Higher Fees On Car Sale, Registration Set

The Texas legislature has increased the motor vehicle tax to 5 percent effective Aug. 1. Except for sales contracts signed before Aug. 1, any title dated thereafter will be taxed at the new rate. Rates for gift, eventrade or resident taxes did not

Vehicle registration fees also will change effective Aug. 1 due to House Bill 122 which was signed by Gov. Mark White on July 13. New rates will not apply to July renewals or title applications supported by certificates of origin or out-of-state titles if postmarked or received prior

to Aug. 1. Any renewals (including July renewals) and title applications postmarked or received after July 31 shall be registered under the new fee



Absentee Voting On Bingo Starts

Absentee voting on the bingo legalization election in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 of Lynn County began Monday and will continue through Aug. 8.

Voters in the election were reminded that they must show their caliber Ruger pistol and four registration receipts before voting absentee--or at the polls on Aug. 11.

Voting will be in three boxes in the county, including the one at O'Donnell, one at New Moore and the Southwest Tahoka box. All absentee ballots must be picked up at the courthouse.

Judge Candidate Stops In Tahoka

Judge Virgil E. Mulanax. Republican nominee for Place 1. Court of Criminal Appeals, was in Tahoka Monday promoting his statewide campaign. He spoke to a group of persons at First National Bank Community Room, after being delayed about an hour in Lamesa with car trouble.

"I am concerned that this extremely important position does not receive the attention it deserves by the voter," said Mulanax, now a district judge, from Gilmer. "This is our state's highest court for appeal of criminal candidates.

"My opponent's name is Sam Houston Clinton. The catchy name has lured the uninformed voter in this low visibility race. This name appears to be my opponent's greatest asset. I suppose some Texans feel they have been good citizens when they cast their vote for this good Texas name. How else could a former American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) lawyer with a record of voting for the criminal be elected in Texas?"

Judge Mulanax is only the second Republican in recent history to campaign for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. By his campaign, Judge Mulanax hopes to give voters in the general election a conservative option.

"My opponent says he rejects the characterization that he is a liberal who finds ways to reverse criminal cases on a technicality," said Judge Mulanax. "However, Texas Monthly reports that Clinton has voted to reverse two of every three cases in which a written opinion is given. This record seems to support his characterization as a liberal."

Judge Mulanax, 46, has served since January 1975 as 115th District Court Judge in Upshur and Marion counties.

SCHEDULE OF REGISTRATION FEES

PASSENGER CARS, CITY **BUSES and PRIVATE BUSES**

The annual license fee for a passenger car, city bus, or private bus shall be based on the manufacturer's model year or weight in pounds, as the case might be, of the vehicle as follows:

MODEL YEAR OR WEIGHT IN POUNDS 78 AND OLDER MODELS 79, 80 AND 81 MODELS 82 AND NEWER MODELS

\$12.50 PLUS 60¢ CWT PLUS 30¢

The weight of any passenger car for purposes of registration shall be the weight generally accepted as its correct. shipping weight plus one hundred pounds.

"Passenger Car" as defined by law means any motor vehicle other than a motorcycle, or a bus transporting persons for compensation or hire, designed or used primarily for the transportation of persons.

SELECTING A WATERMELON----Judging the quality of a watermelon is very difficult unless it's cut in half or quartered, says a food and nutrition specialist, Mary K. Sweeten. In fact, one recent produce industry study showed that about forty percent of consumers find melons the most difficult fruit judge for ripeness and freshness, she adds. According to Sweeten, there are a few appearance factors which may be helpful -- but not totally reliable -- in guiding you to a good, ripe juicy watermelon. The surface should be relatively smooth, she says. The rind should have a slight dullness, neither shiny or dull. The ends should be filled out and rounded, and the underside should have a

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Donald Klaus of Wilson and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Freitag of Slaton.



EATING ON THE RUN IS COSTLY--In a recent study, the United States Department of Agriculture compared the cost of selected fast food items with those of the same food prepared at home. The cost of a special hamburger, French fries and a soft drink in this study cost \$1.61 at a franchised restaurant and 83 cents for an equivalent meal at home. "This is almost twice as much for a service that requires no special culinary skills and does not require specialized kitchen equipment," says home economist Bonnie L. Piernot. Such fast food favorites as fried chicken, pizza, cookies, pies, milk shakes or French fries prepared from fresh potatoes were not included in this study, she notes. Other studies indicate, however, that a meal eaten away from home costs an average of 2.6 times that of a comparable meal prepared at home, says Piernot.

Cotton Looks Up In Japan: A speical U.S. cotton trade team reports that prospects for cotton in Japan look promising.

The trade team, sponsored by Cotton Council International and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, recently concluded three days of meetings with Japanese textile representatives and cotton traders.

Members heard that cotton textile products fared well against synthethic during late 1983 and early 1984.

A recent surge in imported cotton fabrics has renewed concern in Japanese textile circles, but the industry intends to remain strong through introduction of more innovative fabric technology over the long term, the team reports.

Despite the negative influence of surging imports and unfavorable Yen/dollar exchange rates, imports of U.S. cotton are forecast to reach approximately 1.6 million running bales during 1984-85. As of July 5, 1984, Japan's total commitments for purchases of U.S. cotton during marketing year 1984 were nearly 1.9 million running bales, up 26 percent over the same date last year.

The team is to meet trade, industry, and government officials in Korea, Taiwan, Indonesia, and Bangledesh before returning home. Team members are Jim Echols, Hohenberg Brothers Co., Memphis; Penn Montgomery, Montgomery Co. Opelika, Ala.; David Stanford, Plains Cotton Cooperative Assn., Lubbock,

Directors of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, at their July Board meeting elected six High Plains cotton producers, two ginners, one banker and one Production Credit Association manager to serve on two of the organization's more important 1984-85

Elections were in addition to adoption of a \$322,500 budget and development of recommendations for 1985 cotton program provisions, as reported in this space last week, plus action on proposed legislation to establish a permanent system of setting acreage bases and program yields.

Elected to the PCG Executive Committee were producers Bert Williams of Farwell, Guy Austin of Farwell and Henry Kveton of Petersburg, ginner D. C. "Hoss" Newsom of Plains, banker Tommy Lacy of Seagraves and PCA manager Randy Arnold of Spur. Three of the six members were returned to the committee from 1983-84. The three new members are Austin, replacing Sam Means of Ropesville, Arnold, replacing Ben Loe of Spur, and Lacy, replacing Myrl Mitchell of Lenorah.

Under PCG by-laws the six elected members will serve on the committee with current officers, including President Gerald Caswell of Brownfield, Vice President Bennie Claunch of Bula, Secretary-Treasurer Jarrell Edwards of O'Donnell, and the two most recent past presidents, Board Chairman Tommy D. Fondren of Lorenzo and Gary Ivey of Ralls.

Elected members of the organization's Nominating Committee, who will serve with the three most recent past presidents, were also named. Chosen were producers Kenneth Wofford of Lockney, Don Bell of Wolfforth and Frank Jones of Lamesa, and ginner Larry Nelson of Tulia. Past presidents on this committee will be Fondren, Ivey and Joe D. Unfred of New Home.

The new system for setting farm program bases for both crop acreage and yields is embodied in a bill (HR 4565) by Representative Charles Stenholm of Stamford, with companion legislation introduced in the Senate by Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Houston.

HR 4565 would set for each farm an overall acreage base equal to the sum of crop bases. Base acreages for each program crop would be set by averaging the acreage planted to that crop over the past five years. However farmers could adjust any crop base for a given year, subject to certain limitations, by giving advance notice of their intent.

Yield bases would be determined by a rolling fiveyear average of actual yields, excluding the high and low years, and providing that yields could not be decreased more than 10 percent nor increased more than 50 percent in any given year.

PCG directors expressed approval and appreciation for the bill's intent, which in Stenholm's words is "to give farmers a dependable bench mark for making long range plans...," but some were uncertain about the ultimate effects from the bill's particulars over a period of years.

In deference to that uncertainty the Board agreed to suggest and work with Congressman Stenholm toward the possibility of implementing the plan on a pilot program basis in selected counties across the United

As you certified your ACR or signed up for measuring service you reported what cover had been established and is being maintained. The land is not eligible to count as ACR until this is completed. If you certify that a fall seeded crop will be planted, you must return to the office and certify this cover after it has been established. Failure to make this certificaiton will prevent the ACR from being eligible. Eligible covers are fall seeded crops, sudan and sucan corsses, peas, gardens for home use, and stubble from previous crops (not cotton).

Cover on ACR is to be maintained until normal preparation for the 1985 crops would begin. If fall seeded crops are going to be planted preparation on that land may begin now.

Weed Control: Control of weeds is required on all ACR. Failure to do so will also mean loss of payments. Now is a good tme to check your ACR for this problem, Weeds tumbleweeds and thistles are becoming a problem on several farms. The cost of control will increase the longer you wait. After the weeds have blown into your neighbor's field it is too late. The County Committee is very concerned about this problem. Please check your ACR, we have to. Shredding, ripper with knives, onion blade or chisel with sweeps are methods of control that may leave enough cover to prevent wind erosion. Chemical control is also approved. Falled Acres: Failed crop

acres should be reported before you destroy evifailed acres can be reported the crop must be certified. If you have requested measurement service and are going to destroy evidence of crop, be sure to come to the office, cancel the request for measurement service, and certify the crop before plowing up the evidence. If you wait until the measurement ser vice is completed credit cannot be given for additional acreage that failed and cannot be determined.

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Slides For Measurement Service: Slides that will be used for measurement and spot checks will be taken as soon after Aug. 1 as crops will show up. Any adjustment you plan to make should be done prior to this time. Any plowing of turnrows or between crops of the same color will be helpful.

Report Production: As you complete harvest of wheat and grain sorghum, it is a good idea to report the production. The forms can be picked up here at the office or the warehouseman usually has extra. Turn in production on all farms. Acreage not harvested should be reported. Beginning this year, commingled production between numbers can be accepted only if one farm's production is appraised or measured before commingling.
