# Wagon Train Heralded By Sand, Wind & Crowd

A large crowd of local and area residents gathered in downtown Tahoka last Thursday to watch the arrival of the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train at just past high noon. Adding to the the authenticity of the old west theme was a "made to order" West Texas sandstorm which gusted around the 43 wagons. The wagon train riders, however, gritted their teeth and smiled and waved to the crowd of onlookers, many of whom were dressed in western attire as part of their own "salute to Texas."

The wagons left O'Donnell early Thursday morning, traveling at approximately four miles per hour to reach Tahoka at noon. Riding along with the wagons were 186 dusty riders, many who had been "on the trail" since sun-up, as Tahoka riders were told to be in O'Donnell at 6 a.m. in order to accompany the train on its 15-mile treck north to Tahoka.

As the wagon train arrived on the outskirts of town, the driver of each wagon was given a gift bag which included items from several New Home and Tahoka

The McMurry College Calliope was parked on the courthouse square, where Gary White serenaded the riders and crowd with several tunes on the portable pipe organ.

The train wound its way through Tahoka before heading for the campsite located on Hwy. 380 on the compress lot of West Texas Industries. Six wagons and several riders made an additional trip through town to go to the Tahoka Care Center, whose residents were gathered outside to greet them with punch and

At the compress lot the wagon train members made camp, unharnessed their horses and mules, and relaxed until the evening's activities. Several area schools had bussed their students to Tahoka to watch the historical event, including Wilson, New Home, Wellman, Post and Brownfield. Special entertainment was presented during the afternoon for these students, as they would return to their respective schools before the evening program would begin. Lynn

County 4-H presented their musical routine called "Salute to Texas" and Kary and Kriston Durham of New Home played their violins for the group.

Jim Solomon, Mayor of Tahoka, welcomed the Wagon Train participants that evening after the Tahoka Wagon Train Committee prepared hamburger plates for the visitors. A large crowd had gathered to greet the visitors and watch the program in spite of the wind and sand, which by that time was in full gusto. Awards and certificates of appreciation were presented to various persons, and then the 4-H Club presented their program to the enthusiastic crowd. The Durham girls played several numbers on their violins, and the winners of the Miss Wagon Train and Mr. Trail Boss contest were presented.

Velda Fulcher of Slaton was the winner of the quilt drawing. The quilt had been made by several ladies in New Home. The Merry Mixers of Lubbock square danced for the crowd, and the night was closed with a group sing-along led by Carroll Rhodes and accompanied by Dalton Wood.

The campers were provided transportation to the Tahoka bock by 7 a.m.

# Two Burglaries Cleared, **One Reported In County**

Lynn County officials have cleared two burglaries that were reported last week including the burglary of the Glenn Akins home, northwest of Wilson and also cleared was the burglary of Felipie Guillen residence with all items recovered. Roy Rogers Rodriquez and Angel Ortiz remain in custody in Brownfield on charges of burglary of a habitation in conjunction with the Guillen burglary. Bond was set at \$50,000 each.

Jimmy Austin, 22, of Lubbock remains in Lynn County Jail and has been charged with two counts of burglary in conjunction with the Akins and Ruben Sanders burglaries. Bond was set at \$50,000 for each count on Austin.

Lynn County officials investigated the burglary of Steve Payne residence located three miles west of U.S 87 on FM 213 and one mile north. A screen had been reportedly cut and a storm window had been broken out. Items missing include a Sharp microwave oven valued at \$400 and one Elgin glass dome clock valued at \$50. Also reported stolen was one wooden spice rack and one 16 inch silver platter. The burglary occurred sometime between 5:30 p.m. Saturday, May 10 and 8:30 a.m. the next day.

Lynn County Crime Line is offering a \$300 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for this crime.

Police also investigated a burglary at a residence located at South 5th and Ave. L.





God needs you - but you


need God more. Forget everything else if you must - but do not forget Jesus Christ the Lord.
