"We never like to think about raising rates of services, but we do feel we need to be getting ready for these unavoidable heavy costs in equipment used to provide these services," said Solomon

The increases will be figured into the city's proposed budget, with a public hearing set on that budget on Sept. 16.

It has been two years since the city last raised base rates on water and other services.

Appearing before the council Tuesday were Weldon Self, manager of Energas in Tahoka, and Harold Roberts, manager of Southwestern Public Service Co. Roberts said SPS is planning to restructure rates, but that the prices for services to most customers would be unchanged. Self said he was on hand just to advise the council that Energas is always ready to cooperate with the city in every way.

Council members voted to appoint H.B. McCord, former longtime member of the council, to fill the unexpired term of Tom Cooper, who moved away with several months left on his term scheduled to expire next April.


#### **Funds To Replace City's Snowman On Square Sought**

Directors of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce Tuesday voted to try to raise funds to help pay for a new 11-foot artificial Christmas tree to be placed on the courthouse square, replacing the snowman which has been on the square for more than a decade, and which each year shows more signs of age and deterioration.

The new tree will include lights, red "berries" and a 24-inch lighted star at the top. It is supposed to last at least 10 years, according to the manufacturer.

Cost of the tree, including shipping, is expected to be about \$900. The chamber directors hope to raise at least half that amount through donations, which may be given to any chamber director or officer, or to the chamber office, Box 777. Tahoka.

Also, a receptacle for donations for the new tree will be set up during the Harvest Festival.



promises. Cotton growers who have been hard hit economically and are facing a low price per pound in the current season got no encouragement that the loan price for cotton will be raised to a level that would allow farmers to make some profit this year.

Stenholm said that it wouldn't make sense to raise the loan price, and defended his vote against a plan for a referendum on setting cotton loan prices at a higher level.

"The loan price must be competitive with the world market." he said. "If we set it high, producers in other countries will price their cotton just under us, and we won't be able to sell our cotton."

He added that putting a big import tax on foreign cotton or otherwise restricting imports also wouldn't work, because these countries then would not buy our grain and other products, about half of which the U.S. sells on the world market.

"Actually, we have to cut the price a little, because we're

bleakly that about half of these "are broke." Stenholm said that a farm program must be devised which will help the nation's farmers make a profit in two or three years. This prompted questions and comments from the audience about what could be done to keep farmers from going under financially this year. Stenholm replied that even though a

lot of bankruptcies are being filed and others are facing that grim prospect, there is little that can be done by government to help any farmers that soon.

Stenholm said he was disappointed in President Reagan's refusal to help domestic shoe manufacturers in some way. "But understand that I am not a protectionist....I believe in free trade.'

He also said that "some kind of tax reform is needed, but some of the original proposals, no longer being considered, would have devastated farming and oil and gas producers."

The Tahoka Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 50¢.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

helped to raise the thousands of dollars needed each year to aid




