## Wiley Officially Named Head Coach For Tahoka

Ted Wiley, who has been acting as interim head coach and athletic director for Tahoka schools during the summer, with A.D. Shaver critically ill in a Lubbock hospital, was elected by the school board last Thursday night to take the job for the regular school term coming up. With Coach Shaver, head coach and athletic director for several years, still in intensive care after more than two months of treatment for meningitis, the board took the action and accompanied it with a \$1000 severance bonus for Shaver, in appreciation

for his service to the school. Shaver also was assistant high school principal, a job now being handled by Charles Cate, head basketball coach for boys. Wiley was hired at \$4000 above state salary schedule for coaching and an additional \$2000 above base for the athletic director duties. With the school operating with five coaches instead of the seven it has had in the past, the board also voted to hire Charlie Mac Holland on a per diem basis as a coaches' aide through basketball season.

Some changes in the high school student handbook were presented by Principal Dr. Duane Carter and approved by the board. Following a budget hearing at which no citizens appeared, the board approved the recommended budget for 86-87 amounting to \$2,433,887 for maintenance and operation and \$227,618 for special services funds. The board did not set a tax rate, electing to wait and see what the current special session of the Texas Legislature is going to do to schools. Danna Curry was hired as Spanish teacher, and a list of substitute teachers was approved by the board. Business manager Loretta Tekell reported a balance in all funds on July 31 of \$1,526,371. Tax collections from 1985 on that date were almost 95 per cent complete, with \$727,242 collected. Vice-president Jim Wells presided in the absence of board president Joe Hays. Other board members present were Mike Huf-faker, J.E. Nance Jr., Robert Smith and Nedra Young.

### WOODWORK BY DALTON

I THINK I MAY have said it before, but it's still a good idea: all doctors in order to keep their licenses to practice, should have to sit for at least two hours in their own waiting rooms once every month, with nothing to read except 6-month-old copies of Field and Stream. People who go in to see doctors without an appointment should expect to have to wait for long periods of time. But people who have appointments should not have to wait more than 15 minutes, either in the waiting room or in one of the little rooms they stick you in. Some doctors and their staffs do a lot better jobs than others; the worst offenders are specialists. In Lubbock. On 22nd Street. Well, possibly some of the others in the larger cities are just as bad, but I haven't visited those. Yeah, I know. Doctors are overworked, they don't know how long they are going to have to spend with each patient, and they get called over to the hospital for emergencies while patients wait impatiently. But still some of them could do better than they do. I am not criticizing our local doctors. On various occasions I have visited all three, and the only time I had to wait longer than I liked was when I had no appointment. In Lynn County we are very fortunate to have three good doctors and a good hospital. What is unfortunate

is that we sometimes have to go to Lubbock to see specialists. Last week we were in a waiting room in Lubbock for an hour and a half after the appointment time before getting in. After about 30 minutes on the inside, three or four of which involved face-to-face meeting with the doctor, the patient I was with came back out and had to wait another 15 or 20 minutes to get a bill and instructions on what to do. The waiting room was filled with people who had been there for an hour or more past their appointment time. One woman who had been waiting for quite awhile tripped on the carpet and was prone on the floor for several minutes. This brought out a couple of nurses and a doctor to see about her, getting immediate attention. I wish I had thought of that. \*\*\* KNOTHOLES: If you live in Tahoka, the only reasonable way to get to Abilene is to drive, we were told this week by a woman who wanted to take some kind of public transportation because some other members of the family were going down later in private cars. To ride the bus from Tahoka, you have take the one at 10 a.m. because the 4 p.m. bus goes back to Lubbock, then to Big Spring where you have a four-hour layover, an exciting place to

spend four hours in a bus station, then to Abilene arriving at 1 a.m. A plane? You catch it in Lubbock, it goes to Dallas, then back to Abilene.....Some thing needs to be done to stop the escalating trend of putting rolls of toilet paper on the holders the wrong way, where they pull out from the bottom. Toilet paper should always come off the top of the roll, so you can get a good, usable quantity of it without having to struggle and scratch around on the underside of the roll for the hidden end of the paper. This is a very delicate subject not usually discussed, but it may be necessary for government to get into regulation of the proper way to place rolls of paper on a holder. Perhaps the state could appoint toilet paper holder inspectors who would check homes and offices unannounced and levy heavy fines on those who have them unrolling from the bottom. This might, so to speak, wipe out our state deficit.

## City Lowers Tax Rate

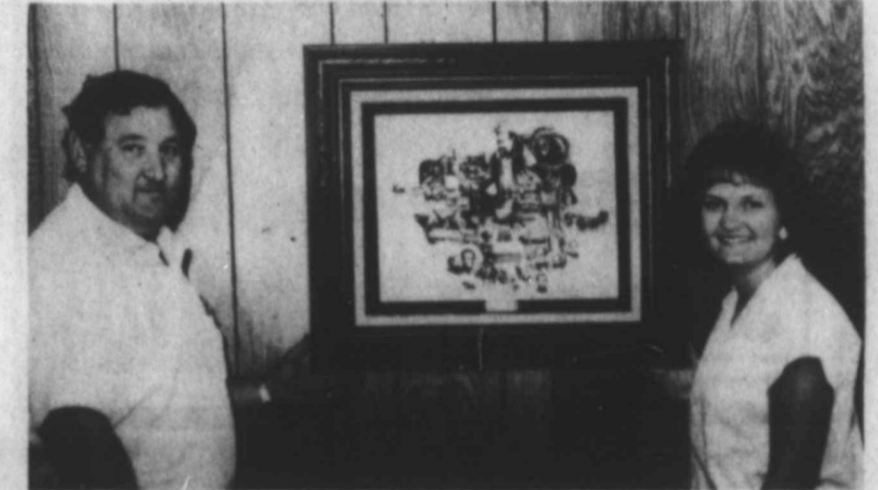
Tahoka City Council Monday night voted to set the tax rate on property in the city at 45 cents per \$100 valuation for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1, a 4-cent decrease from the current tax rate of 49 cents. At the special session in city hall, the group looked at a tentative budget for the coming year and noted the tax appraisal district's report that total valuations in the city have been increased to \$41.3 million, up from \$36.9 million, which has been the tax roll for five years prior to a mandatory reappraisal

conducted this year. Mayor Jim Solomon explained that this means the city can lower the tax rate to 45 cents and still collect about the same amount as in the past to operate the city, which has tentatively set a general operating budget about \$7,000 higher than the amount which will be spent in that category this year. A general budget of \$320,739 has been set, pending a public hearing and final approval. Most homeowners and business owners in the city found their property values raised, some by more than 50 per cent, in the reappraisals announced earlier this year. At that time, taxpayers were advised of amounts of taxes they would owe if the tax rates stayed the same as last year. Lowering the city rates by 4 cents per \$100

valuation will ease the blow of higher valuations for some, council members noted. Mayor Solomon said many taxpayers probably will be paying about the same as before in city taxes, although there will be some paying more and a few less. The 4-cent drop represents an 8 per cent reduction in the tax rate. Of the 45 cents levied, 7 cents will be used for payment on bonded indebtedness, said City Manager Carl Reynolds. The council also approved payment of \$22,251 to Strong Paving Co. for completion of paving at the new cemetery. Present Monday night were Solomon, Reynolds and council members Dayton Parker, Jim Thomas, Leonard Dunn, Wayne Tekell and Dalton Wood.

## Lynn County Harvest Festival Set Sept. 20

The 11th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival has been scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 20, with participants from a wide area expected to participate. The festival, held the past 10 years on the courthouse square in downtown Tahoka, will begin early Saturday morning as organizations begin setting up booths in preparation for the full day of activities. Lynn County encompasses Tahoka, O'Donnell, New Home and Wilson, but booths can be rented for \$10 on a space-available basis to interested parties outside the county area. A Homecoming-Harvest Festival Parade will kick off the weekend events on Friday, Sept. 19 before the Tahoka-Wilson football game. Co-chairmen for this year's Harvest Festival Committee are Nadine Dunlap and Juanell Jones. The committee will meet every Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. until the week of the Festival. Next meeting will be held Thursday, Aug. 21 in the Reddy Room of Southwestern Public Service building. All persons interested in planning the Festival are urged to attend.

## Tonda Freitag Is Named Academic All-American

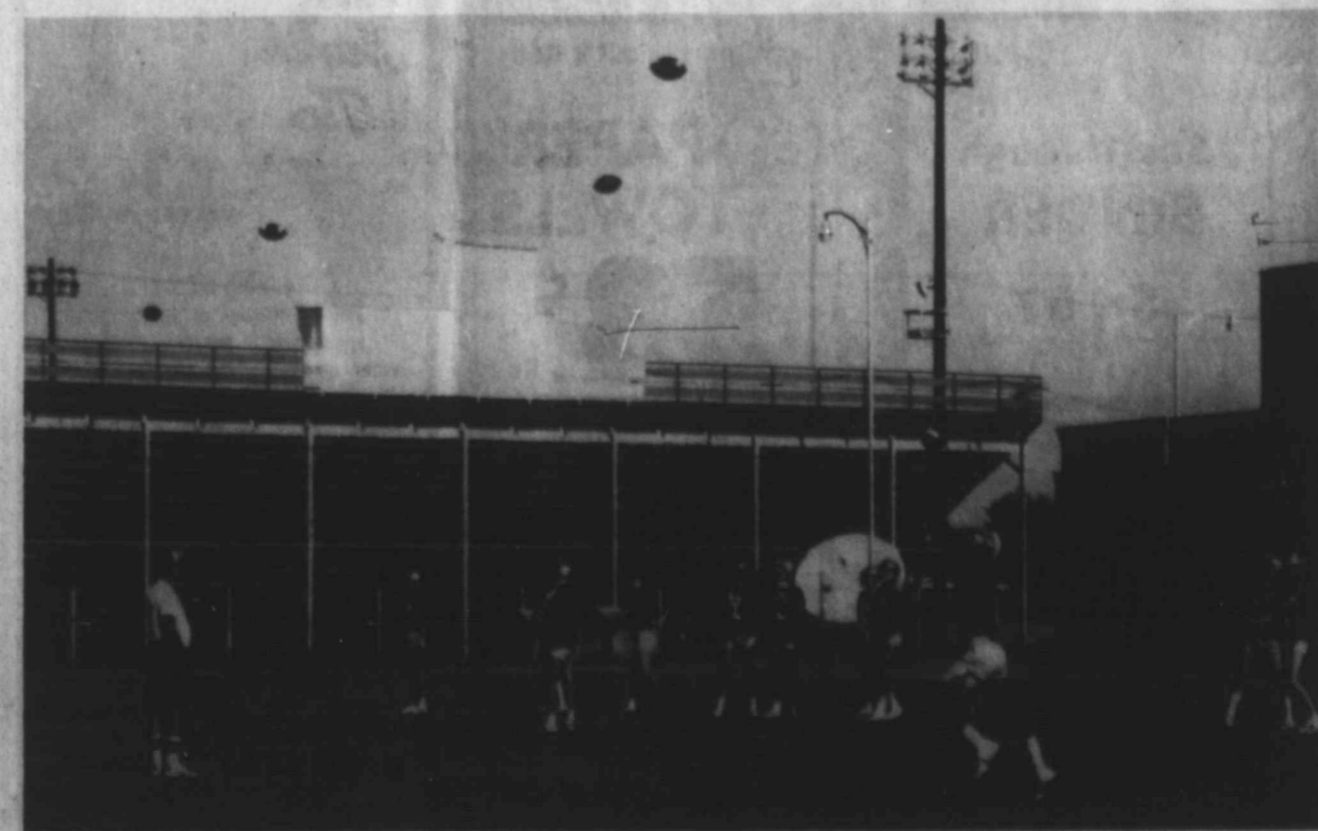

## Tahoka Man Pleads Guilty Of Indecency

Richard Wayne Williams, 37, of Tahoka, who was scheduled to go on trial next week on a charge of indecency with a child, pleaded guilty of that charge before District Judge George Hansard in Seminole last week. District Atty. Ricky Smith said a five-year prison term would be assessed at formal sentencing scheduled Sept. 2. The incident occurred Dec. 23, 1985, and involved a teenaged boy. Tahoka police arrested two white males on Sunday for consuming alcohol in a public place. Both men, currently stationed at Cannon Air Force Base in San Angelo, were taken to Lynn County Jail and later released after fines were paid. It had been reported that several people were drinking at the Tahoka Mini Park. A 1973 Oldsmobile Delta 88 owned by Noel Tijerina was reported damaged while parked at 2102 S. 1st on Saturday. The damage reportedly was due to a family disturbance. Police investigated an accident at the intersection of Lockwood and Ave. F that involved a 1975 Ford driven by Isabel Minjaro Vela of Lamesa and a 1977 Chevrolet driven by Martha Calvillo DeLeon of Tahoka. Police issued one ticket during the past week for illegal turn and no proof of liability insurance. No new burglaries were reported in the city or county, but alcohol-related offenses increased, as the county jail at one time held as many as eight persons on liquor charges, including the two arrested in Tahoka. Five were in jail for public intoxication and one for driving while intoxicated. Another person was jailed for assault by threat and another for disorderly conduct and driving an unregistered vehicle.



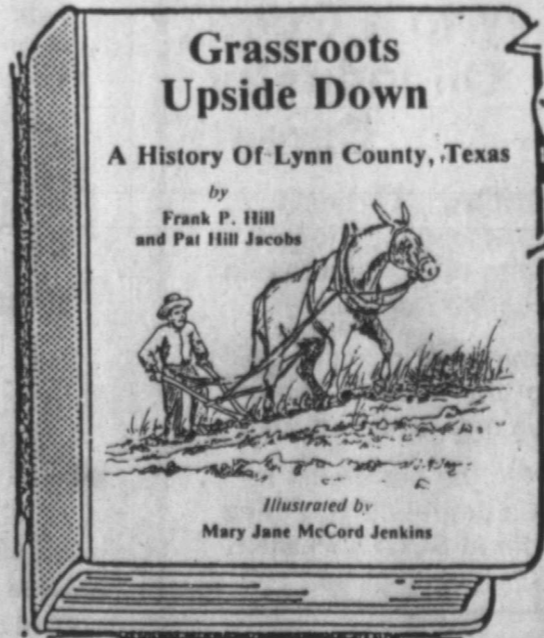

The progress of scientific efforts to help farmers and agribusiness solve production problems of the Texas High Plains will be on display Sept. 9 at the 77th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) at Lubbock and Halfway.

The Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center just north of Lubbock International Airport is the site of this year's program, said Dr. John Abernathy, resident director of research at the station.

Field tours of research projects will begin at 1 p.m. and will feature four major stops which highlight new techniques and products for weed control; the integrated "farming systems" approach to production; cotton breeding to meet customer demands; cotton stripper adjustment; home and commercial grape production; efforts to control the effects of temperature, rain and wind on crops and use of remote sensing to estimate crop stress and predict crop growth.

### LETTER TO PARENTS

Instructions: Modify the letter to accurately communicate the programs operated by the school and complete the blanks with the appropriate information.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Tahoka Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 1.00 and breakfast for 50c.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

**REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

**FOSTER CHILDREN:** If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:
