

County Budget Revised For Bigger Pay Hikes

Lynn County commissioners budget, making proposed ex-Monday reworked the budget for next year to allow for 10 per cent pay increases for all county employes except the commissioners' own salaries.

As originally approved, the budget for next year called for 5 per cent increases for all employes except commissioners, but six elected officials went to amended revenue sharing fund testing that the 5 per cent figure was not enough. The committee agreed and this made 10 per cent increases mandatory for the elected officials.

Commissioners Monday said they considered that it would be unfair to the non-elected employes to leave their salaries at 5 per cent over the present figures, so they raised all by 10 per

This added \$20,949 to the

penditures for the coming year \$1,083,216, more than anticipated revenue from taxes and non-tax sources such as license registration fees. However, the county has a contingency fund, part of which will be used to fund the increases.

The county also approved an the grievance committee pro- budget which includes 73,513 to be spent on improvements to county buildings, most of the anticipated revenue sharing funds, expected to be \$125,138.

The courthouse roof and part of a possible elevator installation project in the courthouse may be included in the improvements.

Bids were opened on a new maintainer for Precinct 1, with four companies submitting bids ranging from \$58,530 to \$90,337, but Precinct 1 Commissioner Eldon Gattis delayed a decision until the bids could be studied further.

Commissioner Nell Blakney, whose term is scheduled to expire, moved that the commissioners' salaries also be included in the across-the-board 10 per cent pay increase, but the motion was defeated by the commissioners whose pay would be affected.

Commissioners voted to pay the county's share of hiring a temporary court reporter during the illness of the regular court reporter.

Tahoka Loses Dogfight

It was the same old story for the Tahoka Bulldogs last Friday night as they played their first game at home this season; the Dogs showed some flashes of being a really good team, but poor pass defense and weak passing on offense, plus untimely penalties and fumbles did them in, and Coahoma won the game 20-8, the third straight loss for Tahoka this season.

Things get worse for the Bulfdogs this week as they travel to Abernathy, another former Class AAA team which has dropped down a notch this season. Abernathy last week beat a strong Shallowater team 28-8 and earlier beat Petersburg and Roosevelt by even bigger scores. The Angelopes are ranked second in the state in Class AA, and Tahoka needs a super effort in this one.

Coahoma scored two touchdowns in the second quarter after a scoreless first period, OB John Swinney passing 8 and 56 yards to Jimmy Yanez and then Brian Calaway for touchdowns. The first TD followed a Tahoka

USDA BEEF GRADES EX-PLAINED--Many consumers buy USDA graded beef without knowing what the different grade labels really mean. The United States Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) grades meat according to the number and size of flecks of fat found in the red meat portion of the cut, says Marilyn Haggard, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. The more flecks of fat -- or marblingthe higher the grade of meat, she explains. "One reason why people become confused about the grading system is that they're used to thinking in terms of lean for determining the quality of ground beef," says Haggard. But even in ground beef, a certain proportion of fat is needed or the taste drops off,

STUDY SHOWS CONSUMER STEAK PREFERENCES--Many American consumers still prefer higher grades of steak, but a significant number-- especially in the west and south -- are willing to buy lower grade, leaner cuts with less fat. Those are the findings of consumer preference tests conducted in four cities by researchers at Texas A&M University's Agricultural Market Research and Development Center. The study showed that consumer ratings of steaks prepared at home generally agreed with USDA grading standards, which are based on the amount of fat within the lean. But about 25 per cent of the consumers in the sample found leaner beef acceptable in terms of its eating quality and indicated they would buy it, said Dr. Robert Branson, project director.

TAX PLANNING STRATEGIES The Deficit Reduction Act of 1984 brings about a number of tax changes that remove all doubt that tax planning should be a year-round effort, notes an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The new legislation reveals tax increases that stretch depreciation write-offs, squeeze income averaging and forclose on most interest-free loans. It also creates tax breaks, such as a shorter capital gains holding period for investors, and it effectively leaves open many legitimate tax-saving

HOME BUILDERS VALUE TREES--Without question, a wooded lot adds value to a home, says forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. A study of home builders in the Atlanta, Ga., area showed that builders' costs for clearing a lot averaged \$860 while the average cost of preserving trees was only \$547 per lot. In addition, builders reported that lots with trees sold for \$5,700 more per lot than those that had been cleared. Builders agreed that trees helped sell houses sooner and that any cost involved in protecting trees could be recovered at a profit when homes were sold.

4-H'ers have gained valuable leadership experiences and learned practical skills that have improved their quality of life.

Today almost five million youth across the nation between the ages of 9 and 19 are gaining valuable learning experiences through 4-H -- almost 200,000 of those are in Texas. The Texas 4-H program reaches boys and girls through more than 2,000 community based clubs and another 900 short-term project groups.

4-H'ers are engaged in some 50 different project areas in which they gain lifelong skills through the program's "learning-by-doing" concept. These projects had their beginning in 1908

when special Corn Clubs were organized for boys in Jack County. First focusing on such traditional areas as crop and livestock production and canning and sewing, 4-H projects now deal with a wide range of subjects, including small engines, rocketry and veterinary science--even theuse of com-

The 4-H program is conducted in each state through the Cooperative Extension Service and is backed by the state's landgrant university (Texas A&M University for the Texas program) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Some 17,000 adult and teenage 4-H leaders shoulder much of the responsibility for the 4-H program



October Tax Hike Is Upon Us

You go to the store and buy an oil filter for your car. It seems like it cost a nickel more this

Then you pick up the dry cleaning. That seem higher, too. You didn't forget that bag of fertilizer. But you paid 50 cents more than the last price you remember paying for it.

Oh, you almost forgot picking up the camera you left at the repair shop last week to get the shutter fixed. That much to get it fixed, huh?

As you drive, you're wondering what it was the newspaper boy said about the new weekly price for home delivery.

And so it goes. The October 2 tax hike is upon us.

The \$4.8 billion tax package passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Mark White takes effect Tuesday.

How much of the new tax burden will fall on you depends on what you buy and where you

The state sales tax went up by 1/8 of a cent, but a whole slew of items will be taxed for the first time, increasing the price of some things by as much as 6 1/8 percent.

Services such as dry cleaning, repairs, catering, massages, tailoring, mending and entertaining all have additional costs tagged on as a result of the expansion of the state sales tax catagories. Repairs such as for fixing the old television set, putting new heels on the old

And, Johnson pointed out, in the two most recent years when no acreage reduction program was in effect, 1980 and 1981, producers planted only 14.6 and 14.5 million acres, respectively, compared to the 1984 national base of almost 15.6 million acres.

"All of which means," Johnson concluded, "that it was necessary for USDA to announce a bloated 30 percent acreage reduction figure to offset the bloated acreage base. And for that reason that actual reduction requirement, in terms of acreage that realistically might have otherwise been planted, probably is closer to 20 percent than 30 percent."

Letter to The Editor

Because of numerous reasons that have become obvious to students, teachers, and parents since the beginning of the school year (and for other reasons which may not become apparent until future years), I voted no on House Bill 72, the "education" bill of the June special session. Numerous calls and letters

from concerned persons indicate that somehow, in a frustrated effort to strike out at what many people believe to be an illconceived and counterproductive change in the statutes, many teachers and parents assume or have been misinformed that all Legislators voted for and supported H.B. 72. This is not the case and I can assure you that many Legislators, like myself, were concerned with (1) inadequate increases in teacher pay and the imposition of an untested pay scheme which results in many veteran teachers being paid the same as beginning teachers; (2) the inclusion in the statutes of inflexible regulations regarding attendance and grading, matters better handled, in my opinion, by local boards; and (3) the almost certain increase in local property taxes for the majority of the 36 school districts located within my legislative district.

A tremendous amount of political capital has been invested in this "reform" measure and I do not hold out great hope that the more objectionable parts can be easily amended. I do hope, however, that the scheduled increase in the proportion of the basic program that local taxes must fund (Local Fund Assignment) can be rescinded and thereby take added pressure off of property taxes. I am also hopeful that policy-making authority regarding attendance, grading structure, and specialized curriculum will be returned to the local boards where it belongs.

It is difficult, when having campaigned and been elected, in part, on a platform of improving education, to vote against a bill highly touted as education improvement. But I did not perceive the bulk of H.B. 72 as the kind of improvement we in the 78th district regard as progress, therefore I voted no

CONSUMER BEEF PREFEREN-CES--A nationwide panel of beef tasters verified that a sizeable group of consumers want their steak lean and there will be a ready market for that type product. The study involved more than 1,100 consumers in San Francisco, Houston, Kansas City and Philadelphia and is the first part of a two-phased research project aimed at finding out what kind of beef consumers really want.

FOREIGN OWNERSHIP OF U.S. FARMLAND--The level of foreign ownership of U.S. farmland is relatively small and has remained fairly stable, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Just over 1 percent of U.S. agricultural land--about 131/2 million acres -- is owned by foreign investors while in Texas that amount is even less--about six-tenths of 1 percent. In Texas most of the foreign-owned agricultural land is timberland in the eastern one-third of the state. Fiftyseven percent of Texas' counties have one or more foreign landowners, the largest number being in Hidalgo County. Other counties with a large number of foreign landowners are Cameron, Collin and Harris.

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
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
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
