OKAY, GUYS, if you can just hang onto your hair for about three more years, help may be available.

That's according to the Texas Medical Assn., which says that a drug used for treating high blood pressure also offers hope for stimulating hair growth: "Results of a year-long clinical study at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio show that minoxidil, a potent anti-hypertensive drug, produces hair in some balding men when rubbed on the scalp.

The drug, however, apparently has not been approved yet by the Food and Drug Administration and would not be available to consumers before 1987, said the story. The release from TMA didn't make it clear whether the drug is already available for blood pressure treatment but not for hair growth, or what.

Anyway, apparently you can take it internally to lower your

blood pressure (when somebody makes dumb jokes about your bald head) and then rub it on your head so that hair will grow.

TMA didn't say so, but the bad news for high blood pressure sufferers may be that the drug causes hair to grow in your innards.

Among the things I learned about baldness for the first time by reading the release were that it's your mother's fault if you are bald, and that a woman's hair may become thin about three months after she has a baby. That may be because she's tearing it out in chunks trying to figure out how to take care of that kid, although that usually comes a year or two later. It grows back in a few weeks, says TMA, which also said that "in men, baldness commonly runs in the family on the mother's side."

I saw my mother's side once. and sure enough, there was no hair growing there.





Social Security By BOOTH ROBBINS

I occasionally get an opportunity to talk to students in various high schools in our twelve county service area. The purpose of these talks is to discuss the Social Security process--from the time an individual applies for his original card to the time that individual (or his or her family) applies for Social Security benefits.

The students usually show a lot of interest in what is generally thought of--incorrectly--as just a program for older people. They have many good questions, but the one which occurs most frequently and evokes the most interest is this:

"Suppose I pay Social Security taxes for many years but die before I get old enough to receive monthly payments. If I don't leave any survivors who qualify for benefits what happens to the money I contributed?"

Sometimes some of the students take a shot at the answers before I can reply to the question. Answers range from "the government keeps it" to "it's given to poor people."

This is when I usually answer their questions with a question. "What happens," I ask, "if your parents pay fire insurance on your house for many years but it never burns? Or if they pay collision insurance on the family car but are never involved in an accident? What happens to the money they gave to the insurance companies?"

Most of the students saw the correlation before it was explained. The major portion of the money spent for fire insurance reimburses those whose homes do burn. Autocompensate those who do suffer a loss. Even if your house never burns and you never have an accident you have received something for your money That something is protection protection- an assurance that funds will be available if you do suffer a loss against which you are insured.

Same thing with Social Security. If you don't get back all that you've contributed, it will be paid out to individuals who do receive retirement checks, disability checks, survivor benefits, and Medicare protection. Some folks get back more than they and their employer contribute.

Check Soil Temperature

**Before Planting** In many cases the early bird does get the worm. But when it comes to spring planting, farmers may want to use a little restraint and take a look at soil temperatures before cranking up their plant-

One of the keys to getting spring crops off to a good start is to heed soil temperatures.

Soil temperatures have been shown to have an mobile insurance funds important effect on how well seeds germinate. Planting in cool soils often leads to poor seed germination and poor stands. Plants that do come up often lack vigor for early growth. And this opens the door to early season disease and insect attacks.

Young advises farmers to begin planting only after the danger of a late frost is past and the soil has warmed to temperatures favorable to the intended crop.

Farmers also need to keep atuned to weather forecasts prior to planting-A sudden change weather conditions following planting can be detrimental to the crop, particularly a cool, wet spell that can lower soil temperatures drastically.

Just when is it safe to plant what crop?

Average minimum temperatures (at the four-inch depth) for planting are as follows: corn, 50 degrees; sorghum, 55 degrees; cotton, 65 degrees; and soybeans, 70 degrees. "Minimum" rather "average" temperatures should be used for rice and peanuts, with rice being 60 degrees and peanuts, 70 degrees. Hardy vegetables such

as onions, cabbage and potatoes can be planted once soil temperatures range between 45 and 50 degrees while warmseason vegetables such as tomatoes, melons, beans and peppers need soil that has warmed into the 60s. With early season plant-

ing, particularly when soil temperatures are still marginal, farmers need to pay particular attention to using high quality seed, fungicides and other seed protectants, and adjusting seeding rates.

How do farmers keep abreast of changing soil temperatures?

Young points out that daily readings are taken at various locations throughout Texas in cooperation with the Extension Sera vice, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the National Weather Service and individual cooperators. For example, the regional temperature reading for North Texas is based on temperatures at Lavon Dam northwest of Dallas, while readings at Lufkin and Longview make up the East Texas average. Regional readings are also made for the Coastal South Texas and

Lower Rio Grande Valley. As temperatures are collected, they are included agricultural in daily advisories issued for each of the regions by the National Weather

vices's Southwest Agricultural Weather Service Center at Texas A&M University. The advisories are fed into the NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) weather wire teletype system to be received by commercial radio and television stations. The advisories are also carried over the NOAA Weather Radio Network.

Specific temperature readings for about 50 locations also are distributed daily through regular weather service dissemination channels.
