

## Crackdown On Traffic Violations Continues

tributes to disease that precedes 90 per cent of all deaths.

Worth reprinting, I think, are Dr. Bortz' Ten Commandments for Healthy and Sensible Living:

1. *A Balanced Diet*—the older we get the less fat we require and the more protein we need — lean meat, fish, poultry. Keep vitamin and mineral nutrition high.

2. *Elimination*—body cleanliness requires adequate elimination of wastes including deep breathing at periodic intervals to eliminate waste gases.

3. *Rest*—adequate rest for both body and mind in each 24 hours.

4. *Recreation*—both as fun and exercise.

5. *Sense of Humor*—the best antidote for tension and stress, the balance wheel of modern living.

6. *Avoid the Poisons of Anger, Hate, Jealousy*—these emotional disturbances are often the forerunners of high blood pressure and strokes.

7. *Companionship*.

8. *Pride in One's Job*.

9. *Participation in Community Affairs*.

10. *Keep an Open Mind*—to grow in knowledge, experience and wisdom contributes to personal maturity.

The booklet is called "How To Live It Up and Live Longer," and is published by the editors of Prevention magazine, a fascinating publication which gets more fascinating as I get older. The magazine itself has some really thought-provoking things to say about health and medicine, and no doubt is on the black list of most hospitals and doctors' offices, but I won't go into all that in this issue.

This little booklet suggests that calcium may be the most important nutrient for the aging individual, and quotes a Dr. Edward Bortz (former president of the American Medical Assn.) as saying that "calcium deficiency con-

## Combined Communications For City, County Approved

Combining all radio dispatching operations in the county into one central location in the Lynn County sheriff's office was approved by city and county officials this week, with the city council giving unanimous approval Tuesday night to the county's proposed breakdown of cost-sharing on the plan.

Combining the operations, which previously have been handled separately by the city and county, will save taxpayers in both entities an estimated \$40,000 over what they would have had to pay to continue the separate facilities, according to Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon and County Judge J.F. Brandon.

Because of new rulings regarding mandatory overtime pay for law enforcement personnel who work more than 40 hours, both the city and county were facing huge increases in expenses if they continue to operate the dispatch service as it now is. Combining the operations will save most of the projected increases, the officials agreed.

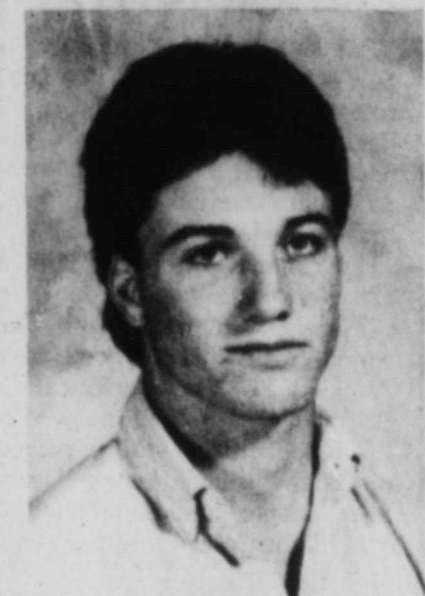
Sheriff Stanley Krause and all Lynn County commissioners met with the city council Tuesday night, as that group had called a special meeting to get the dispatch issue settled. The county

commissioners earlier had suggested a figure of \$25,500 to be paid by the city to the county for operating the combined communications for a year. This figure was based on the fact that Tahoka's population of 3262 is 37.9 per cent of the county's total population and that the \$25,460.98 is 37.9 per cent of the total projected budget of \$67,179.36 for operating the single dispatch system.

Monday night's meeting also involved considerable discussion

between the two governing bodies regarding a city-proposed increase in the amount paid annually by the county for fire alarms answered outside the city by the Tahoka Fire Dept.

The city presently is paid \$3,000 per year by the county for answering fire calls in the county, and the city had proposed that the county pay this plus \$150 per call outside the city limits. City officials pointed out that in most of the counties they had checked on, the counties pay city fire departments about \$250 or more per call in the county; the Slaton Fire Dept. and others in Lubbock

## Judge Says Action By State May Force County Tax Hike

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon said Tuesday that "the state has found a way to get through this legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes will probably have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Brandon indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Brandon said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even."

The judge said that counties only have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines, fees, and federal revenue sharing. He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for several years, and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by Oct. 31, 1986. Revenue sharing averaged 16 per cent of county budgets statewide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11 per cent. It has dropped even more since 1982 and will be gone entirely by

late 1986," the judge said.

"Taxes have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs. And while the state is taking more of historical revenue, legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would have to be handled by the state. The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."
