1985 Stock Show Underway

Judging in the big Lynn County Livestock Show for 1985 will get underway today (Thursday) at 6 p.m. when the steer judging opens the show, which actually began Wednesday with weighing of steers and lambs. Lamb judging will begin at 7 p.m.

The biggest part of the show, the barrow competition, will take place starting at 9 a.m. Friday. Also at 9:30 a.m. Friday will be judging in the baked goods division. Baked items will then go on sale at 1 p.m.

The Pee Wee Barrow Show for children under nine years of age is scheduled for 5 p.m. Friday (Barrows will be furnished).

Barbecue Planned
Broiler judging will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday. At 11:30 a.m. Saturday the popular barbecue luncheon will begin, with serving to continue for at least an hour.

Immediately following the barbecue will be the annual sale of animals and presentation of awards. The auction always is a big event with the results showing the youngsters how their efforts are appreciated by business and individuals in this agricultural area.

Show officials are: Barrows, Johnny Peugh of Stanton; Steers and Lambs, Melvin Chism of Earth; Broilers, Chris Kountz of Lubbock and Baked Goods, Sandy Allison, Debbie Zimmerman, Carolyn Jackson and Jane Blay.

Trophies Given

Lynn County Farm Bureau will present trophies to grand champions and reserve grand champions, and to the showmanship winners. Herdsman awards will be presented by Robert Harvick Insurance Agency. Special donations have been made by First National Bank of Tahoka, Wilson State Bank of Wilson, and Production Credit Assn. of Tahoka for the financing of the show.

Andy Fillingim, president of the Livestock Assn., said he is hoping for a good turnout by the public at all events in the show.

General Superintendent of the show is Barry Weaver, with Danny Preston as assistant. Math Bartley is superintendent of the steer division, David Wied for lambs; Steve Miller for barrows, Jack Miller for broilers and Nancy Franklin for baked goods.

Taxes To Be Delinquent After Jan. 31

All property and personal taxes will be delinquent as of Feb. 1, according to Dovie Miller of the Lynn County Tax Appraisal Office.

Penalty starting Feb. 1 will be 7 per cent, and an additional penalty of 2 per cent will be added each month thereafter, Mrs. Miller said. No penalty will be assessed if taxes are paid by Jan. 31.

Tahoka school taxes, Wilson school taxes and county taxes may be paid at the appraisal office, 1636 Ave. J in Tahoka.

County Businesses May Get SBA Loans

Businesses in Lynn County which suffered "substantial economic injury as a result of the 1983 Payment-In-Kind (PIK) land diversion program of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture" will be eligible for low-interest, long-term loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), County Judge J.F. Brandon was advised this week.

Agriculture-related business owners interested in applying for the economic injury disaster loans should contact the SBA Area 3 office in Grand Prairie by calling toll-free, 1-800-442-7206.

Sales Tax Rebate Payments Up

"Statewide payments are up more than 15 percent over last January's checks, mostly because of the new items brought under the sales tax by the Legislature last summer", Bullock said. Bullock cautioned city governments not to expect similar increases for the rest of 1985. "The cuts we've had to make in expected state revenues are coming from the slump in the oil industry and reduced receipts from oil companies aren't yet reflected in these payments."

January checks represent taxes collected on sales in November and reported to the Comptroller by Dec. 20.

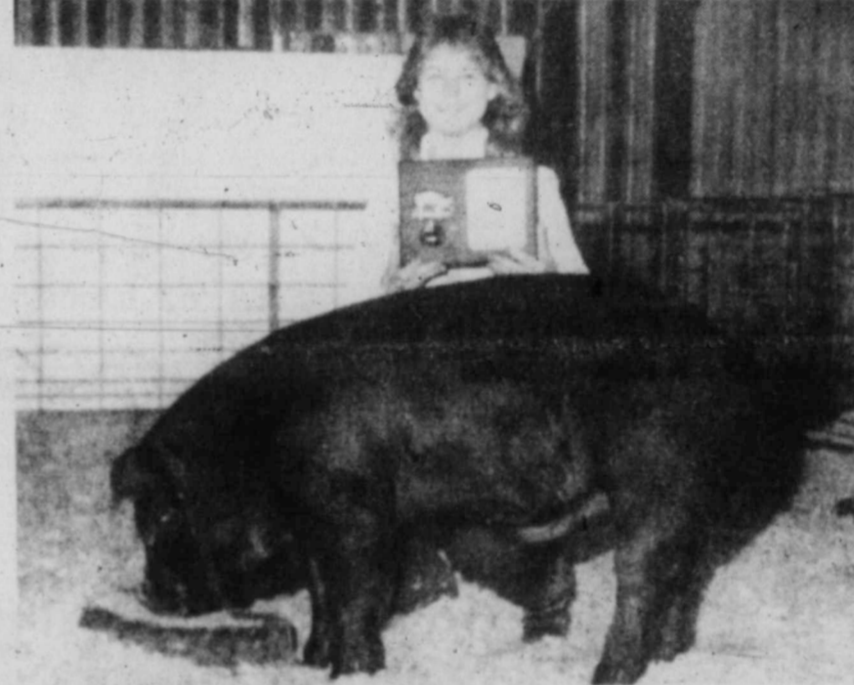

Rural Home Burglary Brings Reward Offer

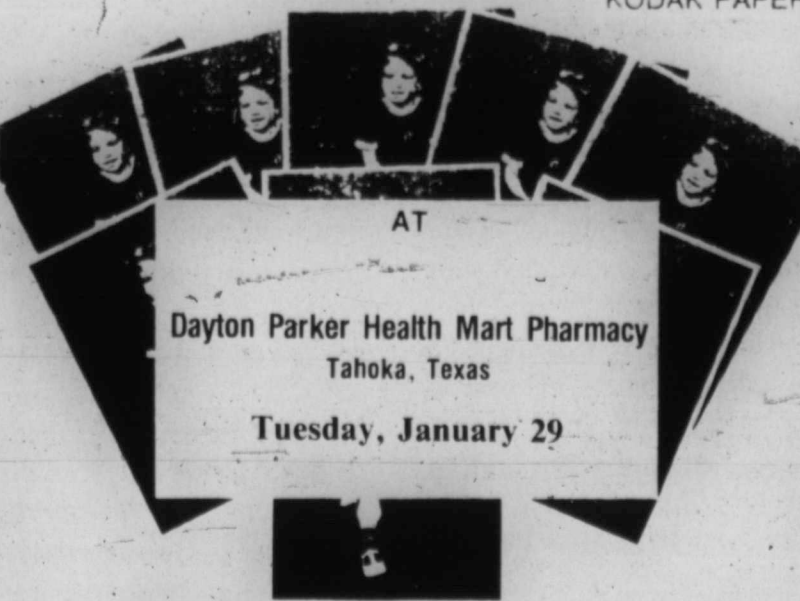

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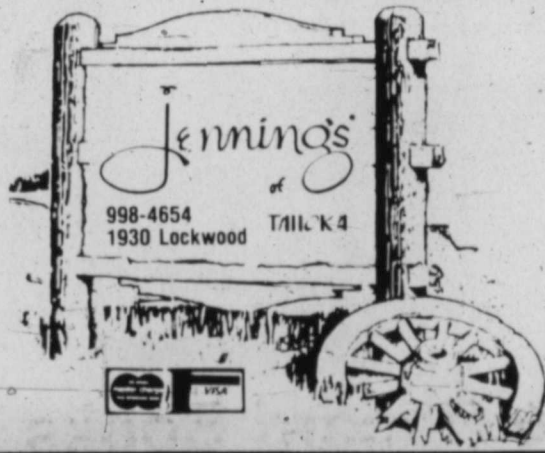

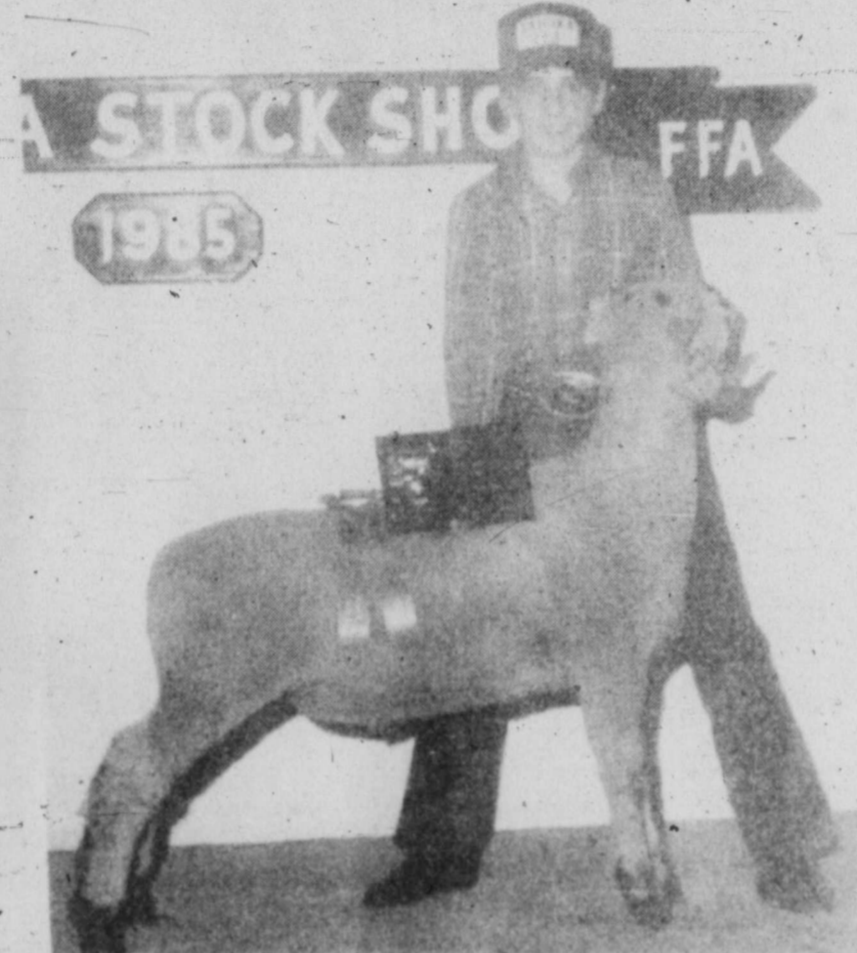

E.M.S Volunteers Needed

Volunteers are badly needed to keep the Lynn County E.M.S (Emergency Medical Services) operating.

People of Tahoka, this article is a cry for help. As you may or may not be aware, the ambulance service provided to you, is provided by a handful of volunteers. Volunteers who think having emergency care available is important enough to give up their time and energies. Volunteers, who number to date a total of seventeen, who cover three shifts a day, seven days a week. South Plains Emergency Services recommends that a rural ambulance service have at least thirty-five members to make it a success.

As of January 1, 1985 all ambulances in Texas have to have a driver and two certified attendants. At present Lynn County E.M.S. has only twelve E.M.T.s. We desperately need help, or the ambulance we all take for granted will not be here. We stress, it is not provided by paid personnel, only volunteers.

Think you can not do it? Talk to anyone of the present E.M.T.s and they will tell you they feel the same way. We will not kid you, the job is a challenge and at the best of times, it is enough to give you a headache. But there are so many worthwhile benefits connected to being a member of a public service organization. The knowledge of knowing that you may help another human being, makes all the negative aspects worth it. The myth that the ambulance is run by hospital personnel is wrong, only three of the ambulance staff are nurses trained as E.M.T.s. The rest are people just like you with no previous medical training what so ever.

So we are looking for volunteers to take an E.M.T. course. This course may be provided in Tahoka if we can get sufficient numbers. The only requirements are that; you be between the ages of 20 to 60 years, are in good health, with a good driving record, and are able to function under stress.

Thank you for listening, but we do not need your ears we need your bodies and your time. PLEASE! Take the time to get involved.

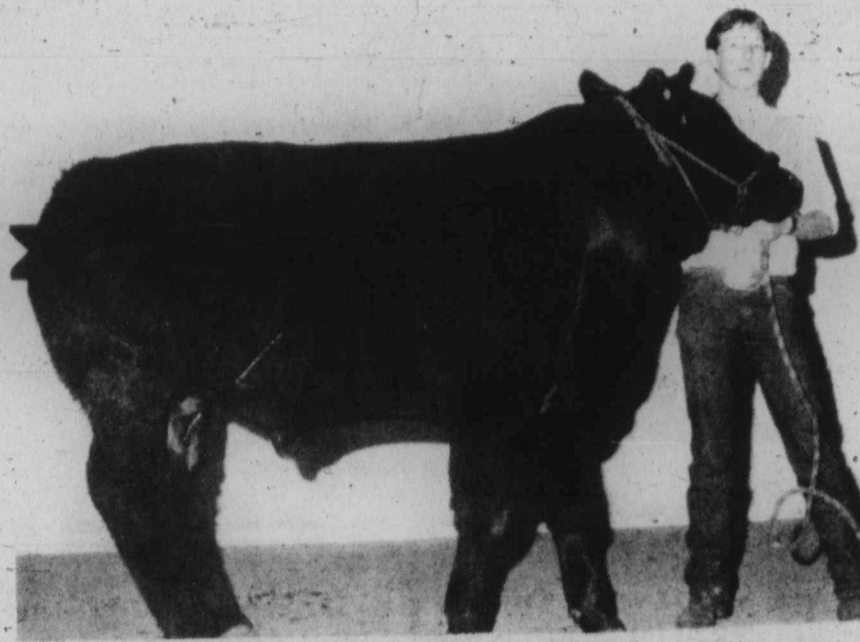
Farm Vehicle Rule Draws Concern: The National Cotton Council has joined with nine other groups in expressing concern over the Internal Revenue Service's proposed record-keeping requirements for mixed-use vehicle including autos, pick-ups and trucks.

In a letter to Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, the

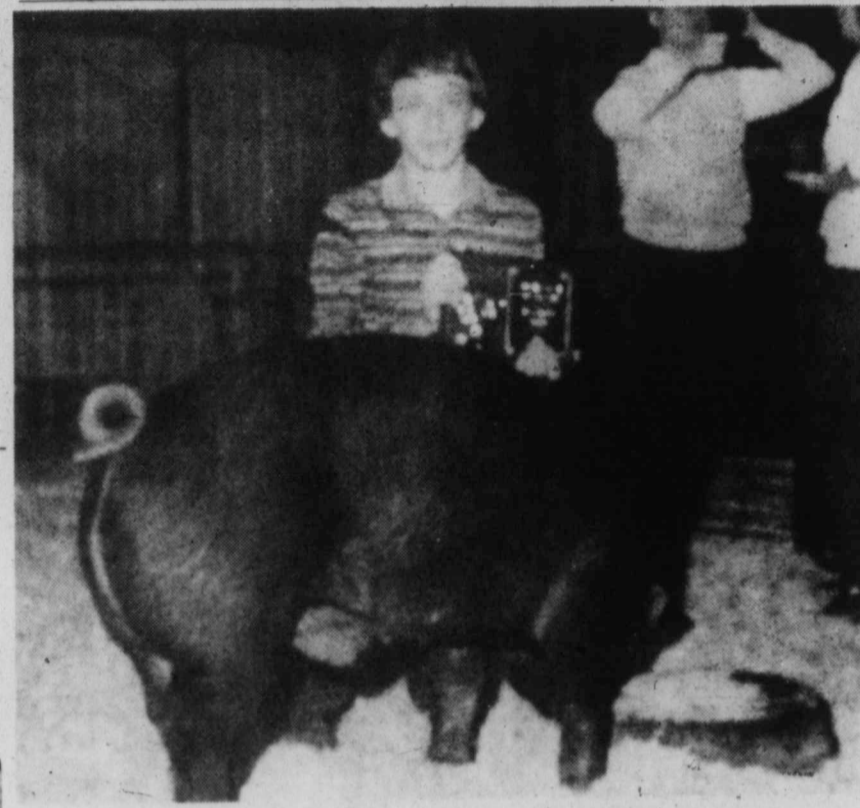
group stated that requiring a daily log or journal of all business uses goes beyond what is reasonable to justify deductions. The journal must include date, operator, purpose, and mileage of all business uses and this, the letter stated, places a tremendous time and paperwork burden on farmers and ranchers. The group urged a return to the present system of substantiation.

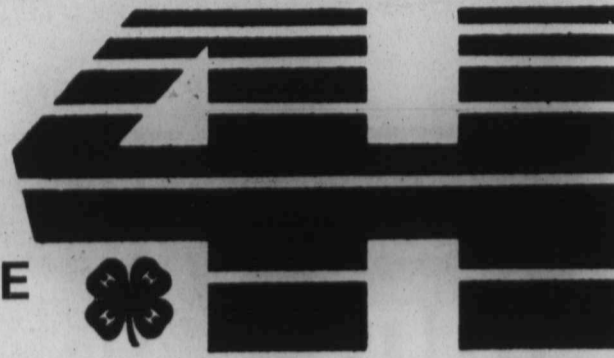
