
## **Community Christmas** Tree

(In 1978, the writer of the Woodwork had his first experience in roofing a house with composition shingles, and wrote the following column in the Slaton Slatonite. He didn't enjoy

this really isn't a bad system. Many persons are anxious to help, some are wanting to show off how much smarter they are than you, and a few just want to butt in. But MY WIFE and I were sitting overall, most of us can learn from the guy passing down the street. Especially if you don't know much to start with. The first thing I did was to consult a professional, a Lubbock building construction foreman who is a friend of mine. (Or was, until he told me how to get the shingles up on the roof.) After telling me how to do the roofing itself, he answered my question of how to get the shingles up onto the roof. "You just put the bundle up on your shoulder and carry it up the ladder. But be careful you don't break the shingles. I did one bundle that way. and then I was about ready for surgery (hernia, broken collar bone). Then I sat down and tried to figure a better way to get those 80-pound bundles up on top. Hiring a helicopter to fly over and deposit them gently on the rooftop was out, I decided. Too much added expense, plus they might drop one from about 50 feet up through the roof. I don't know Harvey Martin or the Incredible Hulk well enough to ask either one of them to do it, so, I finally decided to get another ladder, place the two side by side and push them up, getting my wife to push one end of each bundle. I knew it was a terrible thing to ask a wife to do, but it's better than having her to live by herself for the Some folks told us later they break, the bundles down and carry half of them up there. but that takes a long time, and if you did it the easy way, one from different persons over the shingle at a time, it would take about 11 weeks to do the job. # Wagon Train Members To Use Showers At Tahoka School

Participants in the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train due in Tahoka next May 8 will be allowed to use shower facilities at Tahoka High School, and will be proivided transportation to and from the campsite, school board members voted this week.

In the regular December meeting held Tuesday night, the board agreed to the request by members of the Tahoka Wagon Train committee, including Nadine Dunlap, Dean Bartley and Leah Taylor to allow use of the shower facilities and also to allow students to view the wagon train entrance into town. It was voted to declare May 8 as wagon train day at the school and encourage students and faculty to take part in events as recommended by Gov. Mark White.

Business manager Loretta Tekell reported a balance in all funds on Nov. 30 of \$1,381,382. She also reported that current tax collections for the latest tax roll totaled \$353,666 and were 46.11 per cent complete.

Southwestern Public Service Co. (SPS) serviceman in Tahoka, will retire Dec. 31, 1985, after more 'than 42 years of service to the



### Southerst Misrofile **DPS Estimate 29 Holiday Deaths**

Texas Department of Public Safety officials have estimated that as many as 29 persons will die as a result of traffic accidents during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The DPS expects 12 fatalities during the 30-hour Christmas period and 17 deaths during the 54-hour New Year's period.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked motorists to maintain safe driving habits during the holidays to minimize the loss of life in vehicle crashes.

"We'd certainly like to see our fatality estimate prove to be too high," Adams said. "Unfortunately, there will be drivers who will ignore speed limits and attempt to operate vehicles after drinking. The best way to avoid becoming involved in an accident with a careless driver is to drive in a defensive manner. It also makes good sense to be sure everyone in the vehicle uses a safety belt."

Adams said he has authorized Highway Patrol captains to utilize troopers from other uniformed Traffic Law Enforcement services to augment the regular patrol.

"Additional troopers will be assigned where large volumes of traffic or additional accidents are likely," Adams said.

During the 102-hour Christmas period in 1984, vehicle accidents caused 43 traffic deaths in Texas. A total of 42 deaths were attributed to crashes occurring during the 102-hour New Year's period last year.







Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit

Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could-be a fire risk

If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).

Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.

Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.

Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.

Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.

Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.

When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.

Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.

Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

About 900 Americans a year require medical treatment from being careless with Christmas lights, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

In an effort to help prevent injuries in our area, Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) is conducting a Christmas-season safety campaign featuring its cartoon character, Sparky the safety. mouse.

Sparky's become real popular with kids," said Hermilo Martinez, SPS safety manager. "But the best thing is that adults pay attention to him, too."

Many shocks and burns around Christmas can be avoided by following some simple safety rules, Martinez said.

He said those safety tips include:

\*Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections or damaged plugs or sockets.

\*Check extension cords for wear or damage, and don't run them across walking areas.

\*If you buy an artificial green tree, make sure it has been tested flammability by for

Underwriter's Laboratory (UL). A small tag bearing the letters "UL" should be attached. Also," look for the UL tag that means Christmas lights and electric toys have been tested for safety.

\*Never string lights on a metallic tree.


\*Turn off Christmas lights before leaving home or going to bed. Along with being safer, you'll save energy.

The Christmas safety messages are part of SPS' year-round efforts to adivse the public about the dangers of carelessness around electricity, Martinez said.

He said electric-safety posters, films, publications and presentations are available free to farm and industry groups, schools, youth groups, civic clubs and anyone else interested.

DON'T LET CHILDREN BURN --Part 4--Children must practice fire escape and fire protection techniques if they are expected to react correctly in an emergency. One drill called "Man the Hoses" teaches some principles of fire fighting, says a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Have children practice putting out a small fire in a barbecue pit or trash burner using a bucket of water, hose or fire extinguisher. Warn children never to throw water on an electrical fire because of the shock hazard or on a grease fire because it may spatter, spreading the flames. Also teach children what to do if their clothing catches on fire. Rolling up in a blanket, rug or

**RECORD COTTON SUPPLIES--**Record supplies of cotton worldwide combined with week demand can mean only one thing to farmers--low prices. World cotton production is increasing faster than consumption, and therein lies the problem, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. U.S. exports are suffering because the continued strong dollar makes foreign cotton a better buy. Cotton prices should continue near the Commodity Credit Corp. loan level or loan redemption level. RAYING OFF CHRISTMAS **CREDIT CHARGES--"Without** a concerted effort to reduce credit use, consumers can easily find themselves still paying for big-ticket Christmas gifts the following December," cautions Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. There are two ways to reduce your credit card debt load, she says. You can charge less than you pay off each month, which will reduce your debt over time. Or you can simply stop using credit cards and make payments until the debt is eliminated. She recommends leaving credit cards locked up at home to curb impulse buying that can ruin your debt repayment plans. **EXERCISE FOR BETTER HOLI-**DAY WEIGHT CONTROL .... "Instead of dieting during the holidays, additional exercise may do more for your weight control program" says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt. Consume holiday foods in moderate amounts and increase your exercise to help burn the extra calories. Parking the car further from your office and taking the steps instead of the elevator will help counteract the effect of eating at the office party, she says. Briskly walking for 30-40 minutes a day, riding bicycles or shooting baskets with the kids, taking a hike while the turkey is in the oven or doing exercises during the half-time of the televised bowl games, are just a few of the ways you can work more exerp cise into your holidays, notes the specialist.
