Gary Morrison Named Tahoka Chief Of Police

Gary C. Morrison, 31, former Tahoka resident with seven years of law enforcement experience, was hired Tuesday night as Tahoka chief of police.

Morrison, who currently has been working for Lubbock radio station KSEL, has worked for the Lubbock County sheriff's office, has been a patrolman for Tahoka, Wilson and Slaton police departments, and was chief of police in Beaver, Okla., from August 1979 to February 1981.

After the city council voted unanimously to employ Morrison Tuesday night, Mayor Jim Solomon commented, "we believe we have made a very good choice, although the decision was not easy, since we had some other well-qualified applicants. Mr. Morrison has good credentials and comes highly recommended by those who formerly employed him as a law enforcement officer."

Morrison, a high school graduate with some college credit at Amarillo College, is a certified Texas peace officer, with additional certificates as a corrections officer, basic and advanced narcotics investigation, jail operations, understanding family

violence, and has an Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation certificate in uniform crime reporting.

He is married to the former Cathy Wells of Tahoka, and they have two children, age 9 and 7.

In an interview with the council, Morrison said he would like to initiate programs of crime prevention through citizen involvement stressing security of homes and businesses, and also would like to develop a program of "regular education and awareness presentations for Tahoka school age children through cooperative efforts of the school system and the Tahoka Police Dept."

Morrison is expected to begin his duties here early next month.

Burglaries Reported In City

John Haines of 1600 N. 2nd reported to Tahoka police on Sunday that his residence was in the process of being burglarized at approximately 5 p.m. Haines noticed two young men inside his residence and caught them by

surprise. Haines reported, "I walked in and heard some talking in the back of the house and saw some stuff out in the middle of the floor. I yelled at them and they ran out, but I had recognized them."

Police officers arrived on the scene, and found several items in the backyard and in the alley behind the Haines residence. Two juveniles later were taken into custody. One was transported to juvenile detention in Lubbock and the other youth was released to his parent's custody. Both are now awaiting trial in juvenile court. Both of these boys have already been on juvenile probation due to previous offenses committed, including the admitted destruction of property at McCord Motor Company.

Police received reports from two local businesses on Tuesday that their buildings had been broken into on Monday night. Lynco Automotive reported that approximately \$150 in cash was stolen from their cash register. Entry was gained by prying in the front door. Nothing else was reported missing.

Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. was also reported broken into on Monday. Entry was gained by prying a door open inside a locked chain fence. Nothing was reported missing or damaged, however.

Police investigated an accident on May 4 at 2000 Ave. O that involved a 1963 Dodge, unattended, owned by Gerald A. Duede of Weatherford, and a 1974 Pontiac driven by Delvin Lane Buchanan of Tahoka. No injuries were

reported. Tickets issued during the past week include two for running stop signs and one each for illegal parked vehicle resulting in accident, failure to stop at scene of an accident and no liability insurance and one ticket for exhibition of acceleration.

Police also arrested two men for public intoxication. They were taken to Lynn County Sheriff's office where they were booked and jailed. About \$300 cash was stolen from Tahoka Auto Supply in the burglary of that business sometime Monday night.

One of the two juveniles involved in the Haines home burglary also admitted involvement in the tire slashings that occurred at General Telephone Co. and Lynn County Soil Conservation last August, clearing that case, sheriff's officers said. They also requested that a Crime Line caller who previously had contacted them in regard to the case call Crime Line again and give his Crime Line identification number.

Sheriff's officers arrested two suspects Sunday in connection with a burglary of a barn owned by Danny Lockaby 5.5 miles south of Tahoka. A female suspect was arrested at the scene and a male suspect was taken into custody in the south part of Tahoka, where he had fled on foot. Sheriff's officers expressed appreciation to citizens who called in after sighting the suspect and to the Department of Public Safety for use of their helicopter in tracking down the suspect. Supt. Summitt Asked To Resign

Dale Summitt, superintendent of Tahoka Public Schools since last summer, confirmed this week that the board of trustees of the school district has asked for his resignation.

Summitt said the school board cited no specific incident in asking for his resignation during an executive session May 16, but said that "philosophical differences between myself and the school board recently have surfaced."

"I have not resigned, and I

don't know when, or if, I will do so," the superintendent said.

Summitt was hired by the school board last year to succeed Jim Coulston, who had been superintendent for seven years and who himself left the position after being under attack from some members of the board and the community.

In January, the school board voted to extend Summitt's contract to June 1987, giving him two more years on his contract. Resolution of this factor is one major item that would be required if Summitt does leave the position.

The superintendent carefully avoided any recriminations directed at the school board, saying that "it's just that differences in philosophy have reached an impasse."

Joe Hays, president of the school board, said he could not comment on the situation at all at this time.

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Health Tip

Chewing Tobacco, Snuff
Can Cause Cancer

Cigarette smoking isn't the only form of tobacco use that's harmful to your health, the American Dental Association told the Health Insurance Association of America.

Snuff dipping and tobacco chewing are also hazardous and should not be considered safe alternatives to smoking, said the ADA. In fact, according to an ADA spokesman, snuff dipping and chewing tobacco can cause cancer.

"The habit of holding tobacco in one's mouth while sucking on the quid can damage oral tissues," he said. "This practice often produces a white, leathery-appearance area in the mouth called leukoplakia, considered pre-cancerous."

In addition, smokeless tobacco has been linked to cancer of the oral cavity, pharynx, larynx and esophagus.

There are several other reasons not to use smokeless tobacco, according to the dental association. Among them:

- Chewing tobacco or snuff can cause periodontal problems because of tobacco's juices' repeated contact with gum tissue.
- Smokeless tobaccos contain high levels of abrasive grit and sand, which cause tooth abrasion in tobacco chewers.
- The sugar that is added to improve the taste of chewing tobacco can cause tooth decay. In addition, highly sweetened tobacco can be dangerous for diabetics.
- All forms of cured tobacco contain nicotine, which can lead to high blood pressure and an irregular heart beat.

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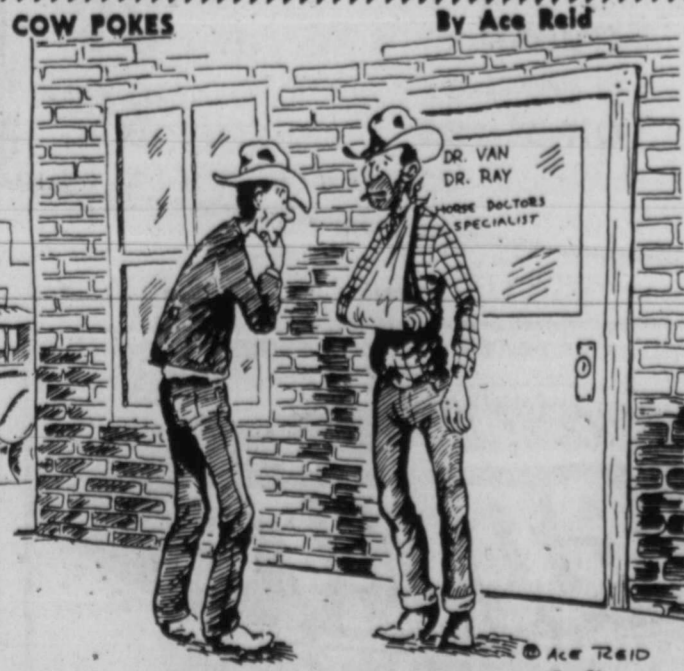
