

Principal, Coaches Resign

Longtime Tahoka school administrator Clifton Gardner resigned last week as elementary principal and three coaching assistants were on their way out, some involuntarily, after the Tahoka school board met last Thursday to consider contract renewals for regular teachers and faculty members.

About 40 teachers and parents attended the school board meeting, which was moved into the school library to accommodate the crowd, most of whom apparently were there to observe. Some dissatisfaction with various programs or actions involving individual faculty members was indicated, but no specific presentation was made to the board by any of the visitors.

Gardner's resignation as North Elementary principal followed by a month the resignation of Tom

Cooper as principal of Tubb Elementary. The two grade schools are to be combined as one school with one faculty and one principal starting next year.

fications and reasons for seeking election. A question and answer session conducted by an organized panel will follow.

Any citizen wishing to address a certain concern or question to the candidates should contact one of the following panel members: Mrs. Jill Warren, 924-7301 or Mrs. Leah Taylor, 998-5142, or other panel members, Lynn County News Editor Dalton Wood, Mrs. Minnie Lou Ash or Barry Weaver. These panel members will direct all questions to the candidates.

Forum organizers request this method be adhered to rather than questions from the audience. According to committee members, the purpose of the forum will be to enable voters to make a better choice at the ballot box on April 6.

basketball coach, was accepted. Boys basketball coach Felix Fabila had resigned previously, but he was rehired Thursday night as a Spanish teacher only. Contracts were not renewed for coaching assistants Mike Underwood and Julie Hall.

The board moved to authorize the superintendent to recruit a teacher/head high school girls basketball coach and a teacher/head high school boys basketball coach, each within a maximum bonus range of \$6,000 above state schedule of salary. Dale Summitt also was authorized to seek applicants for the elementary principal's position.

Fees for driver education courses were set at \$80 for Tahoka students and \$120 for out-of-district students.

Contracts were extended for the other teachers and school employees in the Tahoka system.

Business manager Loretta Tekell reported a balance in all funds on Feb. 28 of \$975,343, and at that time 1984 tax collections totaled \$710,501 and were 87.76 per cent complete.

The board was advised by Supt. Summitt that enrollment in grades kindergarten through 12 totaled 786 on March 20.

Following the April 6 election to fill two places on the school board, the trustees will meet on April 8 to canvass votes. The next regular meeting is scheduled for April 11.

Thursday's meeting did include the usual executive session with the visitors excluded from discussions of personnel, but the meeting was adjourned at 11:30 p.m., earlier than usual.

All school board members were present.

The Wilson First Baptist Church will hold a Bible Conference Sunday through Wednesday, March 31-April 3, led by Glen Harlin of Plains.

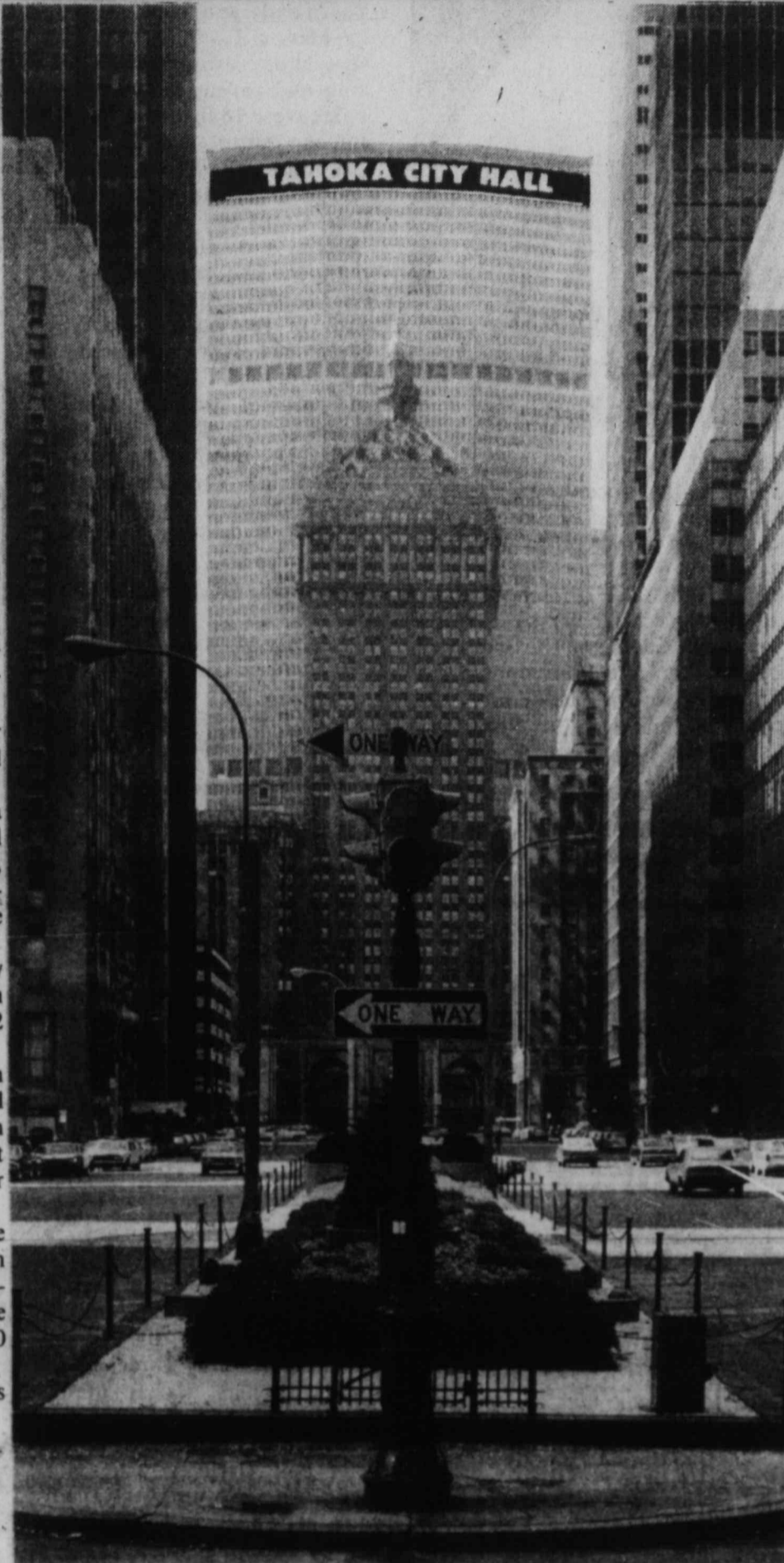
Lunch will be served at the church Sunday with services following. There will be no services Sunday night.

Commissioners Study Library Fund Needs

Lynn County commissioners Monday heard an appeal for more funds for the operations of the county library and also discussed insurance coverage for county personnel and voted to amend the current budget in a few areas to take care of funding requirements.

Librarian Lennie Blackwell explained that the facility needs some increase in funding to allow for more book purchases. The City of Tahoka now provides \$250 per month to the library and the county provides \$200.

Commissioners observed that the money which has been paid to the library monthly comes out of revenue sharing funds, and that there are indications that revenue sharing money will be cut off by Congress. No action was taken Monday on the request for more money for the library.

Judge J.F. Brandon informed commissioners that Gerron Hite of the Texas Historical Committee would be in Tahoka April 2, on a visit related to the county's plans to install an elevator in the courthouse. Since the Lynn County courthouse is designated as an historical site, the state committee has authority to say what physical alterations are permitted and how they are done, in such a way that the appearance of the building is not changed.

Talented Artist's Work Boost To Annual Auction

There are only a few people with the talent to become an artist; an even smaller few ever reach a place where their names are recognizable. In the field of Western Art, Vicki Diggs could be one of these artists.

Born and reared in Roswell, N.M., Vicki attended South Plains College in Levelland where she met and later married Mike Diggs. Mike now cowboys and ranches for the Double U Ranch 20 miles southeast of Tahoka.

Keeping house and rearing seven-year-old Erin and five-year-old Zachary on a ranch doesn't allow much time for work outside the home. Approximately four years ago Vicki became serious about the artistic talents that she had previously used only for pocket money while in high school and college. For as long as she can remember, Vicki has enjoyed drawing in pencil and in ink; she has expanded her skills to water color, pastels, and oil. Vicki went to the "hit-and-miss school of art"; she took lessons occasionally, but never for more than a few months under any one teacher. Most of what Vicki has accomplished has been through experience.

In the past four years, since becoming serious about her art, Vicki has completed more than 200 pieces. "I put a lot of detail into all my work. That is something not all art critics have liked," she said. But there is something the public likes about her art; she has pictures scattered from Florida to California and as far north as Pennsylvania and New York. A colored pencil sketch of a ranch horse, "Viento Uno", hangs in a private home in Paris, France.

Vicki was commissioned to do a painting for the New York office of the Meyer Handelman Co. management firm. In 1984 she was the winner of the Art Contest at the Texas Ranch Roundup in Wichita Falls. Vicki's work has twice graced

the cover of "Texas Hereford Magazine" and she will be featured in the Gallery section of an upcoming issue of "Western Horseman Magazine." She is a past member of the Lubbock Art Assn. and a current member of the Post Art Guild. Vicki is currently busy preparing for the Post Art Guild Show the first weekend in May.

Vicki has been very generous in the past three years by donating some of her art to the Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary Annual Auction. Her contribution has brought from \$400 to \$600 each year and has been one of the highlights of the annual auction. Vicki intends to donate another work for the 1985 Auxiliary Auction.

The Hospital Auxiliary was organized in 1979 and began the Fun and Food Festival in 1981. Approximately \$30,000 in funds have been raised and used for furnishings for the patient rooms and the dining room, trauma kits for the ambulances, EMS training, beepers for the EMS; some of the funds were used to help O'Donnell EMS and \$3,000 was given towards the purchase of the Lynn County ambulance. This year's festival will be April 20.

"With interested people like Vicki Diggs to help, our community will continue to be a healthy place to live," an auxiliary representative said this week.

New Sewing Aids

If you sew, here are some new sewing aids that might be of interest. Check your fabric store for dissolvable basting tape in 1/8" and 1/4" widths. The tape is used to install zippers, to hold a trim in place before stitching, and to match plaids. It dissolves in water without leaving a sticky residue. The original basting tape had to be removed after permanent stitching was completed. Sew-on nylon snaps are another new product. These clear snaps are inconspicuous because they blend in with the fabric and they're flatter than metal snaps. Also look for thread specially designed for fault-free, high speed sewing on overlock machines under the trademarked machines under the trademarked Core-Lock name. It's available in 10 colors.

Sewing Children's Clothes Can Save

How sewing can save up to 80 percent on children's clothing. A recent study compared the cost of ready-made children's wear to the cost of making similar garments with consideration to materials needed and time consumed. The study revealed the genuine need to consider the "time is money" theory in deciding when it is practical to make rather than buy children's clothes. Certainly not all types of apparel should be attempted if excess sewing time is required. However, another advantage to sewing children's clothes is that you can make with built in growth features such as deeper hems or release tucks in sleeve and shirt lengths.

Brownie News

"Don't move someone that has fallen from playground equipment or a tree, for example," points out Lynn County EMS member June Brooks. This and several other first aid procedures were discussed at the Brownie Troop 182 meeting Tuesday, March 19. Mrs. Brooks showed the Brownies the equipment inside an ambulance and explained its use.

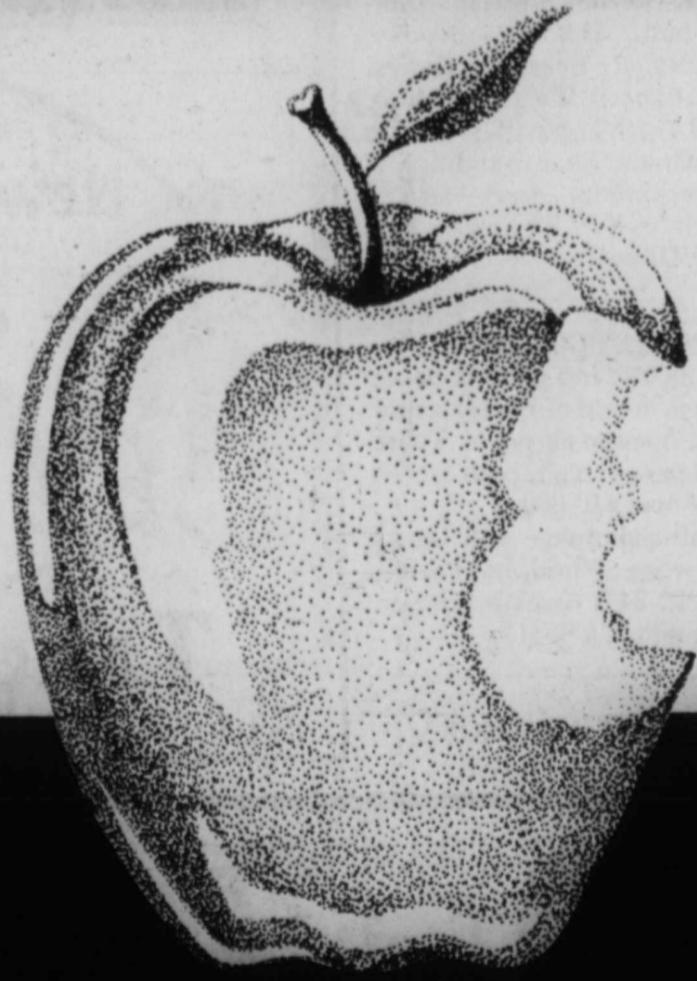

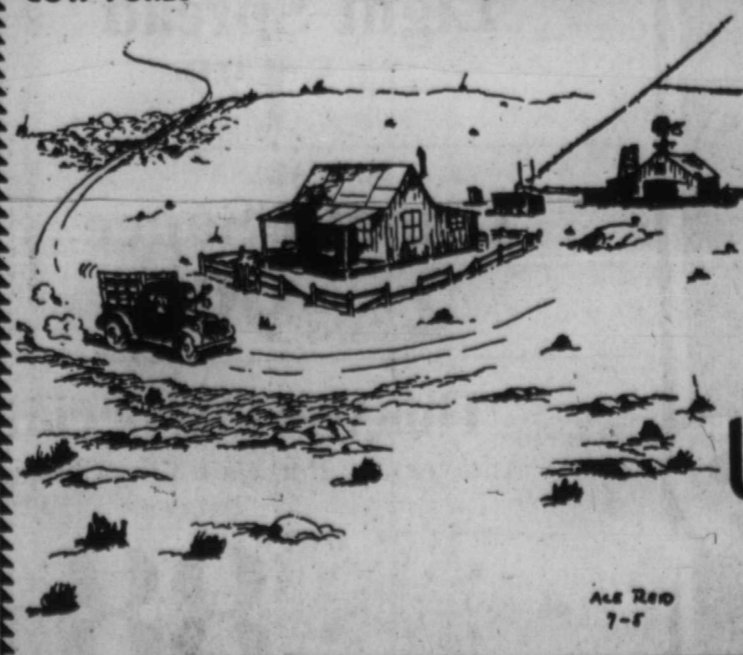

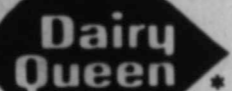

Check Alfalfa For Alfalfa Weevils
The last week of March and the first two weeks of April are critical times for alfalfa producers on the South Plains. This is the time when producers need to examine their

alfalfa for the presence of alfalfa weevil larvae. With the beginning of warm spring weather, overwintering female weevils begin laying eggs. The young larvae which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their back.

"We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity in April in our area," said Young. If larvae numbers are high enough to

reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Treatments should be applied in alfalfa 2 to 6 inches tall when two or more larvae are found per plant or when 30 to 50 percent of the plant terminals show weevil feeding damage. Taller plants 7 to 14 inches tall should be treated when 25 or more weevil larvae per square foot are present. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil control.

The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year and is only a pest of first cutting. After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid May in our area, the larva spins a net-like cocoon on the plant or in the soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa fields all summer and re-enter them in the fall. The adults overwinter in the field and the cycle then repeats itself.

Since the larva are a pest of first cutting, it is sometimes possible to cut a little earlier than usual and avoid chemical treatments. Cutting results in exposure and a lack of food which kills many of the remaining larvae. Winter grazing by livestock helps reduce weevil populations.

Tornado Watch, Warning Designations Explained

The U.S. Department of Commerce mailed us (the News office) a pamphlet recently on tornadoes entitled "Surviving Nature's Most Violent Storms". The National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has supplied information to the public to increase our understanding of a tornado hazard and what to do when severe weather storms threaten.

By definition, a tornado is a rapidly whirling column of air, usually seen as a slender, funnel-shaped cloud that usually destroys everything in its narrow path. When the column of air is aloft and does not produce damage, the visible portion is called a funnel cloud. A waterspout is a tornado in contact with a water surface.

Many of you have probably seen a funnel and if you were living in Tahoka in 1958, you

may have seen or heard the tornado that swept through town. I remember the tornado in Plainview in 1970 and many of us know what happened in Lubbock on May 11, 1970. Every tornado is a potential killer and the tornado season will

soon arrive as the month of May is designated as the peak month of the tornado activity in Texas.

The National Weather Service will issue a tornado watch to indicate when and where severe thunderstorm and or tornadoes are most likely to occur. During a tornado watch everyone in or near the watch area should be alert for signs of threatening weather and make preliminary plans for action. Listen to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for further information.

A tornado warning is issued by local service offices when a severe thunderstorm or tornado is indicated by radar or reported by a trained spotter or other reliable source. However, all tornadoes are not identified by radar or spotters, so if you do see a tornado or funnel cloud, report it immediately to a local government agency so they can relay your report to the National Weather Service. Your report could not only save your life but others as well.

Cotton's White Grade Volume Is Higher

USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock classed 1,760,000 samples during the 1984-85 cotton season, said Mack Bennett, Area Director at the facility. This compares with 970,000 classed during the prior season.

More white grades were classed during this season than any season since 1977. White grades totaled 41 percent during 1984-85 against only three percent a year earlier and 60 percent during 1977's season.

This season's predominant grades were grade 52 at 26 percent, grade 42 was 23 percent, grade 51 amounted to 19 percent and grade 41 was 15 percent. About 36 percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

Predominant staples were staple 32 at 22 percent followed by staple 33 at 21 percent and staple 34 at 18 percent. This season's average was 32.0 thirty-
