Burglary, Gasoline Thefts Investigated

Gasoline was stolen from key pumps owned by Lamesa Butane and located just outside the city

limits of O'Donnell on N. Loop 76 on succesive nights, Dec. 3 and Dec. 4. A total of 100 gallons of gasoline was stolen, and the key pump locks damaged.

Bond Vote Set Jan. 12 On Two City Projects

Voters in the City of Tahoka will have opportunity Jan. 12 to say whether they want a new fire station and a new public meeting room and other remodeling at city hall.

The Jan. 12 date was set by the city council Monday night as members voted unanimously to have a \$150,000 bond election which would result in a raise of 8.5 cents per \$100 valuation in city taxes, which are now 49 cents per \$100 valuation. It would cost the average taxpayer in the city about \$20 more per year in taxes.

The bonds would be paid out over a 10-year period, and Mayor Meldon Leslie said Monday night that he already has had an inquiry from a possible source of financing.

Two propositions will be listed on the ballot. One is for \$100,000 for demolishing the present Scout Hut on city property just east of city hall and then building a modern adequate fire station to accomodate the equipment and other needs of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept.

The second proposition is for \$50,000 for remodeling city hall, primarily the part now used to house the fire equipment. That portion would be remodeled into public meeting room which could accomodate up to 126 persons in banquet style, and would convert a present recreation room into a meeting room for city council larger than the present meeting room, which has almost no space for visitors to council

If the propositions are approved by the voters, the city plans to let the scouts have the present community center for a meeting





FmHA Helps Rural Families Through Programs

The Farmers Home Administration helped 3300 Texas households through its single family and rental programs during the 1984 fiscal year, State FmHA Director J. Lynn Futch reported recently.

The loans, totaling \$101,000,000 were made under programs to assist families who are without safe, decent and sanitary housing and who need credit but cannot obtain it from private lenders.

Futch said that during the 12 months ending Sept. 30, FmHA provided 1600 single family home loans totaling \$55,000,000, and 52 rental housing loans totaling \$46,000,000 which provided for 3300 loans totaling \$2.8 billion in all rural housing assistance.


