## Activities Lined Up For Arrival Of Wagon Train Here Next Week

A busy day of activities has been scheduled for next Thursday (May 8) when the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train, which started out at Sulphur Springs Jan. 1, is to roll into Tahoka.

Mayor Jim Solomon, former longtime Mayor Meldon Leslie and Lynn County pioneer Belton Howell, who will be 100 this year, are to be among the dignitaries who will ride from the edge of town into the city on one of the lead wagons. The procession is expected to include about 50 wagons, plus campers and auxiliary vehicles associated with the wagon train, plus the horses and riders.

The wagon train will come in from the south on U.S. 87 from O'Donnell, where the procession is to spend Wednesday night. From Tahoka the group will go to Lubbock on Friday.

When the train reaches the south overpass, it will go onto the west access road and come on north to U.S. 380, where it will turn west and then go south on Main to circle the courthouse.

On the courthouse lawn will be the McMurry College calliope, on which welcome music will be played by Gary White. The wagon train is scheduled to arrive in the downtown Tahoka area about 12:30 p.m. to coincide with the time school will be dismissed for the day so students may take part in the activities.

Local members of the Sesquicentennial and Wagon Train committees are urging everyone to be outside and on hand when the wagon train arrives.

Other than the calliope, which also will be played at the campsite, no special ceremony is planned downtown when the train first arrives. After circling the square, the wagons will head east on U.S. 380 to the campsite, West Texas Industries property just east of the former Wade Implement building, on the north side of U.S. 380. Except for some games organized by Tahoka Lions Club, no formal activities are scheduled for the rest of the afternoon until 5 p.m., when hamburger plates will be served at a cost of \$3.50 per person, with the burgers prepared by volunteers, including some from Tahoka Rotary Club.

A "Cruddy Hat" contest with entrants in eight age groups will begin at 5 p.m. School art and essay contest entries will be on display all day Thursday at the former Anthony's building downtown, and downtown businesses also will take part in window decoration contests.

At 7 p.m. there will be an organized program at the campsite, with Rev. Gene Wisdom as

master of ceremonies. This will include presentation of awards to winners of the most authentic wagon, the most authentic costume, male and female horseback riders, individual campsite and other event winners.

Entertainment will include a "Salute to Texas" by 4-H members, Karey and Kristin Durham, and the Miss Wagon Train and Mr. Trail Boss winners from school. Then will be the drawing for the quilt, an exhibition of square dancing, and the closing activity, a singalong, led by Carroll Rhodes, with accompaniment.

Wagon Train committee chair-

man Nadine Dunlap said two entrances to the campsite area would be used Thursday to help ease traffic congestion. One is on the south side of the campsite area, facing U.S. 380, and the other is on the west side, just east of the West Texas Industries office. Around the office will be designated parking areas, and visitors also may park along U.S. 380, around the Wade Implement building, and across the highway on Louder Gin and Haney Gin lots. There is no charge for admission to the campsite. There will also be a shuttle provided to carry "senior pioneers" and anyone with difficulty walking around the campsite.

## Crime Line Offers Rewards In Burglaries, Vandalism

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered rewards this week in four burglaries and a case of criminal mischief.

The home of Bob Keene, 1.2 miles northwest of Southland was burglarized Monday. Stolen were two video cassette recorders, a TV set and a shotgun.

Stolen from the home of Sherry Pendergraph north of FM 1317 and about two miles west of U.S. 87 last Friday were a microwave oven and antique .22 rifle.

The fourth burglary was at the residence of Pedro Gutierrez in Tahoka, with nothing listed as missing.

Tahoka police received a report from a local woman who said she had received a couple of harassment calls Tuesday night.

Tahoka Police Department and Texas Children's Protective Services are currently working on a child abuse case that was recently reported by one of the Tahoka elementary schools.

Lynn County Crime Line is offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest of persons involved in criminal mischief of damage to a 1979 Pontiac Grand Prix owned by

Jackie Swinford of Tahoka that occurred on April 16. Crime Line is also offering a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest of persons involved in the burglary of a residence at 1425 N. 4th owned by Pedro Gutierrez that was discovered on Monday, April 28.

In jail during the last week were one person for assault and revocation of probation, one for judgement and sentence on a DWI charge, two for DWI and two on traffic warrants.

Rev. Gene Wisdom, who has been pastor of the Tahoka church since 1981, has been appointed as pastor of Forrest Heights UMC in Lubbock. Wisdom was Man of the Year in Tahoka in 1985.

The Gibbens-Rickmans have two boys, Jared, seven months, and Jeffrey, 19-months. Both attended seminary at Southern Methodist University. Both are in their early 30s. Mrs. Rickman is originally from Oklahoma.

**KIDS OF WORKING MOTHERS CAN EAT NUTRITIOUSLY**— The notion that children of women who work outside the home subsist on convenience foods and snacks is probably a myth, says Dr. Alice Hunt. According to a survey study published recently in the Journal of the American Dietetic Assn., working mothers feed their families 7 per cent more salads and 8 per cent more eggs than mothers who do not work outside the home. The study showed that working parents' children under age 12 eat more vegetable dishes, more bacon, more unsweetened cereals, and less candy, pizza and salty snacks. "The key difference in the nutritional value of children's diets mostly depend on what parents know about nutrition, and whether the mother works outside the home or not, Hunt adds.

**CHILDREN 'WANTED ALIVE'**—A safety specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service offers a special 'WANTED ALIVE' announcement in recognition of the many accidental injuries occurring to children. Children require close supervision because they are attracted to such areas as farm ponds and tanks. They beg to ride on tractors and other dangerous farm equipment. They play with matches and get into areas where poisons are stored. Adults should teach children to avoid dangers. They should set examples for children and should set and enforce safe limits.

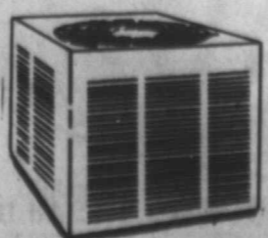

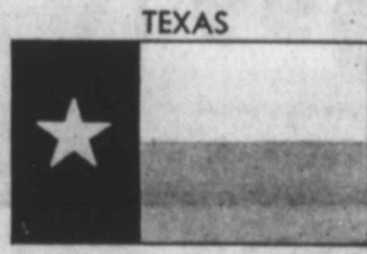

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# A Visit With Your County Agent

## CRP Bidding To Reopen

The bidding process for the Conservation Reserve Program that was initiated at the first of the year will be reopened for the period of May 5-23. At the same time, the initial bidding process for the 1987 program will start.

This will allow procedures whose bids were not previously accepted to revise them or to submit new bids for this year and also to submit bids for 1987.

Producers interested in submitting bids for either of the program years should contact their county ASCS and SCS offices to initiate the sign-up procedure.

The 1986 sign-up held in March fell far short of the acreage expected to be accepted into the program. Nationally, about 838,000 acres of highly erodible cropland on 10,307 farms were entered into the CRP, with accepted bids ranging from \$5 to \$90 per acre. Texas did not fare as well as the rest of the country, with only 29,052 acres on 151 farms accepted into the CRP.

The USDA had hoped to put some 5 million acres into the program in 1986, with about 825,000 of those in Texas. Over five years, the USDA has targeted some 45 million acres for the program, with 11.5 million of those in Texas.

Landowners considering the upcoming sign-up period will need to remember that the CRP calls for a 10-year contract and establishment of permanent cover (grass or trees) to protect land from wind and water erosion.

Costs involved in establishing

this cover will be shared 50-50 with the government.

Bids on the cropland to be taken out of production should be based on what that land would produce if it remained under cultivation. A special worksheet is available at the county Extension office to help a producer determine a bid price.

Producers are reminded that annual rental payments on the land will be limited to \$50,000 per farmer and will be in addition to annual commodity program payments.

## TRACTOR SAFETY

The sharp increase in agricultural activities in the spring means more tractor accidents. Overtakes still cause the most tractor-related deaths, says a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. These can be avoided by extra driving care, particularly in unfamiliar terrain. Other tractor safety tips include being alert at all times, making sure all equipment is in good working order, not allowing riders, matching ground speed to operating conditions, turning off the engine when refueling, and securely blocking the tractor when removing wheels.



It's best to buy a pair of shoes in the afternoon after your feet have had a chance to expand to normal size from walking.

**NCC Board To Meet:** The National Cotton Council board of directors will hold its spring session in Jackson, Miss., May 28-29, Board Chairman Samuel B. Hollis announced this week.

The board will hold an open business session at 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 28, and reconvene the following morning in executive session.

Also meeting during the two days will be the Council's Operations Committee, its subcommittee on investments, and the steering committee of the Committee for the Advancement of Cotton.

All sessions will be held at the Coliseum Ramada Inn. **NCC Testifies:** Dr. Phil Wakelyn, the National Cotton Council's manager of environmental/safety technology, and Tom Wedegaertener of National Cottonseed Products Association testified at a recent hearing on proposed revisions to California's cotton dust standard. The hearing was held by the state's Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board, which is required to adopt a revised dust standard at least as effective as the federal standard.

**Mill's Use of Cotton Up From '85:** March consumption figures show U.S. textile mills use of cotton was up 18.1 percent from a year ago, running at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 6.452 million bales compared with a 5.463 million bale rate in March 1985.

Cotton's share of total fiber use was 27.5 per cent in contrast to 22.9 per cent last March.

## Rep. Carriker Cites Experience, Accomplishments

Seventy-eighth District State Representative Steven A. Carriker (D-Roby), now serving his fourth year in the Texas House of Representatives, is seeking the renomination of the Democratic voters of this rural West Texas district. In addition to the regular committee assignments, Carriker is serving as Majority Whip and acting Majority Leader of the Texas House. He is also serving a four-year term as one of nine Texas members of the Democratic National Committee and is a member of the rural policy group for that body. Carriker has been the author of a number of significant pieces of legislation since his election to the Legislature in 1982, including the 'Buy Texas First' law.

Among the bills he has passed are a property taxpayer relief

law, a farm and ranch security package, and a number of bills enabling local units of government to engage in needed functions. He co-sponsored legislation to modify and improve the "pass-play" rule and carried a tutorial pay bill at the request of teacher groups.

Carriker is a cotton and grain farmer and cattle producer. He and his wife Kathy have three children.

Rep. Carriker has been endorsed for re-election by a wide range of groups, including the Political Action Committee of local county officials, agriculture groups, and the Texas Educators Political Action Committee of the Texas State Teachers Assn.

## SWCD Stresses Water Management

The high cost of irrigation, especially the cost of pumping water, "makes it imperative that everything possible is done to manage the water properly once the money is spent for pumping," representatives of the Lynn County SWCD said.

One good management tool is the use of moisture meters and gypsum blocks to tell when more water is needed by crops. Both moisture blocks and meters are

available at the SCS office in Tahoka. The moisture meter sells for \$160 and is good for several years. The gypsum blocks are \$3 and are good for one season.

The SCS Office has the equipment to measure how many GPM a well is producing, the pump efficiency and to evaluate center pivot systems. They also have a surge system which can be loaned for demonstration purposes. at Tahoka.

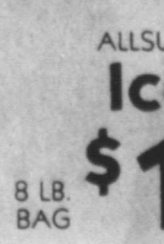

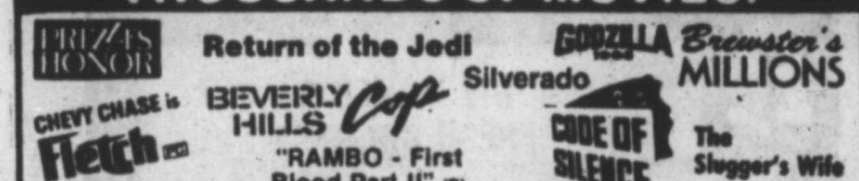

# COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

**Cotton Called On Offensive:** The cotton industry is moving to take advantage of its unique opportunity to gain market share and more volume for the future.

That was the message delivered by Earl Sears, executive vice president of the National Cotton Council, to the Mississippi Valley Oilseed Processors Association.

He said the new farm law is doing positive things for cotton farmers, keeping them in business while making their cotton price-competitive in markets at home and abroad. To strike while the "iron" is hot, Sears said the cotton industry through the Council will be seeking legislation to assess cotton textile imports for research and promotion just as U.S. producers are assessed.

Implementation of the plan could step up Cotton Incorporated's budget by 50 percent or more, he said, and possibly result in a reduced assessment in the bargain.

The Council official said most producer organizations have already endorsed the plan and approval from the remainder is expected shortly.

proval from the remainder is expected shortly.

**Korean Buying Mission Set:** A cotton buying group is part of a trade mission being sent to the United States April 14-26 by the Korean Ministry of Trade and Industry. The group includes representatives of textile mills that purchase one-third of the 1.5 million bales annually bought by the Koreans.

Myung-Kee Chun, president of the Spinners and Weavers Association of Korea, is leading the group. Adrian Hunnings, executive director of Cotton Council International, Washington, D.C., will accompany the mission. CCI is the overseas arm of the National Cotton Council.

**Cotton Belt Stops include:** Fresno, April 15; Bakersfield, April 16; Palm Springs, April 17; Dallas, April 18-19; and Memphis, April 20-21.

The group will then join other members of the mission spend for meetings with government officials for the last four days of its U.S. visits.

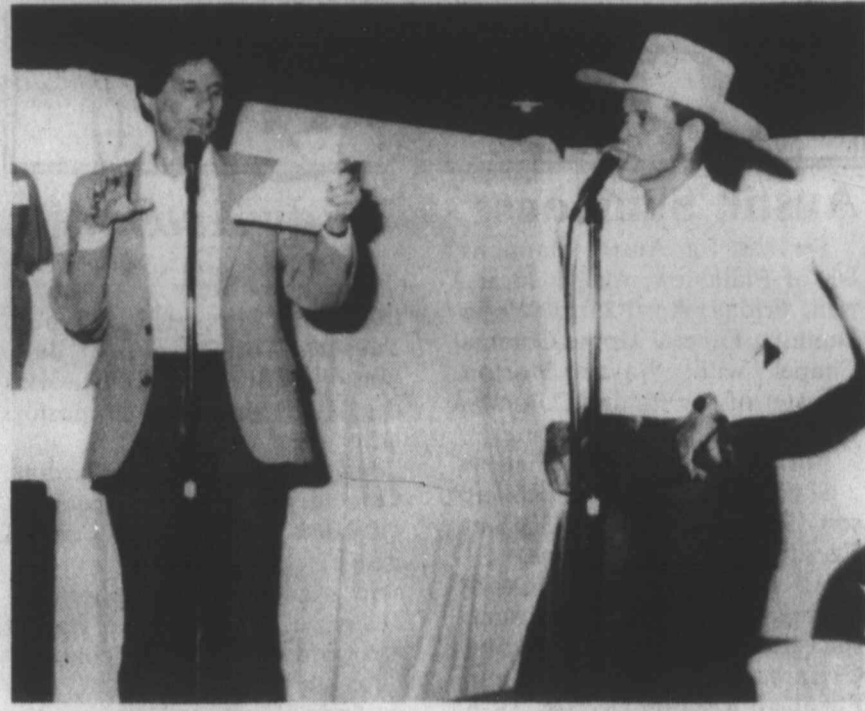

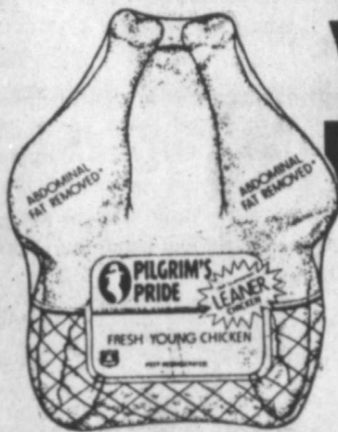
