Burglary Is Cleared Before Items Missed


Lunchroom Prices **To Remain Same**

Tahoka school board last Thursday night voted to keep school lunchroom prices the same as they were last year. The board met to take care of items not handled during the regular meeting on June 12.

The board also moved to rescind a salary freeze voted on March 13. Most other items of business were routine. All board members were present.

June's Rain Is Most **Of Total For Year**

Farmers' toes are starting to grow together and crocodiles have been spotted in the cotton fields. Those are some of the stories going around, and while they are exagerations, it's unfortunately too true that continued rainfall in Lynn County has almost delivered a knockout blow to cotton farming for this year.



Rainfall totals have varied considerably in different parts of the county, and even across town in Tahoka. But the official U.S. Weather Service observer in Tahoka, Ed Hamilton, said Tuesday it had rained 10.4 inches in Tahoka in June, through Monday, when .85 of an inch was recorded. Also he said rainfall from a trace on up had been recorded on 11 of the first 23 days of the month.

Hamilton said the total for the year so far has been 14.34, which means only about 4 inches of rain fell in the first five months, and most of that was in the last week of May when the current monsoon season started. Texas Highway Dept. headquarters just outside Tahoka has measured 15 inches of rain since that last week in May. Lynn County's average rainfall reportedly is 18.5 inches.

Hamilton said he recalls that it rained about 44 inches in 1941, and said that one month--September of 1936--it rained 16 inches.

Water was over some roads in the county Monday after more heavy rains, and there were unconfirmed rumors of rainfall up to 8 inches in some places near O'Donnell.



CONTOUR FARMING--Due to heavy rains in Lynn County numerous acres of land have been eroded due, in part, to poor management. According to some farmers it is easier and quicker to plant straight rows east to west or north to south. But the facts to consider with this practice is the percentage of slope and washes that will occur due to too much grade on the land. Lynn County doesn't usually get this much rain in one month, but when it does rain a lot it costs more to fill in the gullys caused by water erosion than it would to contour farm the land.
