Tahoka Bank Depository For County

First National Bank of Tahoka was accepted as the depository for Lynn County funds for the next two years as county commissioners Monday looked at bids submitted by the Tahoka bank, Wilson State Bank, First National Bank of O'Donnell and Sentry Savings.

Commissioners voted to pay the Texas Assn. of Counties the quarterly payment of \$2,123 for workman's compensation through March 31.

Bids were opened from three companies on a new maintainer for Precinct 4, but no action was taken pending further study of the bids by Commissioner J.T.

Payment to the 7th administrative judicial district for 1985, totaling \$180, was approved, as was renewal of insurance coverage on the Extension Service building and library.

County Clerk C.W. Roberts was given approval to attend a clerk's meeting in College Station in March.

Mayor Proclaims February As **Heart Month**

Mayor Meldon Leslie issued a proclamation this week designating February as American Heart Month and urged Tahoka area residents to support the 1985 campaign to be conducted nationwide.

"These diseases accounted for nearly \$,000,000 of the nations deaths last year and more than 50,000 here in Texas," Leslie said, more than half of the deaths from all causes.

Volunteers in the Tahoka area will join the effort to distribute heart information and collect contributions to support research, education and community service projects. These programs are aimed at reducing early death and disability from heart disease and stroke.

Evidence indicates that some heart disease can be traced to an early age in life and that the disease could be prevented if bad habits, poor nutrition, lack of exercise, smoking and others were prevented in the first 20

Sen. Montford **Introduces New** Legislation

State Senator John T. Montford has introduced legislation in the Texas Senate which would increase the number of commissioners to serve on the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. The High way Commission determines where highway funds will be spent in Texas.

The Highway Commission currently has three members who are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of th Texas Senate. Under Senate Bill 264, the current three member board would be expanded to a six member board with each member serving a six-year term.

One third of the board, or two members, would come up for appointment every two years. Also the Governor would be required to appoint members to the commission on a geographic basis so that all regions of the State will be represented on the Commission.

The market value of property in Texas school districts totaled \$745.5 billion in 1983, according to a study just completed by the State Property Tax

cutive director, said property values have increased by 21 percent since 1981, the date of the last study.

The study estimates that \$636.5 billion of the total value was actually taxable by the state's 1,070 school districts. Taxable value is calculated by deducting from market value the value of state-mandated homesteads and veterans' exemptions and value lost because of productivity appraisal acreage, the school tax ceiling for over-65 homeowners, and the portion of appraised values unavailable for taxation within reinvestment zones.

Patterson explained that the study of the local school district property tax base is required by the Texas Education Code. " A chool district's taxable value estimate is one of several factors used by the Texas Education

Agency to determine the district's share of state education aid for the 1984-85 school year,' said patterson.

SPTB's report shows a total market value for each school district, a breakdown of the total by property category and the deductions made in calculating the district's taxable value.

Statewide, the total market value of Texas school districts increased by \$129.6 billion, or 21 percent, over the value determined in SPTB's 1981 study. Values on the school districts own tax rolls totaled \$590.3 billion.

Overall, the study estimates that about 15 percent of 1983 market value, or \$109 billion, was not taxable by school districts. State-mandated emptions reduced the total by \$18.3 billion, compared to \$14.3 billion in 1981. The school tax ceiling on over-65 homesteads removed another \$6 billion in value. Productivity valuation for agricultural and timber acreage lowered the value totals by \$84.4 billion. Reinvestment zones removed only about \$36.7 million

The largest category of property value was single-family residences, which made up over 28 percent of 1983 values. Their value increased by 25 percent from 1981 to a total of \$212.6 billion.

Values of commercial and industrial real properties combined with business personal properties accounted for a fourth of the value totals and posted a 27 percent increase from 1981.

Oil, gas and minerals made up about 11 percent, or \$84.7 billion, of the state's market value for 1983. However, their value was virtually unchanged from 1981, reflecting the slump in oil and gas production in

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

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

Crime Stoppers Offer Reward

The people around the West Texas town of Coahoma say Anthony Ginnetti was a super salesman.

Investigators from the FBI, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Swisher and Howard County Sheriff's Departments say the same thing. The only problem, they say, is that all Ginnetti sold was a "bill of goods"

Ginnetti, who also goes by the names of Terry Lee Ginnetti, Terry Lee Prero, Anthony Culpert, and Tony Argus, is wanted by state and federal law enforcement officials on charges of defrauding the Coahoma State Bank out of \$260,000 and a private individual out of some \$150,000.

The dapper-looking 37-yearold fugitive began negotiating with Coahoma State Bank in October, 1982, to secure an automobile "floor plan" for his Car City Auto Sales and Service business. The original agreement, say investigators, was for \$38,000 worth of automobile purchases. A total of \$20,000 was to be secured by a Certificate of Deposit held by the bank and the rest of the loan was to be secured by automobile titles held by the bank as collateral.

But detectives say that between October 1982, and April 1984, Ginetti was able to get the "floor plan" raised to \$80,000, with \$30,000 in CD's and the remainder in automobile titles.

During the same period of time, say investigators, Ginnetti was able to defraud the bank in the following manner:

-replacing all automobile titles held by the bank with illegally acquired titles, thereby effectively reducing a portion of the collateral held by the bank.

-passing insufficient fund checks, which were honored by the bank.

while Ginnetti might have left the state, there is a possibility that he might still be somewhere in Texas operating in the same manner.

Ginnetti is described as white male, 5-9, 175 pounds, with blonde hair and blue eyes...

High Volume Breaking strength averaged 25.5 grams per tex at Lubbock during the week ended Feb. 7.

High Plains cotton moved lower. Growers sold moderate amounts of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 30 to 32, mike 30-32 at around 300 to 350 points over 1984 loan rates. This was 25 to 75 points per pound lower than a week earlier. Gins paid growers \$88 to \$105 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$90 to \$95.

Conditions For Harvest Poor

Cold, damp weather hampered final harvest efforts on the Texas High Plains. The on-again-offagain harvest was estimated at 98 percent off the stalk late this week, said Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Many modules remain stored in fields.

"Southern counties had a late killing freeze and that's where most current ginning is underway," Bennett continued. Low micronaire and low gin turnouts have been disappointing during the past few weeks. These two factors resulted in a lower estimated High Plains production in early January.

USDA's Crop Reporting Board lowered the Texas district number 1, covering the High Plains, from 2.76 million 480 pound

HEATING SEASON MEANS COLD SEASON--It's inevitable. The cold weather means we turn on the central heating. The heat dries out the air. And this lack of moisture causes noses and throats to dry, making the mucous membranes of our noses and respiratory systems more susceptible to infections.

The average adult can expect to catch two colds during the year. The average child under four years old is likely to have as many as eight colds.

Americans spend millions of dollars each year on pills and formulas aimed at relieving runny noses or stuffed-up heads. Some may even make a visit to the doctor. But the Health Insurance In-

stitute points out that the money spent on medicine or doctor's visits is doing little good.

Extensive studies by the Food and Drug Administration have shown that there is no generally accepted treatment which can prevent, cure or shorten the course of the common cold. Bedrest and plenty of liquids are as good as any medicine - and a lot cheaper.

Most colds will normally last between two days to a week, no matter what you do. If you have one that lasts much longer though, you may not have a cold at all. It could be an allergy or sinus infection and in this case, see your physician.

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
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
