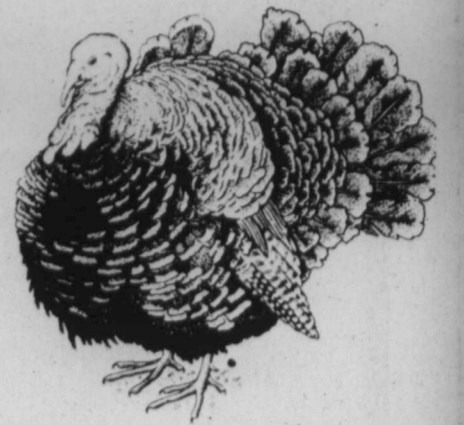

Body Scan Equipment Now Available At Hospital Here

Equipment for full body scanning and diagnosis of a variety of possible conditions in patients who formerly had to be sent to Lubbock or elsewhere for such treatment is now available at Lynn County Hospital, thanks to the use of a mobile unit which can be brought to the hospital

whenever it is needed. The equipment, housed in a large transport truck and operated by Lubbock Diagnostic Services, Inc. of Lubbock, was brought to Tahoka last week for testing a patient of Dr. Lonnie Vickers. Dr. Vickers and John Brooks, Lynn County Hospital

administrator, explained that the equipment is available as needed and is brought to the hospital grounds when the attending physician determines that need.

Brooks said that in addition to the computerized tomography (CT scanning) equipment utilized here last week, nuclear scanning equipment, also is available from the same company and ultrasound equipment from another source.

This means these diagnostic tools now are available here rather than having the patient admitted to a Lubbock facility; it is more accessible and convenient to Lynn County residents.

The sophisticated diagnostic equipment, a Technicare 2060P CT scanner housed in a transport 8 feet wide and 49 feet long, uses narrow x-ray beams to exploit the differences in x-ray absorption between different kinds of intracranial tissues. It may be used to seek out brain tumors or other brain damage, but can also reveal many other body conditions.

4th Annual Moonlight Sale Scheduled Friday, Dec. 6

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS--Safety should be part and parcel of all holiday activities, emphasizes a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. General holiday safety tips should include the following: keep walks and steps clear of ice and objects, turn on outdoor lights at night to light walkways for guests, use special caution when driving, clear indoor areas of tripping hazards and put up things that could injure small children, keep Christmas trees away from heat sources and curtains, check lightstrings for broken sockets and frayed wires, and make sure the kitchen area, always a busy place during the holidays, is free of dangling appliance cords and protruding pot handles and that sharp knives are put up.

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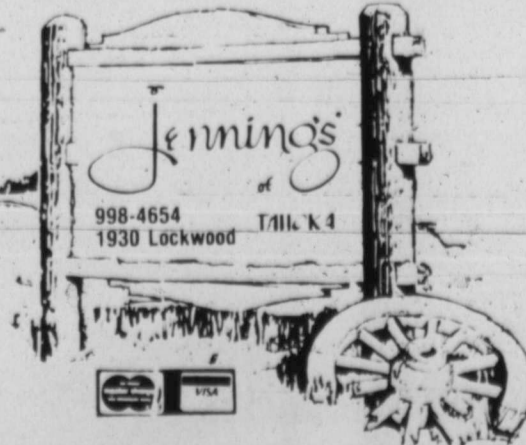

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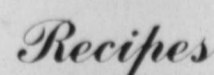
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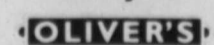
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Obituaries

GET A TEXAS-GROWN CHRISTMAS TREE—For a real Texas Christmas this year, start by selecting a genuine Texas-grown Christmas tree, suggests a forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Texas-grown Christmas trees, most of them Virginia Pines, are fresher, more fragrant and usually less expensive than those shipped in from other states. Most are cut around Thanksgiving while those shipped in from northern states are cut in October. Nearly 300,000 Texas-grown trees can be found in retail lots in the larger cities, and 'choose-and-cut' operations are popular in many eastern counties where most of the trees are grown.

Grazing Management For Winter Pastures

"Grazing management" for winter pastures can be as simple as opening a gate.

Since cold weather will limit growth of winter pastures, they must be used efficiently. This means some type of grazing management to stretch pastures for more animals.

Which system is used dictates the degree of management required.

A simple rotation grazing system with two or more pastures is easy to implement. All animals are put on one pasture while the other pastures grow more forage. When the first pasture has

been fairly well grazed, the herd is moved to a second pasture for grazing, and so on. With total rest, grazed pastures should produce some regrowth for later grazing.

For a more intensive grazing management system, a type of limited grazing may be a good choice. Dry cows can be grazed for two to four hours every other day on winter pastures. Some other forage like hay would be necessary while animals are off pasture. In effect, winter pasture would be the protein supplement for these animals.

Cows with calves, steers or growing heifers should be allowed to graze high quality winter pasture every day, for about two hours.

With such a system, weight gains will not be great, but should occur. The important feature is that grazing days per acre can be increased by limited grazing.

Livestock will become trained

to the type of grazing management selected. Under rotation grazing, livestock will be more than willing to change pastures once the pasture they are on is grazed down.

Under any form of limited grazing, livestock become trained in about two weeks. After being herded off pasture regularly for several weeks, they become trained and start living on their own accord. Thus, actual work involved becomes minimal.

Between rotation grazing and several variations of limited grazing, some type of grazing management can be adopted to anyone's use. It may stretch winter pastures enough to last the season.

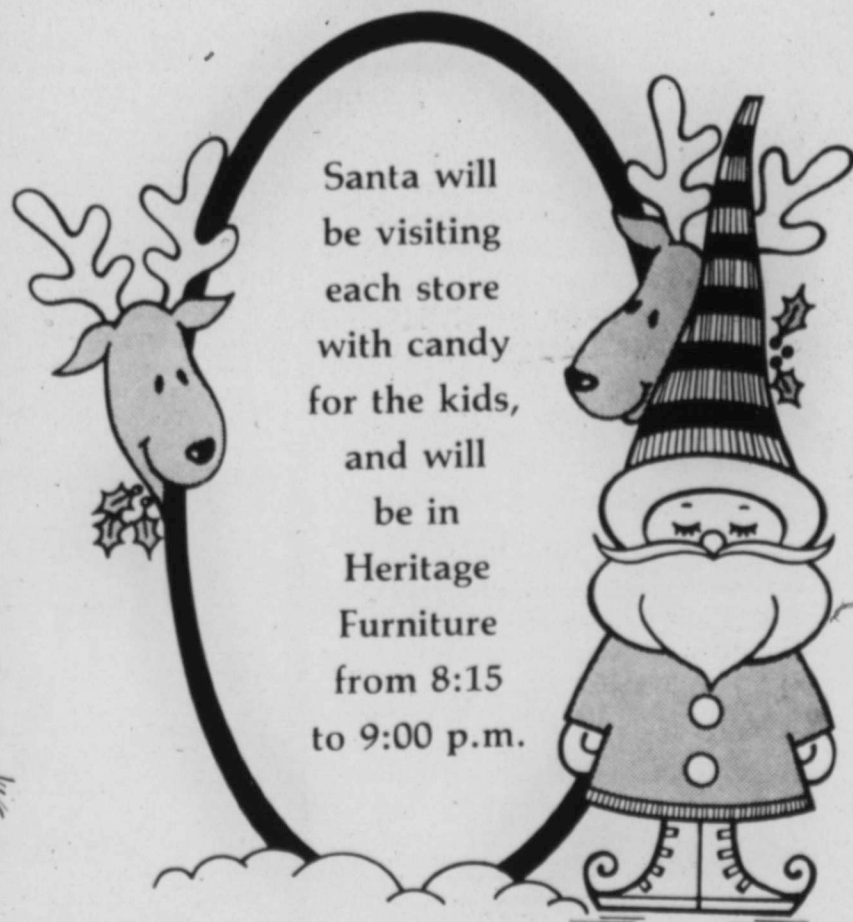

Killing Freeze Aids Cotton Harvesting

The mid-week, blustery, cold front dropped temperatures into the high teens and twenties across the Texas High Plains. The front was dry and lowered humidity, said Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Much of the cotton harvest ed before the killing freeze had been sprayed with harvest-aid chemicals. Many growers had waited until freezing temperatures killed plants naturally before beginning their harvest. About 10 days is required to cure plants after such a freeze, Bennett continued. With this in mind, harvesting should accelerate quickly by Thanksgiving weekend.

Meanwhile, USDA's Lubbock facility classed 105,000 samples during the week ended Thursday, Nov. 21. This brought the season's total to 237,000 and compares with 234,000 classed by the same date last year.

The week's predominant grades were grade 42 at 50 percent and grade 52 at 35 percent. About 20 percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

Predominant staples were staple 32 at 29 percent followed by staple 31 at 28 percent and staple 33 was 23 percent. The average was 32.1 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Micronaire 35-49 was 71 percent, 33-34 was 14 percent and 30-32 was 11 percent for an average of 36.

HVI breaking strength averaged 24.6 grams per tex at Lubbock during the week ended Thursday.

Growers sold some 1984 crop

loan equities at \$3 to \$10 per bale, mostly \$3 to \$5. Sales of 1985 crop increased. Mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31 and 32, mikes 30 and higher brought growers 100 to 200 points over loan.

Gins paid growers \$55 to \$80 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$55 to \$65. The average was \$60.

U.S. textile mills operated five to six day schedules during recent weeks with some plants on seven days. This reflects the continuing upturn in textile business. Americans will be using more cotton in 1985-86 as cotton's share of the apparel market rises from 39 percent last year to 42 percent this year, according to the "Cotton and Wool Outlook."

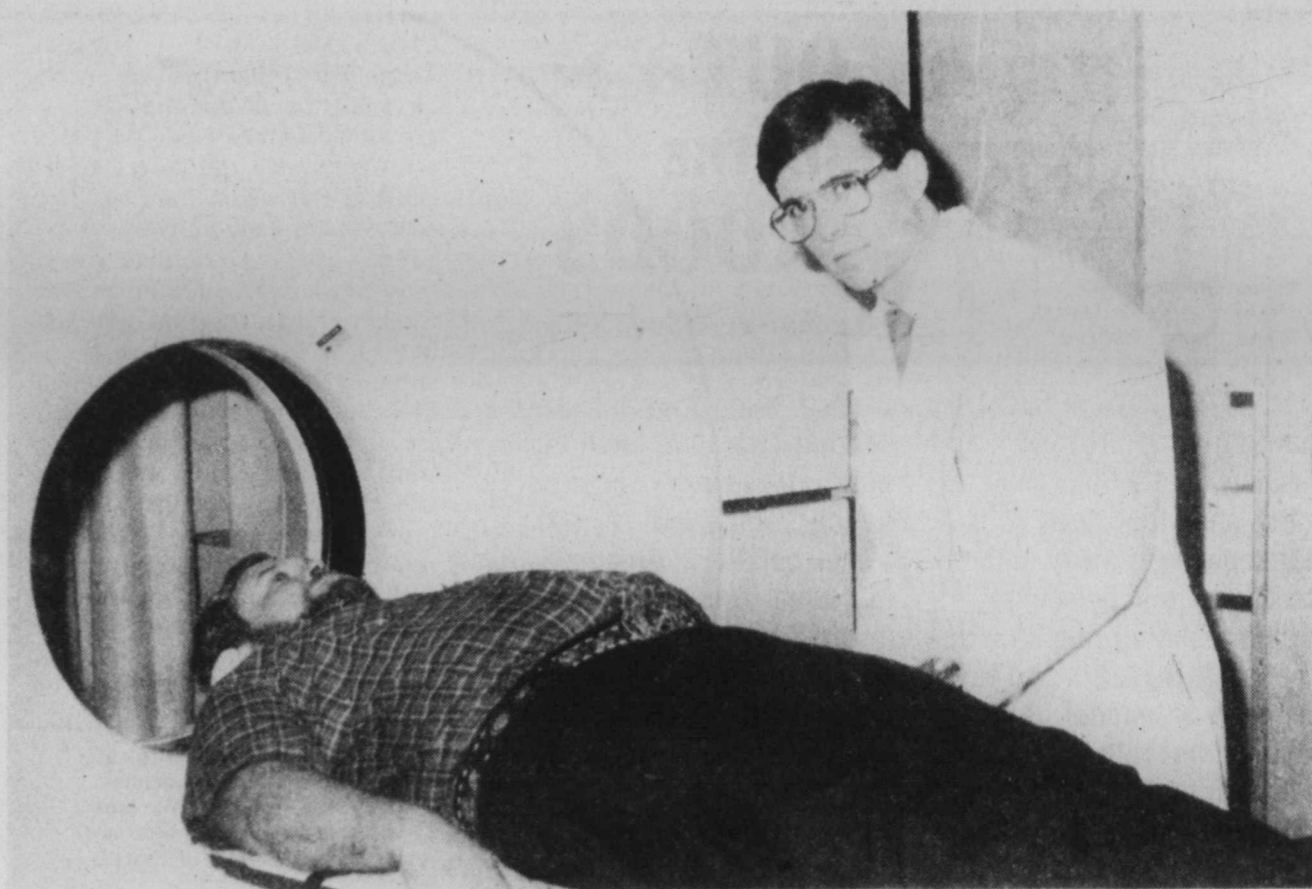
Red Cross Fund Drive Planned

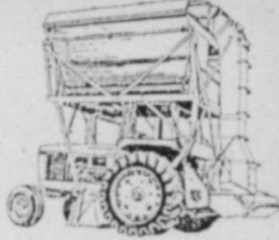


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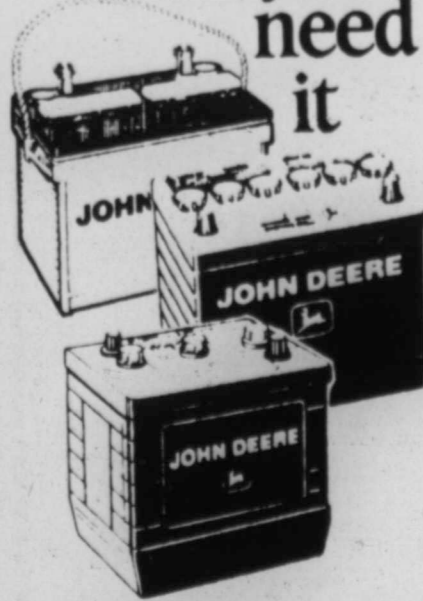


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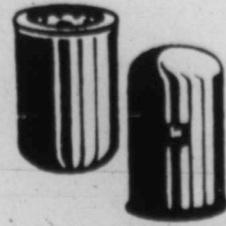
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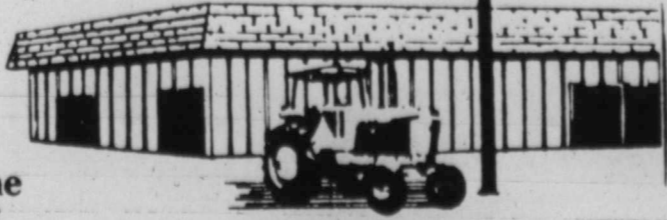
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FmHA Issues Loan Assistance Regulations

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has issued new regulations which spell out, in detail, the various loan servicing alternatives which may be available to farmers who are having economic difficulty, according to Texas FmHA state director J. Lynn Futch.

"All borrowers are expected to pay back their loans according to a planned repayment schedule," Futch said. "However, when that is impossible, we want borrowers to be aware of what kind of assistance may be available and under what conditions."

The servicing alternatives available to eligible borrowers include a deferral of a portion of payments for five years, reamortizing payments over a longer period of time, restructuring the debt, or subordinating FmHA's lien position on security to another lender.

The regulations spell out how FmHA determines eligibility for various loan servicing alternatives and under what circumstances FmHA would propose to take steps to resolve delinquency or other problems.

Farm Credit Banks Of Texas Remain Strong

Officials of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas remain confident of the Texas District's ability to withstand the adverse economic

trends, even though Congress wrestles with a proposal for federal support for the Farm Credit System.

James A. Rogers, president of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas, reports that adverse national publicity has brought about some borrower loss of confidence even in the Texas District, but both loan volume and number of borrowers have remained relatively stable.

Rogers says that the Federal Land Bank of Texas countered the national trend by increasing loan volume from \$2.63 billion at the end of the third quarter in 1984 to \$2.75 billion on Sept. 30 of this year. Reviews of 32 Texas Federal Land Bank Association showed acceptable business remained at 95.7 percent, 8.1 percent above the national average.


