Downtown Weeds Ugly, Council, Chamber Say

Weeds growing in the sidewalks and around downtown businesses and vacant buildings give a poor impression to persons driving through the downtown area, especially for the first time, city council members agreed Monday night.

"It really looks terrible to see all these weeds growing up and down Main St. and the other major streets in town," councilman Jim Solomon commented at the regular monthly meeting of the council.

Mayor Mel Leslie pointed out that the city has an ordinance which provides fines, or under which property owners may be billed for cleanup of their property by city workers if necessary. "It would be a lot better if everyone would poison their weeds and cut them down, get rid of other trash and keep the places clean voluntarily," he said.

Council members agreed that an extra effort to promote cleanup in the city is needed, and on Tuesday, the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce also brought the matter up, without knowing at that time that the city already had talked about it. When the chamber board learned this, they went on record as supporting any efforts to clean up the town, especially in regard to the weed situation.

"We'd certainly urge all our members to be aware of the need to get rid of the weeds," said Chamber President C.T. Louder. City councilmen also voted to keep the tax rate at 49 cents per \$100 evaluation for the coming

year, with 7 cents to be used for interest and sinking fund, or debt retirement.

The council voted to delay action on a rate increase proposal by Energas for 90 days, a delay suggested by Energas to give cities more time to study the proposal. Appearing to answer any questions was Dillon Patterson of Energas.

It was voted to put a stop sign at the intersection of N. 5th and Ave. N, to slow down traffic on 5th.

Present were councilmen Solomon, Cap Whorton, Tom Cooper and Dalton Wood, Mayor Mel Leslie and City Manager Carl Reynolds. Absent was councilman Richard White.

A 10-year-old Tahoka boy has lost the sight in his right eye as a result of being shot in the eye accidentally by a companion playing with a BB gun Sunday, July 29.

Ramon Montemayor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon Montemayor, 1309 Ave. L, underwent

surgery in Lubbock General Hospital for removal of the BB pellet last Friday, an operation which took more than five hours. Preliminary surgery had been done earlier.

A fund campaign has been organized to help the family, which had a limited insurance policy which paid only a portion of the expenses. Also, further surgery is anticipated for the youngster, who will be in the fifth grade.

education and mid-management certification from SWTSU in 1982. He was principal in Hutto for two years.

Meanwhile, young Ramon is doing as well as can be expected at home, and is looking forward to making the adjustments necessary to resume his normal activities.

Bingo Election Set Saturday

Voters in Lynn County Justice of the Peace Precinct 4, which includes O'Donnell and part of Tahoka, will cast ballots Saturday on whether to legalize bingo in that precinct.

Voters must show their registration receipts. Polling places are at O'Donnell, New Moore and Southwest Tahoka.

The election was called after a petition was presented to county commissioners. A previous election two years ago resulted in a narrow defeat of the proposal.

Health Board Backs DTP Immunizations

Despite some controversy over pertussis vaccine, the Texas Board of Health has urged the continued use of this immunization against whooping cough.

At its monthly meeting in Austin recently, board members went on record for supporting the Texas Department of Health's use of DTP vaccine, which protects against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis or whooping cough.

The Health Dept. purchases DTP vaccine from commercial pharmaceutical manufacturers and distributes it free to local health departments around the state.

The Commissioner emphasized the need for the vaccine by explaining that in 1934 there were 265,269 reported cases of pertussis in the country and 7,518 deaths. In 1983, there were 2,258 cases and fewer than 10 deaths.

State law requires that a child attending a day-care center be vaccinated against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis. Any child attending an elementary or other school must have received either DTP vaccine or tetanus-diphtheria vaccine. Children attending child-care facilities or schools must also have received polio, measles, rubella and mumps vaccines.
