Career Ladder Plan Adopted By School

The Tahoka School Board last Thursday finally adopted guidelines for a Career Ladder program designed to reward teachers with extra pay based on merit, authorizing funding up to \$51,000 for the extra pay if needed.

The action came after a lengthy discussion of various plans for determining which teachers get on the career ladder. About 15 teachers were present at the meeting.

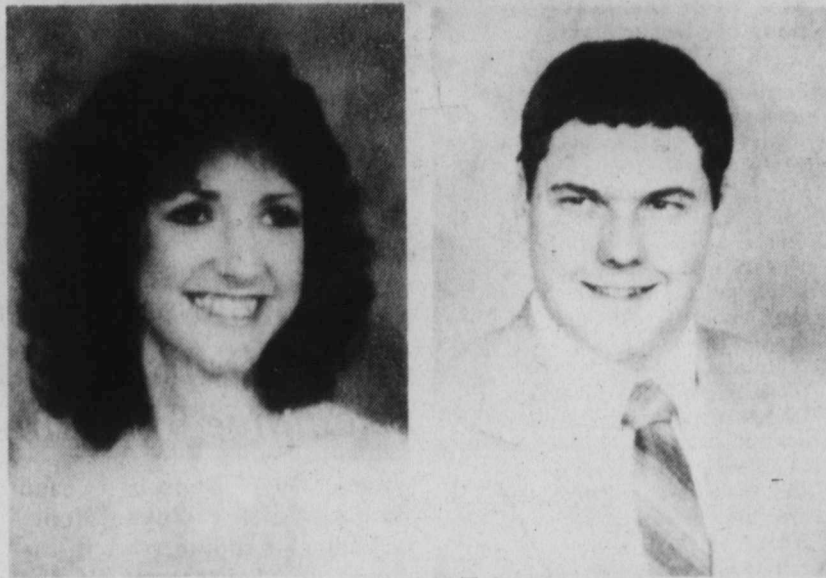
After a closed session, a motion to hire an applicant for the position of elementary principal

was defeated. The board was scheduled to meet again Tuesday night to further consider the vacancy.

Jewel Parker, representing Tahoka Youth Basketball, presented the school a gift of \$500 for each of the two elementary schools to be applied to purchase of playground equipment.

Transfers of Cynthia Everett from 5th grade to physical education for elementary, and Carolyn Virgin from Chapter I regular to 5th grade were approved.

All board members were present.

New City Judge Appointed Here

Tahoka City Council Monday named a new city judge, authorized application for a new federal grant for paving in a section of the city, and reviewed applications for a police chief.

Former Lynn County Judge Melvin Burks was named city judge at a salary of \$200 a month. He will begin his duties June 1.

Council members voted to authorize a consultant firm to make application for a Community Development Block Grant to pave several blocks north of Lockwood and east of Main street in the city. City Manager Carl Reynolds told the council that the city previously had obligated itself to make an application for funds this year, even though chances that the application will be accepted are not considered good in view of the current practices of funding such requests.

He added that the consulting firm has agreed not to charge the city for the work done in making the application unless it is accepted.

A resolution recognizing Melton Leslie for his 28 years of service to the City of Tahoka was unanimously adopted. Leslie was mayor for 24 years before deciding not to run this year. He and his wife Fern will be honored by the Tahoka Chamberettes and the city at a reception in Fellowship Hall of Tahoka Methodist Church from 3 to 5 p.m. Sunday, June 2. Some invitations were sent out, but Mayor Jim Solomon stressed Monday night that everyone is invited to attend the reception, regardless of whether an invitation was received.

Rain Returns To Lynn County

Rainfall returned to Tahoka and other areas of Lynn County Monday evening, with 1.5 inches recorded in the city of Tahoka and reports of an inch or more received from other parts of the county.

In the New Lynn area, the rainfall was reported up to 3 inches, and with some hail in that area and on down toward Grassland, some replanting of cotton probably will be needed.

Again the rain came heaviest in areas which already have had plenty of rain recently, and lightest in the western section of the county which has been driest. There was one report of about a half inch of rain at West Point, where more moisture is needed.

However, about four miles west of Tahoka, a good 2 inch rain was reported.

A new round of rainstorms moved into the county after midnight Tuesday, and rain continued into Wednesday. No new rainfall totals were immediately available.



Man Gets 5-Year Term In Robbery Of Woman

Paul F. Garcia, 18, of Tahoka, was assessed a five-year prison term by a jury in 106th District Court in Tahoka Tuesday, following a trial on a charge of aggravated robbery.

Garcia was accused in the Feb. 13 robbery of Mrs. Inez Garner, 1812 N. 6th, after entering her home.

Judge George Hansard presided and Ricky Smith, district attorney, was prosecutor. Defense attorney was Vince Martinez of Lubbock.

Several new incidents were investigated by police and sheriff's departments during the last week. Robert Calderon, 20, of Rt. 4, Tahoka, was charged with sexual

assault of a child in connection with the alleged rape of a 14-year-old Slaton girl at a home in Lynn County early Sunday morning.

Calderon posted \$5000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton.

Tahoka police investigated a couple of accidents during the past week including one on Tuesday, May 14 at the intersection of Main and Harper that involved a 1973 Oldsmobile driven by Henry P. Garcia of Tahoka and a 1984 Buick driven by Fred B. Hegi of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Another accident was investigated on Saturday at 2117 N. 1st where a 1974 Ford driven by

David Valdez of Tahoka was reported to have run over the curb of Mrs. G.B. Tomlinson's residence, damaging a lamp post and a fence.

Tickets issued during the past week include two for no driver's license, two for negligent collision and careless driving, two for no proof of liability insurance, two for running stop sign, and one each for exhibition of acceleration, running a red light and operating a motor vehicle with headlights off.

Police arrested one Tahoka man for DWI and also another Tahoka man was arrested for violation of a court order.

In jail during the week were one person each for sexual abuse of a child, driving while intoxicated, public intoxication and violation of a court order.

IT'S GETTING to be that time of year when those of us who like warm weather better than cold weather should be pleased for awhile.

Of course, I am perfectly aware that there are just as many people who dislike hot warm weather as much as I dislike cold weather. And most everybody — hot natured or cold natured — agrees that the best temperature is around 70-80 degrees. Ways To Prevent Crime Explained

"Being aware that crime can happen to you, even in the smaller communities, is the key to crime prevention," Sgt. Ben Ussery, head of the Lubbock Police Dept.'s Crime Prevention Unit, told a group of members and guests at the quarterly meeting of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce at noon Tuesday.

About 50 persons were present at the dinner served by the Tahoka Chamberettes in Fellowship Hall of First Methodist Church.

Noting that "everybody is involved with the criminal," Sgt. Ussery said "It costs taxpayers

about \$35 a day to keep a man in Huntsville." He stressed the importance of programs such as the Neighborhood Watch and said "stopping crime takes the cooperation of all the citizens and all the law enforcement people."

He observed that the Neighborhood Watch program is working well in Lubbock. "We have about 70 per cent fewer burglaries in Neighborhood Watch areas than in those areas which don't have the program."

Ussery also told the group that it is important for all citizens to mark their valuable items with their drivers license numbers so that if they are stolen and then recovered, they can be traced to the owner.

He explained that a pen which writes in invisible ink which can be seen only under a black light is available. He also said that the Lubbock Crime Prevention Unit will send someone to Tahoka or any community in the area to make surveys of homes or businesses to show owners how they can make them more safe from criminals.

Later, Chamber of Commerce President Dalton Wood said the Tahoka Chamber will push this program of home surveys and also of marking items such as appliances, guns and clothing with the invisible markers.

Ussery said that if several homes could be surveyed in one trip, there would be no charge for the officers to come down from Lubbock and make the surveys.

The Crime Prevention program is sponsored by the South Plains Assn. of Governments.

SAFETY SENSE

Science and Safety

Thanks to the efforts of one major chemical company, many Americans can feel safe at home.

According to Richard J. Mahoney, Monsanto president and chief executive officer, it is necessary to ask what steps can be taken to prevent accidents from happening.

To this end, he recently named six executives to the task force representing manufacturing, safety, health, environment, social responsibility and international groups within the company.

Chairman of the task force is H.J. Corbett, senior vice president, environment, facilities and materials. The

groups will report to Mahoney monthly and will call on experts from outside the company for consultation, as appropriate.

"If the review turns up ways in which we can improve our safety practices, or our accident response mechanism, we will put them into effect promptly," Mahoney said. "Even though we are confident that our plants are as safe as it is humanly possible to make them."

The company has policies in place which require regular, detailed safety audits at all plants, worldwide, and yearly audits of industrial hygiene standards, Mahoney said. In addition, he said, safety begins with plant de-

sign and construction, and continues through manufacturing, storage and transportation. "Because we are keenly conscious of their...potential hazard," said Mahoney



A thorough review of safety policies and procedures around the world is the job of a special task force at a major chemical company has undertaken.

"We take extraordinary precautions to ensure against mishaps—employing the best available technology and safety precautions; constantly monitoring the storage and processing of highly toxic materials; regularly reviewing and updating our safety precautions, which are the same at all locations around the world."

Mahoney added, however, these precautions must not lead to complacency. "Safety must be a continuing, abiding commitment of everybody. The task force will look for tangible measures for even greater safety."

In addition to the special review underway at his company, Mahoney said he intends to work with other chemical industry leaders through the Chemical Manufacturers Association (CMA) to encourage the entire industry to consider collective actions to prompt greater safety. He serves on the CMA board of directors. Their efforts can mean a greater sense of security for people all over the world.

Scanning Social Security

June Brides and Social Security

June is the traditional month for marriage. This may be an appropriate time to discuss how marriage may affect a person's right and responsibilities under the Social Security program.

The first reminder is to change your name with Social Security if you use your married name at work. Failure to do so could cause a mixup in the earnings credited to your Social Security record.

In recent years, a number of private firms have offered to perform this service for a fee. However, changing your name with the Social Security office is both free and simple. All it takes is to contact the nearest Social

Security office. You will need evidence of your old name and the new one. Many people don't stop to think how marriage will affect their Social Security protection.

Marriage means that a person's work under Social Security may be more important. The program pays benefits to the dependent spouse and children when either worker retires, or if she or he becomes disabled or dies. Although women are more likely to receive dependent spouse benefits, they are also payable to men.

The benefits include payments to mothers or fathers under 65 with children under 16 or children disabled before 22 in their care; payments to wives and husbands or divorced spouses as early as age 62, to widows, widowers and divorced surviving spouse between age 60 and to disabled widows, widowers, and divorced surviving spouse between age 50-59. Children 18 or under or disabled before age 22 may receive benefits after the retirement, death or disability of either parent. A dependent parent may qualify for benefits on a deceased son or daughter's earnings at age 62.

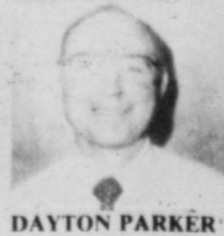
Under a recent change in the law, retirement benefits may be paid to a divorced spouse at age 62 whether or not the former spouse has retired, if the divorce has been affect for at least 2 years following a marriage of at least 10 years.

People who are already receiving benefits as the dependent of a retired, deceased, or disabled worker should note that marriage or remarriage may cause his or her benefits to be reduced or stopped. However, this is not true for widows and widowers or divorced surviving spouses age 60 or older, or disabled between age 50-59. They may marry or remarry without affecting their right to benefits.

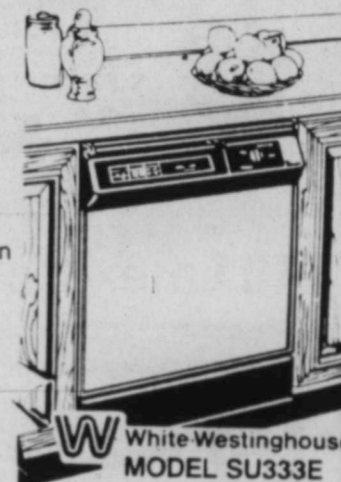

FARM VALUE OF FOOD BASKET UP--For the first time since 1978, the farm value of a typical basket of food increased more in 1984 than did the retail food price increase. The farm value of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's market basket of foods rose 5.3 percent last year, notes an economist. However, because of depressed farm

prices over several years, the 1984 farm value of foods was only 7 percent above the 1980 value. During that same time, retail food prices increased 17 percent. The farm value averaged 34 percent of the retail cost for a market basket of food last year.

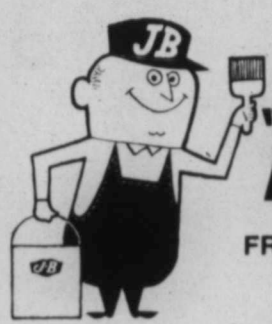

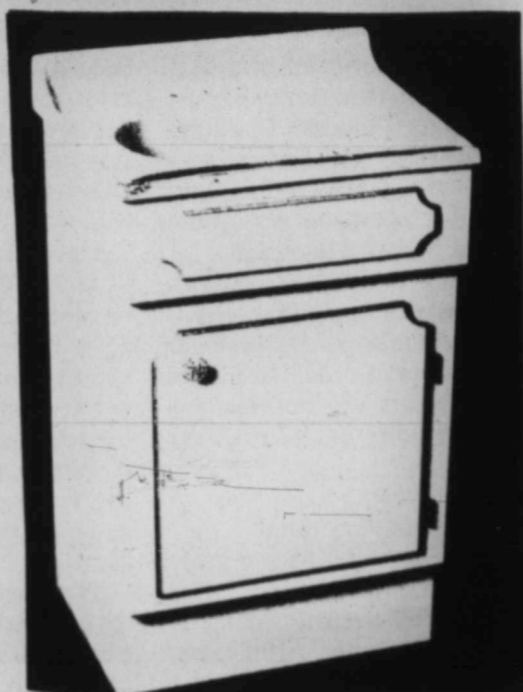

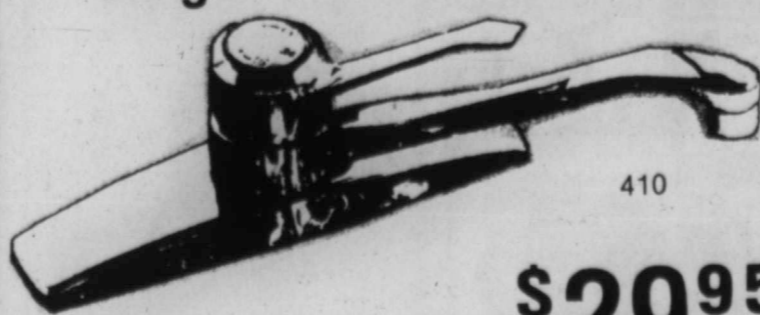

A Visit With Your County Agent

CONTROL BAGWORMS NOW

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began early in May in the Lubbock area this year and is now almost complete. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuringiensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. Always read and follow label instruction when applying insecticides.

Cotton Today

Cotton Outlook Overcast:

High interest rates, high exchange rates, textile imports, and trade policies of foreign countries pose major threats to the cotton industry in the upcoming year, the National Cotton Council Board was advised at its Washington meeting this week.

Staff Economist Dean Ethridge said nay farm bill will be limited in its ability to alleviate the effects of the 60 percent increase in the dollar's value. Council President Samuel B. Holis presented a report on efforts to help bring textile imports under control, citing the filing of a Section 22 action and active support of a trade enforcement bill. Hollis said Council leaders have met with numerous high-level Administration officials and members of Congress to discuss the severe impact of the strong dollar and excessive textile imports on the cotton industry.

The Council adopted resolutions: (1) reaffirming its position that announced provisions of the 1985 farm program should not be changed, and (2) supporting the Agriculture Secretary's discretionary authority to include cotton in market PIK programs, but insisting that such programs for cotton pro-

vide equal treatment for domestic and export users.

Norton Sees Easing Of Industry Pressure: Addressing the National Cotton Council Board this week in Washington, Deputy Agriculture Secretary John Norton said he believes pressure on the cotton industry will be eased by some reductions in the budget deficit and some increase in inflation. He said the cotton industry's challenge is to have the discipline to compete in the world market. "If we simply would remove the 55-cent loan floor for 1986, the signal we would give other producing nations would be very surprising to them," Norton stated.

Deputy Secretary Norton, who said he will harvest his 31st cotton crop this year, assured the Board there would be "no diminution of efforts" in agricultural research.

"My desire to maintain the budget equal to what we've had and enhance it as much as possible to get unit costs down and become the lowest cost producers in the world," Norton declared. He said total federal spending in agricultural research is not as much as what IBM alone spends on its corporate research.

boot stage to have a good quality hay that can be used during the winter and other times when forage is needed, he said.

"One disadvantage of pearl millet is that under drouth stress conditions where high fertility levels have been maintained, nitrate toxicity may occur," the Extension agent said. He urged producers to watch their livestock when stress conditions occur. Material can be cut and tested for nitrate levels so you know when to remove animals to prevent death due to nitrate toxicity, he said.

Pearl millet hybrids are sold by various companies and producers should check with local seed dealers for them, he said.

A four-to-five-week cutting cycle will produce plenty of good quality hay.

Once the hay crop is cut, delayed drying results in reduced feed value and hay volume because of plant respiration, leaf shattering and leaching.

Although the plant is cut, respiration continues until the plant moisture content drops below 35 percent. This respiration decreases feed value. Respiration losses are slight with optimum drying conditions, but

can amount to 16 per cent of the crop when drying conditions are poor. Mechanical crushing of stems speeds up drying and helps reduce losses.

Leaf shattering is most serious with legumes but also occurs in grasses. In legumes losses can total 20 percent of dry matter and up to 11 per cent protein. Raking hay into windows while moisture is at or above 40 percent will reduce shattering losses.

Rain causes leaching losses--losses of water soluble nutrients. Rewetting of cut hay also favors micro-organism development which can cause additional losses.

While rainfall is a hazard for cut hay, continued exposure to bright sunlight also is a problem because it reduces carotene levels and result in bleaching.

To reduce environmental related losses, bale hay as soon as it's cured. Continued exposure can only result in loss of feed value.

Baling losses occur in every haying operation. Some hay is left on the ground regardless of the condition of the hay or baler. Operations should strive to keep these losses to a minimum.

Activities the first day include the State 4-H Food Show and State 4-H Project Show.

The opening assembly for Roundup will begin at 7 p.m. June 4 with the recognition of 99 outstanding 4-H members who will receive scholarships totaling more than a half million dollars. Two 4-H alumni and four long-time supporters of the 4-H program also will be recognized at a

special assembly that evening at 8 p.m.

4-H'ers competing in the State Food Show and Roundup contests must qualify by winning in county and district competition. The State Project Show is open to all 4-H youth who are interested in preparing exhibits about particular project areas in which they have excelled.

Summer Annual Forages Available For Horses

Many Lynn County horse owners are wondering what types of forages may be available under the open grazing and hay harvesting programs available to producers on set-aside acres in 1985, says Greg Henley county Extension agent for agriculture.

Many good forages are available, Henley said. But he offered several precautions and suggestions to improve the picture.

"Many of the sorghum and sorghum sudan grass hybrids cause a problem called sorghum cystitis in horses," he cautioned. He said this can lead to kidney and coordination problems, as well as death.

The county agent noted that pearl millet is suggested by Dr. Kirby W. Huffman III, Extension agronomist at Lubbock, as an adequate forage for use in this area. These materials do not cause prussic acid poisoning nor the sorghum cystitis program, the agent added.

"Pearl millet can be planted about the same time as the other forage materials. Plant from five to seven pounds of seed per acre in 38 to 50 inch rows or drill 15 to 20 pounds per acre if using a grain drill. The seed should be covered with from 1/4 to an inch of soil because of their small size.

"The millets can be grazed when they reach a height of 18 to 24 inches. This will give excellent quality as well as adequate forage," he said. By utilizing rotational grazing, allowing livestock to graze pearl millet to a shorter height and moving to fresher forages, better quality can be maintained throughout the summer, he advised.

Memorial Day Safety Stressed

Memorial Day is the first holiday of the year when traffic using the highways of Texas will increase considerably.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety cautions motorists of the increased dangers of holiday traffic. "Memorial Day holiday signals the beginning of summer fun and outdoor activities. It also signals the beginning of more traffic on our highways. Along with increased traffic, the danger of more accidents and more deaths always follows," he said.

He noted that heavy traffic will bring out the best and the worst driving habits. Some drivers recognize the hazards and compensate for them, while others become frustrated or angry. The frustrated or angry driver then becomes a hazard that can kill or maim others.

Major Cawthon advised, "Traffic and activities around our recreational areas will be heavy. It seems when people are enjoying themselves in these areas, alcoholic beverages pay a big part in their enjoyment, so drivers need to be especially observant for the drunk-driver."

The Department of Public Safety Troopers will especially be on the lookout for the speeder and the drunk driver as these two violations kill over half of the people killed in traffic each year. As a precaution, slow down, wear your seat belt, and don't drink and drive to insure your safe Memorial Day holiday.

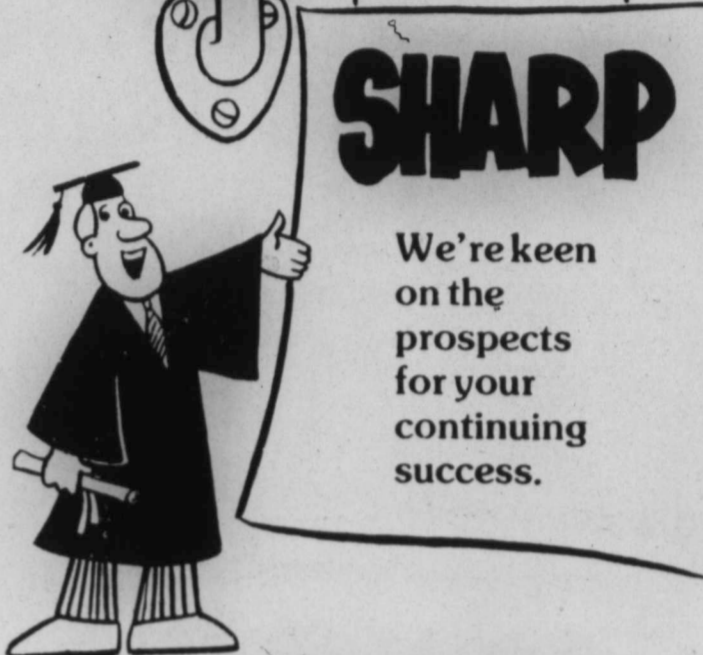
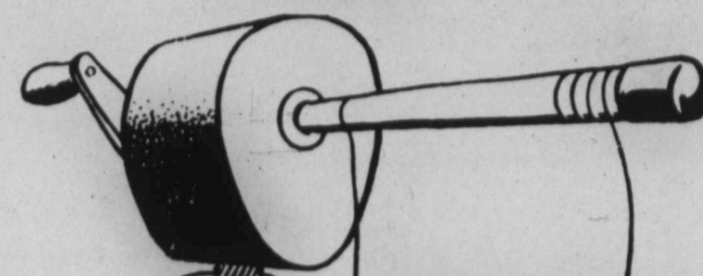

AIR CONDITIONER MAINTENANCE IMPORTANT--Since air conditioning is one of the largest single users of home energy, proper service and maintenance can help consumers hold down electric bills, says housing specialist Dr. Peggy Owens. Checking the system for warning signs is a simple matter, she maintains. Put your hand in front of the air supply vents. If the air feels lukewarm, it could indicate a problem with the ductwork, compressor, evaporator or refrigerant. You should also feel air movement from the vent. If you don't it may indicate a fan problem, a dirty filter, dirty evaporator coils or ductwork leaks. Then check the condenser unit outside. It's normal for the air being discharged from the unit to be hot. If it isn't, there could be a problem with the compressor.

EMPLOYED WOMEN NEED VACATION TIME--Many of the women who most need a vacation are least likely to have one, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist, Diane T. Welch. Some women employed outside the home tend to save up chores like sewing, house cleaning, gardening or house painting for their vacation time. Others continue to carry the burden of housecleaning, cooking and other tasks while the family vacations in a camper, cabin or condo. Employed women who "vacation" in this manner are getting no vacation at all, says the specialist. "They return to work exhausted, but in a different way."
