## Contests Assured In Two Elections

Four persons have signed up for three seats available on city councils in both New Home and Tahoka, but school board candidates were still needed just to fill all the places in three of the county's four school districts.

In O'Donnell, with the deadline for signing up just hours away on Wednesday, terms of Mayor Truett Hodnett and councilmen Bill Klopton and Bobby Knight are scheduled to expire. All three had signed for re-election by Tuesday afternoon, but at that time no other persons had filed.

With a March 5 deadline for filing, all three O'Donnell school board members whose terms are up had filed for re-election by Tuesday. They are Larry L. Moore, Kenneth Eaker and Robert Bessire. No others had filed.

In Wilson, where March 5 was reported as the deadline for signing up for the school elections, no candidates had filed for any of the available positions.

Terms of school board members James Wuensche, Donald Klaus and Woody Follis are expiring. Terms of Lupe Arellano and Virginia Gatzki are scheduled to expire on the Wilson city commission, and no candidates had filed by Tuesday afternoon.

Terms of New Home School board members Leland Zant, Larry Durham and Charles Smith are to expire, but no candidates had filed by noon Tuesday. Deadline is March 5.

In New Home's city election, four persons, including two incumbents, have filed for three places available. Terms of John Edwards, Gayland James and Harold Nettles are expiring, and James and Nettles have filed for re-election. Also filing to get their names on the ballot were David Gandy and Roy Blevins.

Deadline for filing for Tahoka city election was Wednesday. As of Tuesday afternoon, four persons had filed for the three places to be voted on in the election April 5. Terms of Nick Summitt, Dr. Richard White and H.B. McCord are to expire. Filing for the ballot by Tuesday were Summitt, Danny Preston, Leonard Dunn and Dayton Parker.

All three incumbents whose terms are to expire on the Lynn County Hospital Board have filed for re-election and no others had filed by Tuesday. Deadline is March 10, however. Filing were Billy Tomlinson, Roger Doss and Dale Zant.

## Subscription Prices To Be Raised in April

Prices of annual subscriptions to the Lynn County News will be increased starting with renewals paid April 1 or thereafter, with the increases to be about 15 per cent over current rates.

Publisher Dalton Wood said postal rates for mailing the News were increased by more than 15 per cent Jan. 1; the Texas Press Assn. has figured the increases to range from 30.3 percent to 116 per cent, the latter figure for certain copies mailed outside the county were a newspaper is published.

Annual rates for the News starting April 1 will be \$11 in Lynn and adjoining counties, \$12 elsewhere in Texas and \$13.25 outside the state. Current rates, which have been in effect for several years, are \$9.50, \$10.50 and \$11.

The new rates include tax, Wood said, explaining that the \$11 charge for local subscribers, for example, actually is \$10.47 plus 53 cents tax.

A BUNCH OF Church of Christ folks down in Abilene are in the process of rewriting their hymn books. I read this in the paper the other day, wondering if they were trying to do what some Methodists are attempting, a really dumb project which I'll get to in a minute. Apparently the Church of Christ group is being much more sensible; they reportedly are just taking out a few older hymns and putting in some newer ones.

The Baptists rewrote their hymnal in 1975 and I suppose that most of their members like the present book just fine. But the Methodist Church has set up a committee (we Methodists are great on committees) to revise the hymnal, which I think was last done in about 1970 or so.

Of course, if you're not a Methodist, you could care less what they do over there, but get this: the reason the Methodists (up in New York or some such place, not around here) are wanting to rewrite their hymnal is to get rid of all the sexist references in some

hymns, and also to eliminate the "amens" at the end of all hymns except those the committee decides are prayer hymns.

They are talking about changing "God of Our Fathers" to "God of the Ages", dropping the words "whiter than snow" from "Have Thine Own Way" (ethnic, you know) and making "Good Christian Men Rejoice" into "Good Christian Friends Rejoice". "Faith of Our Fathers" stays as it is, but they want to put a footnote under it saying it's okay to substitute "mothers" or "ancestors" for "fathers."

And one character on the committee even objected to the words in America the Beautiful as being offensive to American Indians; the part about pilgrim feet beating a path for freedom across the wilderness.

We Methodists need to think about this situation and perhaps pray about it, as we have been taught: "Our Person, which art in Heaven..."

## Stolen Items Include Furniture, Saddle, Dog

Furniture items were reported stolen from a vacant farm house three miles southeast of New Moore between Friday and Monday. Owner E.H. Conrad said a dining table, couch, recliner and antique mahogany radio were missing.

The Tahoka Pioneer Museum Board of Directors met Monday, Feb. 17, at noon in the museum. A lengthy discussion on procedures in handling the large assortment of miscellaneous farm equipment items that have been given to the museum by Mrs. G.M. (Lady) Stewart ensued and a decision to restore or renovate just one of a kind of these large items was reached.

Maurice Huffaker requested that he be removed as farm equipment acquisitions chairman and Harold Green, president, appointed Dr. K.R. Durham to that position. Dr. Durham requested Winston Wharton and Truett Smith be part of his committee and also suggested that individuals "adopt" a particular piece of equipment to restore or renovate. responsible for general acquisitions and that all such items go through established acquisition procedures.

Participation in the Wagon Train Celebration was tabled until more information and details were available. Nadine Dunlap, chairperson of the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train Committee, will speak to the museum board in the near future regarding this event.

### Sales Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$131.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported to Bullock by Jan. 20, as well as quarterly returns for the last three months of 1985 and sales made by annual filers.

Tahoka's net payment this period—\$9,730.12; comparable payment prior year—\$10,661.62; 1986 payments to date—\$12,586.01.

O'Donnell's net payment this period—\$2,801.61; comparable payment prior year—\$2,598.69; 1986 payments to date—\$3,747.89.

Wilson's net payment this period—\$1,178.79; comparable payment prior year—\$1,080.29; 1986 payments to date—\$1,178.79.

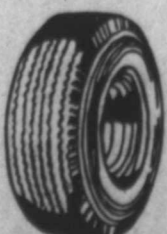

#### AID FOR DIABETICS

"Putting diabetics on a high-carbohydrate and low-fat diet may reduce their need for insulin, with possible elimination of insulin entirely," notes Dr. Julian Whitaker, director of Calif. Health Treatment Center. "Fat, the enemy of the diabetic, tends to block the natural action of insulin. Complex carbohydrates work in reverse — they boost the effectiveness of insulin." His diet for diabetics calls for only 6 to 12 percent of calories from fat — the less fat, perhaps the greater the hope for diabetic healing.

**POLL SHOWS 4-H MAKES A DIFFERENCE**—A national poll last fall of 1,761 individuals showed that 4-H does, indeed, have a positive effect on the lives of individuals who were involved in the program as youths. The poll included 710 former 4-H members and 743 members of other youth organizations, with the remainder being individuals not involved in organized groups during their youth. A key finding is that former 4-H members today are more active in community activities, particularly in leadership roles, than non-members, says a program evaluation specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Former 4-H'ers also gave higher rankings to personal development, knowledge, leadership and coping skills than did former members of other youth organizations.

## Lynn County History By Frank Hill, Soon To Be Published

"Grassroots Upside Down, A History of Lynn County, Texas" is on sale at a pre-publication price. Deadline for taking advantage of this price is June 1.

Set to go to the printers March 1, the time of publication is expected to be from three to six months, according to the co-author, Pat Hill Jacobs, daughter of the late Frank P. Hill who originally began the book.

Expected to be from 400 to 500 pages with about 300 pictures and illustrations, the publication will measure 8 1/2 by 11 inches.

The history of Lynn County is told in four parts. Part I will carry the reader through the reign of the Indian, the early ranchers, and to the days of the "nesters." Part II is the story of the county from 1903 to 1949, year by year, including the events and the people who made them happen.

Part III is devoted to the cities, schools, churches, banks, the agricultural scope to 1984 and other economic factors in its history, as well as the achievements of many of its people, and home spun stories of others. Part IV tells of the pioneers who came here in 1910 or before.

Most of the information prior to 1949 was gathered by Frank

Hill through 60 years of research, interviews with ranchers, pioneers, Indian traders, buffalo hunters and others, and from files of the Lynn County News, county records and other records. Every effort has been made to include the history of every family who lived in Lynn County 1910 and before, a list Hill had been compiling during the same 60 years. Those were the people who arrived on horseback and in covered wagons and made their homes in tents and half dugouts. Like the writers, the reader will stand in awe at those determined men and women who faced the Plains, and in spite of one hardship after another, stayed to build a new land.

## Tahoka Junior High Sets Powder Puff Game

## Most Lynn County Soil Needs Moisture

Results of a recent survey in the 152,150 acres in Lynn County served by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District reveal that approximately one percent of the area has soil moisture deficits ranging from two to four inches, and 59 percent of the area has deficits ranging from four to six inches. The accompanying map illustrates the current soil moisture deficits throughout the District's service area in Lynn County.

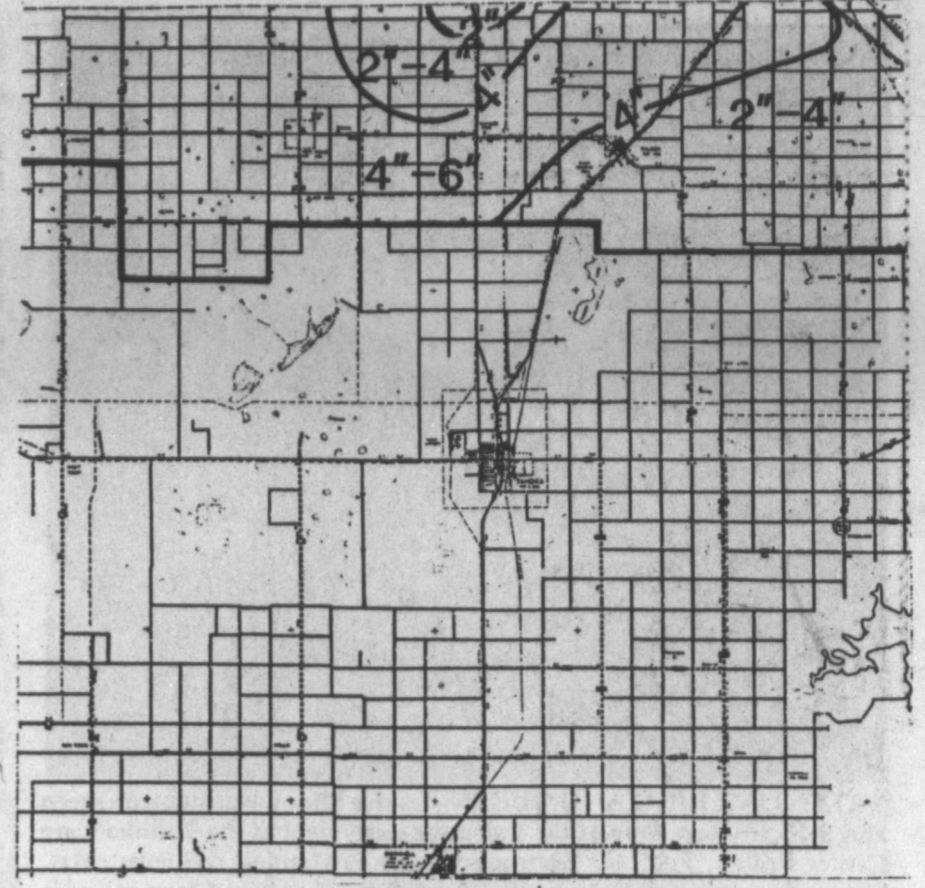
Soils in the Water District's service area in Lynn County hold a total of 7.0 to 8.0 inches of plant available water in the five-foot root zone soil profile when the soils are wet to field capacity. According to the survey, it appears that most of the county needs additional moisture to bring the moisture content of the root zone soil profile to field capacity before planting season rolls around.

Mike Risinger, soil scientist with the USDA-Soil conserva-

tion Service in Lubbock, notes, "This year in any one county we found big difference in the amount of stored moisture present." Risinger suggests that, due to the variability in soil moisture, it is a good idea for farmers to check the moisture content of the soils in their fields individually to determine their specific needs.

For assistance in determining soil moisture conditions, farmers should contact the local Soil Conservation Service office or the High Plains Water District for copies of the free brochure, "Monitoring Soil Moisture By Feel and Appearance," and a copy of the "Soil Moisture Guide" for Lynn County.

Risinger also suggests that it is a good idea for farmers to check for hardpans in their fields. If present, they should be destroyed to make the most of any rainfall received or irrigation water applied between now and planting season.

## A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

A number of farmers in Lynn County may be eligible to participate in the Conservation Reserve Program of the recently passed farm bill. Meetings will be held Feb. 25 in Lubbock and Feb. 26 in Abilene to help explain the program to area farmers.

The program is to take erodible cropland out of production and plant it to permanent cover, such as trees and grasses, points out Stanley M. Young, county agent with Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The Extension Service working with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS), is conducting five regional meetings across the state in February to help farmers better understand opportunities in this program.

The meeting Feb. 25 in Lubbock will be from 9 a.m. until noon at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock airport. The center is on FM 1294, just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit. The Abilene meeting Feb. 26 will be from 9 a.m. until noon in the jury assembly room in the new courthouse.

Farmers whose land qualifies for the program (as determined by land classifications by the SCS) will be eligible for annual

rent payments over the 10-year life of the contract and cost-sharing on cover establishment practices, Young points out.

According to SCS records, some 11.5 million acres of Texas cropland will qualify for the Conservation Reserve Program. However, only about 825,000 acres of that will be included in the program this year.

Farmers can check with their local ASCS or SCS office to determine if any of their crop acreage is eligible for the program. A 10-day sign-up period will be held March 3-14 at county ASCS offices.

Once a farmer determines that his cropland is eligible for the program, he must submit a bid for the annual rent payment on the designated acres, Young explained. Bids will be reviewed by county and state ASCS personnel, and farmers will then be notified as to whether or not they have been accepted. Annual payments will be limited to \$50,000 per producer.

More details about this new program also are available at the local SCS or ASCS office, Young said.

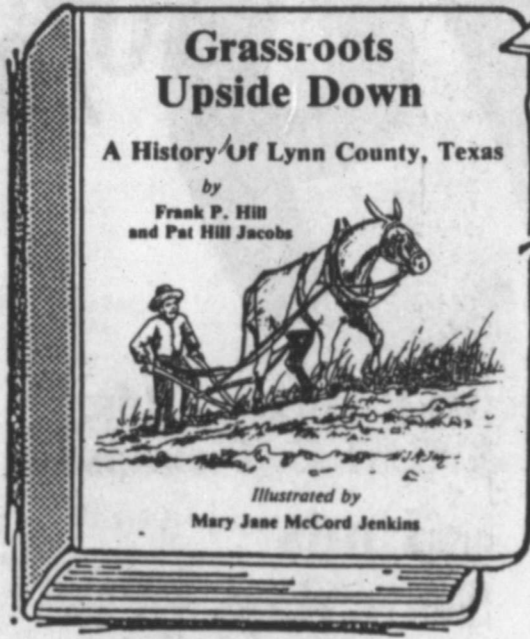
