## WOODWORK

I'VE HEARD THAT when you get older you remember the good times of your youth as being a lot better than they really were, but I still can't help believing that kids nowadays just don't have as much fun being kids as we did.

In the olden days, by cracky, we used to do some things for fun, especially when we were 9 or 10 or 13 years old, that kids no longer do.

How many kids now do you see getting inside a car tire and having a buddy roll them down a hill? Of course, that was a little bit dangerous, but we did it occasionally.

And how about tops, yo-yos, marbles and rubber guns? I have seen a few youngsters playing with yo-yos in recent years, but I haven't seen a top (the kind you wind up with string and spin) since World War II. I don't know if you can still buy them.

And we used to make our own rubber gun pistols and rifles, sawing them out of boards and putting clothespins on them to hold the stretched rubber (that sometimes were powerful enough to raise big red spots on the shooter). We'd choose up sides and

anytime you got hit you were dead.

I asked a fellow worker the other day if he ever saw any kids spinning tops anymore. "Kids nowadays walk around with Sony Walkmans or jam boxes and play video games," he said.

If we had had Sony Walkmans and video games, I might not have spun any tops, either. But we used to have 10 or 15 of them each, and we'd spin them inside a circle drawn on the ground or the floor, and when it was your turn, you'd plug at them with your own top, and if you hit one, it was yours (unless you split it open).

I remember I had one top that you wound the string around it, tossed it out, and it separated into two tops, both of them spinning. That was neat, I thought, at 12 years old.

We played marbles, too, and once I got into big trouble in school for "playing keeps" at recess.

We also made paper airplanes, and I can say quite humbly that I made the very best ones. I still can make them; I made one at a Rotary Club meeting recently and got into trouble there, too.

## Hays New President Of School Trustees

Joe Hays was named new president of the Tahoka School Board as the group reorganized last Thursday evening following an election the previous week.

Outgoing president Bob Haney conducted the meeting until the election of Hays, and of Jim Wells as vice president and Betty Green as secretary.

Hays then expressed the appreciation of the board to Haney for his nine years as trustee, and the board passed resolutions of appreciation to Haney, who did not seek re-election, and to Clifton Gardner, who has resigned as principal after 26 years of service to the school district. It also was voted to name the

former North Elementary school "the Clifton Gardner building", to name the Tubb Elementary "the Floyd Tubb building" and to call the combined campuses "Tahoka Elementary School."

All board members were present, including Green, Hays, Wells, David Midkiff, J.E. Nance Jr., Robert Smith and Nedra Young. Smith and Mrs. Young were elected April 6.

Also present were representatives of the Tahoka Classroom Educators, with Hedy Bufe as spokesperson. She told the trustees the TCE supported an item on the agenda concerning graduation requirements, and that the group favored Gardner and Tom Cooper as principals to serve on the Career Ladder Selection Committee.

The visitors were excluded from an "executive session", or closed session, of the board which voted after the closed session to appoint Supt. Dale Summitt, High School Principal John Haines and Gardner to the Career Ladder Selection Committee, a group which will decide which teachers may be placed on the Career Ladder mandated by the Legislature as a procedure to reward superior teachers.

Trustees voted to change graduation requirements from two credits of physical education to 1½ credits and to drop require-

ment of a half credit in career education or introduction to marketing.

Resignation of Carmen Horn, high school math teacher, was accepted, effective at the end of this school year.

Summitt reported on several items, including a pending legislative bill to amend House Bill 72.

Business manager Loretta Tekell reported a balance in all funds on March 31 of \$1,029,685, and that 1984 tax collections at this time had reached \$722,936, which is 89.9 per cent complete.

## Sales Tax Rebate Totals Given

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$48.9 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

April checks represent taxes collected on sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller by March 20.

Tahoka's net payment this period was \$2,527.94; comparable payment prior year—\$2,984.29; 1985 payments to date—\$19,850.56.

O'Donnell's net payment this period—\$956.38; comparable payment prior year—\$611.82; 1985 payments to date—\$4,114.39.

Wilson's 1985 payments to date—\$1,080.29.

## Tahoka Students Receive Awards At Science Fair

Four Tahoka students received a total of six awards from the 29th annual South Plains Regional Science Fair held March 29-30 at Wayland Baptist University.

Scott Orr, senior, was the big winner from the Tahoka group, receiving one of two special awards from the U.S. Army as well as the Biochemistry Award from the U.S. Marine Corps. His project was entitled "The Effect of Stress on the Cardiovascular System."

Also winning two awards was Boone Barrow of Tahoka Junior High, who won the Junior Division Award from the American Society for Microbiology and an honorable mention award in the general competition for the "Effect of White Blood Cells on the Growth of Bacteria."

Other honorable mention awards went to Jim McVey for "Characterization of Marijuana by Color Test and Thin-Layer Chromatography," Mark Vega for "A Satellite Formation."

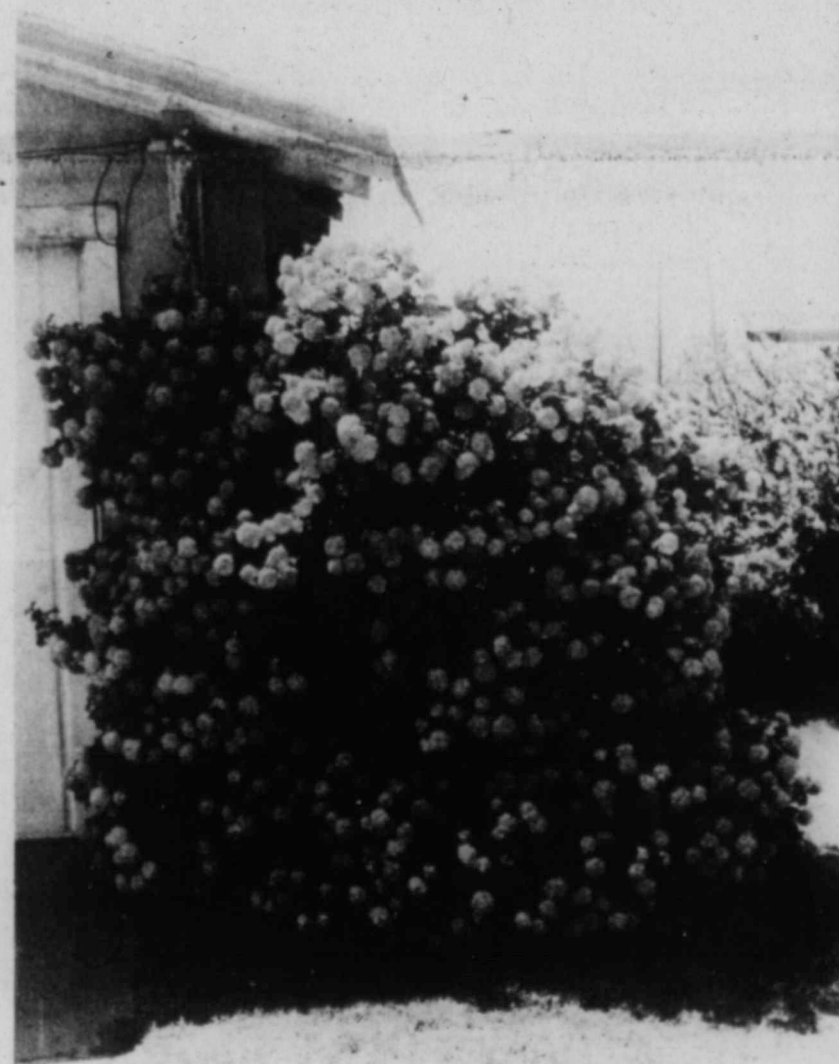

OSUT is a 12-week period which combines basic combat training and advanced individual training.

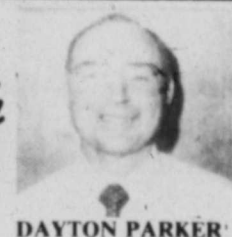

## ABDOMINAL HERNIA

The causes of abdominal hernia vary, but most relate to a sudden pressure on the abdominal wall. One common cause is heavy lifting, using the stomach muscles instead of the stronger muscles of arms, shoulders and legs. When lifting heavy objects, feet should be spread about 18" apart to give solid footing, and bending should be done by the knees, not the waist. This lessens back strain. Don't overstress your strength - a helping hand is usually close by.

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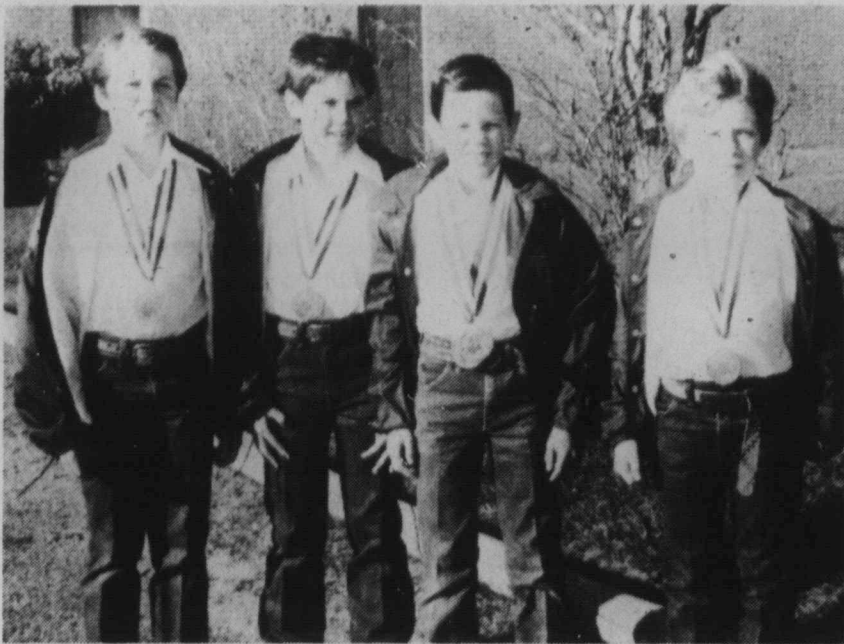

Ever since I started working here, I have had this wonderful dream of seeing the library facility extend on out to the street on the west side and having two or three windows on the south side where we might have a good reading place complete with tables and chairs as well as a few pot plants to make it look inviting. Right now the library is quite crowded and filled almost to capacity and will be 'bursting at the seams' before too many years if the present is any indica-

tion of the future.

In reflecting upon the past four years, I find that some things have been accomplished. We now have the following: 5,000 adult fiction books besides about 500 paperbacks; 1200 non-fiction books, some of which are reference books to be used in the library; about 200 biographies and a section of approximately 150 paperback books for young adults. In our children's room we have the following: about 500 fiction books, 120 non-fiction and approximately 50 biography books.

I will not be able to finish the card catalog before I quit but will have at least nine-tenths of it done so that it has become a good workable tool in finding certain books in our library.

In bringing our minds back to the present, I want to remind everyone that we will start our book sale on Tuesday, April 23, at 9 a.m. and will have them available for sale until April 30 at 25 cents a book. These are old books or duplicate copies that will be on sale.

This will be my last time to write the library news. It is with mixed emotions that I am quitting, but other things are beckoning to me, and I feel a strong desire to pursue them. I will still have an interest in the library and will hope that it will continue to grow.

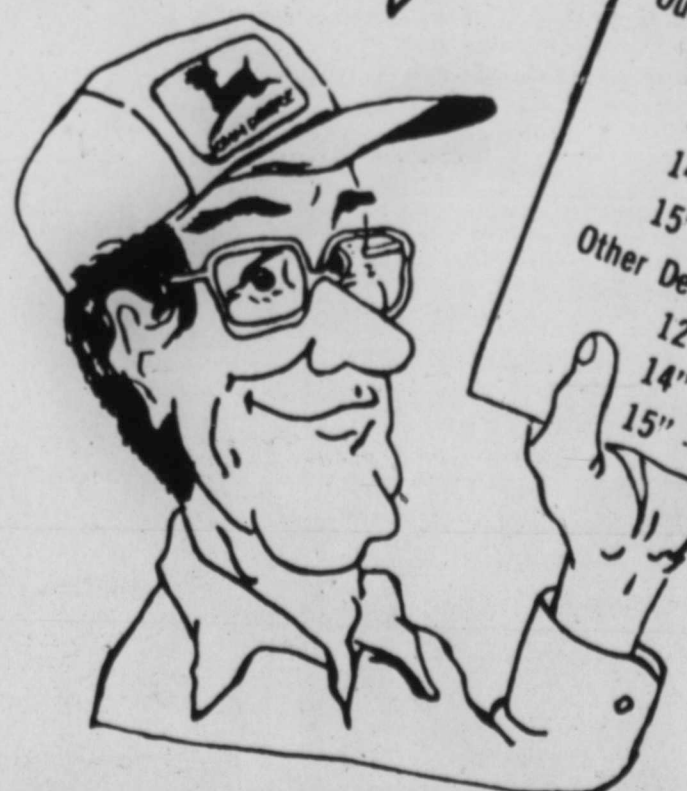

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## Scanning Social Security

### Disability Claims By Appointment.

The Lubbock Social Security Office has a new unit specializing in taking disability applications by telephone. This new unit operates on an appointment system that eliminates waiting time for disability applicants who have appointments.

The disability unit began operation April 1 and the people in the unit take all claims for all disability under Social Security and/or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) by appointment only.

About 50 percent of the total claims workload taken in the Lubbock Social Security office are claims for disability benefits. In the last six months, 1218 disability claims have been filed in the Lubbock office. The average disability interview takes between 30 and 45 minutes.

There are five experienced claims representatives and two development clerks in this unit. The claims representatives act as the appointment clerk/disability information specialist on a rotating basis. When you call or come in for an appointment that person can tell you what documents you will need for your particular case and can answer any questions you may have at

that time.

Disability claims can be filed by telephone or in-office visits. Either way, an appointment will be made especially for you. The appointment time will be between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Generally, you will need to furnish the following proofs at the time you file your claim: The last two year's W-2 forms, or income tax returns if you were self-employed. We will also need birth certificates of each eligible family as well as Social Security numbers, names, addresses and telephone numbers of doctors who have treated you for your disability in the last two years. If you are filing for SSI benefits you will also need to furnish your last bank statement and savings passbook, insurance policies, and current market value of any property you own jointly or solely, excluding the home in which you live.

The number to call for an appointment to file a disability claim is 743-7376.

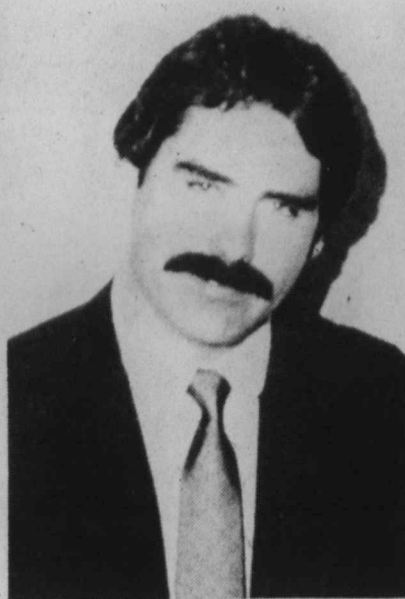

#### THE IMPORTANCE OF A WILL

A valid will is one of the most important legal documents you can have. It's also one of the most important things you can do for your family.

If you die without a will in Texas, the laws of descent and distribution will determine how your property will be divided. And those laws may not reflect your preferences at all.

Lack of a will can also affect your children. Without a will, your husband or wife may be required to support the children from his or her own resources, even though the children might have received substantial inheritances. In other words, your spouse might not have access to that part of your estate which went to your children, so the whole family would have a reduced standard of living.

Without a will you also have little control over when your children get their inheritance and how it is spent. When a child inherits property, a guardian or custodian must be appointed to protect both the property and the minor child's rights. But at age 18, the child's property is turned over to him, regardless of his maturity or financial experience.

If you have a will, a trust to administer your children's property can be established. You can specify how the trust is to be managed, who the trustee will be, how the funds are to be spent and when and how the property should be distributed to your children.

Both you and your spouse need separate wills. Without a will, half of the community property will pass to the children. This can cause financial hardship for the surviving spouse and potential costs and problems related to court-assigned guardian ships or custodianships. Having just one will in the family does only half the job.

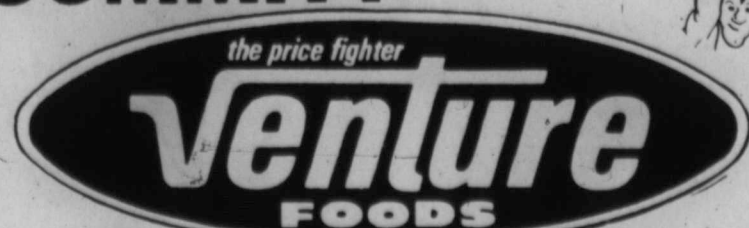

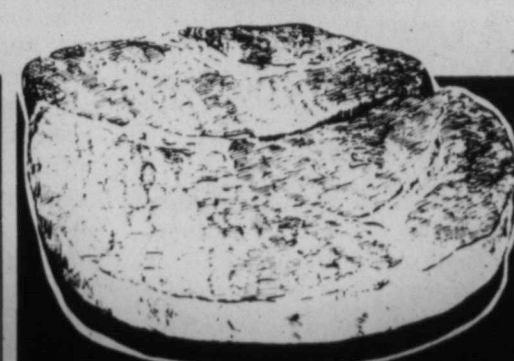

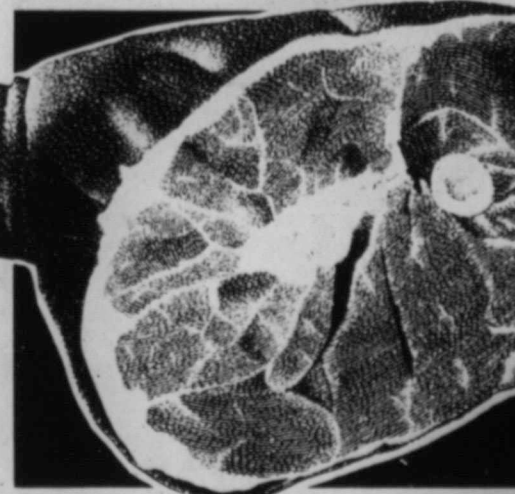

#### Combating Horn Fly Resistance To Pyrethroid Ear Tags

During the past year, horn flies have begun to develop some resistance to ear tags impregnated with pyrethroid insecticides.

Cattlemen using insecticide ear tags on their herds need to keep a close check on control once the

horn fly season is at hand to determine whether or not the tags are effective.

These strategies for managing horn flies are suggested:

Do not use insecticide-treated ear tags to animals before economically damaging populations of horn flies develop.

Horn fly resistance to pyrethroid insecticides can be suspected if new tags have not satisfactorily reduced fly number within 10 to 12 days.

Animal treatments with insecticides which have an alternate type action should be used in normal treatment schedules be-

fore pyrethroid resistance becomes evident. Dust bags, oilers and other self-treatment devices should be used to reduce and delay the pyrethroid resistance problem.

Spray, 'pour-on', 'spot-on' or dust treatments with phosphate compounds-coumaphos (Co-Ral), crotoxyphos (Ciodrin), dichlorvos (Vapona), dioxathion (Delnav) or malathion—provide a different mode of killing action and can be used to reduce pyrethroid resistance and to control horn fly populations.

Whole-body sprays of pyrethroid insecticides should not be used to control resistant flies which can not be controlled with ear tags as these sprays will provide significantly higher selection levels of already resistant flies.

Pyrethroid ear tags can be used successfully where the spinose ear tick and Gulf Coast tick are the target pest. Use alternate control methods for these ticks if pyrethroid resistance has developed in the horn fly population.

Remove ear tags from animals as soon as they have lost their effectiveness in killing target pests. Tags emitting a sublethal dose to the animal appear to add to the resistance problem by killing or weakening susceptible individuals in the population.

Pyrethroid tags can be successfully used to manage horn flies where resistance has not developed. In general, western and southern areas of Texas have not experienced a resistance problem. However, tagging entire herds year after year with pyrethroid ear tags can develop serious resistance.

Some producers are enjoying satisfactory management of horn flies by tagging only the calves in the herd. Fly movement within the herd is sufficient to achieve control in this manner. Self-treatment devices with phosphate-type insecticides can be easily integrated into the management system if pyrethroid resistance develops or is suspected.

Suggestions for managing the horn fly resistance problem must be considered on a herd-by-herd basis. Previous herd treatments must be considered as well as possible cases of resistance already at hand.

4-H leaders are found everywhere -- a judging contest, county fairs, square dances and talent shows.

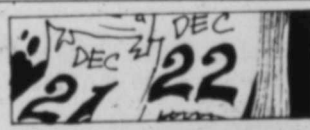
They are tireless consumers of muffins, experts at taking knots out of thread, peerless coaches, and expert hoof trimmers.

## Texas Crime Stoppers Offer Reward

An identity problem seems to surround the man who calls himself John Lee Davis.

Like a great many people who have had problems with the law, Davis has assumed a number of identities.

At various times he has called himself Bruce Edward King, John Wayne Anderson, John Wayne Townsend, Johnny Warren O'Keefe or James Albert Darst.

His acquaintances call him "Big Un" or "Tank" -- and for good reason. Davis, whose age is listed as anywhere from 38 to 40, is 6-7 and weighs an estimated 350 pounds. He has black hair and hazel eyes and has worn a full beard in the past.

Davis has been wanted on federal warrants since April, 1980, alleging that he sold P2P -- a chemical used for making methamphetamines -- to a Drug Enforcement Administration agent in April, 1979. To compound his problems, Davis also was arrested in Austin for assaulting a federal officer.

Law enforcement officials say Davis is a member of the Nomads Chapter of the Bandidos Motorcycle Club. This means he can travel at will and that his activities are not confined to one local Bandido chapter.

Investigators say Davis also was a pilot for the Bandidos.

This week Davis and his string of aliases joins an exclusive group of fugitives--the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered by the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council for information leading

to his capture.

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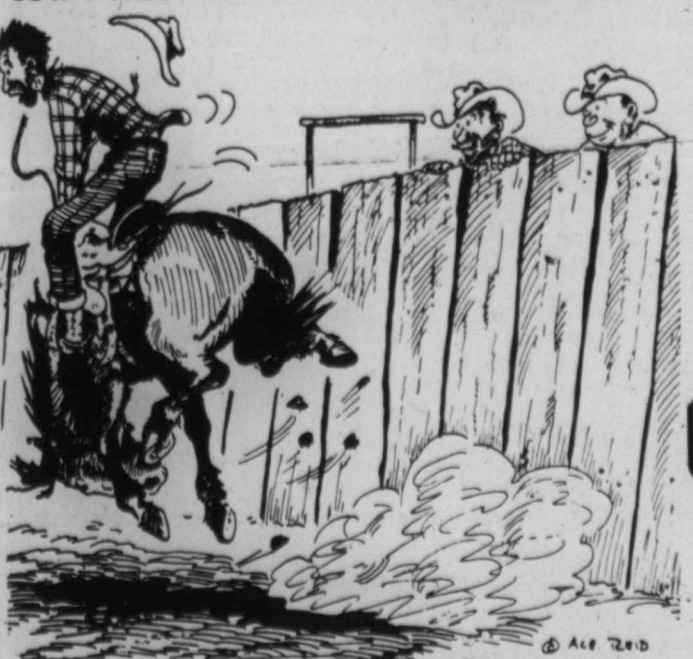

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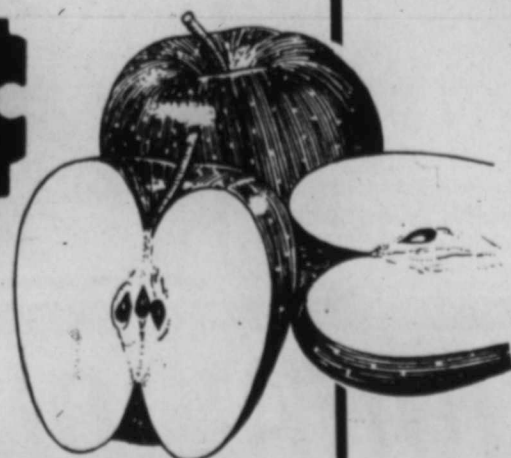
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
