## Bulldogs Lose In Opener 20-6

Tahoka Bulldog fans must have thought they were looking at reruns last Friday night as the Bulldogs suffered from some of the same problems that have kept them from winning the last three years. They played well for awhile, but a few lapses proved

too much to overcome, as the visiting Stanton Buffaloes won the opening game 20-6. This week Tahoka will host Hale Center, a team which beat the Bulldogs 54-0 last year, but which may not be quite so strong this year. Hale Center lost some of their big linemen, but re-

tained some big, fast backs led by Mitch McBeth. However, the Owls lost their opener last week with Cooper. Stanton drove for a touchdown after taking the opening kickoff, with Timmy Rose going around left end 18 yards to score with almost half the quarter gone. A kick was wide, and it was 6-0 at 6:57. Stanton had another drive going in the first, but Randy Taylor grabbed a fumble by the Buffs at the Tahoka 32, and then the Dogs put on a drive that carried to the Stanton 32 before returning the fumble favor. But a few minutes later, QB Trey Teaff hit running back Todd Nance in the left flat with a pass and Nance escaped down the sideline 54 yards for a Tahoka TD. A running try for points failed, and it was 6-6 at 8:01 in the second period.

Stanton drove deep into Tahoka turf late in the half, aided by an unnecessary roughness call out of bounds that was very close, giving Stanton a first at the Tahoka 16. Again, things looked all too familiar as the Bulldogs played tough in stopping Stanton for three downs, but on fourth, with just 41 seconds left in the half, Buff QB Kevin Glaspie passed to Derek Sorley for the touchdown. The same combination worked for two points and it was 14-6 at halftime.

In the third, after Tahoka lost the ball on downs at midfield, Glaspie passed 50 yards to End Mark Gonzales for another touchdown. The try for point kick was blocked. The fourth period was scoreless, although Tahoka made a couple of fair stabs at getting into the end zone. On one occasion, with fourth down and just inches for a first, Tahoka lost the ball by trying an end sweep. There were lots of penalties in the game--26 in all, 13 for each team. FB Johnny Morin was Tahoka's

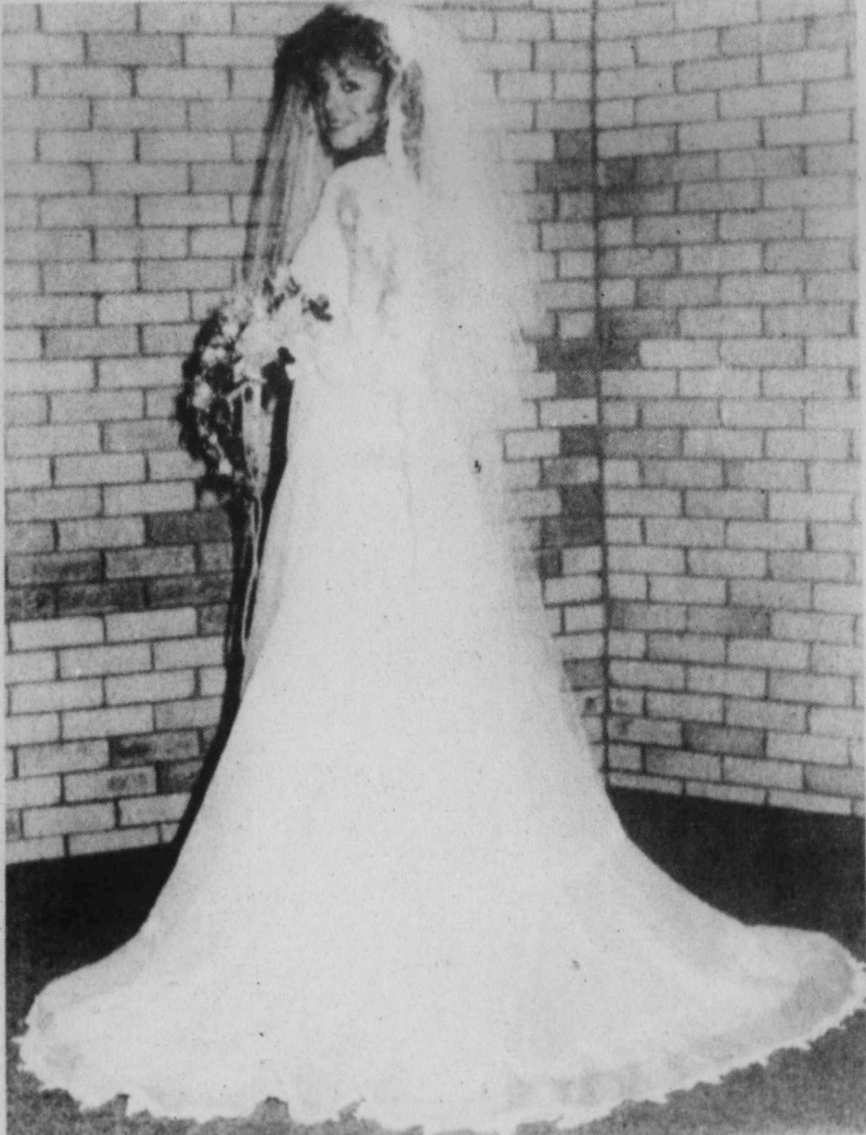

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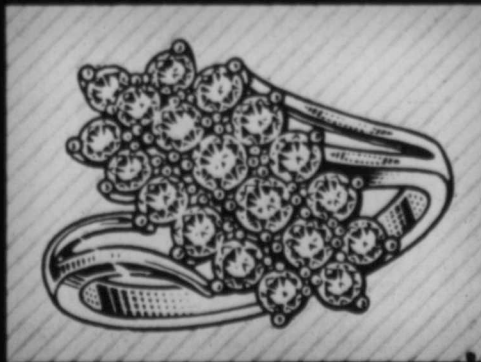

During the half-day seminars, Employment Commission representatives will discuss the laws and procedures concerning unemployment compensation taxes, ideas for immediate cost reduction, the appeals process and fraud control.

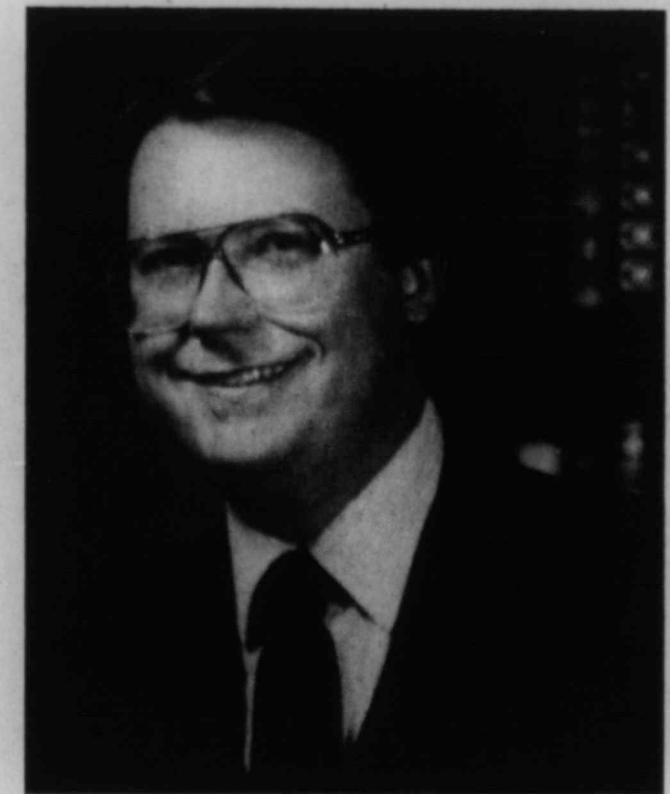

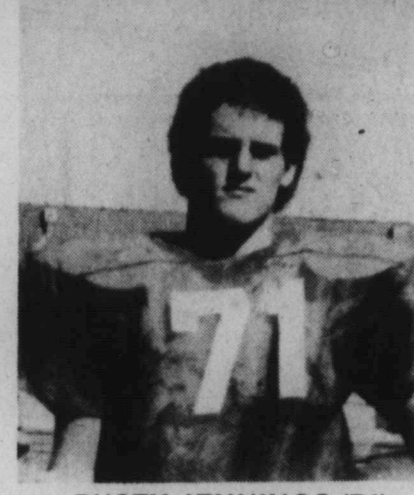

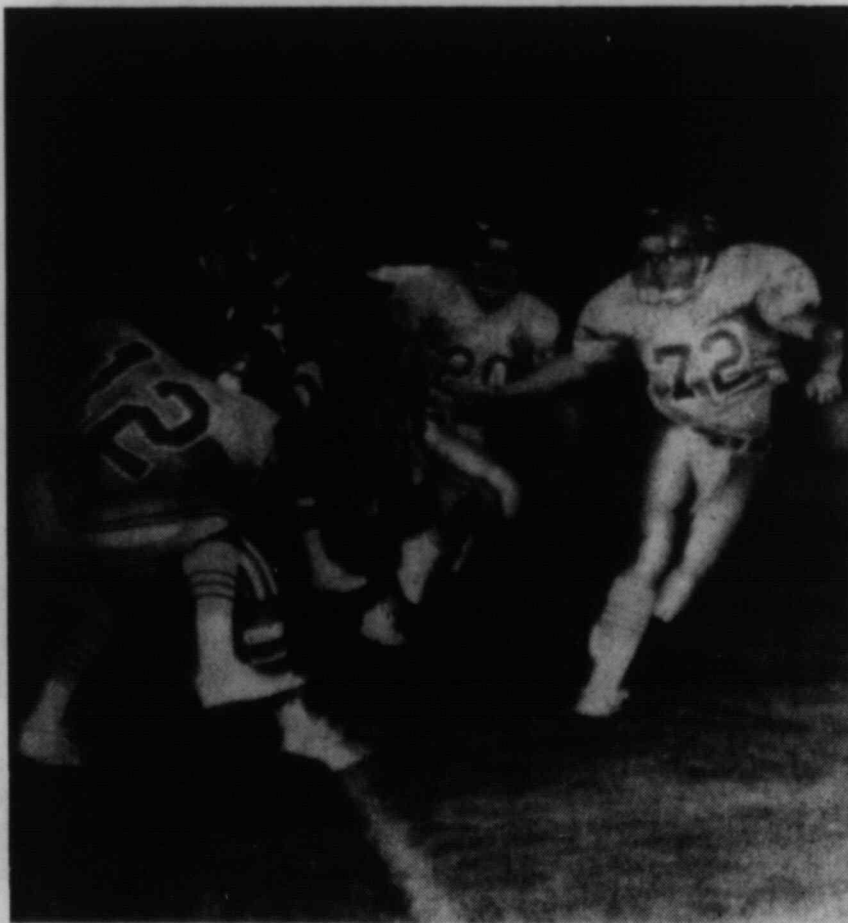

Upon graduation from the academies, the cadets and midshipmen will serve as officers in the service for a minimum of five years.

vances, farming and ranching is still one of the most hazardous occupations in the nation. That's why the week of Sept. 15-21 has been set aside to call special attention to farm and ranch safety, says Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In a proclamation designating Sept. 15-21 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas, Gov. Mark White noted: "While new technology has brought advances in safety, the quantity and severity of remaining risks require daily attention to avoid mishap. Incidents of accidental death, injury and job-related illness are still tragically numerous on farms and ranches and in the homes and on the roads of rural Texas. But with increased safety education and continued improvement in product design, there is hope that further progress in preventing accidents can be made."

The Extension Service along with the Texas Safety Assn., Texas Farm Bureau, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas are encouraging all who farm and ranch and live in rural areas to make a special effort to practice safety in their day-to-day operations.

Among safety and health measures to reduce losses from serious accidents and illness are the following:

- \*Manage to prevent accidents. Make safety an integral part of every farming operation. Train workers. Buy quality products and take care of them as directed by manufacturers.

- \*Strive for good health to accomplish as much as possible with resources available. Eat properly. Deal with harmful life stresses, seeking professional help if needed. Consult a doctor if you develop symptoms such as unexplained fatigue or pain, shortness of breath, or one of cancer's seven danger signals.

- \*Invest in personal protective equipment, ROPS cabs for tractors and other safeguards to help you avoid injuries and illnesses that could cost many times that investment.

- \*Keep informed about safety and health. Note newspaper and magazine articles. Acquire publications available from Extension, health and safety

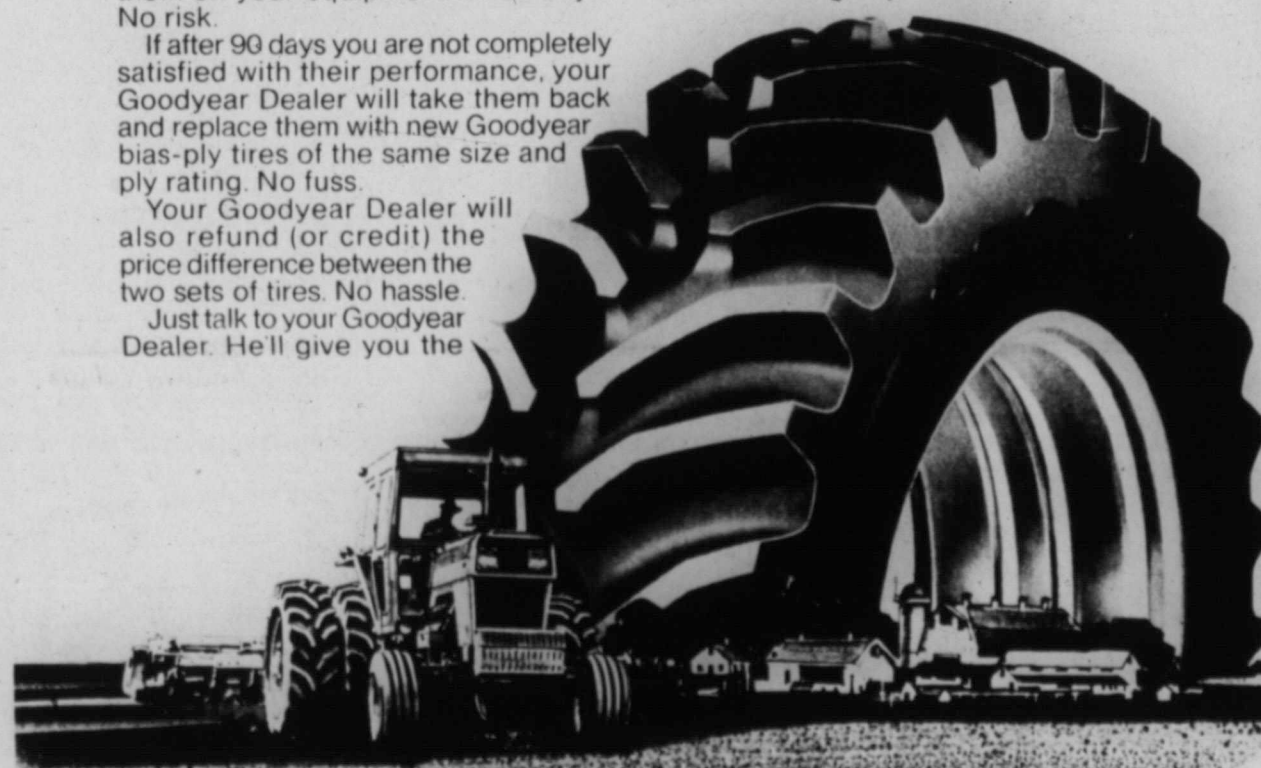

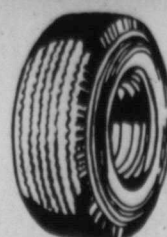

## Devotional

By Rev. Hazel House

### SCRIPTURE:

Colossians 1:1-20; John 15:1-17

"I am the true vine, and my father is the vinedresser." (Somebody gave a title for this entire month saying: "Can we build a world without walls?") And in Deuteronomy 30:9-14 it is written in the Palestine covenant that "The word of God is not so 'totally other' that it cannot be understood and obeyed. It is not so far removed from where one is that it cannot be practiced." This Love relationship between God and man, and between man and man.

This is one of the greatest scriptures in the Gospels. It is so broad and deep. Not a measurable something that we can hold in our hands and say "This is the length and breadth and the size of it; not a shallow pond of water around which we can stroll, but there are the surging of eternity in it. We need for better understanding to pause almost after every verse. We want to pause to think about the meaning for each and all of us.

Jesus said, "I am the true vine." Now the true vine means the genuine vine (which corresponds to the name Israel — which was once a noble vine) but at the time of Jesus, Israel had become degenerate, so Jesus says, "I am the true vine..." and "My Father is the vinedresser."

He removes the dead and unfruitful branches, and prunes the rest to make them more fruitful. Now here the disciples do not need pruning treatment because the teachings of Jesus which they have believed and accepted which is the Spirit and the life which has made them clean. "Apart from me you can do nothing," Jesus said and it is on this basis of His recognition of our uselessness apart from Him that Christ enters into His covenant with us — giving us His great promises and making His claim upon us.

So there need be no fear that when He comes to us He may draw back, turn away from us, saying that although His grace is all-sufficient,



He had not realized that anyone could be so useless as we are. Since He is knowing all there is to know (even then) Jesus is not daunted in the least, but is sure that He can manage for us. He knew that without Him we could do nothing.

He says, "I am the vine; you are the branches" and the vine does, and must do, everything for the branches in order to keep the branches alive (this speaks of Sanctification). It is the vine that causes the branches to grow to become beautiful and be fruitful — new everyday. It is the vine that enables the branches to hold on and to get more nutrients and to put on more branches.

Apart from the vine, the branches are mere withering sticks, soon ready for the burning. But Christ Jesus, the True Vine, can make us, the branches, alive and ready to serve God and man — if we will let Him — just be willing to abide in Him.

Many things have happened in our world (God's world) because we thought the branch could bear fruit of itself. But it cannot and it never will. We are all full of plans and schemes for social betterment, and for human brotherhood, but many today see no need for Christ. And they try to push Him aside saying, "We are a new generation, we are a great breed of man. Faced by any problem and given a computer and a little time and we will ultimately solve the problem ourselves. Haven't we conquered space in this age? A Saviour — A Saviour from what? What do we need from Christ?"

## Emergency Medical Services Workers To Be Honored

The 15 counties of the South Plains will be honoring special citizens who volunteer their time and effort to saving others as celebrations begin for Emergency Medical Services Week, Sept. 29-Oct. 5.

Just eight years ago, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) began being organized across the South Plains to bring the advanced treatment methods pioneered in M\*A\*S\*H units to the civilian population. Community leaders

knew that life saving equipment, rapid communications, and skilled personnel could, in effect, take the emergency room to the site of injuries or accidents, and death rates from trauma were falling in cities where they operated.

To organize such services for scattered population centers, citizens established the South Plains Emergency Medical Services, Inc. (SPEMS) in 1977 to secure state and federal funding for the purchase of equipment and the training of personnel.

Since that time, 30 emergency services, largely staffed by volunteers, have been trained and equipped to serve the counties surrounding Lubbock.

Today, all of the counties on the South Plains have access to a Basic Life Support system and eight of these have Advanced Life Support capabilities.

Working together with regional EMS services and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, SPEMS has trained more than 1,400 persons in life-saving skills, has published regional

treatment protocols, oversees operation of the EMS radio network, and provides workshops for individual communities. SPEMS also sponsors an annual regional educational conference on emergency care which will be held at Tech's Health Science Center on Oct. 26 this year.

The 21 member Executive Board, comprised of representation from each county, is currently developing a uniform record keeping and evaluation program which will develop the statistical

data base needed for future planning and grant applications.

Lynn County has 29 Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and 21 Emergency Care Attendants (ECAs), the first level of training prior to becoming EMTs.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 5, 1985

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater.

Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest on such bonds would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

## Texas Dealers Help Motorists Comply With Seat Belt Law

Many Texas franchised new car and truck dealers will be offering repair and replacement of safety belts at cost during September and October and most can supply oversize motorists with belt extensions at no cost.

"Texas will be the second largest state to have a mandatory safety belt law in effect," said Gene Fondren, president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Assn. "It is important that we make it as easy as possible for Texans to comply with the law, so we have joined with the manufacturers in offering this program."

Fondren urged car and truck owners to check the condition of their belts. Some motorists suspect that their belts do not work because they are able to move freely.

"That is not necessarily true," Fondren said. "The safety belts in many of the newer models operate on a pendulum system. They are car sensitive, which means the belts lock when the car slows too quickly."

"But don't leave anything to chance," Fondren continued. "Look at the webbing. Test the lock. Check the retractors. If everything does not seem perfect, go by a dealership and have the safety belt checked."
