# Insurance Premium Hike Stuns Commissioners Lynn County commissioners

were aghast Monday at a quoted increase of more than 200 per cent in premiums for coverage of county buildings and vehicles, particularly the liability portion. Commissioners finally accepted

the only bid submitted after hearing an explanation from insurance agent Jim Solomon, who said most companies have stopped insuring counties at all because of high losses in liability claims--"not here, but in other counties," he said. The "multiperil" section of the insurance bid for the next year has not yet been accepted, pending some further investigation.

The premium as submitted would have risen from the current total of about \$9,200 per year to more than \$30,000.

Commissioners were advised by County Treasurer Cindy Bryan that a recent ruling puts county workers, including precinct workers and law enforcement personnel, under a wagehour law stipulating that anyone . working more than 40 hours per week must be paid overtime. It was noted that this will cost the

county a considerable amount of money; Mrs. Bryan said that in the sheriff's department alone, the rule would have cost the county \$600 in the last two-week pay period.

After lengthy discussion, commissioners voted to put on record that the county is complying with the law effective April 28.

Meeting with the commissioners Monday were three representatives of the City of Tahoka, Mayor Jim Solomon, City Manager Carl Reynolds and council member Dalton Wood. The group discussed at length plans for possible consolidation of dispatching law officers in the city and county.

The-city and county dispatching operations have been serving the entire county, with the City of Tahoka operating in the evenings and nights and the sheriff's office handling dispatch in the daytime. Solomon pointed out that the City of Tahoka for years has been paying for and operating a dispatch service which also includes other cities in the county. Wilson and

O'Donnell have local police officers who use the Tahoka radio;

New Home has no local officer. In attempting to determine what would be the proper share of payments for a new singlesystem dispatch service, county and city officials appeared to agree that it should be based in some way on the number of people served. But commissioners appeared reluctant to any idea of assessing the other cities in the county for their portion of the costs.

In other action Monday the commissioners voted to discontinue maintenance of a road through the T-Bar Ranch property.

Sheriff Stanley Krause also was at the meeting Monday, and all commissioners were present, including Bart Anderson, Boyd Barnes, J.T. Miller and Eldon Gattis, plus Judge J.F. Brandon and County Clerk C.W. Roberts.

The meeting was adjourned Monday afternoon until Tuesday night, when the group met with the full city council on the dispatch proposals.



#### **Judge Says Action By State** May Force County Tax Hike

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon said Tuesday that "the state has found a way to get through this legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes will probably have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Brandon indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.


'The way this works," Brandon said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasin property taxes just to stay

The judge said that counties only have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines, fees, and federal revenue sharing. He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for several years, and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by Oct. 31, 1986. Revenue sharing averaged 16 per cent of county budgets statewide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11 per cent. It has dropped even more since 1982 and will be gone entirely by
