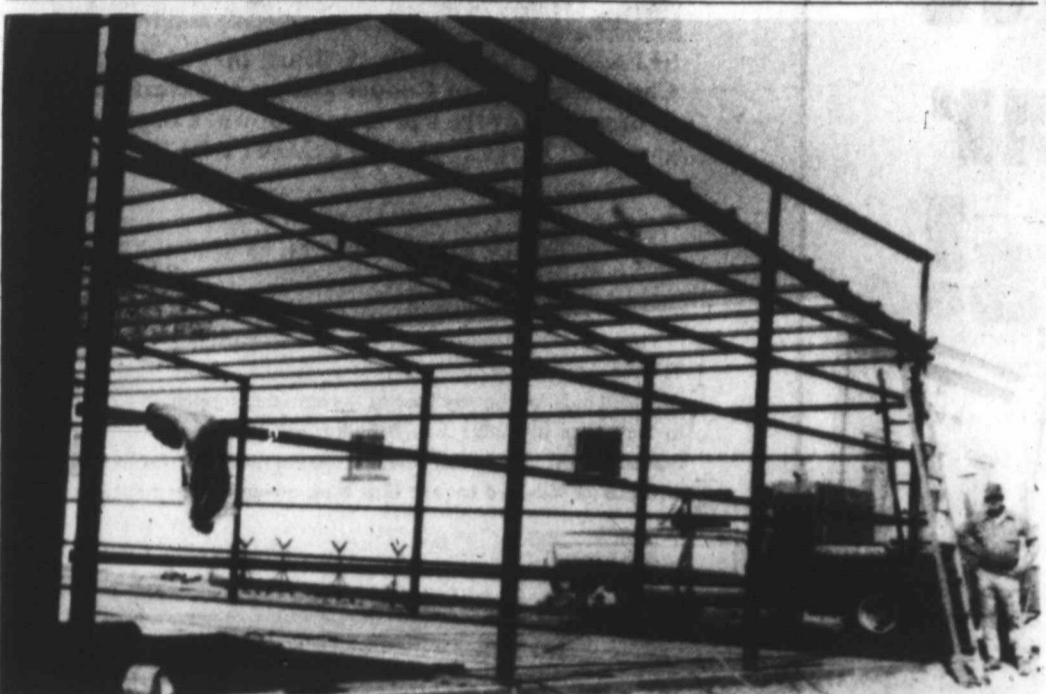

Letter to The Editor

Dear Mr. Wood:

Texas taxpayers have a lot to gain and nothing to lose in voting FOR Proposition 5, the school bond amendment, in the November 8 constitutional amendments election.

The amendment could save our schools and local taxpayers \$435 million in interest payments alone in just the next 17 years.

It comes as a surprise to many people that the awesome resources the State of Texas dedicates to education are not taken into account by national bond markets when setting local school district bond ratings and interest rates. Local bonds are judged solely by the local district's situation.

Proposition 5 would cure that by permitting qualified local school bond issues to be backed by the state's \$3 billion Permanent School Fund. The result would be better bond ratings and lower interest rates for our local districts.

The state's Permanent Fund would simply be lending its good name; it would not be paying off the bonds. Texas schools have a fine bond record. In the unlikely event of a default, the state would

simply pick up the payments by withholding the local district's allotments. I urge Texas voters to approve Proposition 5.

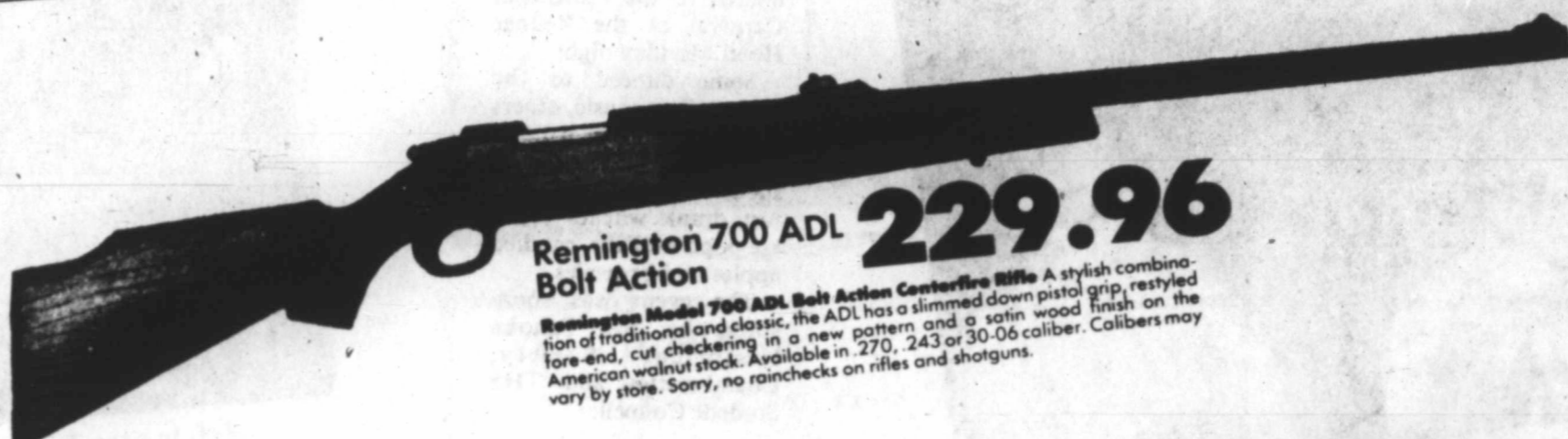

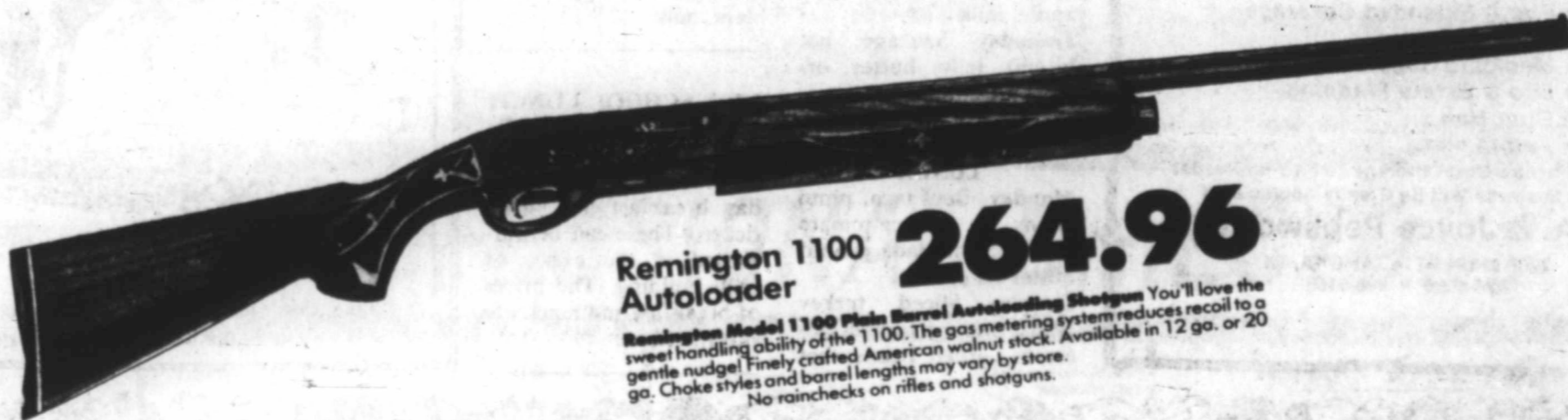
