

THE FINNEY CHRONICLES: Part I

Tahoka Man Has Done Just About Everything

(This is the first of a four-part series on C. Edmund Finney, retired Tahoka photographer who, at the request of this newspaper, sat down before a tape recorder for several hours and related some of his recollections of events and people he was involved with during a long and fascinating career in a wide variety of occupations.)

Usually when writers of newspaper articles refer to someone in a story, they give them some kind of label relating to that person's present or past activity or vocation. In other words, the subject will be labelled a prizefighter, mechanic, photographer, lawman, deep sea diver, tennis player, movie actor, rabbit raiser, onion grower, broncbuster, bellhop, fireman or whatever.

C. Edmund Finney of Tahoka could be labelled any or all of those things, including the whatever, because over the years he has been all of them, and more, as he has lived a varied and adventuresome life to its fullest, with enthusiasm and the willingness to try just about anything at least once.

Finney, who will be 85 May 24, has been recognized throughout the area as an expert professional photographer of the highest standards since he came to Tahoka in 1957. He closed out his photography business a few years ago, but his recollections of past activities also include many remarkable events outside the field of photography.

He tells of sparring in the ring with Jack Dempsey ("his manager stopped it, because he was afraid his fighter would get hurt"); of taking pictures of Marilyn Monroe, including a nude setting ("she was much maligned, but she really was a nice, sweet person"); of playing tennis against Bill Tilden ("I read years later that he was a homosexual, and if I'd known that, I probably wouldn't have played tennis against him") and of knowing movie stars ("Vic Mature one night talked me into enlisting for unpaid service in the Coast Guard").

1953 fire at home "burnt the whole thing"

Unfortunately, Finney has no documentary evidence of his associations with the famous over the years. Except for a few items that were stored in a barn, all photographs, negatives and equipment were lost in a fire in 1953, when the Finneys lived near Victorville, Calif., and a fire destroyed their new home. "It burnt the whole thing," he said.

Conversations with several longtime Tahoka residents who have known Finney since he first came here reveal that he has a reputation as a masterful teller of fascinating stories who has kept many listeners spellbound talking of events and people he remembers from the past. One young businessman said that as a boy "I used to sit and listen to Mr. Finney for hours at a time." He added that Finney has often demonstrated brilliant ingenuity in such areas as electronics and other fields and he and others contacted agreed that Finney is a man respected for his extensive knowledge of a wide range of subjects.

Finney recently was interviewed about events which he has been a part of from the time he was a boy in Arizona to the present day. His recollections on many of these things are quoted here, along with some of his commentaries on the American way of life, past and present, including some bouquets for Tahoka, the town he obviously ap-

preciates for its life style. Finney was born May 24, 1901, "on the side of a mountain in northern Arizona, Conconino County, outside of Williams, Ariz." in a log cabin with a dirt floor and just one big room, with a big fireplace at one end. "My grandmother cooked on big pots. My father was a teamster; he moonlighted buying cattle and horses."

"My father's people were missionaries"

He said his mother, who had been born in Missouri, came with her parents to Arizona by wagon train. Her father had been a Union soldier and in Arizona was engineer for a lumber company ("everything was run by steam"). Finney's mother (who later was Johanna Frederica Fudge when she lived with Mr. and Mrs. Finney in Tahoka for several years before she died) met Finney's father in Williams and they were married ("I think it was in Prescott, Ariz.") when she was only 21.

Finney said his father was often gone for long periods of time buying horses, so his mother lived with her parents, and that's where Fin-

stowed away on a wagon train and wound up in Williams." Finney

"My father's people were missionaries. They were a puritanical breed who went all over the west saving souls...my father was a religious fanatic. He ran away from home when he was seven and said he had two brothers, Frank, now deceased, and Harold, who lives when I was a bellhop there. His name was Hutchinson and he came in Newport Beach, Calif.

Kirsch, now deceased, who was the original owner of the Crossed T's Ranch three or four miles from the Grand Canyon. It's still there; now it's a big dude ranch." Finney said he worked on that ranch as a boy of 11 or 12 and that in the winter it was especially hard work. "In that country when it snowed, cattle would drift in front of the snow. They'd walk right off the cliff. So when it snowed, we'd be in the saddle all day." He added that he attended public schools, but

did not go on to college.

Finney said his father was once in partnership with a man who later became president of the Studebaker Corp. "His name escapes me right now, but he and my father had a big livery stable together and he wanted my father to go into the automobile business with him, but the old man wouldn't do it. He said 'those things won't ever last'...but this guy later became an adviser to Hoover."

"My mother and father were divorced when I was a teenager. My mother was uneducated, but was a very shrewd, hard-working woman, and she took us three kids and moved to wherever she could get work, sort of like I did later on." He added that they lived in Phoenix for two or three years and later moved to Los Angeles and then to Watts, Calif.

Finney said the first job he ever had that he was supposed to have been paid for was washing dishes at a camp near Chandler, Ariz., around 1915. "The Goodyear Land and Cotton Co. was levelling land, using Indian workers operating Fresno scrapers, and I worked there (washing dishes) for about three weeks and never did get paid, so "My next job was a bellhop in the Adams Hotel in Phoenix. It was

a real learning experience for an uncultured young man. I was thrown into a cosmopolitan atmosphere. I remember how surprised I was at how the other people lived. I learned about women and drinking and everything else right there in that hotel."

Finney recalled that the governor of Arizona at that time sometimes stayed at the Adams and that the governor once sent him to Yuma to get some whiskey to be used by the governor and some of his special friends. Arizona at that time had only been in the union a few years and it was a dry state. Finney said the governor told him to keep the whiskey in a vault and charge \$20 a bottle for it when certain wellknown people came to the hotel.

"His name was Harold Bell Wright, and he wrote books"

"The whiskey cost about a dollar and a quarter. I cannot remember the governor's name...I can only remember one name from that period in Arizona--he was a newspaperman, by the way. His name was Harold Bell Wright, and he wrote books. He would sit up on the mezzanine floor and read poetry to this woman. I remember he would give me a silver dollar every time I brought something up to him."

Harold Bell Wright was author of several well-known books, including "The Winning of Barbara Worth" and "The Shepherd of the Hills," which is the basis of an outdoor theater production now presented each summer at Branson, Mo.

Phoenix still has an Adams Hotel, said Finney, but the original hotel was demolished and a new one built. The old Adams Hotel was the center of all social life in Arizona in the early days, he said.

"I was first introduced to the movie business in the hotel," Finney mused. He said a troupe of movie people came to the Adams, and that the director was a man named Ford, who later made "Ruggles of Red Gap." It was in 1915 or 1916 and they were making a silent movie.

"They kept pretty much to themselves. I remember it was the first time I ever saw a woman undressed. They played strip poker and I would take things up to them, and I was just like a piece of the furniture to them.'

In those days in Arizona, the young bellhop would spend much of his time in the Phoenix library reading when he was off duty. This reading, he said, contributed much to his education and knowledge on

"Probably my first interest in photography came from an old manold? Well, he probably was about 40--who came to the Adams Hotel

from Los Angeles. The hotel would let me take a leave of absence and "We were back and forth living in Arizona. I had an uncle, Charley this Hutchinson had a circuit camera and we'd go out to Jerome, Ariz., and different places where they had mines and take pictures. Those cameras are a clockwork deal, and the camera turns, with just a slit behind the lens." He explained that this was the kind of camera used in early days to take large crowds of people and still have all the faces and everything else in focus, like the wide crowd pictures which used to be seen in barber shops.

Finney said he moved with his mother and two brothers to Los Angeles and then seven miles to Watts, Calif., which at that time was not a part of Los Angeles, although it was annexed while the Finneys lived there. In those days, any kind of work was welcome, and Finney said he used to get up at 4 a.m. and go down to the pool hall in Watts. "We'd play pool and line up outside the place for any job in the construction business. One day I'd be a hod carrier, the next day something else; we got paid by the day we worked."

"I got five bucks for boxing with Jack Dempsey"

The owner of the pool hall was a boxing fanatic who built a 16-foot boxing ring, and Finney said he and others could pick up four or five dollars sparring. "Any of those boxers who came in there, I'd spar with them for three rounds for five bucks. I never did have one of them deck me... I got five bucks for boxing with Jack Dempsey one time. He wasn't champion yet. He had come to Los Angeles to fight a benefit bout at the Los Angeles Athletic Club...I don't know how he got down to Watts, but he showed up... His manager stopped it in the second round; he was afraid I was going to hurt his fighter. He (Dempsey) was a rough, tough man, a killer, but I knew exactly how he fought; you see, I had seen him fight. He used an uppercut and you could tie him up if you were a good boxer. He never did hurt me. I was pretty strong in those days."

Finney also remembers that the pool hall manager "used to get his violin out and play it while the fight was going on."

During the interview, Finney took time out from his narratives to comment occasionally on life in general and voiced some definite opinions about some aspects of society. After telling of doing various construction jobs in his younger days in Watts, he remarked.

"I never was able to be happy sitting at a desk. Construction work was hard, but you could still remain an individual." He then commented on current ways of doing things, saying that people "who live in this day and age are 'certs'--they get up at a certain time, they rush around and do the same things every day and spend hours and hours sitting before a computer." He said that Lubbock General Hospital and the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center, where he and his wife have had to go on occasion, "is one of the most horrible examples ... there's this long corridor lined up with cubicles on each side, reminds me of a song sometime back about all the little boxes in a row...all these little boxes and somebody sits in each one of them with a computer. I think this is the most horrible way to live I've ever encountered; I don't think any black slave ever had it as bad as that."

Finney said he took pictures of all the seniors at Tahoka High School for about 20 years. "I used to encourage these kids from the poorer families to do whatever they could to get through college. I used to tell them they could do it, if they'd just try hard enough." It was good advice, from a man who always has been eager to tackle seemingly impossible jobs.

"Tahoka is a wonderful place to live"

"I've always been amazed at the incredible stupidity of some of our congressmen and legislators... Tahoka has been very lucky; we don't have too much interference...one of the star attractions of living in Tahoka is that we don't have any police interference in our lives."

"I think Tahoka is a wonderful place to live. Our younger people don't believe that, but as an old man, it's absolutely marvelous. It's more civilized than New York or Chicago or Los Angeles or any of the other sophisticated cities."
