

City's Voters Reject Fire Station Bonds

'Ma' Hill Honored As Top Employee

Mrs. Loretta "Ma" Hill, cashier at Dayton Parker Health Mart Pharmacy in Tahoka, has been selected by the parent Health Mart chain as "an outstanding employee", the first person so honored in the chain of 231 stores located in 21 states.

When a Health Mart official recently was visiting the Tahoka store, he was so impressed with the energy and devotion to duty of Mrs. Hill, 77, that he initiated a new program of special recognition for outstanding employees and Mrs. Hill was the first person so honored.

Store owner Dayton Parker commented that "nobody is more deserving of this type of recognition than Ma Hill...she walks to and from work in all kinds of weather (Mrs. Hill never learned to drive), is the first one on the job and stays as long as

we'll let her. She does everything from scrubbing floors to handling money."

The widow of John N. Hill, who died in 1977, Mrs. Hill worked for Robinson Ready-To-Wear on the west side of the square for 26 years before starting to work with Collier-Parker Pharmacy in 1967, after Robinson's closed. She has a daughter, Mrs. Charles (Joretta) Smart of Lubbock. Mrs. Hill is a member of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka.

"She is the most loyal, dependable, hard-working employe any business could hope for," Parker said.

Health Mart stores are located in the northeast, midwest and southwestern U.S., and it is the 16th largest independent drug chain in the nation.

Possibly the largest turnout of voters in history for a city bond election went to the polls here Saturday to turn down proposals for two bond issues, one to build a new fire station and the other to remodel city hall.

A total of 344 votes was cast, with 195 voting against the proposal for issuing \$100,000 general obligation bonds for a fire station, which city officials had proposed to build just east of the present city hall and fire station. Voting for the proposal were 149 persons.

The second proposition on the ballot, to issue \$50,000 bonds for remodeling city hall and making a public meeting room to accommodate up to 126 persons in banquet style, was rejected 211 to 129.

Canvassing the votes in a called meeting Monday night, city council men observed that the turnout was very high.

If the proposals had passed, the city would have increased taxes by 8.5 cents per \$100 valuation to pay out the bonds over a 10-year period. In 1981 city voters approved a bond issue to repair all paving in the city, a \$175,000 issue which was financed by a 7-cent increase in taxes. The turnout in that election was a total of 105 votes, less than a third of Saturday's turnout.

According to Mayor Mel Leslie, this is the first time a city bond issue has failed.

Members of Tahoka's volunteer fire department told council members Monday night they were "extremely disappointed" by the results of Saturday's vote.

Some Of Crop Still In Fields

Farmers stayed out in the fields all day and far into the night on the best weather days of the last week, although new moisture at times kept them out. Much of this year's crop has been stripped, with about 80 per cent of the crop ginned, by one estimate.

Gins were busy this week catching up, particularly on modules, but some cotton-still is on the stalk around the county.

"The turnout has not been good," one ginner said. "When we're finished, we probably will have ginned about 60 per cent of the total number of bales we first thought we would have."

He estimated that the crop would be all harvested and ginned only after another two weeks of good weather, making this one of the latest crops in years.

Commissioners Name New Grievance Unit

Lynn County Commissioners Monday named nine citizens to a new county grievance committee, replacing the former committee which had been composed of persons elected to county offices.

Last year's group approved salary raises for themselves and other county employes after elected officials protested planned increases in salaries as being inadequate. The new committee was chosen from grand jury lists, but those chosen had not been contacted at press time to determine whether they would serve.

Commissioners also approved paying dues to various state and area organizations and reappointed members to the county historical committee, replacing the late Frank Hill with Sonya Huffaker. Named chairperson of the committee was Mrs. Kenneth Turner.

A contract for fire service was signed with the City of O'Donnell, with the county to pay that city \$1,250 annually.

A scheduled appearance by an official regarding the county and state retirement program did not materialize, as the official was unable to get to Tahoka Monday because of bad weather.

All members of the commissioners court and Judge J.F. Brandon were present.

Tire-Slashing, Wreck Listed

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated one wreck during the last week with no injuries reported. Lynn County sheriff's office investigated a tire slashing incident at Wilson.

In the 2100-block of Main Sunday a 1978 GMC pickup driven by Lewis Rangel of Tahoka and a 1982 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jeffrey Leon Jennings of Tahoka were involved in a collision.

Rudy Sosa of Tahoka told officers a radial tire valued at \$73.80 was slashed on his pickup parked at Wilson school Saturday. A juvenile suspect was questioned in the case.

Police also answered two family disturbance calls and had two complaints of persons receiving obscene phone calls. Police issued one ticket each for failure to control speed on icy road, making illegal U-turn and no drivers license and driving without headlights.

In jail during the week were one person for public intoxication and one on a traffic warrant.

BE SURE TO mail your valentines by Valentine Day, because first class and other postage are going up on Feb. 17, when it will cost you 22 cents to mail a letter. It might be a good idea to mail your Christmas cards for next December before the 17th, also.

In the weekly newspaper business, about 75 per cent of our circulation is through the mail. The rest is sold on newstands or stolen from the bottom of bird cages. We have always operated on the principle of trying to charge enough in subscription rates to pay for the labor used in mailing the paper, the cost of materials in mailing such as stencils, and the time keeping them updated, mailing out renewal reminders--and of course, postage.

It varies with the number of pages in the newspaper each week, but it costs us about 7 cents per copy to mail a newspaper. With the other costs involved in getting the newspaper to the readers, the current subscription price doesn't cover the expenses. So, if we don't make any money on selling papers, how do we make money? Well, we steal hubcaps on weekends and at night. No, I'm just joking, officer; advertising is our main source of revenue. So if you want to do the newspaper a favor, tell some business person you saw his/her ad in the paper.

Second class mailing (the class for newspapers) is still cheaper than mailing a letter, but second-class mailers have been sorely discriminated against by the Postoffice Dept. in recent years. According to information from the Texas Press Assn., in the last 12 years, the cost of mailing a first-class letter has increased 174 per cent. Second class in-county rates have gone up a

whopping 618 per cent. And third-class bulk regular--which clutters up your boxes with junk mail--has gone up just 141 per cent.

When the new postal rates go into effect in February, second class rates will increase for some size newspapers, and decrease for some others, but further increases are scheduled in October. We have been advised unofficially that our own rates will go up about 13 per cent.

Okay, so what can we do about it? Nothing except complain; however we briefly considered just stacking all the papers out in front of the office and having everyone come by and get his own.

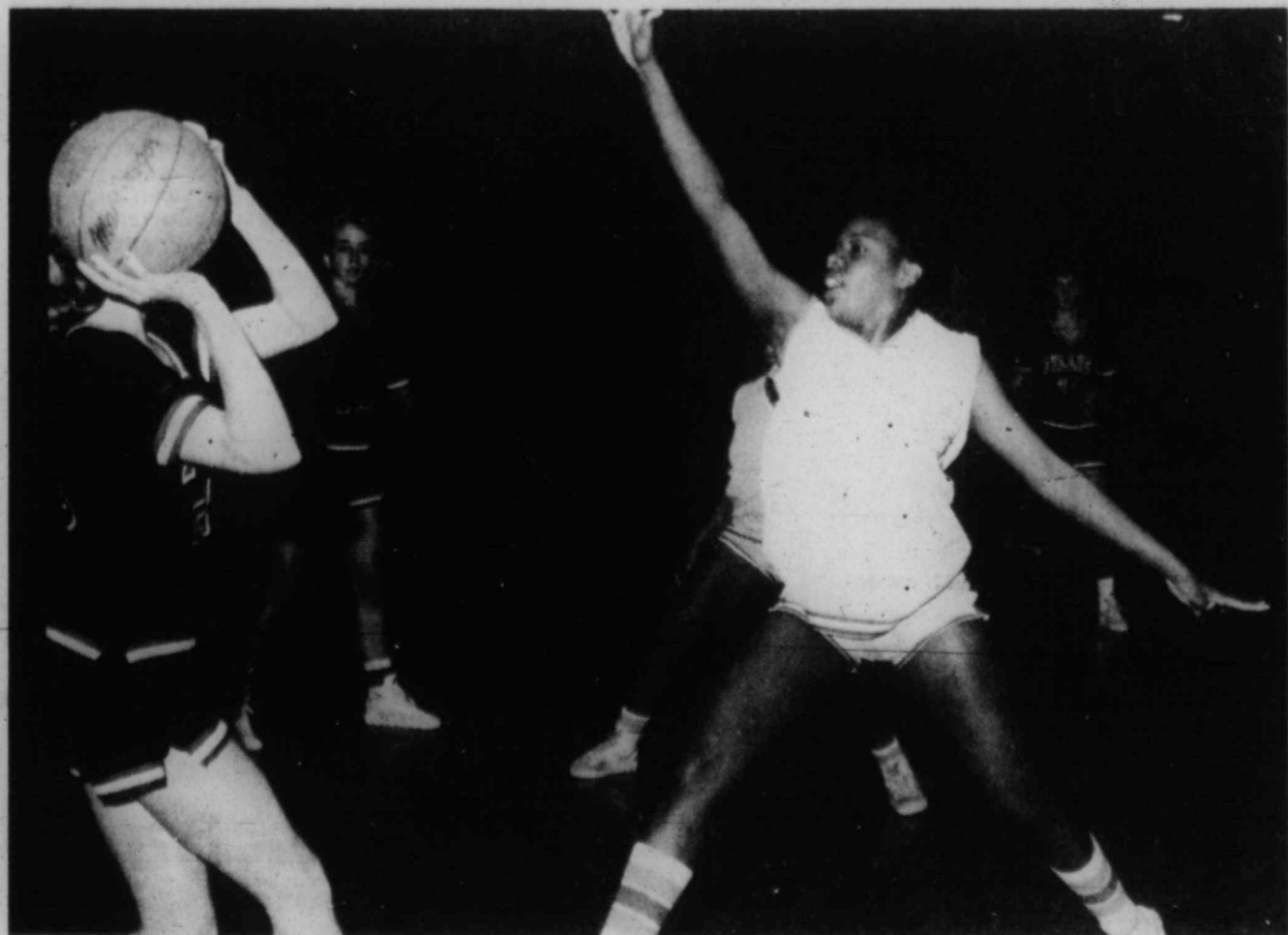
(By the way, when you're griping about the higher prices for mailing letters, don't fuss at your local postoffice workers. They don't make the rules or set the prices, and besides, nearly all of the small-town postal workers do a better job and are a lot more courteous doing it than their counterparts in the big city offices. Direct your complaints to your congressman.)

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Students To Jump Rope For Dollars For Heart Fund

Students of Tahoka Elementary School will jump rope to raise funds for the American Heart Assn. in a Jump Rope for Heart event scheduled the week of Feb. 16-18.

The three-hour event will feature students who will jump rope as team members. Each team member will jump until tiring and then pass the rope to another team member. The sequence is repeated for a maximum of three hours.

Prior to the event each participant will recruit sponsors, family, friends, and neighbors to make pledges based on each minute their team jump. Following the event the student will return to sponsors with a verified report of how long they jumped and collect the pledge. These pledges will then be turned in to

the Jump Rope for Heart Coordinator and forwarded to the local American Heart Association.

All participants will receive a certificate of appreciation. Students, who turn in their pledges by a special date will receive a jump rope. Each member of the team raising \$25 or more will receive a T-shirt, for \$100 to \$199 will receive a backpack or barrel bag and for \$200 or more a warm-up suit.

"The kids really get excited over this. More than the prizes, they get a real sense of satisfaction from helping people," states Julie Hall, jump rope coordinator for Tahoka Elementary Schools.

The Jump Rope for Heart event is sponsored by the Texas Assn. for Health, Physical Education & Recreation and the Governor's Commission on physical fitness. More than 80,000 students are expected to participate in the event here in Texas.

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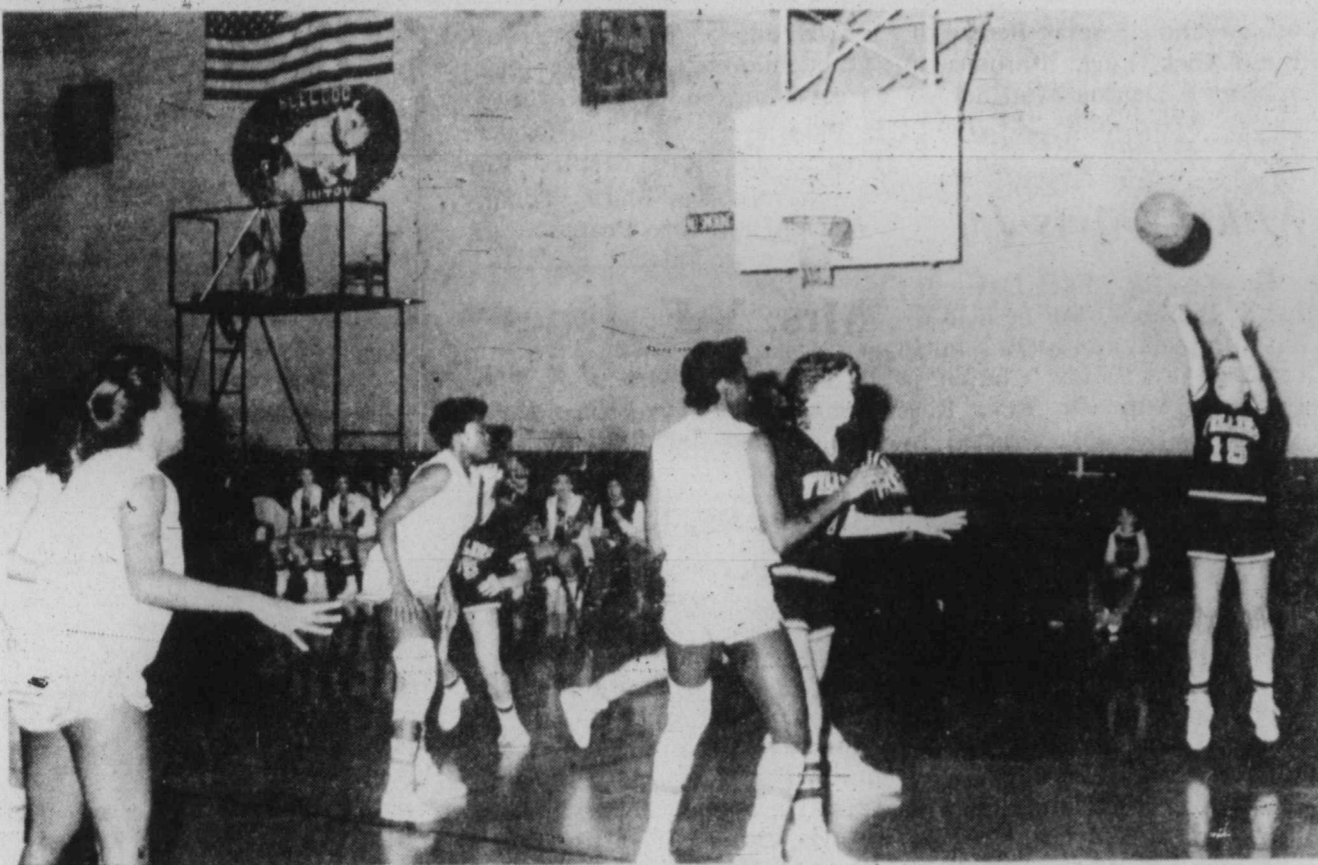

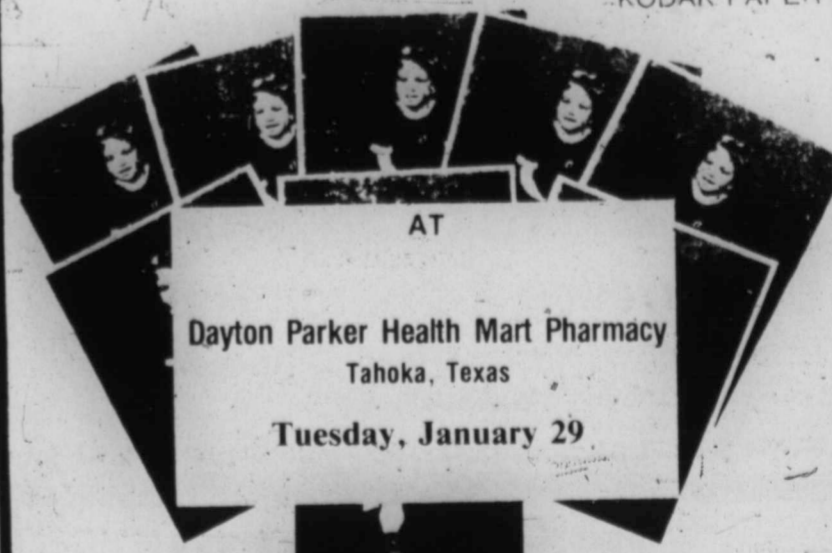

Carriker Reports Results Of Poll

State Rep. Steven Carriker, District 78, this week reported the results of a recent poll he took of constituents on various legislative issues.

Carriker, who said he received more than 2,500 returns on his questionnaires, said he plans to introduce legislation in the current session to correct some of the problems created for West Texas schools by the last session's House Bill 72.

Results of the poll:
1. House Bill 72 has caused significant increases in school property taxes in many districts. Do you favor a property tax relief measure such as Proposition Zero to replace some property taxes with a state sales tax? Favor 64.7%; oppose 21.4%; don't know 13.9%.

2. Do you favor amending House Bill 72 to return policy decisions on absence and extracurricular activities to local school boards? Favor 76.2%; oppose 19.1%; don't know 4.7%.

3. Do you favor changing Texas weekend closing laws (the "blue laws") to allow sales of most consumer goods on Sunday? Favor 71.3%; oppose 24.6%; don't know 4.1%.

4. Should the Legislature act to update the minimum agricultural wage from 1.40 hr. in order to prevent federal court intervention? Favor 67.7%; oppose 14.0%; don't know 18.3%.

5. Do you favor a law which would limit the terms of service

of state legislators? Favor 51.2%; oppose 32.3; don't know 16.5%.

6. Some legislators accept pay for representing clients before state agencies. Would you favor a law to prohibit this practice? Favor 80.6%; oppose 10.9%; don't know 8.5%.

7. If it would result in more efficient use of tax dollars, would you favor annual legislative sessions? Favor 77.3%; oppose 14.9%; don't know 7.8%.

8. If the Legislature is to avoid additional tax increases, spending cuts may have to be made. Please check the areas in which you feel it is important to avoid making cuts. Education 60.2%; Highways 37.8%; Aid to the elderly 65.5%; Prisons and law enforcement 37.7%; State schools and hospitals 34.1%; Child abuse prevention 46.3%.

9. Would you favor allowing the phone company to charge you separately for each local call (local measured service)? Favor 6.0%; oppose 88.8%; don't know 5.3%.

10. Would you be willing to pay \$1.20 a year to fund the Public Utility Counsel to represent consumers when utilities want rate increases? Favor 67.7%; oppose 22.9%; don't know 9.3%.

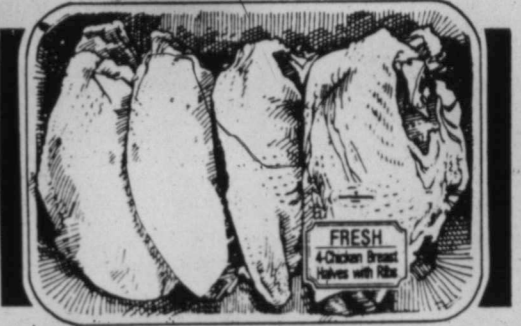

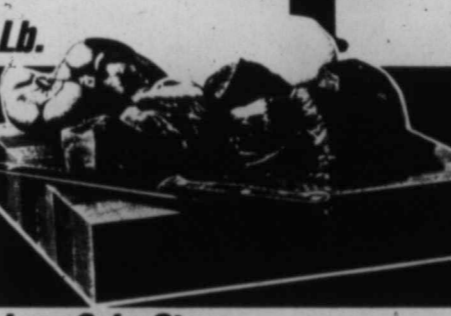

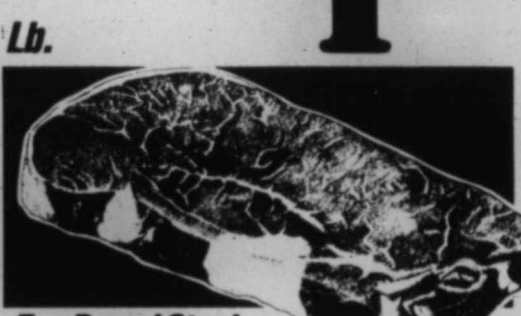
