More Burglaries Listed In County

Several more thefts and burglaries were reported in the county and city during the last week and officers also investigated reports of criminal mischief, loud noises, a fight and a teenage Wilson girl being severely scratched and bitten by a possibly rabid cat.

Mt. Zion Church, a mile northeast of New Home, was burglarized between April 29 and May 6. Stolen were a Realistic public address system with accessories. Total value of the system was set at \$725. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$300 reward for information clearing this

J.C. Durham, Rt. 5, Tahoka, reported a farm house three miles southeast of O'Donnell burglarized with four doors, a gas heater and an electric air compressor stolen, total value \$645.

Cat Attacks Girl Sheriff's deputies and members of Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. went to Wilson Tuesday and finally

located a stray cat which had attacked a 16-year-old Wilson girl Sunday. The cat was destroyed and tests are being conducted. The girl was treated by a physician and released.

A Tahoka High School freshman girl, Isabel Perez, still had not been located this week after disappearing from her home April 23. Officers said Wednesday they were checking a report she had been seen in the Odessa area.

In County jail during the last week were two persons for public intoxication.

Tahoka police answered a family disturbance call on Sunday night where two family members were involved in a fight. Both were taken to Lynn County Hospital where they were treated for severe cuts and bruises. Neither of the residents was charged at press time.

Man Treated

Also on Sunday, a Tahoka man was treated for a drug overdose consisting of valium and a bottle of mixed pills. He was treated for complaints of a severe headache and hyperventilation.

Police also received several other calls on Sunday including a prowler call from a resident in the 1600 block of South 4th who reported she had heard a car door slam outside of her house and when she got up to look out, she saw someone standing by her window. A resident at Tahoka Care Center reported she heard someone beating on a door across the street and wanted it in-

White, Miller In Runoff For County Commissioner

Lynn County voters Saturday gave incumbent Sheriff Stanley Krause a heavy margin of ballots which returned him to office without having to be in a runoff against either of two opponents. But in a three-man race for commissioner of Precinct 4, candidates Leland White and J.T. Miller will be in a runoff June 2 for the Democratic nomination, which means election, since there are no Republican candidates for the position.

Miller led the ballot on the commissioner's race, an election to fill the unexpired term of the late E.R. Blakney, who died in a tractor accident. Miller had 277 votes to 235 for

White and 88 for Robert Edwards. Three voting boxes in the New Home vicinity gave White big margins over Miller, but the Tahoka box in that commissioners precinct gave Miller a huge cushion of 172 reported to police last Wednesday votes to 23 for White, while Edwards had 53 in that box. New Home Box 4 gave Miller 48, White 124 and Edwards 9. Lakeview, Box

11, gave Miller 14 and White 45. North Lynn, Box 13, had 17 for Miller, 33 for White, and 22 for Edwards. Miller had the edge in the absentee balloting, getting 26 to 10 for White and 4 for Edwards.

Krause received 1,321 votes to 123 for Randy Smith and 171 for Kenneth Cawthron.

Kent Hance, who statewide led the Democratic ticket in the race for U.S. Senator from Texas and will face Lloyd Doggett in a runoff, also led Lynn County easily, getting 1,425 votes to 118 for Bob Krueger and 26 for Doggett. U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm steamrolled his opponent in the 17th District race,

getting the nomination and winning 1,438 to 80 in this county.

Commissioners Bart Anderson. Precinct 4, and Eldon Gattis, Precinct 1, were re-elected without opposition, as were Tax Assessor-Collector Geroge McCracken and County Attorney Jimmy Wright.

Tommy Lawson, who was reelected County Democratic Chairman, said this week that the Lynn County Democratic Convention will be at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 19, in the District courtroom in Tahoka. At this time four delegates from the county will be elected to go to the state convention.

"The first step in producing quality fruits is to insure that the tree is in a healthy, vigorous state." Young said.

Various insects attack fruit trees and often tue use of insecticides is the only means of control, the county agent said. cultural practices such as proper pruning, fertilizing and watering also play important roles in preventing insect damage, he noted.

Insect losses can be reduced with a spray program and by diligently following good cultural practices.

"But this should begin right away for peach and apricot trees and in the next few days for apple trees," he stressed.

4-H Program Stresses Fire Safety

Installing one or more smoke detectors in your home can greatly improve your chances of escaping safely in case of fire.

Most fires can be prevented. But should fire strike, 4-H'ers have found that lives can be saved by early warning devices that are properly installed, tested and maintained.

The National Safety Council reports that in a recent year about onefifth of all home accident deaths--5,100 out of a total of 25,500--resulted from fires, burns, asphyxi ation and related causes. These statistics point to

the need for continuing fire safety education for 4-H'ers, their families and

their communities.

Boys and girls enrolled in 4-H safety projects and activities learn-by-doing about fire control methods. They inspect and rid their homes of trash, papers and other combustibles.

4-H members check to see that flammable liquids are stored in sturdy metal containers, and that electrical wiring and equipment are kept in top condition. And they educate their families to the vital importance of installing smoke and fire

Fire safety is only one emphasis in the 4-H safety program,




