

## Burglar Caught Leaving Building

O'Donnell Police Chief Billy Jack Bairrington surprised a burglar inside O'Donnell Auto Supply on Doak St. in that city just after midnight Friday. Bairrington saw someone in the store and waited outside, where he arrested the man as he exited with a box filled with tools from the store.

Simon Ruelas, 28, of O'Donnell, then was taken to Lynn County jail, and on Tuesday he pleaded guilty of burglary before District Judge George Hansard, who assessed a 10-year prison term, probated.

Tahoka police last week investigated two forgeries, one each at Thriftway and Venture Foods during the past week. The investigation revealed that a female suspect residing in Post had reportedly stolen some checks in a burglary in Post. Police located the suspect and she was assessed a three-year probated sentence after she pleaded guilty.

Police investigated a burglary that occurred between Monday and Wednesday at Riddle's garage, located on South 3rd and Ave. H. Approximately \$450 worth of tools were stolen. Lynn County Crime Line has offered a \$250 reward leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for this incident.

Police investigated an accident on Monday at 1400 Ave J and South 2nd that involved a 1982 Cadillac driven by Angela Rene Draper of Tahoka. Her vehicle was reported to have struck a curb

and sidewalk due to loss of control on a wet road surface. No injuries were reported.

Police investigated an accident on Tuesday at 1400 Ave. K and South 1st that involved a 1984 GMC pickup driven by Eddie C. Scott of Lubbock and a 1982 Ford driven by Daniel Lee Cooper of Plainview. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were the forgery suspect, Ruelas and one person each on charges of indecency with a child and disorderly conduct.

### Bulldog Booster Club Elects New Officers

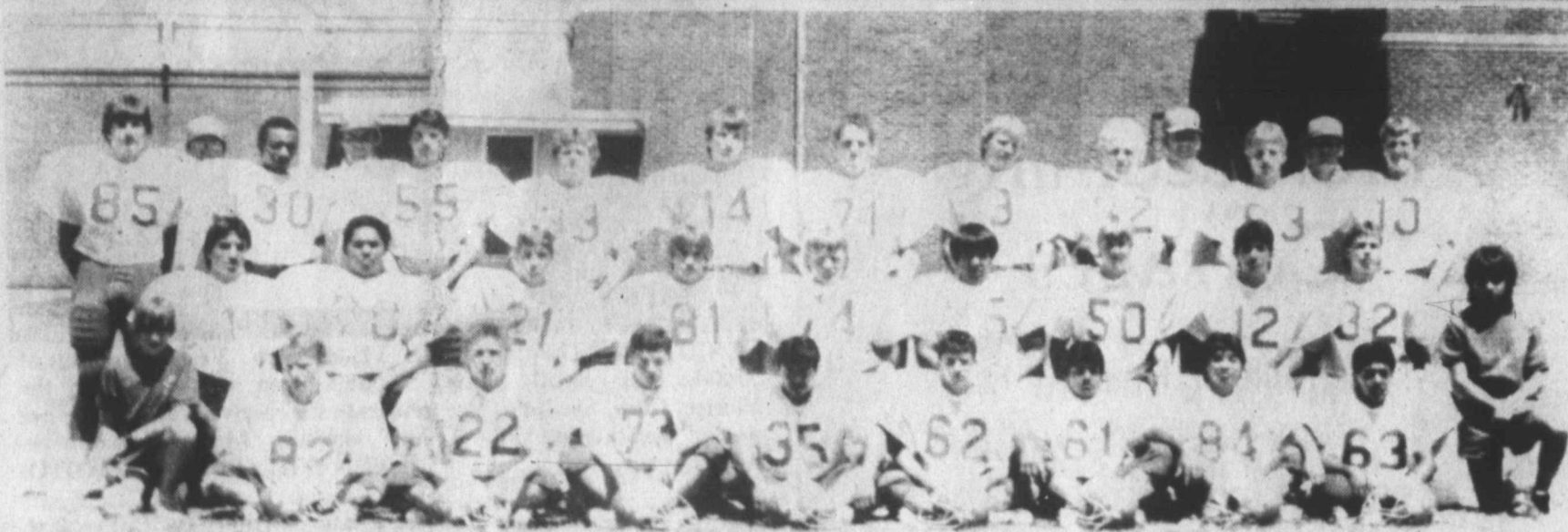

## Dogs To Open Grid Season At Plains

The Tahoka Bulldogs will show a new look on offense and hopefully a new look on the scoreboard as they open the 1986 football season at Plains Friday.

Coach Ted Wiley in his first

year as head coach here will operate a veer offense, which means quarterback Randy Taylor may be running with the ball frequently, and the Bulldogs also will sometimes run from and I formation, Wiley said. With a veteran backfield of Taylor, running backs Todd Nance and transfer Mike McDonald and flanker back Marty Hammonds, the Bulldogs also will start an offensive front line that averages about 200 pounds despite having a 140-pound guard and 170-pound center.

Plains this year will not be a district contest, as the two teams are no longer in the same district. Last year the Cowboys beat Tahoka 35-7 behind the passing of QB Shane McMinn, who is still around to throw the ball. Pass defense was Tahoka's greatest weakness last season--

and for the last four losing seasons--and hopefully there will be some improvement in this area.

Last Thursday the Bulldogs had their last scrimmage, butting heads with players from Ropesville. The two teams scored once each.

Friday night's game at Plains starts at 8 p.m.

Season tickets for all Tahoka home football games are now on sale at the school business office. For the five home games the price is \$17.50.

### City Adopts New Budget For Year

After a public hearing at which no citizens appeared, the City of Tahoka Monday night adopted a budget for the coming year calling for expenditure of \$320,739 in general operating funds.

Councilmen also approved applications for housing assistance and heard a monthly report on activities of the police department from Chief Gary Morrison.

### Wagon Train To Arrive In Tahoka Today

The Texas Lone Star Wagon Train, a reorganized group made up of approximately 10 wagons from the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train which visited Tahoka May 8, will visit the city again today (Thursday), scheduled to arrive this afternoon from Post on U.S. 380.

The wagon train will camp overnight at the compress yard, same campsite as was used by the May 8 group.

From Tahoka the wagons will go to West Point between Brownfield and Tahoka and will camp there Friday night.

### Friends, Family To Honor Howell On 100th Birthday

Tahoka historian Belton Howell, whose CB handle is "The Old Timer" will be the honoree at a reception Sunday, ushering him into the second century of his life.

Family and friends will greet him from 2 to 4 p.m. at the First National Bank Party Room hosted by the Wade Howell family of Odessa.

Howell, who will be 100 years old Tuesday, Sept. 9, came to Tahoka in 1902 in a covered wagon from Hereford. Now the only survivor of his family, he resides in Odessa near his son Wade; however, he is in Tahoka frequently for various events, the most recent being his ride in

the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train on May 8.

In 1915 he and Birdie Walters were married in Brownfield and they made their home in Tahoka until the late 1970's when they moved to Odessa to be near their only child. Mrs. Howell died in March of this year after 70 years of marriage that Howell describes as a "perfect and indescribable love story."

There are three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, all of whom will be on hand to help celebrate the rare occasion of a 100th birthday.

## OUT OF THE WOODS

WELL, SCHOOL days are finally here. I remember well my very first day of school. My twin sister and I dressed just alike, down to our ankle socks and penny loafers, in anticipation and a little bit of fear of our first day at this huge building called "school." Mom's got a picture of us (as all good Mothers do) standing outside our home in our new red dresses, my brother in crisp new blue jeans, and the dog peeping out from behind his legs, all set to take on the world.

Much to my dismay, things didn't work out quite as I thought they should, because the first thing they did was separate my sister and I, putting us in different rooms. The very idea! I mean, up to this point in our lives, we had done everything, just everything, side by side, me for her, her for me, and united we stand.

So, I did the only thing that occurred to me at the time -- I dropped my head to my desk and cried ... all day long, non-stop. I think I used my whole box of Kleenex (I can see why this was a required item). Finally, in desperation, my teacher called in my sister to hold my hand and comfort me. She, as it turned out, was doing just fine and taking all these obstacles in stride.

Well, the awful day finally ended, and when I got home I sobbed to Mom what a terrible place it was and that I never wanted to go back. So, the next day when I, of course,

had to go back, I cried all day again. This went on for quite some time, with my sister allowed to come in and comfort me periodically. Mom would come up to the school where she, in turn, would cry on my teacher's shoulder (which was a pretty good feat in itself, as my sweet little old teacher was only about 4'10").

I don't remember when it finally occurred to me that, like it or not, I was going to have to stick it out without my sister. My teacher, I'm sure, was relieved that I had stopped the 'waterworks', and she could finally get on with her classwork. Poor Mom -- I think it was harder for her than it was for me, watching her tearful child who thought she was so mistreated.

However, after the first few "traumatic" weeks, I settled into the routine and learned that school wasn't such a bad place after all. And my teacher, bless her heart, treated me with loving gentleness and taught me to enjoy education. She will always have a special place in my heart.

There's a saying that "your sins will come back to haunt you in your children." My son will start school next year, and I hope to goodness he takes to it better than I did. I'm not sure how I will cope with it if he doesn't, so teachers beware... and no, you can't draw straws to see who has to take him!

## GM Interest Cut Spurs Car Sales Here

When General Motors cut interest rates on financing new 1986 cars and pickups to a record-low 2.9 per cent last Thursday, it caught other car manufacturers by surprise and spurred sales of 1986 GM cars to new heights as buyers rushed in to take advantage of the low rates.

In Tahoka, H.B. McCord of McCord Motor Co., which sells Oldsmobiles, Pontiacs, Buicks and GMC pickups, said sales of new units since the 2.9 rate was announced have been at record levels. McCord said the dealership sold more vehicles Thursday and Friday than in any two-day period since 1938.

The 2.9 rate on new 1986 cars will continue for a few weeks, McCord said. The dealership still was selling 86 models this week at a good pace, having replaced some of those sold earlier with models obtained from other dealers.

Commitment is turning from self to give that self into the keeping of Christ, believing in what He is and what He is saying; giving yourself to Him to do as He wills to do in you and with you.

The story of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-24) is a good example of sin, repentance and commitment, and the opening sentence of this writing is based on this story. Have you really started eating nourishing food, and living with your heavenly Father in the daily cleansing of His word and His presence, and at His loving directions? Then you have begun to prove the convictions and truth of your faith.

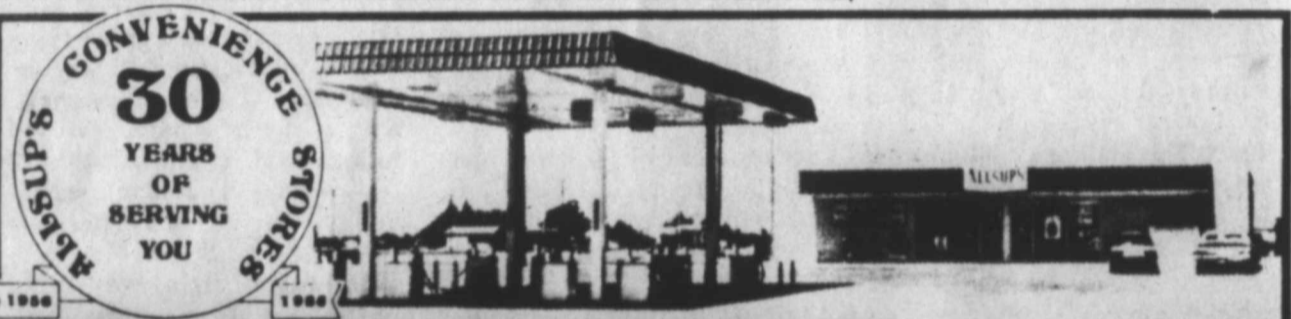
So, what is faith? Faith is part emotion, but is based on Christ Jesus, who is the

author of it, and also the finisher of it. (He molds, sands, shapes, and polishes as we live by Him — sometimes it hurts — but He keeps us eternally!)

"Now faith is the substance (made of) of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

How can you get faith? If you want truth, if you search for it you must do it by faith. But saving faith in God is more than intellect (although reason and faith should go hand-in-hand), more than knowledge, more than evidence that God exists; saving faith finally is giving one's spirit into God's Spirit in perfect love, trust and conviction that He is willing and able to keep what one has committed unto Him. "Faith, hope, love" — but to have hope and love, you must also have faith. Saving faith is a daily saving help.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ? For by God's "grace are ye saved, through faith." 2 Corinthians 5:1-10. Paul knew first hand the weakness, suffering and rejection of apostles of Christ. As he reflects on dying, he speaks of faith, "If the earthly tent be destroyed, we have a house not made with hands." "We are always of good courage, for we walk by faith not by sight."

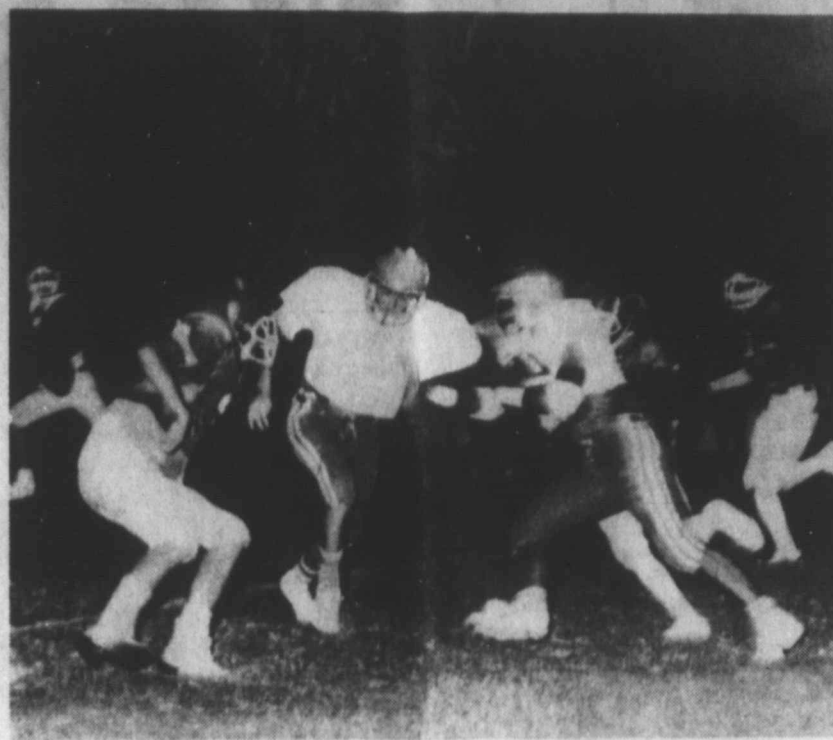
