Reward Offered In Vandalism

Rewards of \$500 each have been offered by Lynn County Crime Line for information clearing a recent burglary northeast of New Home and heavy damage done to a tractor and other equipment near the Gordon community.

Jack Haire of Slaton told officers that a John Deere 4430 tractor and other equipment were damaged when someone drove the tractor over the other equipment April 30. The tractor, plow, shredders, planter and lister were damaged more than \$4500 worth.

The other \$500 reward is offered in a previously reported burglary April 28, when the Frank Lisemby home four miles northeast of New Home, lost numerous items. No dollar value

was set on the missing items, but among the things stolen were a Browning 12-gauge shotgun, SCM electric portable typewriter, RCA 24-inch color TV, men's and women's golf clubs, rare coins including an 1845 penny, jewelry and silverware.

Damage estimated at \$1808 was caused when two youths age 14 and 16 broke door glasses on six vehicles at McCord Motor Co. last Friday night. Officers questioned the two youths and they admitted the crime, and also admitted burglarizing the Dixie Dog the same night, taking chips, candy and cigarettes. The case is to be turned over to juvenile authorities.

City Seeking New Chief Of Police

Tahoka city council Monday decided to seek applicants for the job of Chief of Police for the city, to fill the position left open when longtime Police Chief Jack Miller's resignation became effective May 3. In a busy regular monthly meeting, the group also voted to contract with the Lynn County Appraisal District to collect city taxes, voted to seek another Community Development Block Grant, and heard a representative of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority report on a suggested project to lower the salt content of the Canadian River water, which is the primary source of all the city's water supply.

John Williams of the CRMWA said scientists and engineers for several years have been studying possible ways to keep the Lake Meredith water from being so salty, and now is presenting to the 11 member cities a plan to drill a well or wells into the shallow brine artesian aquifer and pumping those wells to reduce the artesian pressure. Cost of the project was estimated at a total ranging from a low of \$3.2 million to a high of about \$7.8 million. Tahoka's part of the projected cost would

run from about \$2,500 to about \$5800 per year.

The city was not expected to take any action of the plans. Williams said he is just now making the rounds of cities in the system to present information. Williams did say that if the project is carried out and is successful, the problems that water users have with rusting faucets and appliances such as water heaters, air conditioners, washers and icemakers would be greatly alleviated. He said most of the saline problems come from an area around Logan, N.M.

V.F. Jones, the city's representative on the water authority, also was present for the water discussion. In voting to have the appraisal district collect the city's taxes, the city is joining the county, hospital district and Tahoka and Wilson schools in having taxes paid at the appraisal office. In Tahoka this means all taxes are paid at the same location.

The city also voted to impose an additional 15 per cent collection fee on all 1984 taxes paid after July 1, on top of the normal delinquent penalty. The payment of city taxes at the appraisal district office on Ave. J is effective immediately.

Several applications for housing assistance under the CDBG program were approved.

Mayor Jim Solomon, city administrator Carl Reynolds and council members Tom Cooper, Richard White, Dalton Wood, Nick Summitt and Jim Thomas were present.

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Rain Heavy In County

Rainfall Sunday was general throughout Lynn County and particularly heavy in the eastern part of the county, with totals in the Redwine area reported from 2.5 to 3.5 inches.

At Draw, rain was reported at .50 to an inch, and the total in the city of Tahoka also varied that much, with the heaviest rain in the east part of the city. O'Donnell reportedly had about an inch of rain.

During Sunday afternoon's thunderstorm, power was knocked out in the west section of Tahoka as lightning struck a transformer in the 2600-block of N. 2nd St. Power was off an hour and 40 minutes, according to Southwestern Public Service officials.

Heavy rain and hail struck the Wilson and Southland areas of Lynn County Tuesday night. No reports of damage were received.

BY DALTON



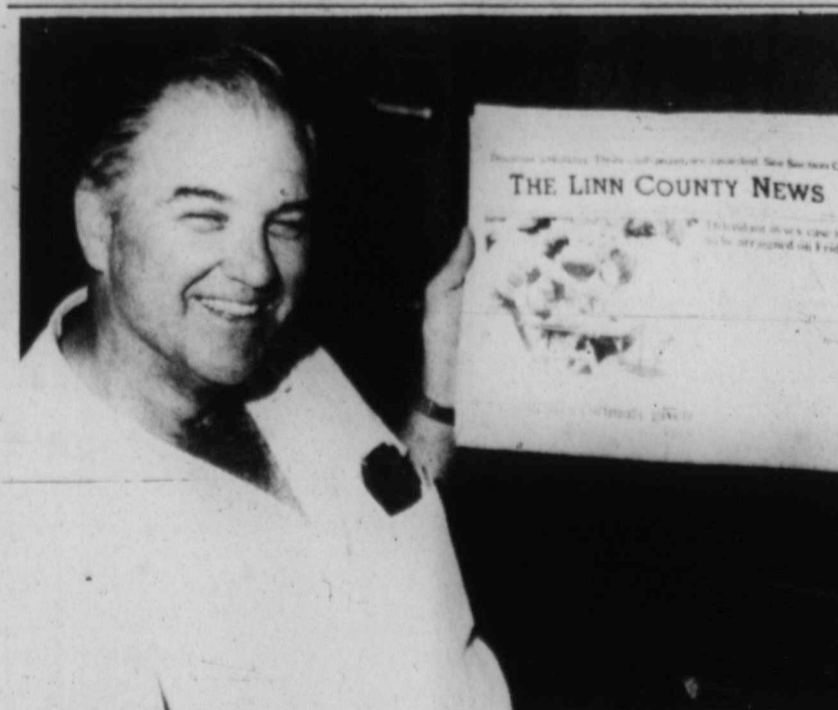
I HAVE KNOWN for years that if I could ever plant or set out a tree in my yard and if it would grow tall and leafy and green that this would be a miracle. And of course, I have known all along that birth of any kind of creature, the change of a caterpillar to a butterfly, the emergence of a flower, plant, fruit or vegetable from a seed all are miracles that we take for granted. But I never realized until the other day what a miracle it is to grow a nice juicy red tomato.

Lynn County Agent Stanley Young, who knows about things like tomatoes and cotton and howcome they grow or don't grow, presented an interesting program complete with slides on what you have to do to grow good tomatoes. I tried to take a few notes, but it was dark and I finally gave up. I did decide that with all the things that can louse up a tomato plant, it truly is a miracle if anybody ever has good ones. Either that, or they have studied all the stuff that Stanley told us about and could qualify for a degree in tomato-ology.

Just a few of the things I do remember is that tomatoes can be ruined by root rot, blossom end rot, curly top (my wife had this once and it looked good on her), aphids, plant lice, pinworms, hungry neighbors, heat, cold, wind, and I forget what else. You have to know about scratching the ground, caging the tomatoes, all kinds of chemicals, nematodes and other toads, do this and do that. All this time I thought that you just put plants in a little hole in the ground and water them once in a while, and voila, one day you will have good-tasting tomatoes.

There's so much to remember about growing tomatoes, though, that the obvious conclusion after hearing Stanley's presentation is that most of us would be better off to just forget the whole thing, and buy them at the supermarket or from somebody's truck by the side of the road.

Or better yet, write about them, and maybe somebody who is good at raising them will give you a few when they get ripe.

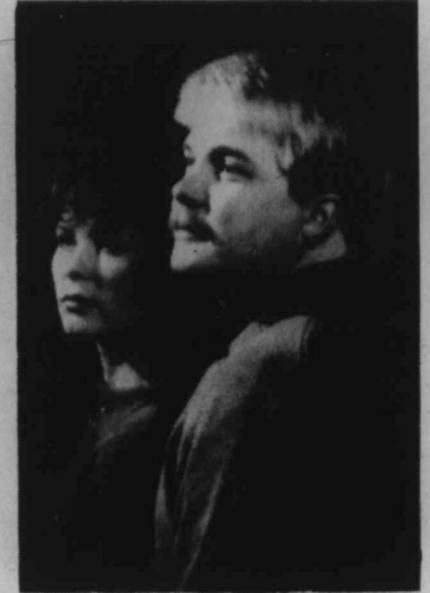

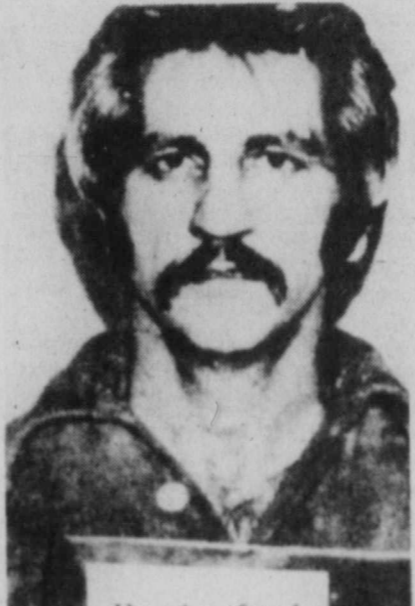

Crime Stoppers Offer Reward

Cledis Clark Weatherford is known to law enforcement officials in East Texas as the "Jogging Burglar."

There's a good reason for the nickname. In what police describe as an "active" career, Weatherford is renowned for the various disguises he uses while casing residential neighborhoods for possible burglary targets. His favorite is to wear a jogging suit.

In living up to his nickname, Weatherford has managed to keep jogging at least a step in front of the law. He has been wanted by the Smith County Sheriff's Department for more than five years on a felony charge of burglary. And when he finally is caught, police departments throughout East Texas and Oklahoma would like to talk to him about 37 unsolved burglaries—primarily in wealthy residential areas.

This week the elusive Weatherford has made the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to his capture.

Weatherford is described as a white male, about 45 years old, 6-0, 180 pounds, with graying hair and brown eyes. He has a scar on his head.

He has used a variety of aliases, including Cledis Cecil Weatherford, Clet Weatherford, Cleda Weatherford and Cledis G. Weatherford. He has driver's licenses from Texas and Oklahoma.

Investigators believe he is still somewhere in Texas because he has a family in the state. He was last seen driving a 1979 white and red Lincoln Continental Mark V with Oklahoma license plates MY-3368.

Jones On Crime Stoppers Most Wanted List

James Randy Jones is known to acquaintances as "Big Bird." Possibly he got the nickname after he flew the coop at the Potter County correctional facility in Amarillo in September 1984.

He is 6' 4" and weighs 220 pounds.

Now Texas law enforcement officials have added his name to the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of Jones, who is wanted on federal warrants charging him with 15 counts of possession of forged and altered money orders as well as escape.

In addition to his imposing size, Jones has a number of highly identifiable tattoos on his body—including tattoos of three teardrops under his left eye and more tattoos running from the wrists to the shoulders of both arms.

Jones, born Sept. 26, 1957, uses a variety of aliases, including Jimmy J. Jones and Larry Berry.

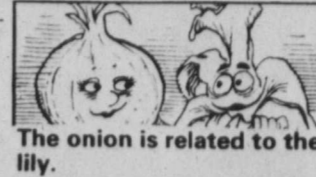
The blonde-haired, blue-eyed Mississippi native ran afoul of the federal government for his alleged propensity to alter money orders.

Investigators say Jones would purchase \$1 postal money orders then alter them to read \$51 or more.

Jones was apprehended and

then compounded his legal problems by escaping from the Potter County correctional facility on September 24, 1984.

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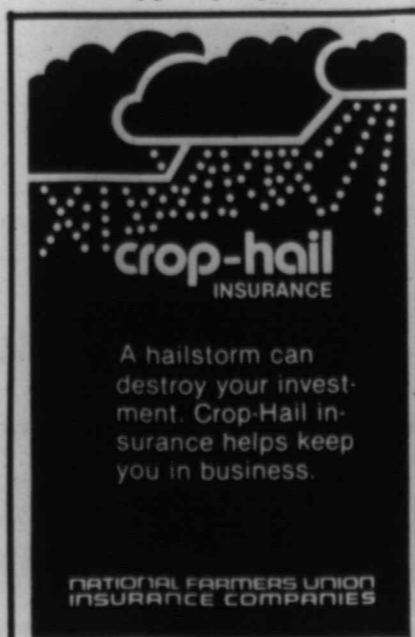
REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

LEADING A 4-H PROJECT GROUP IS REWARDING

The 4-H project is the basic ingredient in the 4-H program. And that is where the 4-H project leaders comes in.

The success that a 4-H member has with a project is largely dependent upon the project leader.

A project leader has an excellent opportunity to help young people grow and develop in a rapidly changing world. The most important qualities of a 4-H leader are these:

A strong belief in the basic worth of each individual as a human being.

A commitment to the personal development of each individual.

The ability to relate to children, parents and other volunteers.

An understanding that leadership can be fulfilling for both adults and youth.

Leadership by project leaders is critical to the success of the 4-H program. Young people need relationships with adults who will recognize their need for good feelings about themselves and their need to develop meaningful relationships with other youth and adults.

Young people also need to acquire subject matter, knowledge, physical skills and decision making abilities.

Success as a leader is not measured by blue ribbons or the number of fair exhibits. The good things that happen through the 4-H program will be visible in the young people themselves. Do the young people feel good about themselves and the things they have done? Have they improved in relating to other young people and adults? Are they having fun?

The single most important quality an individual can bring to the job of a 4-H leader is that of caring about young people and a willingness to give time and knowledge to help each young person develop to his or her greatest potential.

A 4-H leader sees many "things" created or planned—cookies, engines, chickens, dresses or gardens. The quality of the finished product will always be secondary to how the young people have grown.

Being a 4-H leader can be a positive and satisfying experience—one every individual should consider.

May is a great opportunity for 4-H'ers to get their communities involved in bike safety. With bicycling growing by leaps and bounds, bicycle safety programs are becoming more important. An estimated 105 million bicyclists travel our streets. This means nearly half of the U.S. population ride bikes for fun, fitness, energy conservation and transportation.

Bicyclists need to ride defensively to protect themselves in today's traffic. 4-H clubs can help educate communities in bicycle safety in a variety of ways, points out Greg Henley.

Here are some things 4-H'ers can do regarding bicycle safety:

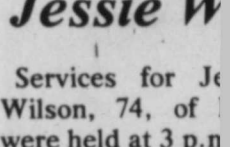

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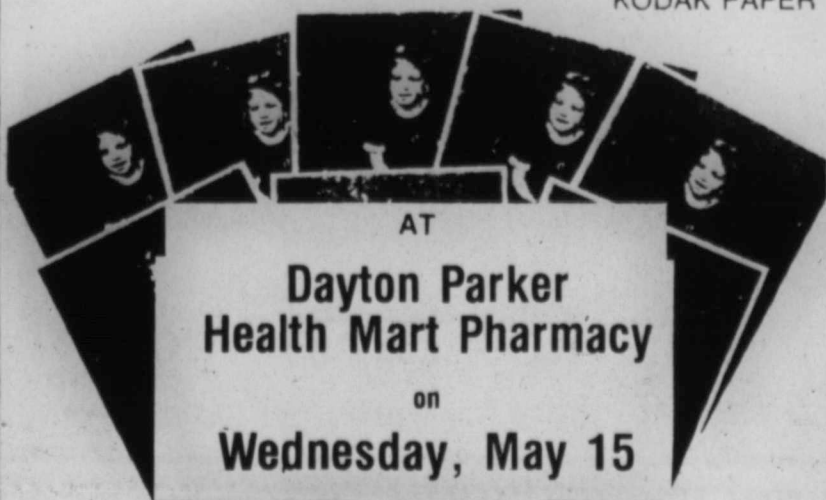

AG ECONOMY HURTING—Texas and the nation's agricultural woes boil down to the law of supply and demand—too large a supply of agricultural commodities and a lack of markets. Abundant crop supplies, sagging exports and a strong U.S. dollar abroad are all hurting agriculture in Texas and the nation, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Agriculture's present devastating financial crunch results mostly from policy actions outside the confines of agriculture. These include monetary and fiscal policies that together make up U.S. economic policy, trade subsidies of other countries, tariffs, trade barriers and other forces that influence interest rates, inflation or economic conditions at home and abroad.

CUSTOM SEWING GROWING IN POPULARITY—It's working women who are now expanding the market for custom sewn clothes. "An increasing number of women don't have the time to sew, but appreciate the quality, fit and distinctive nature of home sewn garments," says Alma Fonesca, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist. 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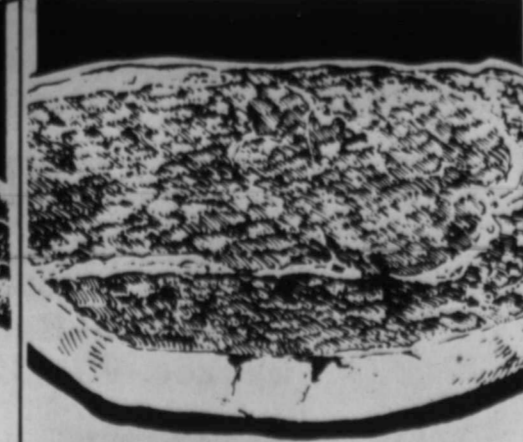

Gas grills cook faster than electric and charcoal grills, saving energy and money. For example, a gas grill will cook four hamburgers in 18½ minutes at a cost of just 1¢. A charcoal grill takes nearly twice as long—34 minutes—and costs approximately 8¢. An electric grill is least efficient, taking 42 minutes of cooking time at a cost of 49¢.

And you won't miss a bit of that wonderful "cook-out" flavor, because it's not the charcoal that makes foods taste good. It's the juice from the meat itself, falling on a hot surface, that creates the smoke that flavors your food. Now here's a handy tip for gas grill enthusiasts that will keep you from running out of fuel. Simply weigh your propane cylinder on a bathroom scale, and subtract the tare weight (stamped T.W. on the cylinder). This gives you the number of pounds of propane remaining. You can expect your gas grill to burn approximately ½ to 1 pound of fuel per hour, depending on whether you cook on "high" or "low." It's simple to determine how full (or empty!) your cylinder is! 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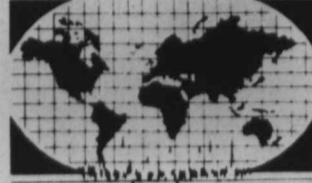
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Crime Prevention To Be CC Topic At May 21 Meet

Space Shuttle Spared

Every time a space shuttle goes up, 285,000 gallons of water flood the flame trench and launch pad in just 30 seconds, and a good thing too. Reflected sound waves could shake apart the bird from the rocket flame are absorbed by converting water to steam, reports James MacAfee. He's Chief Engineer of Jamesbury, the company that made the valves that release the water. It is a subsidiary of Combustion Engineering, a leader in energy technology worldwide. Here's how it works: at T minus 12.25 seconds, three 48-inch Water-Sphere valves open, releasing water at a rate of 50,000 gallons per minute into the flame trench. At T plus 2.75 seconds, three more 48-inch valves open, releasing water at a rate of 40,000 gallons per minute into the launch pad, as the space shuttle climbs toward orbit. The valves must cycle from closed to full open in just two and a half seconds. The system works so well that Water-Sphere valves have been installed in a second launch pad at Kennedy

Space Center and have been purchased for a similar facility being built at Andenbug Air Force Base in California. It would appear these little devices designed to beat the heat at space shuttle launches can do a down-to-earth job that's out of this world.

SHOP IN TAHOKA

NUTRITIOUS DIET IMPORTANT FOR ARTHRITIS—Although there is no particular food or diet that gives special help to people with arthritis, a nutritious, balanced diet is still important. Nutritionally balanced meals benefit overall health, muscle tone and build resistance to the wear and tear of the disease, says Texas A&M University Extension Service nutrition specialist, Mary K. Sweeten. One recent study of rheumatoid ar-

thritis patients indicated that one out of four was malnourished and deficient in a variety of proteins, zinc and folic acid. An inadequate diet, the effect of arthritis drugs, or the disease itself may be the cause of nutritional deficiencies. Whatever the cause, people with rheumatoid arthritis should make special efforts to eat well with a varied diet of fruits, vegetables, meats, fish, poultry, gains and dairy products, she advises.

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Tornado Warning Signals Outlined

Four short blasts of the fire sirens in Tahoka is a signal for residents to take cover from a violent storm, citizens were reminded this week. In Tahoka, the four short blasts will be repeated after a brief interval, and it means a tornado has been sighted moving toward the city.

A continuous tone is the regular fire signal, summoning volunteer firemen. Three short blasts is a fire practice signal, but this signal is never sounded when there is threatening weather. Two short blasts is the all clear signal. Residents of Tahoka are urged to clip the following portion of this story and post it in a convenient place in their homes:

TORNADO AND FIRE SIGNALS
CONTINUOUS TONE — Fire alarm.
THREE SHORT BLASTS — Fire practice.
FOUR SHORT BLASTS — Take cover.
TWO SHORT BLASTS — All clear.

At Wilson and O'Donnell, the signals are reversed, with a continuous long blast meaning take cover, and a wavering siren signal for a fire. New Home is the same as Tahoka.
