WOODWORK

RUNNING a business these days is no easy job and finding good help is just as difficult as finding good employers. But it is a pleasure to do business with merchants and companies whose employees seem to care about the customers.

Of course, not all customers are the kind you can love, especially if you're just part of the hired help, and you can be nice to an obnoxious clod only up to a point. But most customers are congenial, and in this town, most of the workers at the various businesses are anxious to please the customers.

This is not the case in many businesses in larger cities, and Lubbock is just as bad as any. You can grow a beard (or your permanent will wilt) while you're trying to get waited on in many Lubbock stores, particularly the chain stores.

There is this one discount place where you can pick up what you want since it is self-service and run the basket through the checkout line. Only you don't really run it through. What you do is look up and count 29 checkout stands, but only two are lighted and in operation. The line to each one stretches about 16 people deep. By the time you get through it and everybody has had his check approved, and all the missing price tags have been verified and all the drivers licenses shown, the stuff you bought is either spoiled or out of style.

A guy was telling this week about his experiences with one of Lubbock's major stores. He wanted to buy a storm door, but the one he needed was not in stock, so they had to order it. So he ordered it from the mail order counter, and gave them his credit card so it could be charged to him. A few days later he went by for it, but they said it would be a few days. It was two weeks before he was told it had arrived.

He went to the store, to the mail order counter, and was told that the door was out at the warehouse. Well, he said, he'd go out and get it

(although the warehouse was out in the east part of town in a location best accessed by helicopter). It was about 6 p.m. and he was informed that he couldn't get it because the warehouse closed at 5.

The next day, when he was going to be in the area of the warehouse anyway, he called that location and said he'd drop by and pick up the door. They told him he couldn't do that without some papers he'd have to obtain at the main store to bring with him. In the meantime they planned to take the door over to the main store later that day. He blew his cool and wanted to know why, if they had his door and he already had paid for it, that he couldn't come get it right now. They were sorry, but it was company policy (to give each customer the run-around, we suppose).

A woman listening to all this said yeah, she recently made the mistake of ordering something from that store and having it shipped to the store instead of directly to her. She said when she went after it at the mail order counter, she had to stand in line forever and then they give you a number and you go find your order yourself. And the last time her order was in two parts and she had to stand in a separate line to get the second part.

Another lady this week told about being ripped off for a little over \$3 on a bill for a classified ad in an unnamed Lubbock daily newspaper. The ad ran for two consecutive Sundays and they told her what it would cost to run it twice. But in between the two Sundays, they changed their method of billing classifieds and the second ad, a repeat of the first one, was that much higher than the first week.

Anyway, as we have said many times, it pays to shop right here, if you can possibly find what you want, even if it costs you a buck or two more. There is not a business in town which doesn't appreciate every customer that trades with them.

Burglary Is Cleared Before Items Missed

Justice moved swiftly in the case of a burglary of the O'Donnell home of Mrs. J. T. Middleton Jr. last week. Mrs. Middleton was away from home when someone entered the residence and took eight rifles. The rifles were found by another resident in a well house and officers notified.

Investigation produced information on two suspects, who were arrested, and both pleaded guilty and were sentenced before the deputy on the case could complete his report. Also, the case was cleared before Mrs. Middleton knew the rifles had been stolen, officers said.

Judge George Hansard assessed a 7-year, probated, prison term for Arthur Ortiz, 17, of O'Donnell, on charges of burglary of the Middleton home. A 16-year-old also pleaded guilty before juvenile authorities and was taken to a detention center.

A.P. Stephens of Tahoka reported a horse had been stolen from pens 8.5 miles southeast of Tahoka on June 19. Officers Wednesday were seeking a suspect in the case.

Police investigated a family disturbance on Friday night on N. 6th that involved a 16-year-old Tahoka girl who was reportedly assaulted by an adult Tahoka woman in which the 16-year-old received minor injuries. No charges had been filed; however, the county attorney had been contacted in connection with charges pending in this case.

1985 Tax Payment Deadline At Hand

Property owners who have not paid their school, county, city and hospital district taxes for 1985 must do so by Monday or face a stiff penalty of an additional 15 percent which will be added at that time, officials of the Lynn County Tax Appraisal District said this week.

The penalty applies to taxes due to the city of Tahoka, Lynn County, Tahoka school district and Wilson school district.

The appraisal district this week mailed out notices of new values placed on property in the county, showing a sharp increase in the values set on real estate and showing lower values on farmland. Businesses and homeowners in the county are looking at increases on value of their property varying from 5 or 6 percent to more than double what they have been in the past.

Dovie Miller, head of the appraisal office, said taxing entities may be able to lower their tax rates under the new values and

Tahoka school board last Thursday night voted to keep school lunchroom prices the same as they were last year. The board met to take care of items not handled during the regular meeting on June 12.

The board also moved to rescind a salary freeze voted on March 13. Most other items of business were routine. All board members were present.

June's Rain Is Most Of Total For Year

Farmers' toes are starting to grow together and crocodiles have been spotted in the cotton fields. Those are some of the stories going around, and while they are exaggerations, it's unfortunately too true that continued rainfall in Lynn County has almost delivered a knockout blow to cotton farming for this year.

Farmers have planted and replanted only to see the heavy rains and some winds and even a little hail destroy much of their crop potential. Despite everything, however, there still will be some cotton produced in the county, agricultural observers say.

Rainfall totals have varied considerably in different parts of the county, and even across town in Tahoka. But the official U.S. Weather Service observer in Tahoka, Ed Hamilton, said Tuesday it had rained 10.4 inches in Tahoka in June, through Monday, when .85 of an inch was recorded. Also he said rainfall from a trace on up had been recorded on 11 of the first 23 days of the month.

Hamilton said the total for the year so far has been 14.34, which means only about 4 inches of rain fell in the first five months, and most of that was in the last week of May when the current monsoon season started.

Texas Highway Dept. headquarters just outside Tahoka has measured 15 inches of rain since that last week in May. Lynn County's average rainfall reportedly is 18.5 inches.

Hamilton said he recalls that it rained about 44 inches in 1941, and said that one month--September of 1936--it rained 16 inches.

Water was over some roads in the county Monday after more heavy rains, and there were unconfirmed rumors of rainfall up to 8 inches in some places near O'Donnell.

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CONTOUR FARMING--Due to heavy rains in Lynn County numerous acres of land have been eroded due, in part, to poor management. According to some farmers it is easier and quicker to plant straight rows east to west or north to south. But the facts to consider with this practice is the percentage of slope and washes that will occur due to too much grade on the land. Lynn County doesn't usually get this much rain in one month, but when it does rain a lot it costs more to fill in the gullies caused by water erosion than it would to contour farm the land. 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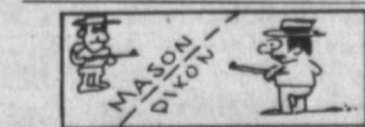
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Tennis Tournament Slated In Post
