A POSTAL UNION publication I was reading the other day was pointing out that some of the big corporations' top executives are, in the union paper's opinion, grossly overpaid. Two carbon heaters bathe sore back muscles in penetrating warmth...As you lie back on the table, eight rollers on two axles move slowly up and down your spine. The tensions of the day disappear in a sigh of pleasure."

## Abernathy Spoils Homecoming, 28-6

A large homecoming crowd at Kelley Field last Friday night was disappointed as the visiting Abernathy Antelopes refused to be nice to the Tahoka Bulldogs and won the game 28-6.

The loss was Tahoka's third in four games this season. This week the Dogs go to Roscoe, a Class A team, but one which has been ranked among the state's top teams in that classification.

The first quarter of Friday's game was scoreless, although Tahoka put on one drive which featured runs of 11 and 9 yards by Johnny Morin and a 19-yard pass from QB Randy Taylor to End Marty Hammonds. The drive died just barely into Antelope territory, however, and at the end of the quarter, Abernathy connected on a 50-yard pass play which carried inside the Tahoka 20.

The Antelopes then scored at 10:33 of the second as Billy Cooper ran 21 yards. A kick was no good and it was 6-0. On the kickoff following the TD, Tahoka players stood around and watched the ball bounce until Abernathy recovered it on the Bulldog 21, with some of the Tahoka players apparently not aware that a kickoff, unlike a punt, can be recovered by the kicking team whether touched or not.

Abernathy immediately threw a 21-yard scoring pass, making it two TDs in a space of 8 seconds on the clock, and after missing the point, leading 12-0 at 10:25.

Tahoka had a chance to score late in the second quarter after Morin ran 17 and then 8 yards to the Antelope 15. But Tahoka tried a reverse and laid the ball on the ground for Abernathy to recover at the 20.

Then just before halftime, Rowdy Powell of Abernathy ran 18 yards for a third TD for the visitors, a pass for points was no good, and it was 18-0 at halftime.

The third period was scoreless, but near the end of the period, Abernathy began running off big chunks of yardage through the Bulldog defense, carrying to the Tahoka 8, and on the first play of the fourth, End Dan Evans caught an 8-yard scoring pass. Bill DuBose kicked the point to make it 25-0.

Another Abernathy drive ended as Morin intercepted a pass at

the Tahoka 33. A few plays later, Morin broke loose for 50 yards and Tahoka was on the scoreboard. A running try for points failed and it was 25-6 with 8:14 left.

Abernathy tried field goals three times and finally made one late in the game, 37 yards by DuBose, to make it 28-6.

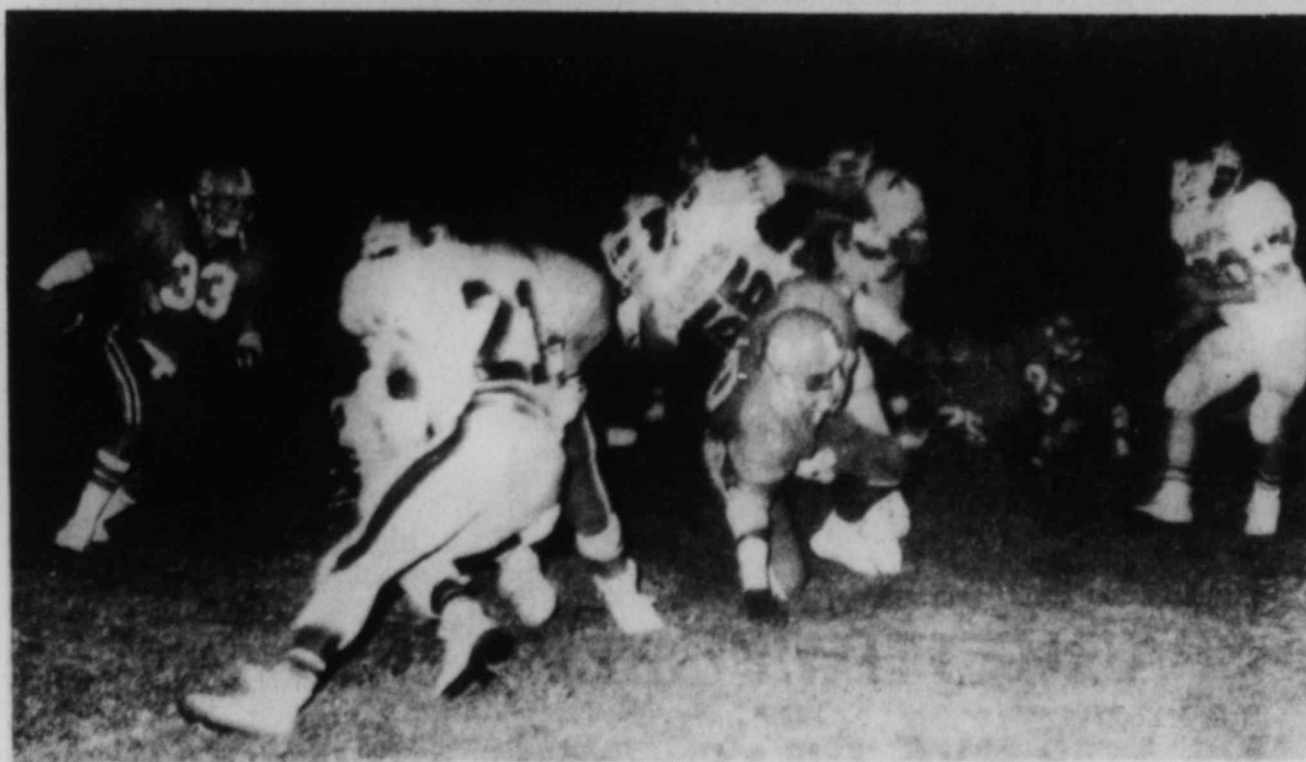
Morin gained 120 yards in 21 carries, punted six times for an average 46 yards, including one 58-yarder against the wind, and intercepted one pass. Todd

Nance gained 36 yards in 16 carries.

On defense, Andrew Chapa and Taylor did good work.

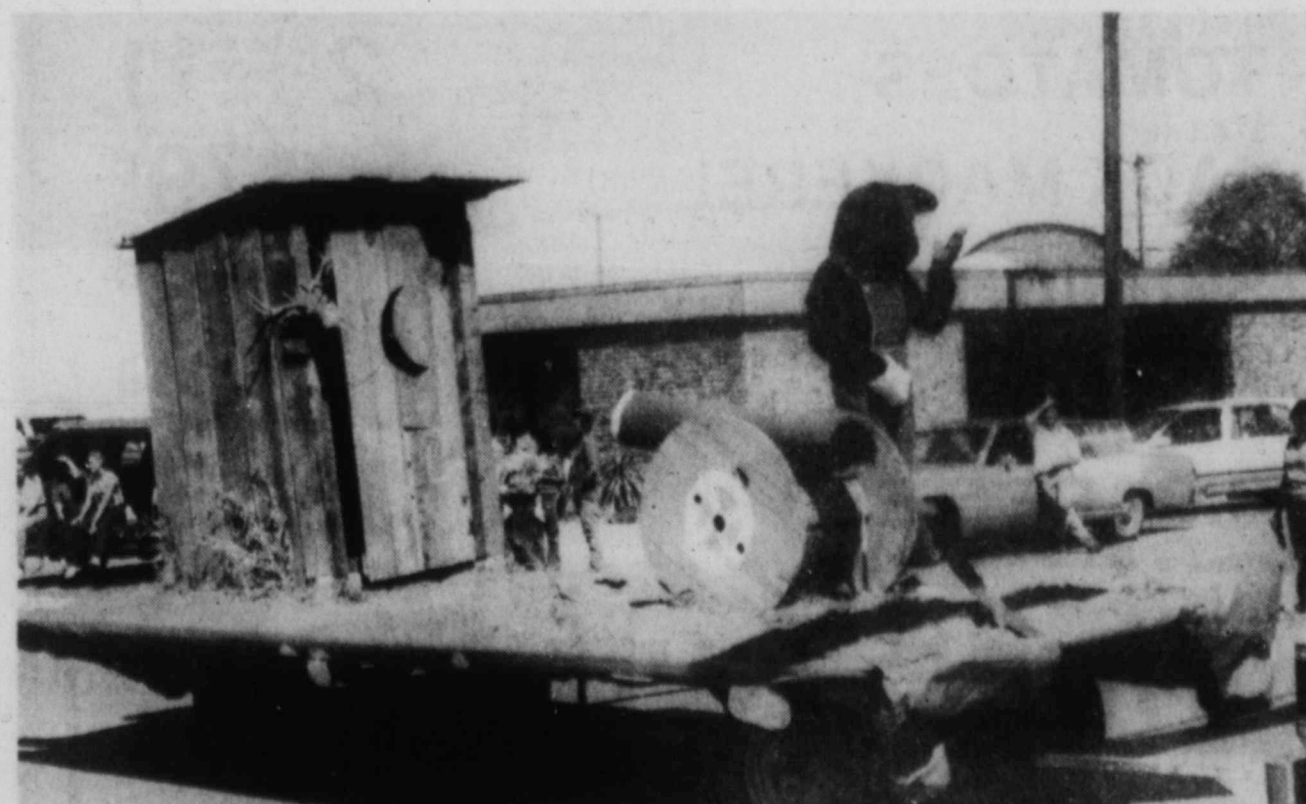

Luke 12:1-10

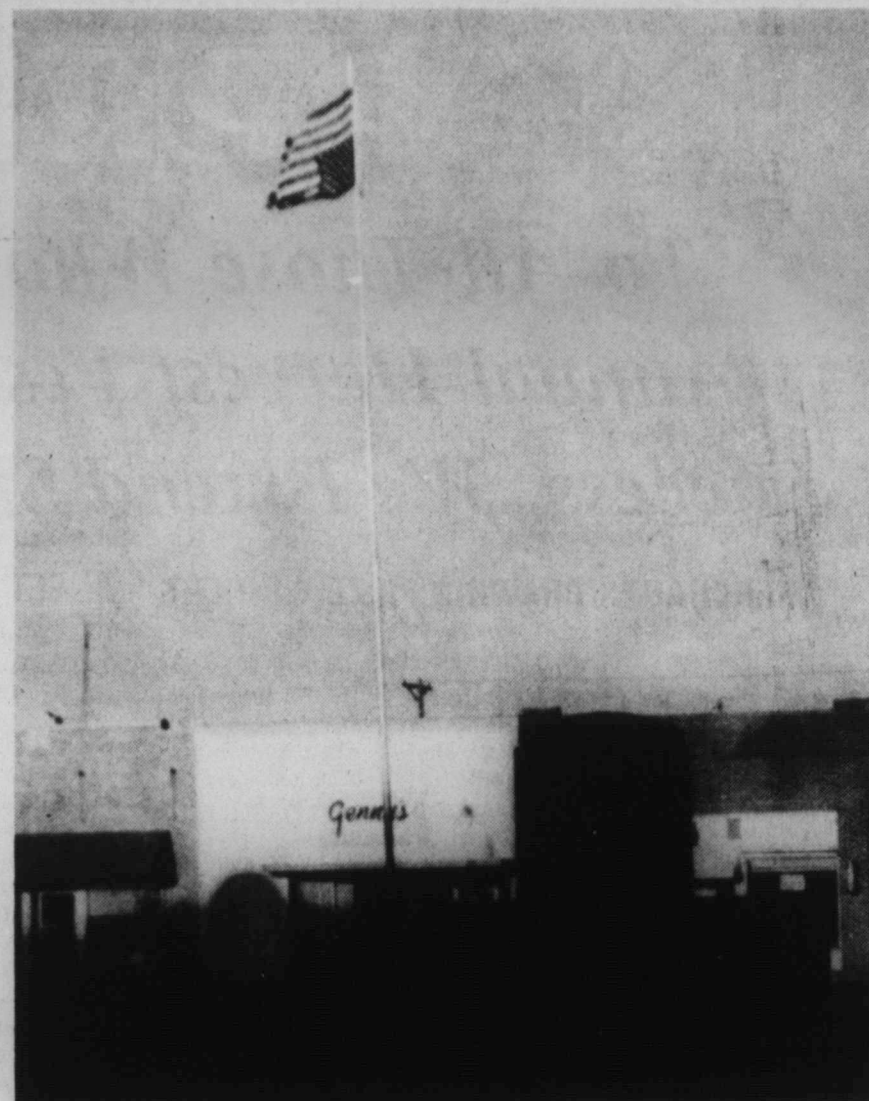

## Electrical Safety Vital To Farmers

Harvest season is a good time for farmers to remind their families and workers about the dangers of carelessness around electricity, advises Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The National Safety Council reports 82 persons died in electricity-related accidents on America's farms in 1982, the latest year for which figures are available, said Seth Thomason, SPS Manager of Agricultural and Industrial Power. There were 979 electrocution deaths in the nation that year, he said.

Deaths and serious injury have occurred when farm machinery, tools or irrigation pipe touches an overhead line, Thomason said.

"A big problem is hunters who lift irrigation pipe to chase out rabbits," he said.

Farm workers should be extremely careful when operating tractors, combines, cotton module builders and other equipment with parts that extend high enough to touch overhead power lines, Thomason said.

Fallen or dangling power lines damaged by a storm or accident pose a special danger, Thomason said. "Those lines can look harmless but be deadly," he said. SPS offices have electrical safety booklets, posters and other items available free to the public, Thomason said. Films and presentations are offered free to schools, civic clubs, employers and other groups, he said.

Many area farmers through the years have been introduced to electrical safety at SPS-sponsored 4-H and FFA camps.

SPS primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million people in a 52,000 square mile service area in southeastern and eastern New Mexico, the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, the

Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

## EMS Week Set Sept. 29-Oct. 5

Emergency Medical Service (EMS) Week of Sept. 29-Oct. 5, as proclaimed by Mayor Jim Solomon recognizes the dedicated service of ambulance attendants, physicians and nurses involved in emergency care of sick and injured, as well as other medical personnel. Lynn County is fortunate to have two separate EMS organizations, one in Tahoka and one in O'Donnell, with four ambulances staffed by the two organizations on a volunteer basis.

The ambulance attendants take time off from their busy schedule to make calls when needed. The public does not realize how important these two EMS organizations are until there is an emergency.

Two classifications qualify the attendants to handle emergency calls, Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) or Emergency Care Attendants (ECA). There are 19 EMT and eight ECA qualified and certified by the Texas Department of Health. EMT personnel receive approximately 140 hours of schooling and training and ECA personnel 40 hours.
