

Commitment is turning from self to give that self into the keeping of Christ, believing in what He is and what He is saying; giving yourself to Him to do as He wills to do in you and with you.

The story of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-24) is a good example of sin, repentance and commitment, and the opening sentence of this writing is based on this story. Have you really started eating nourishing food, and living with your heavenly Father in the daily cleansing of His word and His presence, and at His loving directions? Then you have begun to prove the convictions and truth of your faith.

So, what is faith? Faith is part emotion, but is based on Christ Jesus, who is the

author of it, and also the finisher of it. (He molds, sands, shapes, and polishes as we live by Him sometimes it hurts - but He

keeps us eternally!) "Now faith is the substance (made of) of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

How can you get faith? If you want truth, if you search for it you must do it by faith. But saving faith in God is more than intellect (although reason and faith should go hand-in-hand), more than knowledge, more than evidence that God exists; saving faith finally is giving one's spirit into God's Spirit in perfect love, trust and conviction that He is willing and able to keep what one has committed unto Him. "Faith, hope, love" - but to have hope and love, you must also have faith. Saving faith is a daily saving help.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ? For by God's "grace are ye saved, through faith." 2 Corinthians 5:1-10. Paul knew first hand the weakness, suffering and rejection of apostles of Christ. As he reflects on dying, he speaks of faith, "If the earthly tent be destroyed, we have a house not made with hands." "We are always of good courage, for we walk by faith not by sight."
