LUBBOCK, Friday, September 21, 1984 The U.S. Department of Agriculture's decision to require that producers in 1985 plant no more than 70 acres planted to cotton next year as much as it first would appear, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., ubbock.
That's what Johnson told ginners and allied industry people gathered in Lubbock September 22 for the annual meeting of the Plains Ginner's Association. "In planted to cotton is as large in 1985 as the 11.3 million acres planted and intended to be planted in 1984."
USDA Secretary John Block released the acreage reduction details September 14, with producer signup to begin October 15 and extend through March 1. Announced provisions require that participating pro-
ducers put 20 percent of base acres into a voluntary acreage reduction program (ARP) without compensation and idle another 10 percent as a paid acreage division. The diversion payment rate will be 30 cents per pound on the farm's established yield.
Unlike similar programs in the past, when the paid diversion part of acreage reduction plans was optional eligibility for program benefits in 1985 will require deficiency payment at 198 cents per pound and said producers may request one-half that amount and one half the 30 -cent diversion payment at sign-up.
The advance payment and the paid diversion, for some producers will serve as added incentives to program participation, Johnson admits. Taken by them selves they would make you think that 1985 acreage would be five percent or more short of 1984 was only a 25 percent "But when you look at the probable effect of the
$\$ 50,000$ payment limitation and the planting record of producers in recent years, the view changes quite a pit," he said.
Expectations of higher per-pound deficiency payments, coupled with the 30 -cent diversion paymen means more producers will be affected by the limit and all will be affected at a lower acreage level, Johnso reasoned. "In other words, large farmers who sign up all their acreage in 1985 will have to devote mor acreage to conservation uses and plant fewer acres cotton just to earn this year.
For some, that additional cost of program partic they'll go outside the program." There is no cross-compliance requirement between farms, Johnson explained, meaning that producer with two or more farms can be in the program on farms with enough acreage to qualify for their max mum payment, then go out of the program on al This This was a widespread practice in 1984, and with expectation of higher total per-acre payments in 1985, follow the acres and more 'wildcat' acres."
He also called attention to the fact that the required 30 percent reduction will be applied to a "bloated"

And, Johnson pointed out, in the two most recent years when no acreage reduction program was in effect, 1980 and 1981, producers planted only 14.6 and 14.5 million acres, respectively, compared to the 198 national base of almost 15.6 million acres.
