## Energas Rate Hike Approved For Tahoka

I READ SOMEWHERE that where the average worker Lloyd Doggett and Phil Gramm were both a little upset that their television ratings on a debate were low; they seemed surprised that not many people tuned in. So here's the word, fellows, on why it was that way;

 SOME CONSUMERS--Some like it lean. That's the conclusion eesearchers at Texas A\&M Unistudy of consumer beef steak preferences. In the study, 25 percent of the consumers--mosty from Houston and the SanFrancisco area - found USDA grade good loin steaks to be acceptable (and indicated they would buy this grade of meat. Consumer acceptance of leaner
meat could result from number of factors, says food and nurition specialist Marilyn Haggard. Those consumers looking for ways to cut calories and fat
from their diets may be more willing to trade some of the taste and juciness of higher grade steaks, she notes. But cooking methods may have something to
do with it, too. People who tend do with it, too. People who tend
to use moist cooking methods, or prefer their meat on the rare side, will find leaner cuts more acceptable, explains the special-
ist. Marinating steaks before ist. Marinating steaks before
cooking on an outdoor grill, or slow cooking barbecue are also popular cooking methods well
