Police recovered a stolen car from Houston on Sept. 23 and Houston officials notified the owner of this matter.



Electrical Safety Vital To Farmers


Harvest season is a good time for farmers to remind their families and workers about the dangers of carelessness around electricity, advises Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The National Safety Council reports 82 persons died in electricity-related accidents on America's farms in 1982, the latest year for which figures are available, said Seth Thomason, SPS Manager of Agricultural and Industrial Power. There were 979 electrocution deaths in the nation that year, he said.

Deaths and serious injury have occured when farm machinery, tools or irrigation pipe touches an overhead line, Thomason said.

"A big problem is hunters who lift irrigation pipe to chase out rabbits," he said.

Farm workers should be extremely careful when operating tractors, combines, cotton module builders and other equipment with parts that extend high enough to touch overhead power lines, Thomason said.

Fallen or dangling power lines damaged by a storm or accident pose a special danger, Thomason said. "Those lines can look

harmles but be deadly," he said. SPS offices have electrical safety booklets, posters and other items available free to the public, Thomason said. Films and presentations are offered free to schools, civic clubs, employers and other groups, he said.

Many area farmers through the years have been introduced to electrical safety at SPS-sponsored

4-H and FFA camps. SPS primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million people in a 52,000 square mile service area in southeastern and eastern New Mexico, the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, the

Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

EMS Week Set Sept. 29-Oct. 5

Emergency Medical Service (EMS) Week of Sept. 29-Oct. 5, as proclaimed by Mayor Jim Solomon recognizes the dedicated service of ambulance attendants, physicians and nurses involved in emergency care of sick and injured, as well as other medical personnel. Lynn County is fortunate to have two separate EMS organizations, one in Tahoka and one in O'Donnell, with four ambulances staffed by the two organizations on a volunteer

The ambulance attendants take time off from their busy schedule to make calls when needed. The public does not realize how important these two EMS organizations are until there is an emergency.

Two classifications qualify the attendants to handle emergency calls, Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) or Emergency Care Attendants (ECA). There are 19 EMT and eight ECA qualified and certified by the Texas Department of Health, EMT personnel receive approximately 140 hours of schooling and training and ECA personnel
