

## Water, Garbage Pickup Rate Hike Considered

Tahoka City Council, faced with the replacement of two major pieces of equipment within the next year or two, are considering raising rates of services to start a fund to buy that equipment, a backhoe and a trash truck.

"The backhoe is more than 15 years old, and is just about worn out," City Manager Carl Reynolds advised the council Tuesday night. "And the trash truck, which could cost more than \$60,000, certainly will have to be replaced pretty soon."

Mayor Jim Solomon and councilmen Dalton Wood, Nick Summitt and Jim Thomas agreed that the city should be planning ahead for these certain expenditures and that the money for the equipment should come from the

areas of service the equipment is used in.

Under consideration is an increase in basic sewer rates of 25 cents, a 50-cent hike in the garbage collection fee, and an increase of 15 cents per 1000 gallons of water used above the basic 2000 gallons allowed under the base rate. If these raises are included in the upcoming budget and made effective Nov. 1 as was discussed Tuesday night, persons who have been paying the minimum water-sewer-garbage collection bill now totaling \$15, would be paying \$15.75.

Reynolds said the average customer in Tahoka uses 7000 gallons of water per month—more in the summer and less in the winter. For a customer whose monthly average usage

figures 7000 gallons, there would be an increase on his total bill of \$1.35 per month, he said. Presently the minimum on water is \$6.00, plus \$1.25 per 1000 gallons used over 2000 gallons per month.

"We never like to think about raising rates of services, but we do feel we need to be getting ready for these unavoidable heavy costs in equipment used to provide these services," said Solomon.

The increases will be figured into the city's proposed budget, with a public hearing set on that budget on Sept. 16.

It has been two years since the city last raised base rates on water and other services.

Appearing before the council Tuesday were Weldon Self, manager of Energas in Tahoka, and Harold Roberts, manager of Southwestern Public Service Co.

Roberts said SPS is planning to restructure rates, but that the prices for services to most customers would be unchanged. Self said he was on hand just to advise the council that Energas is always ready to cooperate with the city in every way.

Council members voted to appoint H.B. McCord, former longtime member of the council, to fill the unexpired term of Tom Cooper, who moved away with several months left on his term scheduled to expire next April. McCord agreed to serve for the interim period until the election.

Two applications for housing assistance under the Community Development Block Program were approved. Councilman Richard White was absent.

## Bulldogs Host Stanton In Opener Here Friday

Coach A.D. Shaver's team has a good quota of veteran players who should be able to get back on the winning side of the ledger if they play up to their capabilities.

Stanton brings a veteran team, particularly in the backfield, led by Quarterback Kevin Glaspie on offense, and with a strong defense, particularly at linebackers.

In last week's scrimmage against Ropesville, the Bulldogs looked good, scoring six times to once for the home town team. There were no injuries of note, and all the Bulldogs should be ready to go Friday night, Shaver

said.

On offense, the Dogs are expected to go with senior Trey Teaff at quarterback, Johnny Morin at fullback and Randy Taylor and Todd Nance at the other running back spots. Seasoned performers like Scott Isbell, Doug Lawson, Tadd Knight and Andrew Chapa up front should help make the offense work.

Defense is what wins most football games, however, and it is in this area that the Bulldogs hope they will be better, with the greatest room for improvement in the secondary.

Tahoka has opened with Stanton every year in recent years, but has not won over the Buffaloes since 1981, when they managed a 14-10 decision. Last year Stanton won 25-7.

## Stenholm Paints Grim Picture For Farmers

What U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm told farmers and other interested persons at last Thursday morning's "town-hall-type" meeting in Tahoka was not exactly what they wanted to hear. But at least the popular Democratic congressman from Stamford can't be accused of offering any "pie-in-the-sky" promises.

Cotton growers who have been hard hit economically and are facing a low price per pound in the current season got no encouragement that the loan price for cotton will be raised to a level that would allow farmers to make some profit this year.

Stenholm said that it wouldn't make sense to raise the loan price, and defended his vote against a plan for a referendum on setting cotton loan prices at a higher level.

"The loan price must be competitive with the world market," he said. "If we set it high, producers in other countries will price their cotton just under us, and we won't be able to sell our cotton."

He added that putting a big import tax on foreign cotton or otherwise restricting imports also wouldn't work, because these countries then would not buy our grain and other products, about half of which the U.S. sells on the world market.

"Actually, we have to cut the price a little, because we're

facing a big surplus of cotton now."

The congressman said that "we're losing 100,000 farms this year," and said that of 2.4 million farms in the nation, about 1.6 million grossed less than \$40,000. The remaining 700,000 or so farms in the nation produce 80 per cent of the farm products, he said, and added bleakly that about half of these "are broke."

Stenholm said that a farm program must be devised which will help the nation's farmers make a profit in two or three years. This prompted questions and comments from the audience about what could be done to keep farmers from going under financially this year. Stenholm replied that even though a lot of bankruptcies are being filed and others are facing that grim prospect, there is little that can be done by government to help any farmers that soon.

Stenholm said he was disappointed in President Reagan's refusal to help domestic shoe manufacturers in some way. "But understand that I am not a protectionist....I believe in free trade."

He also said that "some kind of tax reform is needed, but some of the original proposals, no longer being considered, would have devastated farming and oil and gas producers."

The congressman also said he

would favor a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. "If we're really going to solve our whole country's problems we must cut the deficit."

Stenholm also met during the day with citizens in Wilson, O'Donnell and New Home.

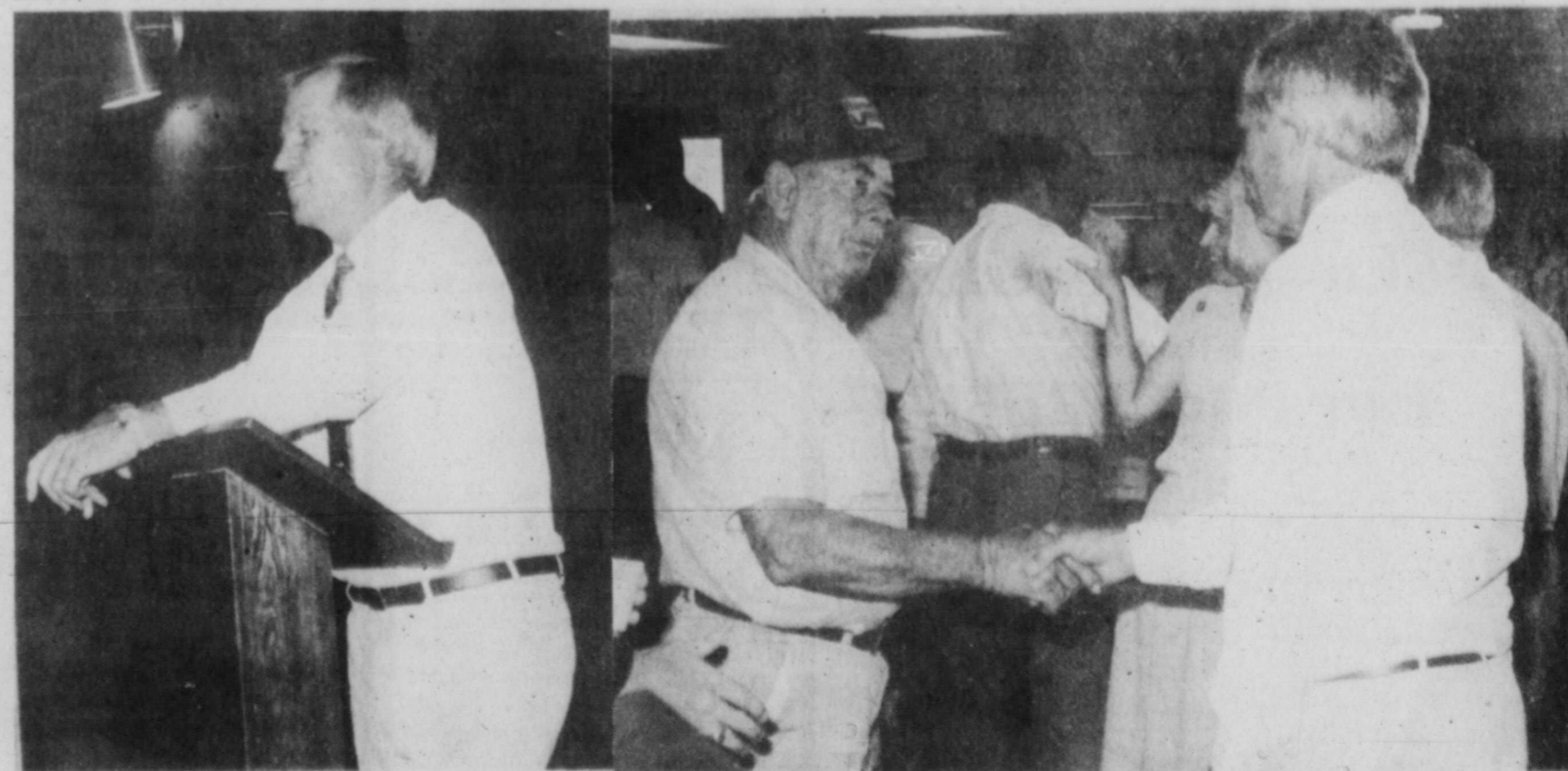
## Funds To Replace City's Snowman On Square Sought

Directors of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce Tuesday voted to try to raise funds to help pay for a new 11-foot artificial Christmas tree to be placed on the courthouse square, replacing the snowman which has been on the square for more than a decade, and which each year shows more signs of age and deterioration.

The new tree will include lights, red "berries" and a 24-inch lighted star at the top. It is supposed to last at least 10 years, according to the manufacturer.

Cost of the tree, including shipping, is expected to be about \$900. The chamber directors hope to raise at least half that amount through donations, which may be given to any chamber director or officer, or to the chamber office, Box 777, Tahoka.

Also, a receptacle for donations for the new tree will be set up during the Harvest Festival.

**SCRIPTURE:**

Isaiah 1:18; Matthew 16:13-16

## A Visit With Your County Agent

**Field Day Planned At TAES Research Facility At Halfway**  
Research which can help Lynn County farmers reduce irrigation costs and make more efficient use of the water supply, as well as the latest scientific information on crop production and control of weeds and insect pests will be featured during the 76th

annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock/Halfway on Sept. 10, County Agent Stanley M. Young reports.  
The TAES/High Plains Research Facility at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70, is host this year, Young said. The annual program

alternates between the Lubbock center and its Halfway site, he explained. Tours will begin at 1 p.m. and conclude at 5 p.m.  
Five major displays are planned on the motorized tours of the research plots and facilities. Dr. Doug Owen, research scientist at Halfway and chairman of the program, said these will feature reports and demonstrations on farming systems research, irrigation, weed control, cotton breeding and cotton insect control.

An additional stop, which can be reached by a short walk, will focus upon research being done in the production of grapes, an increasingly popular diversification crop for this area.

Visitors also can see research on other crops, on soil fertility, and the Texas Forest Service seedling program which provides windbreak and conservation planting, said Dr. David Bender, TAES assistant professor of horticulture and co-chairman of the field day.

Another popular feature of the annual public program is a display of the latest farm machinery and irrigation equipment. Research scientists and specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be on hand to answer questions and discuss particular concerns.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Forest Service and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service.

### Electricity Rates Remain Stable

### Under SPS Rate-Restructuring Plan

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) expects to file a request to restructure rates with 35 days for retail electric service in Texas, leaving prices essentially unchanged.

Residential electric bills will neither increase nor decrease

under the plan.

SPS chief executive officer Bert Ballengee said the utility will petition SPS-served communities in Texas and the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), to increase base rates by \$40,842,255, but to decrease the boiler-fuel charge in bills by \$40,933,368. The difference is a \$91,113 decrease.

"Some costs to us have increased, and some costs to us have decreased," Ballengee said, "so, we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But prices to almost all of our Texas retail customers will remain the same."

The utility is petitioning the PUCT to decrease fuel charges, and is asking for a one-time fuel-charge credit to customers. Details on the fuel-charge credit will be available later, Ballengee said, after the PUCT has issued an applicable order.

SPS previewed the rate-restructuring request on July 31, in preliminary information packets distributed to the Texas communities the utility serves.

The last increase in base rates for retail service from SPS in Texas was in mid-1982.

Ballengee said SPS has decreased costs primarily by improving operating efficiencies, by increasing generation at coal-fueled power plant units, and by renegotiating fuel and fuel-transportation contracts. Higher base-rate costs to the utility include costs of constructing a new coal-fueled unit near Muleshoe, Texas. The unit was brought into commercial service in June 1985.

## Methodists Set Bike-A-Thon

For the fifth year, the Northwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church is sponsoring a 100-mile Bike-A-Thon in Lubbock Sept. 14. Participating in the event will be Tahoka United Methodists Frank Barrow and Jim Solomon. The Golden Cross Fund to which the benefits are pledged helps to provide health care for patients with limited ability to pay. The Chaplain's office at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock administers the funds which are available to persons of all faiths upon application.

Recently, a young father came to the chaplain's office for

assistance. He had the responsibility of raising a five-year-old son alone. He is a student at Texas Tech University but had no medical insurance for surgery urgently needed by his son. The surgeon was willing to waive his fee and perform the surgery in the hospital's Short Stay Surgery Unit to cut costs. Golden Cross funds were used to cover the remaining costs, according to Tahoka Methodist Minister Gene Wisdom.

The annual Bike-A-Thon has helped to raise the thousands of dollars needed each year to aid

just such families. "Members of the community who wish to help can pledge their support by giving a specified amount for each mile of the one hundred pedaled by the participants," said Wisdom, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Tahoka. "The riders suffer the heat, the wind, and the 100 miles so that others will not have to suffer without the medical care they need." Pledges to these riders can be made by seeing Barrow and Solomon in person, or through the office of First United Methodist Church.
