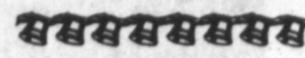
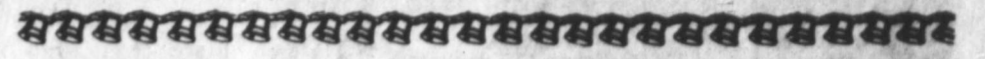

Taxing Units Question Value Set On Stocks

Lynn County and the City of Tahoka this week joined the Tahoka Independent School District in requesting that stock of banks within their taxing jurisdiction be put on a supplemental tax roll for this year, meaning that no taxes would be collected on bank stock this year.

It possibly could mean that taxes would be collected on the stock retroactive to this year provided the courts, legislature or mutual agreement between banks and taxing entities in the state result in an acceptable method of determining how much bank stock is worth.

All three of the above taxing entities formally protested to the county board of review the value set by the review board on bank stock in the county, with members of each governing group contending the values were set too low after one bank protested the value set by the

county appraisal district.

If the review board agrees to put the bank stocks on supplemental rolls, it would simply be setting aside those valuations with taxes to be collected if a formula for valuing bank stock is settled on within the next five years.

The school board and city council took the action in special meetings. The county took its action in regular session Monday.

Commissioners Monday also renewed membership in the Farm Bureau, voted to seek bids on microfilming records and approved Joy Laws' attending a vital statistics meeting in Austin Dec. 4.

Mrs. Laws, district clerk, also appeared before the group to ask their support for HB 29 which would increase filing fees in a district clerk's offices.

Also appearing were a representative of a microfilming company and Kathleen Stocco of South Plains Emergency Medical Services, who discussed the services offered and requested a donation. The commissioners declined to authorize a donation, but voted to let the hospital district proceed as they see fit in regard to EMS participation.

ONE LAST NOTE about the unfair tax situation I wrote about a few weeks back: A cousin in Dallas wrote to me that she had the same kind of thing happen to her, only a whole lot worse, regarding a small piece of land in Arkansas, where they also don't have to notify you about how much tax you owe, either current or delinquent.

In Arkansas, believe it or not, they don't even have to notify you they are selling your property for back taxes. She said they sold her piece of land at an auction to get \$2.67 in delinquent taxes.

Anyway, the law still needs to be changed to require that all tax notices on a piece of property indicate any delinquent taxes on that property.

ISN'T IT RIDICULOUS?



Some people have had what experts consider a pretty silly idea: that drycleaning causes clothes to wear out. The truth is, it's the dirt and soil that wear out clothes. If such soil is not removed, it can have an abrasive effect on the fabric and that's what causes the fabric to wear out. Many tests have shown drycleaning solvents do not damage fabric. In addition, drycleaning helps protect clothes from insects.

Home Economics In The '80s

Parents are a child's first (and best) teachers. The opportunities that parents provide for play, especially during the first three years of life, are an important stimulus to the development of a child's intellect. Carefully selected toys are some of the best tools for learning. Toys that teach need not be expensive. In fact, some of the best teaching toys are objects found and used in the home. Non-breakable mirrors hung mobil-style over the crib; four empty, metal cigar containers that can be chimed when touched; cuddly animals made from socks; large cardboard boxes for building, crawling or sleeping; or sets of soft plastic bowls or cans that can be stacked are all valuable teaching tools. Select toys that are safe, and have no small parts that can be swallowed. Toys that can be used in more than one way depending on the child's imagination, and can be used for more than one year of play are also a good choice. Toys are extra special when you can make them easily yourself so they bring enjoyment to you as you join in your child's play.

TEX-MEX STACKED ENCHILADAS

Serve with beans, rice, guacamole and crisp tortilla chips for a full course Tex-Mex meal.

- 1 can (7 oz.) Bumble Bee Solid White Tuna
- Vegetable oil
- 12 (7-inch) corn tortillas
- 1 can (10 oz.) enchilada sauce
- 3 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 3 cups sharp Cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped green onion
- Dairy sour cream

Drain tuna. Pour vegetable oil in 8-inch skillet to measure 1/4-inch deep. Heat until hot. With tongs, immerse tortillas, one at a time, in oil just to soften. Drain on paper towels. Heat enchilada sauce. Mix cheeses and onion. For each serving, place a tortilla on heat proof serving plate; then layer 1 tablespoon enchilada sauce, 1/3 cup cheese mixture, tortilla, 2 tablespoons sauce, 1/4 can tuna, 1/3 cup cheese mixture, tortilla, 2 tablespoons sauce, 1/2 cup cheese mixture. Place under broiler until cheese melts. Top each with dollop of sour cream. Makes 4 servings.

FAMILY STRENGTHS

"Although the number of families created by divorce and re-marriage has increased dramatically in the past decade, this doesn't necessarily mean that the family as an institution is growing weaker," says Diane T. Welch, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. "Changes in families mean education, community and church programs dealing with families have had to change too," says Welch. "Perhaps the most significant change is a greater concern with building family strengths in all types of families." Family strengths are thought of as a set of factors-- relationship patterns, interpersonal skills, social and psychological characteristics. These factors create a sense of positive family identity, promote satisfying and fulfilling family interaction, encourage the development of family members' potential and help the family deal effectively with stress and crisis. All types of families can work actively to develop these strengths, says Welch.

Holiday Hints

Home computers are the latest craze. Yet, while there are over eight million in use in U.S. homes today, not many people know that they take the drudgery out of holiday preparations. Here are some tips on using a computer system to make your holiday season merrier in the coming holiday season.

A mailing list program such as Commodore's EasyMail is helpful in preparing greeting card lists. Once the list is typed into the computer, it can be printed out onto address labels, and then saved on a floppy disk for use again next year, or anytime in between, without retyping. If someone on the list changes his residence or marital status, revisions are easily made. Holiday gift lists are easily prepared on the Commodore 64 using a word processing program, shopping can be done with even leaving the house. Lists can be printed for Santa or saved for anyone else who wants to "call them up." In addition, financial and data base programs like The Commodore Manager, EasyFinance and EasyCalc can keep track of gifts purchased, prices paid, bills to expect, and the budget. If you're a more knowledgeable computer user, you might use the Commodore 64 Super Expander cartridge to help design a video show with colorful holiday characters dancing on the video screen to music made by the computer's music synthesizer. Your computer can also help cut down on trips to crowded shopping areas. By adding the VIC Modem and connecting the computer to a telephone, banking and word processing programs, shopping can be done without even leaving the house. Then when preparations are completed, add to the festivities by gathering family and a few favorite friends to play the new Commodore games like Lazarian, Kickman, and Dragonsden.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service began contacting farmers and ranchers across the state for final 1983 crop acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley reported that producer compliance with the current farm programs reduced crop acreage across the state, and many farmers and ranchers are depending on this survey information for an accurate picture of the 1983 agricultural situation.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state as well as county estimates.

EROSION CONTROL--Old methods are still good ways of controlling erosion, according to the Lynn County SWCD. After cotton harvest, farmers should chisel or hoeme their cotton fields to keep both wind and water from damaging their fields. Thousands of tons of soil are lost every year due to shredding and tanding of cotton fields on the high plains. Chiseling or hoeme does leave the cotton stalks standing and allows ground ridges rough enough to keep winds and rain from eroding the land.

Harvest Explodes

High Plains cotton harvesting reached peak momentum before general but light showers Tuesday and Wednesday halted field work.

Most gins expected harvest would be completed by Dec. 1, if weather cooperated. Much of the unginned crop is field stored in modules. Gins can continue operating from modules unless wet soils prevent transportation.

About 102,000 samples were classed at USDAS Marketing Services at Lubbock during the week ended Wednesday, Nov. 23. This brought the season's total to 250,000 according to Mack Bennett, Area Director at the USDA facility. This compares with 192,000 classed by the same date last year.

Predominant grades during the week were grade 42 at 13 percent, grade 52 amounted to 30 percent, grade 43 was 12 percent and grade 53 accounted for 23 percent. Below grades amounted to 13 percent while 57 percent

was reduced one grade because of bark.

Predominant staples were staple 30 at 12 percent, staple 31 amounted to 24 percent, staple 32 was 23 percent, staple 33 accounted for 18 percent and staple 34 was 12 percent for an average of 32.0 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Mike 35-49 was 63 percent, 33-34 was 12 percent, 30-32 amounted to 15 percent 27-29 accounted for 8 percent and 26 or below was two percent for an average of 36. High Volume Instrument breaking strength averaged 25.3 grams per tex during the week.

This week's U.S. textile mill cotton buying continued at a fairly steady rate. Demand was fair to good for medium and higher grades while selected lower qualities continued to seek lower priced qualities to reduce new material costs. Buying was largely Memphis territory and Texas cotton.

A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

Farmers should not wait until next spring to begin planning their crop fertilization programs.

By collecting samples now and having soils tested, farmers can get a jump on next year's production.

Testing soils this fall offers several advantages: --Samples often can be collected when fields are dry and more accessible. In the spring, it's often difficult and sometimes impossible to collect samples because soils are wet or even flooded.

--By testing this fall, farmers avoid the typical spring rush in the Soil Testing Laboratory.

--Applying fertilizers in the winter minimizes spring planting delays because of tight dealer schedules and reduces the potential for moisture loss just prior to planting. Also, fertilizers usually cost less in the fall than in the spring when demand is greater and supplies tighter.

Fall testing also eliminates the risk of not getting fields sampled. If soils are not tested until near spring planting time, chances are good that fields will not be tested at all.

For more information concerning soil testing and materials, contact the County Extension office.

CAR CARE CORNER

Stay In Touch With Your Brakes

Before taking off on a trip in your car, always be alert to trouble in the braking system.

Strange noises from the wheels and unnerving sensations in the brake pedal often are early warning signals.



Most noises are the result of wear. If brakes squeal when bringing the car to a halt, it could be due to glazing of the lining on brake pads or shoes. Glazed linings don't grab effectively and drums or discs can become damaged and scored.

A metallic grinding sound means that brake linings are worn down to the metal backing and the pressure of metal-against-metal is all that's stopping the car. This can damage drums or discs beyond repair.

If the pedal must be pumped before the brakes take hold or if the pedal sinks to the floor under steady pressure, there probably is air in the system or leakage in one of the hydraulic cylinders. The same symptoms can occur when the brake fluid level is low.

Brakes that pull to one side are another hazard. A thorough brake inspection can stop problems before they occur, says the Car Care Council, which emphasizes that quality brake work is the car owner's best investment in safety.

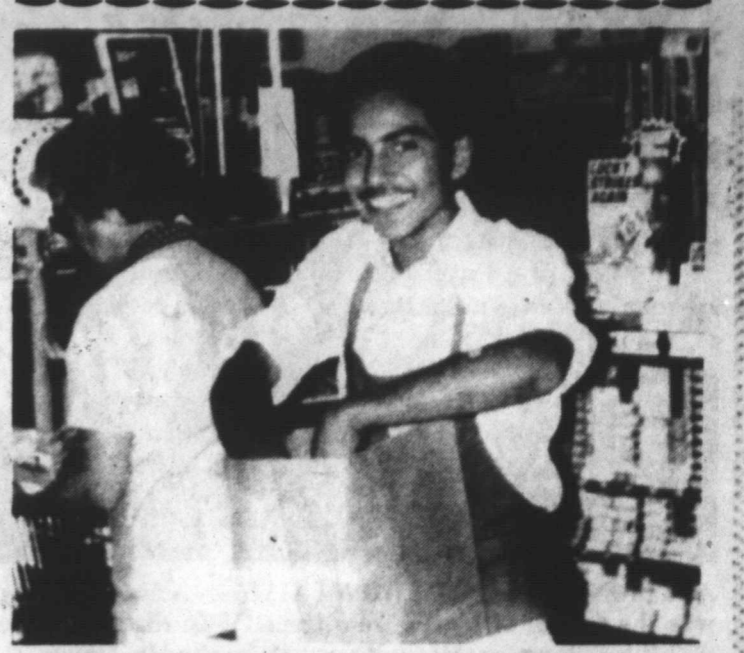

The percussion, flags, and feature twirler of the Tahoka High School Band earned honors at the South Plains colorguard competition in Levelland Saturday, Nov. 21.

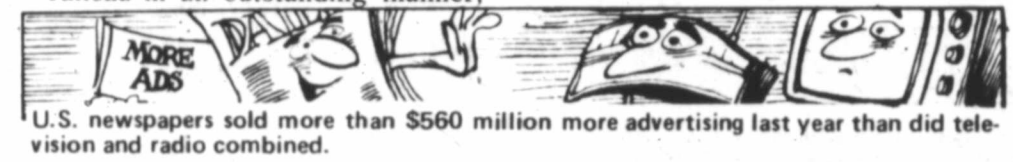
