

Career Ladder Plans Have Teachers Upset

A crowd of Tahoka school teachers, upset over local committee recommendations about who can be placed on the career ladder program, was on hand at the school board meeting last Thursday night to voice their opposition to the guidelines.

The career ladder is a program established by the Legislature to reward outstanding teachers with more pay based on merit, and only a small number of teachers may qualify.

Hedy Bufe, representing the Tahoka Classroom Educators, explained the viewpoint of the TCE regarding the career ladder. Supt. Dale Summitt then said that the career ladder committee did not have a recommendation ready for the board to act on. After considerable discussion, school board president Joe Hays said the board would have a called meeting today (Thursday) at 8 p.m. to address the career ladder program.

A new school calendar adopted by the board Thursday will have teachers reporting to work on Aug. 28, and Sept. 3, 1985, as the first day of school this fall. School will end on May 31, 1986.

The later dates for beginning and ending school are in accord with new state law which says school may not begin before Labor Day. Tahoka School Board adopted the dates with the stipulation that it may be changed if the Legislature changes the law to allow schools to begin in August.

The board also voted new rules regarding cheerleaders, agreed to participate in a child dental care program of the Texas Dept. of Health, approved 16 transfer students, moved to seek specifications for bids on a new gymnasium roof, authorized signs on the two elementary

buildings, and voted to offer a contract to an applicant for band director, who has not yet accepted the offer. All board members were present.

WRITING in Inside Tennis this month, Dr. Carolyn Moore observes that 34 million Americans are at least 20 per cent above their desirable weight for height, and gloomily notes that in the long term, treatment of obesity is estimated to be 95 per cent failure for the severely obese, and 66 per cent overall.

She said studies have shown that body weight tends to remain stable, no matter how much we diet. "If given unlimited access to food, most people will eat just enough to maintain weight at their own particular level. If they are force-fed, weight increases; however, as soon as force feeding is stopped, weight returns to normal. If these people are starved, they lose weight but will regain weight to their normal level once they are given free access to food. These findings suggest that one's stable weight...is under some type of metabolic control."

She goes into some stuff about how fat cells are different; you have alpha receptor cells on your thighs and beta ones on your stomach, and if you can't reduce your waistline, you have too many

beta critters in your abdomen (along with too many French fries and enchiladas).

It doesn't help me to know that. I knew already that most of what I lose in dieting is quickly gained back with compound interest. But if Dr. Moore knows what she's talking about, maybe the doctors and scientists can someday come up with that magic pill which makes flatbellies out of blubberguts.

She does, in fact, suggest this: "In the future, drugs that block alpha receptors or stimulate fat cells to mobilize fat may be the new treatment of choice for obesity.

There is already a pill which can help you lose weight. It renders you unconscious for a month, during which time somebody comes by once a day and drops cottage cheese and carrot juice into your mouth. In a month, you wake up slim and trim and with a terrible after-taste.

BRAN ENGLISH MUFFINS Makes 10 to 12 muffins

- 1 cup whole bran cereal
 - 1/3 cup instant nonfat dry milk
 - 4 cups all-purpose flour
 - 2 teaspoons salt
 - 2 teaspoons sugar
 - 2 packages Fleischmann's RapidRise™ Yeast
 - 4 tablespoons unsalted margarine, cut into 4 pats
 - 1/2 cup hot water (125 to 130°F)
 - 1 cup cold water
 - Cornmeal
- With metal blade of Cuisinart® DLC-10 Plus Food Processor*, process bran and dry milk for 1-1/2 minutes.

Insert dough kneading blade; add and process next 5 ingredients for 20 seconds. With motor running, pour hot water, then cold water through small feed tube in a steady stream. After dough cleans side of bowl, process 45 seconds longer. The dough should be soft, pliable and slightly sticky. If dough feels dry and stiff, add warm water, a teaspoon at a time, while processing. If dough is too soft and sticky, add flour, a tablespoon at a time.

Turn dough out onto surface sprinkled with cornmeal. Let stand 5 minutes. Roll dough out to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut out muffins with a 3-1/2-inch round pastry cutter. Transfer muffins to an ungreased griddle or skillet over low heat. Cook 10 to 12 minutes. Turn muffins over; cook 10 to 12 minutes longer. Cool on wire racks. To serve, slice english muffins in half; toast.

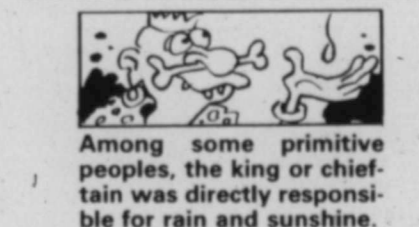

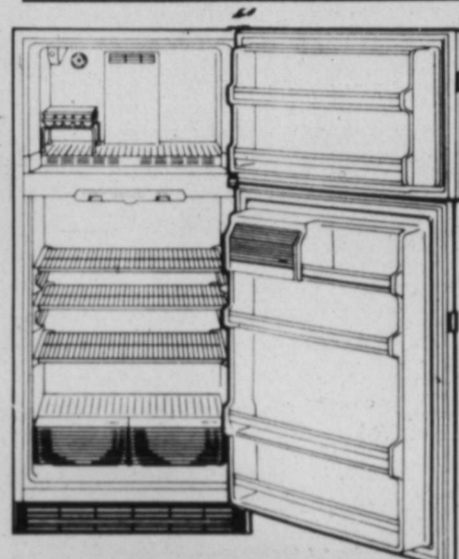

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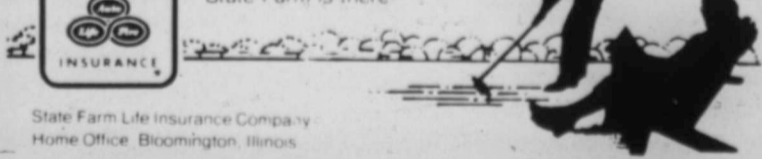
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Desde Mi Ventana/From My Window

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and the first quarter and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

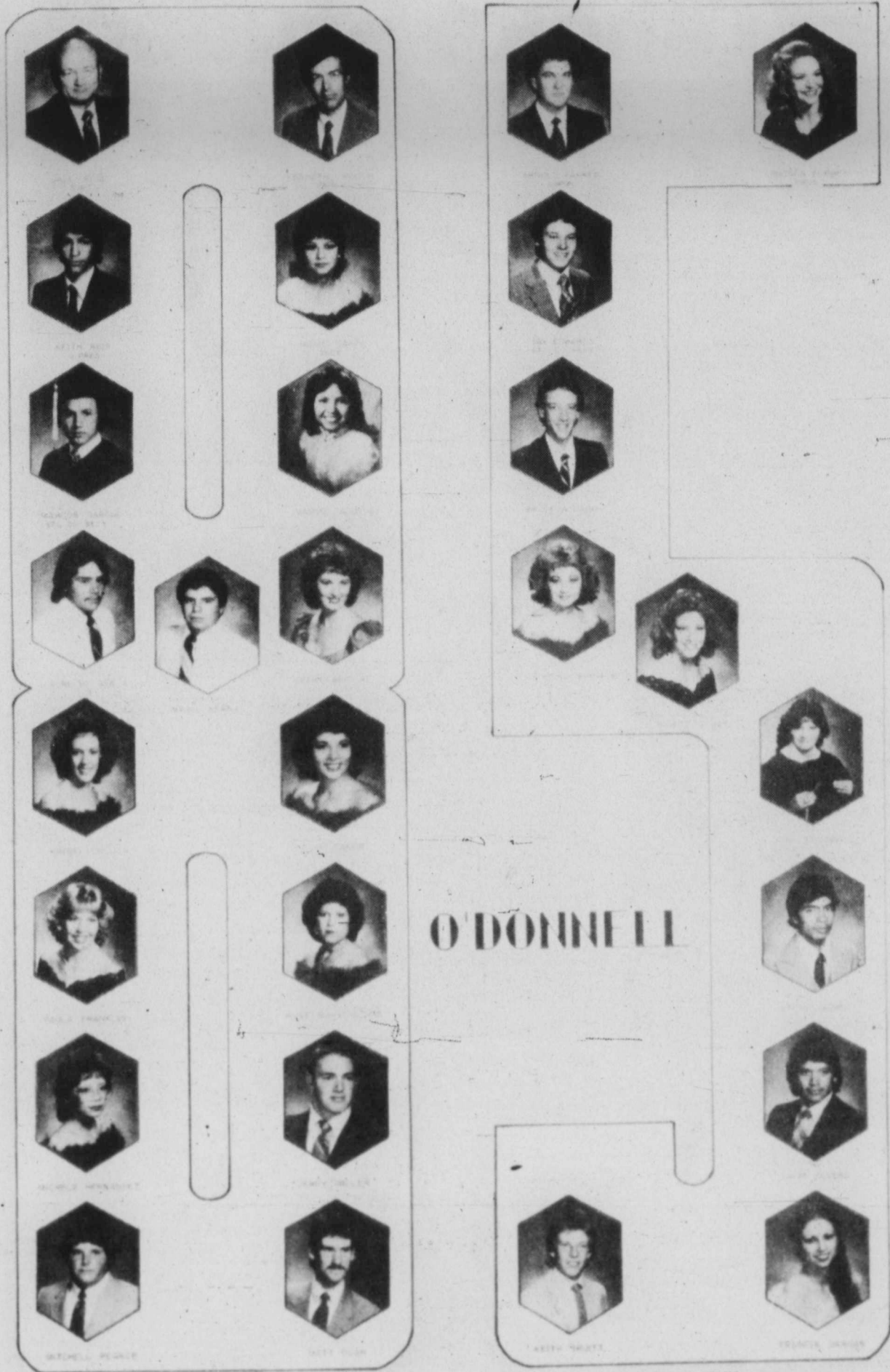

'85 COTTON OUTLOOK BLEAK—Although domestic cotton supplies are lower than first estimated and a lot of cotton farmers have enrolled in the 1985 acreage reduction program, the market outlook for cotton is still bleak, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Foreign production and the strong dollar abroad remain the culprits. These two things are challenging the market for U.S.

cotton. Advanced export sales for 1985 cotton are lagging behind a year ago by more than 50 per cent. Unless American trade policies supporting cotton are strengthened, cotton exports will continue to fall. Cotton farmers need to keep a sharp eye on the market situation to plot prices and to look for pricing opportunities during market rallies.

SPRING CATTLE MARKETING
Although most cattlemen look at the spring season as a time to expand their business, it may be a good time to do some "cashing in" notes an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Spring might be a good time to sell some cows and calves because market prices are usually at their peak since most cattlemen are out to buy more stock. Traditionally, increased demand for cattle, as well as reduced supplies, combine to boost cow and calf prices this time of the year. Cattlemen simply need to compare the weight of spring calves and the market price with their probable weight and price in the fall. Regarding cows, they need to look at the total dollars the animal would bring in the spring, at a higher price, compared to a heavier cow at a lower price in the fall.

BASIC TRACTOR SAFETY—Tractor safety is a serious matter, for violation of some basic operating rules could mean injury or even death. All farm workers should be instructed in tractor safety when they first begin work and at least annually thereafter, emphasizes a safety engineer. Key safety guidelines include using seatbelts, allowing no extra riders, reducing speed when turning and when crossing slopes, staying off steep slopes, operating the tractor smoothly, hitching equipment only to the drawbar and hitch point, watching for dangers or obstacles at row ends and on roads, and setting brakes securely when the tractor is stopped.

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


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
