

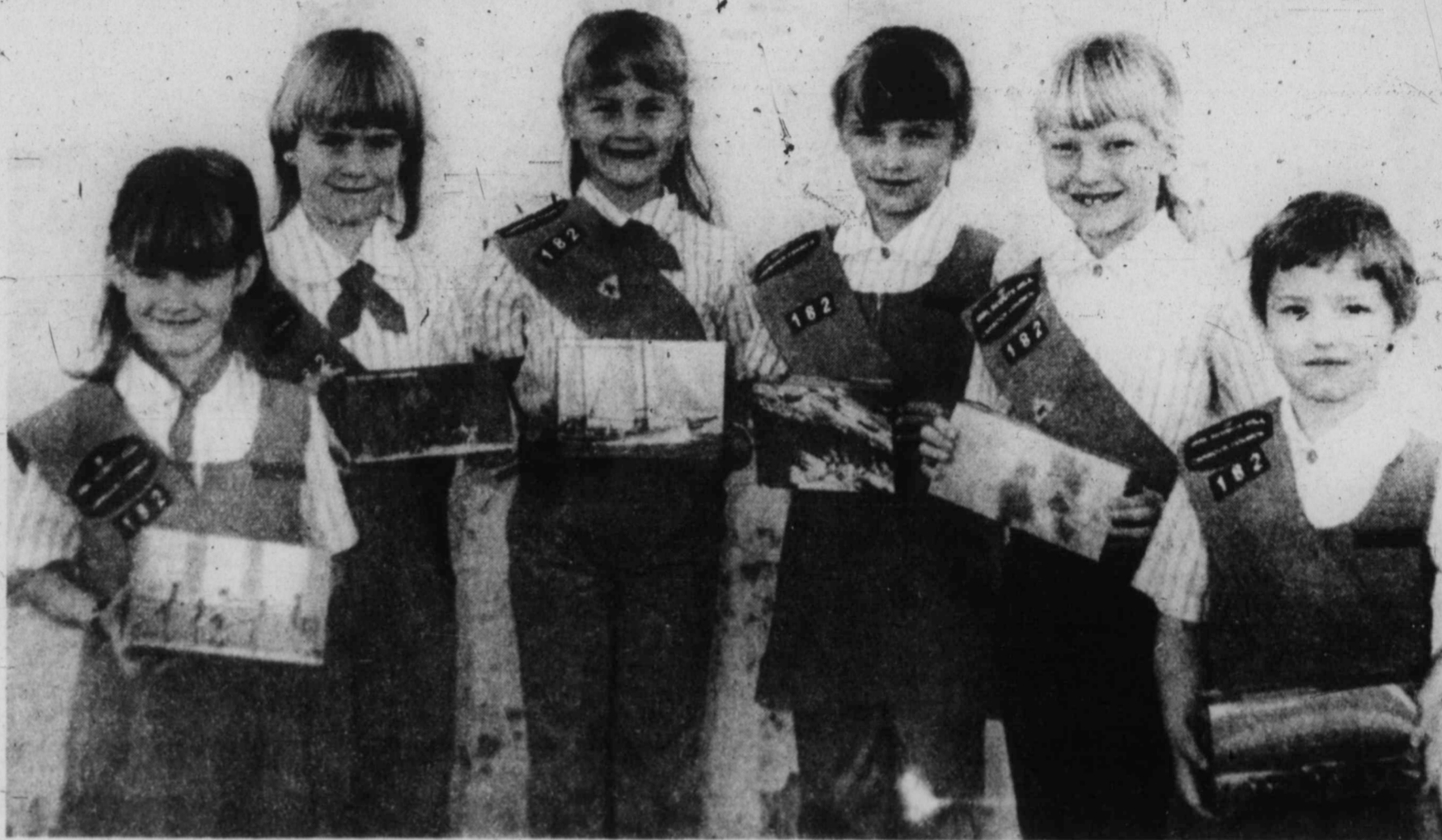
Brownie Troop Gets Set For Upcoming Cookie Sale

AN EDITORIAL:

New Fire Station In Tahoka Needed

Voters in Tahoka will decide Saturday whether to allow the city to issue bonds for construction of a new fire station and remodeling of part of city hall.

There is no group in Tahoka that serves the community and surrounding area as faithfully as the volunteer fire department--and they do it without pay, going out in miserable weather at all hours, and often at risk of injury or even death. They deserve the best facility the city can provide. Another good reason for building a new fire station is that the present facility simply is too small to meet the needs of the near future.

The total proposed bond issue is \$150,000, with \$100,000 of it to be used to tear down the present Scout Hut and build a new fire station. If this is approved, the city plans to fix up the present community center for use of the scouts. The second proposition on Saturday's ballot is to issue \$50,000 bonds for remodeling city hall so the present fire department portion can be used as a community center, providing a meeting room for groups to up to 126 persons for banquets, family reunions, etc. There are no plans to build any new offices for the city manager, police department or secretarial help.

Voting "for" on both propositions will mean an increase of 8.5 cents per \$100 valuation in city taxes. This means, for example, that if you own a house valued at \$20,000, your taxes would increase by \$17 per year.

The Lynn County News believes both propositions are well worth the cost and that the firemen and other citizens deserve the best facilities possible. Please vote for both propositions Saturday.

Vote On Bond Issue Scheduled Saturday

Qualified voters in the city of Tahoka will go to the polls Saturday to say whether they want a

new fire station and a new public meeting room and other remodeling at city hall.

On the ballot will be two propositions, totaling \$150,000. If approved, taxpayers will face an increase of 8.5 cents per \$100 valuation on their property. Currently city taxes are 49 cents per \$100 valuation.

The proposed increase would cost homeowners \$8.50 more per year in taxes if his home were valued at \$10,000, or a \$20,000 home would be taxed \$17 more and a \$40,000 home \$34 more.

The bonds would be paid out

in a 10-year period.

Proposition 1 on the ballot would allocate \$100,000 for tearing down the present Scout hut just east of city hall and building a new fire station on the site. The new fire department would have enough room to house the newest type fire trucks and equipment, which the current fire department facility could not accommodate. Also, there would be showers for firemen coming in from a dirty job, and other modern accommodations.

If the issue passes, the city plans to do some work at the present community center building and turn it over to the scouts. Then, if the second proposition on the ballot passes, the city would remodel the part of city hall now used by the fire department into a public meeting room, with new restrooms and a kitchen, and change the present recreation room into a larger meeting room for the city council.

Mayor Meldon Leslie explained that the present council meeting room is not large enough to accommodate more than two or three visitors.

None of the money would be used for expansion of the present front offices or the police department in city hall, Leslie said.

All voting will be at the school cafeteria Saturday, with polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Directors voted to price banquet tickets at \$7.50 per person. Tahoka Chamberettes will serve the meal.

A major feature of the banquet will be announcement of the Tahoka Citizen of the Year for 1984. Chamber secretary Rachel Huffaker told the directors that she has contacted clubs in the city to ask for nominations. However, any citizen or organization may submit a written nomination for any person, male or female, for the Citizen of the Year award. All nominations must be received by Feb. 1 at the chamber office, Box 777.

A committee was named to nominate seven new directors for the chamber. There will be five holdover directors with a year remaining on two-year terms.

Vice President Dalton Wood presided at the meeting of 11 persons.

WOODWORK BY DALTON

THE IRS has saddled businesses, including farmers, with some new and impossible rules of record-keeping regarding business use of vehicles, saying that if you don't keep a daily record of the mileage and how it is used, you can't deduct anything at all from your income taxes for that vehicle.

Also, they aren't allowing any business use for driving to and from work, and if your vehicle isn't used at least 50 per cent for business, you get no deduction at all for it, and some other stuff that I can't recall offhand.

The main thing is that you have to keep a record of every mile and what you did it for, business or personal.

Folks who haven't enjoyed the benefits of depreciating cars as a business expense will no doubt be pleased that those who do now will have to

account for every mile. But keeping a daily record in every car, pickup or van is a pain in the exhaust pipe. Following is my first day's record of mileage in the company pickup:

Mileage, Jan. 2, 1985, 29,301. Backed vehicle out of garage to street, .008 of a mile. Pickup could have been left in street, but placing it in garage kept it protected from weather and increases resale value, so putting it into the garage is a necessary business expense, since it makes money for the business.

Drove from street to office, 1.2 miles, all personal use, except stopped at business on the way to pick up an advertisement. Not sure if distance from that business on to office (.5 mile) is business mileage, or if I should have driven on to office, then turned around and drove back to business to get

Stenholm Offers Bill To Balance Budget

WASHINGTON--Cong. Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) has introduced legislation that would require the nation's government to operate under a balanced budget.

The proposal, which could become the 27th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, was filed by Stenholm on the opening day of the 99th Congress, which has just convened in the nation's capitol. Stenholm, who is co-sponsoring the bill with Cong. Larry Craig (R-Idaho), said the proposal is vital to the nation's future.

"The tremendous deficit-spending habit that our government has is one of the most, if not the most, serious problem facing our country in 1985 and beyond," the Stamford Democrat said. "If we do not learn to live within our means as

a government, our grandchildren will pay dearly."

The proposed amendment would not allow Congress to pass a budget in which outlays exceed receipts, unless three-fifths of the total membership of both the House and Senate vote specifically to do so. The President would also be required to submit a balanced budget to Congress.

Presently there is no effective deficit-spending barrier. Tax-and-spend issues are decided by a simple majority vote. Potentially unpopular votes, such as tax increases, are sometimes incorporated into votes on essential legislation, rather than being voted on individually.

More than 80 other Members of Congress have already signed on as co-sponsors to the joint resolution, which is being called the Craig-Stenholm bill after its originators.

If approved by Congress, the legislation would then be presented to the states. In order to amend the constitution, 38 states must ratify any proposed amendment.

Police investigated an accident on Tuesday, Jan. 1, at the intersection of North 5th and Ave. P that involved a 1977 Ford

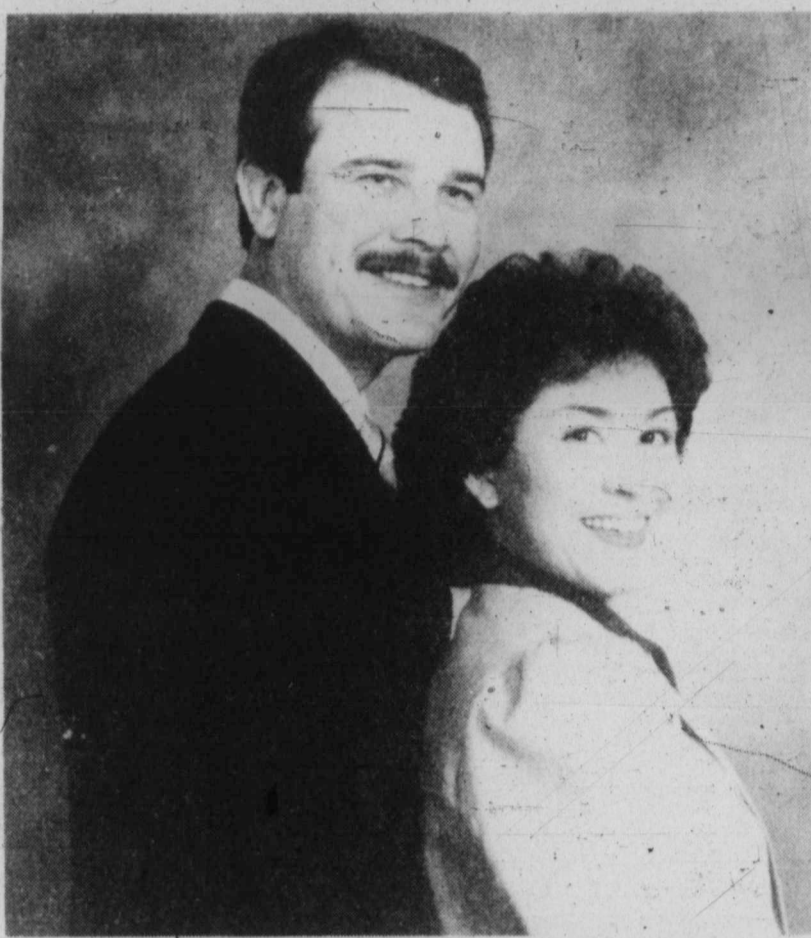

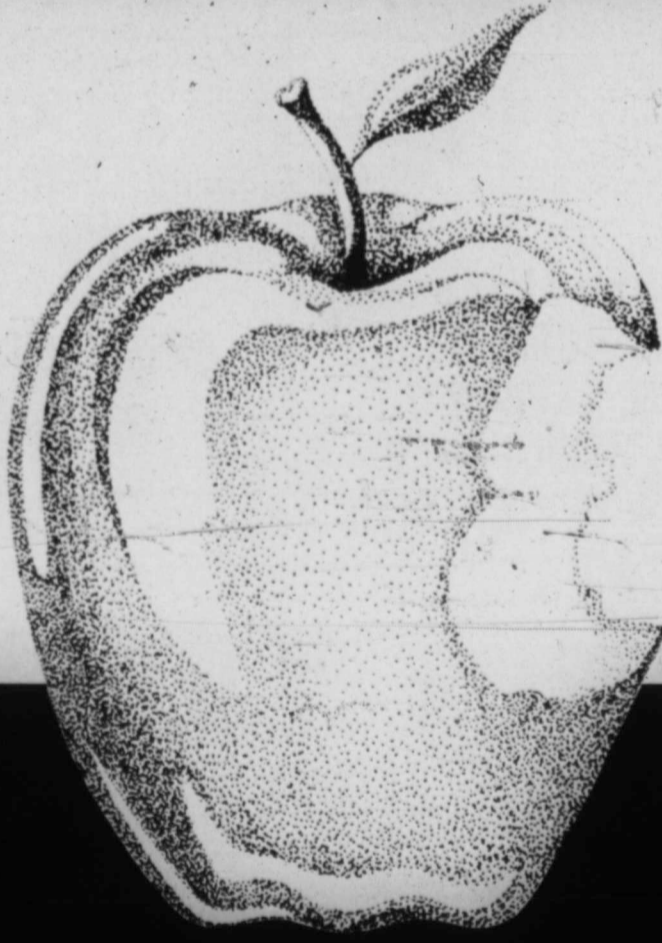

Year-End Cotton Prices Decline

This-week's spot cotton on the Texas High Plains was moderately active. The new year approached and some growers needed to sell before Jan. 1. Mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31-32, mike 30-32 brought growers around 650 to 800 over 1984 Commodity Credit loan rates. This was 1 to 1½ cents per pound below a week earlier, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Demand weakened and so did prices.

Generally wet, foggy weather since the weekend before Christmas kept harvesting at a slow pace. Gins cleaned up backlogs and some moved modules. Poor drying conditions kept these activities at low levels.

Daily sample receipts continued to decline at the Lubbock office, Bennett continued. Estimated receipts for the week ended Thursday, Dec. 27, was around 50,000 samples. The estimated carryover of unclassified samples by Thursday-night was about 56,000, down 72,000 from a week earlier.

Harvesting was estimated at 75 percent off-the-stalk when the wet weather slowed it.
