

# Moonlight Sale Bargains Set Here; Santa On Way

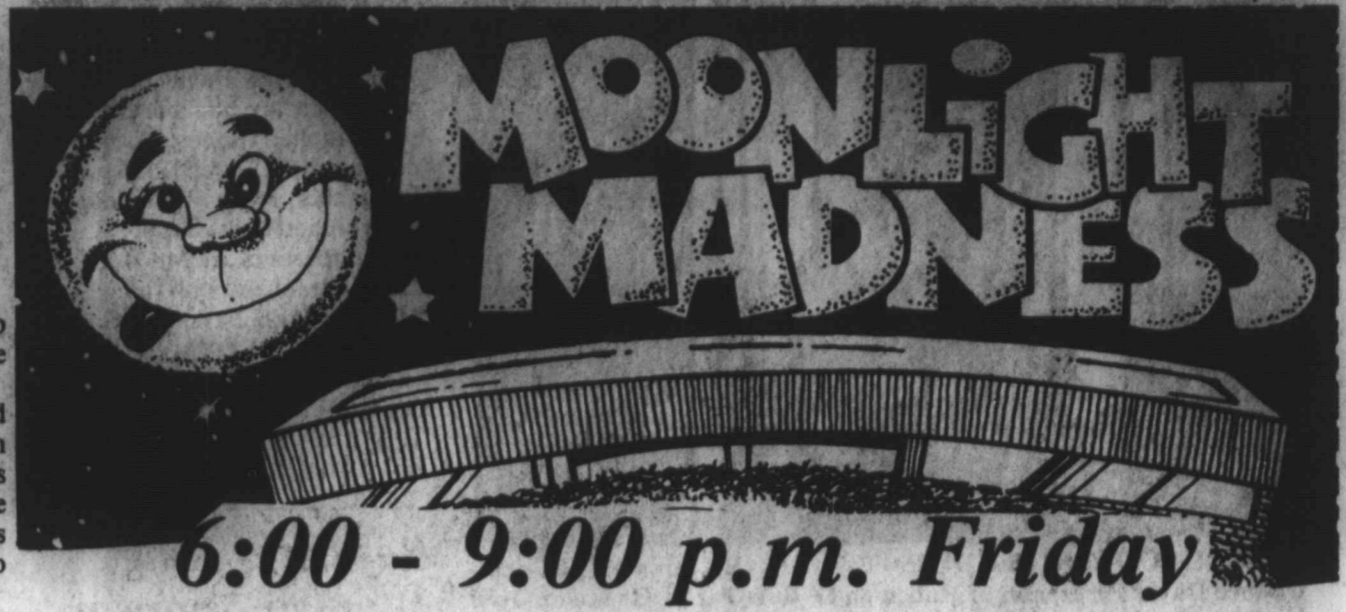

## No Bids Received On Courthouse Steps

Lynn County Commissioners Monday were all set to open bids for replacement of the concrete steps on the north side of the courthouse, but no bids were received. A new effort to get bids on the project is planned.

With all commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon present, the group also discussed possible membership in an area patho-

logical service to perform autopsies, which is being considered by South Plains Assn. of Governments. No action was taken pending further information on the plans. The commissioners also took no action on a proposed resolution to SPAG Agricultural Development Corp., preferring to get more information before nominating a director for the organization.

Also discussed were arrangements for auditing financial statements, and early payroll checks for county employes in December.

Approved were payment to a court-appointed attorney in a criminal case and membership in Farm Bureau, with dues of \$25.

## WOODWORK

OUT IN OUR yard are some plastic jugs filled with water, and next door and across the street there are also similar containers with water placed around the yards. There are some others in town, too, and not long ago one of these weird magazine salesmen came to my door and before I hustled him off, he wanted to know why so many yards around town had bottles of water placed in them.

"They are supposed to keep dogs from (doing unpleasant things) on your lawn," I told him. He didn't believe it, and wanted to know did it really work. I told him I didn't much think so, but we never had got around to removing the bottles of water, which make good conversation pieces.

There are some folks who swear it works, but nobody I have heard from can give any reason why. I suspect that most people who have bottles of water out on their lawns are just trying it on the off chance that it might work.

A "Dear Abby" column in a recent issue of the Lubbock Landslide-Diary addressed the

issue, with a letter from a reader in Seattle telling about how well it worked. However, a veterinary consultant in California said he checked it out, including taking his own dogs to some of the yards which had mayonnaise jars or coffee cans filled with water, and his dogs did the usual things which dogs do on everybody's yard but their own.

There is a better and more infallible solution to keeping the dogs that are running loose out of your front yard: a .22 bullet between the eyes. This works well, but causes all kinds of violent reactions from dog owners who don't really mind if their pets mess up someone else's yard and from the good old Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (remember the people screaming about using a baboon's heart to try to save a little baby?).

The bottles of water do work well for keeping away some more vicious animals, panthers, for instance. There have been no panthers in our yard since we put the bottles out.

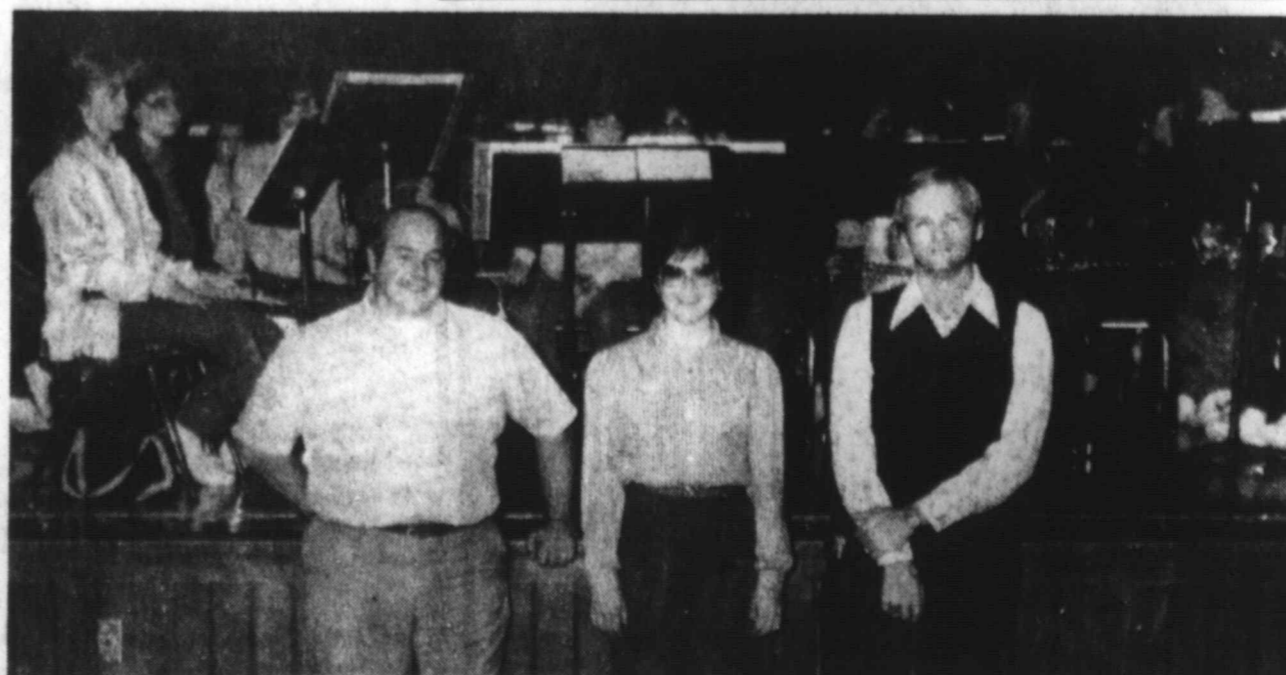
No other players for Tahoka were named to the first team, but Tahoka had four spots on the second team, including Morin as placekicker.

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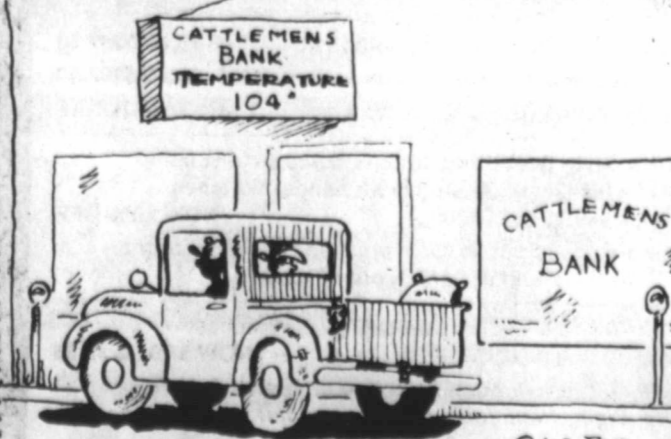

## Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

**COTTON STALKS**, by themselves, provide very little protection against hard blowing winds. However, with a little help and very little expense the stalks can be made to stop a lot of wind damage. One way is to leave the stalks and spread cotton burs on the field. The burs may be placed in strips 12-15 feet apart or spread solid. If left this way through the blow season, about April 1st, there will be little if any damage from wind or water. Another inexpensive but effective method is to run a chisel between the rows of stalks. The roughing of the soil along with the stalks will provide adequate soil protection. Stalks can be cut later or left, chemicals applied, and bedded back on. There are two objects to keep in mind, ie, adequately protect the soil and cut expenses. ## Slaton's Dr. Payne Has Delivered 7,000 Babies

Dr. Glenn Payne of Slaton, who graduated from O'Donnell High School in the mid-1930s, has stopped delivering babies as part of his practice. In 40 years of practice in Slaton, Dr. Payne has delivered more than 7,000 babies, with many of his patients being from Lynn County.

Dr. Payne, who as a boy lived 3 miles east and a mile north of O'Donnell, was the subject of a feature article in the Slaton Slatonite last week, part of which is as follows:

After nearly 40 years delivering babies in Slaton, enough babies to equal the present population of this town, Dr. Glenn B. Payne has stopped delivering babies as part of his medical practice. His decision brings to a close an era which saw him touch the lives of thousands of Slaton families over the years.

"If we ever get a new hospital built here, which seems to be the requirement to get another doctor to serve in it, I may resume my obstetrics practice," he said. "But as it is now, since I have no back-up physician practicing with me at Mercy Hospital, if I leave town for even two hours I feel guilty when I have expectant mothers relying on me."

In the four decades since he received his license to practice medicine, from Southwestern Medical School in Dallas, Dr. Payne estimates he has delivered well over 7,000 babies. "Obstetrics probably provides the happiest aspect of practicing medicine," said Payne. "Of course when things go wrong it can be one of the saddest, too. But on the whole, delivering babies is very rewarding and satisfying."

"Probably if it hadn't been for World War II which called me for service, I would have continued on and specialized in obstetrics. But by then I was married and had to earn a living."

After completion of his internship at Gallinger District Hospital in Washington, D.C., he served four years from 1944 to 1948 in the U.S. Marines first in a field hospital in the Pacific theater then for one year after the war in China.

His year in China, six months of it in Peking, left a lasting impression on Payne who has numerous Chinese artifacts decorating his offices. "Peking was a walled city with its gates locked at night then. Outside the city gates was a large thieves' market where you could buy anything you wanted if you had the money...all of it stolen. Conditions there were really pathetic after the war. But beyond the human misery, there were fascinating things to see in a culture as ancient and different from ours as China," he said.

He came to Slaton in 1948, practiced five years, then was called back into the military to serve as a doctor for one year during the Korean conflict. This time, however, his service was at Camp Pendleton, rather than overseas.

**Home Deliveries**

The intimacy of a small town practice was one of the reasons Dr. Payne settled in Slaton. "I came here in 1948 and practiced one year in partnership with my cousin, Dr. Averitt Payne. Then I practiced for a while with offices in both Lubbock and Slaton. I finally decided to stay in Slaton because I liked the town better." Dr. Payne began his practice in an age marked by change from old ways to new. "For the first six months here, we delivered babies in the

home...As part of our training, we had to make at least 20 home deliveries. But that practice was phased out soon after I came to Slaton.

He recalled one home delivery story which pointed out the contrast between ancient ways and the new. "A Dr. Snyder and I worked as partners then taking each others calls and he came back from one home delivery and recounted his experience." When Dr. Snyder arrived at the home there was a large, old woman with rubber kitchen gloves on presiding over the "birthing" proceedings. She and Dr. Snyder prepared the mother, then sat down to wait for what looked like would be a long time.

Eventually the old woman suggested to Snyder that it was probably time to "quill her". He pretended to know what she was talking about and agreed to it with a certain amount of suspicion. The old woman filled a turkey quill with snuff and dropped some of the tobacco in the laboring mother's nostrils. The resulting produced the baby immediately!

When there was a high influx of migrant workers each year, Dr. Payne occasionally delivered babies to mothers who had not seen a doctor in pregnancy, a few in his office.

**Modest Fees**

Fees for medical services were modest by comparison to present standards. However, Payne began his practice after the age of the old country doctor had passed. "I was never paid in 'barter' such as chickens and pigs," he said with a grin. "But then I didn't always receive the payments either!"

Fees for various medical services when he began his practice were \$2 for an office call; \$35 for a home delivery; \$75 to \$100 for a hospital delivery with a \$50 fee added for a C-section; \$100 for an appendectomy. Whatever the fees charged, through the years Payne has tried to keep his fees affordable so anyone could afford health care in Slaton. "Even before Medicare and Medicaid, there wasn't anyone in Slaton ever refused medical care by any of the doctors who practiced here."

He and his wife, Mary (who as a former nurse "has always understood" about the long hours and the 24 hours a day on-call nature of a doctor's life) have three children, two daughters and a son. Paul Payne is a doctor specializing in obstetrics and gynecology in Dallas; Rita Payne has just begun her practice in Lubbock in obstetrics and gynecology and Glenna Pember is a teacher in Houston.

**General Practice**

Dr. Payne, who at 68 is one of the oldest practicing physicians in Lubbock County, is also one of the few of a vanishing breed of general practitioners in this age of specialization. "Even doctors who set up practice now as 'family doctors' or G.P.s now don't do it all," he said. "If they have a family practice, they don't handle gynecology-obstetrics, pediatrics, orthopedics or surgery. Those fields are handled by specialists now," he said.

Dr. Payne is one of the rare doctors who still makes house calls. "When I first started my practice, I probably made as many house calls as office calls. When the weather got bad, they'd call me out because they couldn't get into town on the roads. I recall one snowy day when I got two of my own cars stuck and two borrowed cars stuck getting to my patient's homes."

He continued, "There is more stress in being a doctor than most people realize. I think sometimes, when a doctor has known his patients for as long and as well as I have, the stress is even greater than that on a doctor who has less personal contact with his patients. It can be very depressing to see people I've known to be vigorous and productive, wither and lose physical ability with age and disease. And as many times as I have seen death in the years I've practiced, it never gets easy...especially the untimely death of the young."

## Cotton Prices Trend Upward

High Plains growers sold mixed lots at slightly higher prices than last week, said Mack Bennett, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services Office in Lubbock.

Mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and 51, staples 31 and 32, mikes 35-49 traded at about 950 to 1,000 points over Commodity Credit cotton loan rates, up about 100 points from a week earlier. Gins paid growers \$100 to \$125 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$100.

Light to moderate rains last weekend slowed harvesting in western counties, but halted harvesting in eastern counties. When gins cleaned up backlogs on gin yards, they began searching for more seed cotton, mostly field stored in modules. Many eastern county gins had to halt operations because fields were too wet to support module moving equipment. "Drying conditions have been poor all week," Bennett continued.

Daily sample receipts dropped from about 30,000 before the rains to about 15,000 this week. The Lubbock office classed about 101,000 samples during the week ended Wednesday before Thanksgiving. This brought the season's classing total to 234,000 and compares with about 204,000 classed by the same date last year.

Freezing temperatures have visited northern and central High Plains counties. Southern counties continue to wait for this season's first freeze.

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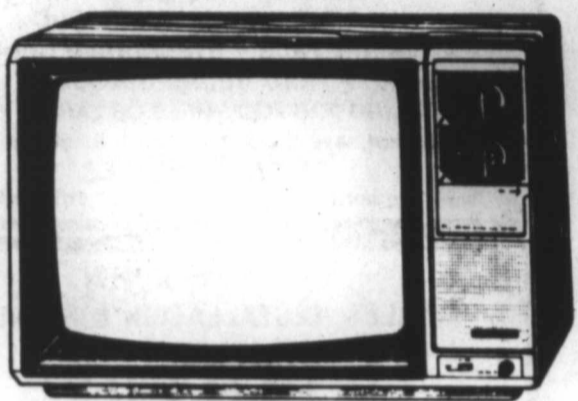

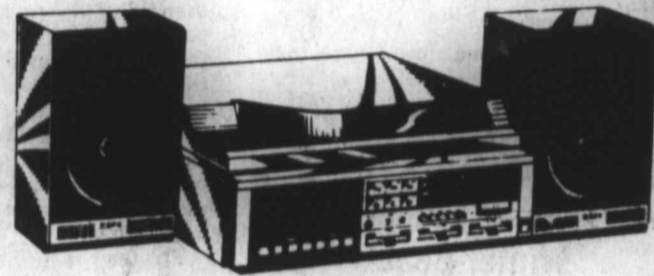

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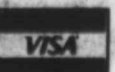
