Little League Signup Slated Here Saturday

Signup for all boys and girls interested in playing Little League baseball and softball is scheduled this Saturday, March 23, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Tahoka Community Center, S. 1st and Ave. K.

The league, open to all residents of the county, requires a registration fee of \$10 per player, and youngsters should also bring a copy of their birth certificate, unless one has already been filed with the league.

Bob Lamp, league president, said there will be "T-Ball" for 6-7 year-old boys and girls, minor league for those 8 and 9, and major league for 10-12 year-olds. New additions to the program this year will be girls softball for ages 9-12 and senior league baseball for 13-15 year-olds. The league is open to boys and girls alike, except softball is restricted to girls only. The age for league play is whatever age the player will be on July 31.

truth, I am better at splitting infinitives than at splitting logs. I knew this all the time, but it was brought home to me with renewed emphasis when I tried to split some logs I had cut with my trusty little chain saw.

much for firewood when you cut your own as it does when you buy it off a truck, but that's another story. What I want to deal with here is the fact that when you cut down a tree, part of it usually is too large to get into the average fireplace, much less burn, So when you have it all sawed up into the proper lengths, you get two or three of these 3-pound wedges and an 8-pound maul (a sledgehammer with a pointy side) and if you drive all those wedges into the wood at the proper angle, and hit it enough times with the maul, the log splits down the grain and you have two pieces more manageable and burnable than the one you started with.

If you drop one of the wedges on your foot, it hurts like...it hurts a lot. If you miss the wedge with the maul and on your follow-through it glances off your ankle, it also away.

TO ACTUALLY TELL the causes some re-evaluation of that day's priorities.


