Again, things looked all too familiar as the Bulldogs played tough in stopping Stanton for three downs, but on fourth, with just 41 seconds left in the half, Buff QB Kevin Glaspie passed to Derek Sorley for the touchdown. The same combination worked for two points and it was 14-6 at halftime.

In the third, after Tahoka lost the ball on downs at midfield. Glaspie passed 50 yards to End Mark Gonzales for another touchdown. The try for kick was blocked. The fourth period was scoreless, although Tahoka made a couple of fair stabs at getting into the end zone. 

LIKE MOST FOLKS, I always have been fascinated by discoveries of sunken ships, buried treasure, mysteries of the ocean depth and such as that. So the finding of the Titanic has drawn great interest all over the world. This is the most famous of all sea tragedies and naturally people want to know more about what happened, what is on board, what stories can be determined from the wreckage, etc.

The folks from Woods Hole. Mass., Oceanographic Institute (or whatever they call it) certainly deserve a lot of credit for their achievement. But they are taking an unfair (to the public) view of what is to be done with the Titanic now that it has been found.

They want to leave it where it is, and are stongly opposed to any salvaging of artifacts or any attempts to bring all or part of the vessel to the surface (I'm not even sure that is possible; one man estimated it would cost \$4 billion, and the rear section of the vessel has not been located)

The scientists want to leave it and do some poking around with their equipment and keep all the goodies to themselves. One of their excuses for this attitude is that the Titanic needs to be left where it is as a shrine, a burial place for all those who lost their lives in the tragedy in 1912. They say the site shouldn't be desecrated,

and they are strongly opposed to any salvaging and commercialization of the wreck.

This is a bunch of hogwash (seawash?). I certainly would favor someone's bringing up as much of the Titanic as possible and letting us all go on board at \$5 a head, or whatever. At least that way we common folks would get to see it. And regarding the desecration of gravesites, those folks have been dead a long time, and moving their bones, if any, won't hurt them.

## Devotional

#### By Rev. Hazel House

SCRIPTURE:

Colossians 1:1-20; John 15:1-17 "I am the true vine, and my father is the vinedresser." (Somebody gave a title for this entire month saying: "Can we build a world without walls?") And in Deuteronomy 30:9-14 it is written in the Palestine covenant that "The word of God is not so 'totally other' that it cannot be understood and obeyed. It is not so far removed from where one is that it cannot be practiced." This Love relationship between God and man, and between man and man.

This is one of the greatest scriptures in the Gospels. It is so broad and deep. Not a measurable something that we can hold in our hands and say "This is the length and breadth and the size of it; not a shallow pond of water around which we can stroll, but there are the surgings of eternity in it. We need for better understanding to pause almost after every verse. We want to pause to think about the meaning for each and all of us.

Jesus said, "I am the true vine." Now the true vine means the genuine vine (which corresponds to the name Israel - which was once a noble vine) but at the time of Jesus, Israel had become degenerate, so Jesus says, "I am the true vine ... " and "My Father is the vinedresser."

He removes the dead and unfruitful branches, and prunes the rest to make them more fruitful. Now here the disciples do not need pruning treatment because the teachings of Jesus which they have believed and accepted which is the Spirit and the life which has made them clean.



He had not realized that anyone could be so useless as we are. Since He is knowing all there is to know (even then) Jesus is not daunted in the least, but is sure that He can manage for us. He knew that without Him we could do nothing.

He says, "I am the vine; you are the branches" and the vine does, and must do, everything for the branches in order to keep the branches alive (this speaks of Sanctification). It is the vine that causes the branches to grow to become beautiful and be fruitful - new everyday. It is the vine that enables the branches to hold on and to get more nutrients and to put on more branches.

Apart from the vine, the branches are mere withering sticks, soon ready for the burning. But Christ Jesus, the True Vine, can make us, the branches, alive and ready to serve God and man - if we will let Him - just be willing to abide in Him.

SKOOSH

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Many things have happened in our world (God's world!) because we thought the branch could bear fruit of itself. But it cannot and it never will. We are all full of plans and schemes for social betterment, and for human brotherhood, but many today see no need for Christ, And they try to push Him aside saying. "We are a new generation, we are a great breed of man. Faced by any problem and given a computer and a little time and we will ultimately solve the problem ourselves. Haven't we conquered space in this age? A Saviour - A Saviour from what? What do we need from Christ?"

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



knew that life saving equipment, rapid communications, and skilled personnel could, in effect, take the emergency room to the site of injuries or accidents, and death rates from trauma were falling in cities where they operated.

To organize such services for scattered population centers, citizens established the South Plains Emergency Medical Services, Inc. (SPEMS) in 1977 to secure state and federal funding for the purchase of equipment and the training of personnel.

Since that time, 30 emergency services, largely staffed by volunteers, have been trained and equipped to serve the counties surrounding Lubbock.

Today, all of the counties on the South Plains have access to a Basic Life Support system and eight of these have Advanced Life Support capabilities.

Working together with regional EMS services and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, SPEMS has trained more than 1,400 persons in life-saving skills, has published regional

treatment protocols, oversees data base needed for future planoperation of the EMS radio network, and provides workshops for individual communities. cy Medical Technicians (EMTs) SPEMS also sponsors an annual and 21 Emergency Care Attenregional educational conference dants (ECAs), the first level of on emergency care which will be training prior to becoming held at Tech's Health Science Center on Oct. 26 this year.





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

The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year

and Z of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Developnent bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund. with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply bans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proeeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for ose in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration. The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water

corporations. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment 78711.

#### **PROPOSTION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.


