Grassland Man, Son Die In Wreck

A 31-year-old Grassland area man and his young son were killed in a brutal collision of his pickup and truck carrying gin equipment near the Hackberry community Tuesday evening.

Rodney Dale Ray and his son, Bradley Dale, 5, were pronounced dead by Tahoka Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton at the scene of the collision on FM 212 about two miles north of U.S. 380 and about 12 miles east of Tahoka.

Ray's wife, Sharla, 26, and their daughter, Lindsey, 19 months, were taken by EMS ambulance to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where they were reported in serious condition. The driver of the truck carrying equipment to Hackberry Gin was also injured and was taken to a Lubbock hospital.

The truck driver, Luis Rodriguez, 50, Rt. 2, Post, was reported in serious condition with

head and chest injuries.

The investigating officer at the scene said another truck carrying gin equipment was in front of the one which was involved in the collision, and that the truck in front apparently kicked up a large cloud of dust on the road, obscuring the vision of the second truck driver and the driver of the pickup.

The truck and the GMC pickup reportedly driven by Ray collided almost head-on about 7 p.m. on a narrow stretch of pavement on 212, at a place where dirt had been pushed back from the shoulders of the road and piled up.

Another pickup was behind the truck and apparently struck the truck from the rear, but no one was reported injured in that vehicle.

Crime Line has offered a \$300 reward for information clearing a

burglary at Bartley-Weaver Fertilizer on U.S. 380 east sometime Tuesday night, July 16. Five cases of Roundup and two cases of Banvel herbicide were stolen, along with two green hand trucks apparently used to load the cases. Total value of all missing items was set at \$2657. Entry was gained through the roof.

Texas Crime Stoppers offers cash rewards up to \$1000 for information clearing pesticide thefts such as the Bartley-Weaver case, and callers will remain anonymous. The toll-free number is 1-800-252-TIPS.

Five persons were jailed for public intoxication during the week, four of them Lamesa men. Three of these were arrested at O'Donnell and one in Tahoka. Also in jail during the week were one person for driving while intoxicated and one on a charge of burglary with intent to commit a felony.

Police in Tahoka also issued 11 warning tickets and one ticket each for violation of drivers license restriction, no tail lights and defective vehicle and careless driving.

high prices paid for natural gas under provisions of a 1983 contract between the company and Westar which requires Energas to purchase all gas for its West Texas System from Westar.

The suit alleges that Cabot Corporation and certain of its subsidiaries, among other things, committed the violations by manipulating the calculation of gas costs under the 1983 contract, and by refusing to grant Energas relief from the "all requirements" provision of the contract. By so refusing, the defendants have restrained Energas' ability to purchase lower cost gas for the West Texas System from other potential suppliers, the suit alleges.

This condition has resulted in Westar having absolute control over the price Energas pays for gas for its West Texas System, while at the same time, Westar and its affiliates are in direct competition with Energas for certain large-volume customers' business. Energas officials assert.

Last year Texas library users requested 225,985 items through Interlibrary Loan, a computerized procedure for borrowing and lending books. This free library service utilizes improved computer technology to locate books, magazines, newspaper articles, or answers to factual questions that cannot be supplied by local libraries. large library, then in Texas and finally throughout the country, Interlibrary Loan staff can supply almost any informational item.

Funded by the Texas State Library, Interlibrary Loan service absorbs all user fees except those for magazine articles that may need to be photocopied by out-of-state libraries. Use Interlibrary Loan. It's fast; it's efficient; it's free.

THE U.S. GOVERNMENT Printing Office sent us a catalog of publications they have for sale to the public. The publications cover a wide range of subjects, nearly all specialized for some particular interest, and a lot of folks might find some really interesting reading in some of them.

You can order publications on such things as agriculture, careers, children and families, computers, diet, education, weather, health and physical fitness, history, hobbies, senior citizens, vacation and travel--and some others.

Examples include a report on the search for the cure and treatment of Alzheimer's Disease, 124-page booklet for \$5; Farm Uses for Computers, 38 pages for \$1.75; Aunt Sammy's Radio Recipes (from a popular radio show of the 1920s and 1930s), \$2.25; Solar Greenhouses, \$2.25.

There are some booklets with a very limited sphere of interest. For example, I can't think of many people who would spend \$7 for a 195-page publication called "United States Participation in the Multilateral Development Banks in the 1980s."

They have books on how to get rid of pests such as insects, but nothing on how to get rid of people who come around to bug you about

things you're not ready to think about at that time.

ONE OF THE THINGS I got in the mail recently was a sample pullout chart which tells you how many calories are in all the things you eat, and how much running, swimming, cycling or walking you have to do to get rid of that many calories. For example, you pull the little marker down to "cheeseburger" and look in the little window and it tells you a cheeseburger has 518 calories, and to get rid of that many, you'd have to run for 39 minutes, swim for 64 minutes, bicycle for 82, walk for 136 or aerobic dance for 78.

You can order these things with your company name on them and hand them out to all the fat people you know. It would be a good way to lose business or to get hit in the mouth by a heavyweight, so I didn't order any.

A friend came by while I was looking at the charts, and I asked him what he planned to eat for lunch. We looked up all the calorie things and decided that if he chose walking (you have to walk 82 minutes to get rid of the 313 calories in a bologna sandwich), it would take the whole 24-hour day just to equalize lunch.

After looking over the calorie list, I decided that the only safe thing to do for lunch was to eat the chart (4 calories).

Commissioners View Handicapped Aid Plans

Lynn County commissioners Monday looked at preliminary floor plans and discussed ideas for making county courthouse facilities more accessible for handicapped persons, particularly those in wheel chairs.

The commissioners authorized the architects who presented the plans Monday to go ahead and make detailed plans which could be used for construction bids.

Three phases of the work which would bring the county facilities into full compliance with federal laws regarding accessibility of public buildings for handicapped persons were discussed. Total of all the work, including making the building entry itself easier by use of a ramp, new restrooms and other facilities on the basement level and installation of an elevator to stop at all floors, has been loosely estimated to cost about \$140,000

not counting architects' fees.

Gary W. Smith and Danny McLarty of the Lubbock architectural firm of McLarty, Smith and Meyers, were present at Monday's meeting.

Commissioners appeared to be leaning toward a plan which calls for the basement remodeling with new restrooms and the outside access by way of a ramp on the west side of the courthouse as the first part of the program. This would leave the elevator construction for later.

Treasurer Cindy Bryan advised the commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon about the effect of Senate Bill 449 which goes into effect Aug. 26 and relates to daily deposits.

Commissioners also approved limited payment on two indigent funerals and discussed maintenance of the Memorial Triangle next to the courthouse.

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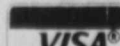

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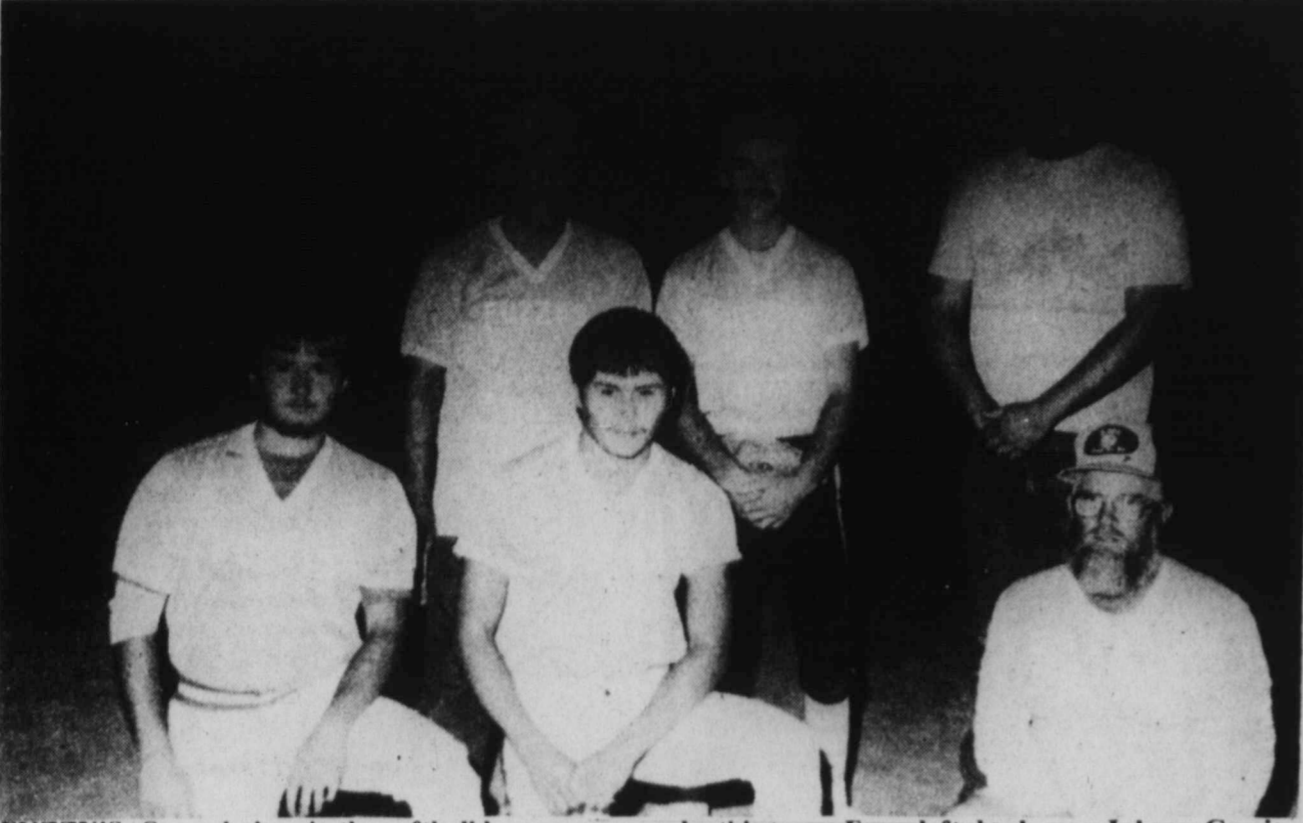

ASC News

Measurement Service--Once again a large number of producers have requested measurement service. (Plans have been made to begin taking slides on the last day of July) We will begin on the east side of the county and will complete the county as soon as possible. If you requested measurement service you need to shape up your farm, all action must be completed by July 26. Crops of the same color will need a three or four row strip plowed between so measurements can be made. Examples are peas and cotton or grain sorghum and sudan the same size.

You will be notified when the measurements have been completed. You will have 5 days to make adjustments and complete certification. There are a few very early grain sorghum fields. If you have requested measurement service please notify us at least two weeks before beginning harvest. After the acreage is harvested adjustments cannot be made. Keeping us up to date will help us complete the service timely.

Foreign Owned Agriculture Land-- Foreigners who have bought or sold U.S. agriculture land are reminded of the requirement to report the transaction within 90 days to the local county ASCS office.

Haying And/Or Grazing of ACR-- Haying and/or grazing of ACR is approved for spring seeded covers just like small grain covers. You must:

1. Certify the acreage before grazing or baling. You may need to cancel your measurement ser-

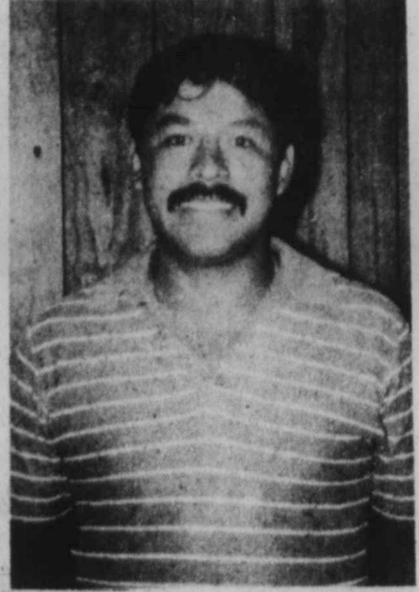
vice request on these acreages.
2. Sign a request and agreement to not sell the hay or grazing.

3. State if the hay will be fed or acreage grazed by your livestock or other producer's livestock.

4. Pay \$10 per farm cost of farm visit.

Wheat Production--Many producers have harvested wheat that produced very good yields. You are encouraged to report evidence of this production. Additional forms may be picked up here at this office. If your wheat failed and will not be harvested, you need to report these acreages.

Failed Crop Acreages--Remember to report any acreages of a crop that has failed and will not be harvested before destroying evidence of the crop. Total certification of that crop on that farm must be completed before recording of failed crop acreages. Failure to report failed acres before destroying evidence will mean loss of history of these planted acres and possible program benefits on these acreages.

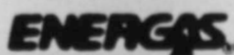

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Devotional

SCRIPTURE:
Mark 10:17-22

We live in a day when we over and over hear about money and the deception in the use of it. In other words, we soon learn how necessary it is to know how to make money and then how to use it. We want to find how to use money in our life and how to get it in the right way and in the Bible we learn of the "right way" when we begin reading this scripture in Mark. Take time to understand it in what happens. Hear the answer to the question of the young man who came running to Jesus and asked, "Good Master, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?" And Jesus' answer was a question: "Why do you call me good? There is none good but one, and that is God."

What Jesus was really saying to this one was: "Do you know who I am? That I and the Father are one? There is no one good except God." Then Jesus assumed that this one knew the commandments and quoted some of them; and then note the man's reply, "Master, all these things I have observed from my youth." Here was a man who was a good man, a man with high morals, one who kept all the Laws of Moses (the Ten Commandments). But, although he wanted to live forever, he would not accept and follow Christ. He thought it cost him too much.

Jesus saw him, and loved him, telling him how he could have this gift of eternal life which he sought. He never said, "You must not do this or that," but he told the man the one thing that he lacked -- commitment -- to give himself to Christ, take up the cross, and follow Him. But the young man loved his great possessions, and would not turn loose of them. He foolishly held on to his present wealth, not realizing that he really could accept the gift of eternal life, and let God be God -- be responsible for him in this world and the next life after physical death.

From this distant time, we might



be inclined to say, "Man, how foolish can you get?" But, let me ask you, do you hold on to your possessions? Do you own them, or do they own you? If the rich man had accepted Jesus as the divine Son of God sent to save men from their sin, do you think he would have had to give up his great possessions? Yes, I think he probably would have, not just because he had riches but because they were the stumbling block which kept him from following Jesus. They absorbed his attention and gave him a feeling of false security.

But let's not get away from the one point I want us to get from this Scripture: That to be one who keeps all the laws of Moses is not enough. It will not give you eternal life. Only Jesus can do that -- this was and is His purpose, and Paul said it well in Romans 5:8 -- "But God commends His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." So, "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great a salvation?"

The rich young ruler must have been busy and very rich, but neither his riches nor his high moral character, nor his good deeds -- none of these could save him. If these could have forgiven his sins and saved him from them into new eternal life -- God would not have had to send Jesus, His only begotten Son, to die on the cross for our sins.

The wages of sin is death (always!) but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ -- no other way!

Do you believe Him and His promises? Then accept Jesus Christ and follow Him, bearing your cross of service in His Name. Jesus can save you, if you will have faith in Him!
