## GCOTTON TALKS

Some of the most discouraging statements made to date concerning the farm bill under development in Washington came September 18 from the Republican Helms of North Carolina, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Grow ers, Inc., Lubbock. Senator Helms, in what Johnson terms a misguided effort to bring potential program costs down to the
three-year $\$ 39$ billion budget target, is proposing a 20 percent across-the-board cut in farm income supports. Such a cut for cotton, Johnson points out, would drop this year's 81 -cent target price to 64.8 cents. "We are losing cotton producers and support indus-
tries at an alarming rate now" tries at an alarming rate now," Johnson says, "and a sudden drop of 20 percent in farm nothing short of disastrous."
The Senate Agriculture Comm months working on a new farm bill to replace the law that expires September 30 this year. Most of the details were tentatively agreed upon before the August recess, but the measure as written exceeded by about $\$ 9$ billion the congressional farm spending guidelines made known just before adjournment.
Also on Helms list for cuts is a reduction in the
proportion of each farm's production that would be eligible for income supports. Instead of paying a farmer based on all production, payments would be made only on the part deemed needed for domestic and

> SOFT WATER CAN SAVE ENERGY--Most people know that hard water requires use of hat hard water requires use of more detergent or soap to get
clothes and dishes clean. But few people are aware that hard water can also result in wasted energy and higher water heating bills, says Texas A\&M University
Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring. Research conducted at New Mexico State University has shown that both gas and electric
water heaters use more BTUs than those operated on softened water. The gas heaters operated on hard water in the study used
29.57 percent more BTU 29.57 percent more BTUs than
those operated on softened those operated on softened
water, reports the specialist. Likewise, the electric heaters operated on hard water used EXTEND THE LIFE OF YOUR HOT WATER HEATER.-. Texans living in hard water areas can prevent a buildup of sedi-
ment and scale in their hot water ment and scale in their hot water
heaters either by installing a water softner or by draining enough water out of the heater each six months or so to remove sediment. "People who live in
areas with extremely hard water and high sulfer content may find it advisable to drain the water heater as often as every other month,", says Dr. Susan Quiring,
