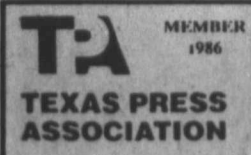

Bulldogs Lose Opener, To Host Owls Friday

Tahoka's Bulldogs failed to break a long losing streak in last Friday's opening football game at Plains, but did play a good game defensively and showed they have some tough youngsters who should be able to win some games this season.

Plains won the game 14-0, scoring touchdowns in the first and third periods, while the Bulldogs twice drove down around the Cowboys' 10-yard line but couldn't score. Yardage, first downs and costly fumbling were all about even for the two teams.

This week the Bulldogs open a three-game home stand, hosting Hale Center, which was beaten last week by New Deal 40-12. Last year Hale Center was the only team Tahoka beat, and the Dogs did that handily, winning 45-12, but the Owls still got into the playoffs while Tahoka never

won again all year. Game time Friday night is 8 p.m.

New Deal was the only District 4-AA team to win last week. Seagraves lost to Stanton 26-6, Shallowater lost to Idalou 17-3, Morton was beaten by Stratford 12-7, Crosbyton lost to Floydada 29-8, Ralls was clipped 36-0 by Lockney and Spur lost to Aspermont 16-6.

Tahoka missed a scoring chance the first time the Dogs got the ball after the opening kickoff, driving to a first at the Plains 16, but eventually losing the ball on

downs at the 20. In that drive were runs of 17 yards by QB Randy Taylor and runs of 17 and 18 by Todd Nance, who was the leading rusher of the game with 97 yards in 20 carries.

Plains scored with 2:27 left in the first on a 33-yard pass play from Shane McMinn to Scott Lowrey, but missed the extra point and it was 6-0.

For most of the game, however, the hustling Bulldog defensive backs and hard rushing by the line kept the heralded Cowboys passing attack in check. Jim Patterson intercepted one pass and the secondary, especially John Aldous, harassed Plains receivers all evening.

Plains scored again in the third after Tahoka lost a fumble at the Bulldogs 25. Michael Diaz scored on a pitchout from the 15, and also ran for two points to make it 14-0.

In the second half, Tahoka's leading rusher was big Mike McDonald, who showed lots of power once he got moving. For the game, McDonald had 60 yards on 11 carries, with 51 of those yards coming in the second half. He also threw a 28-yard pass to flanker Marty Hammonds just before the end of the first half.

Aldous and tackle George Morin and tackle Ronnie Dunn recovered fumbles for Tahoka in the fourth period, and the Dogs threatened, but couldn't get across the goal line. McDonald at defensive end, David Brooks at linebacker and tackle Gary Daniell also did good work on defense for Tahoka. Starting tackle Oscar Gutierrez suffered an ankle injury and was taken to a Lubbock hospital for treatment. Gutierrez was wearing a cast on the ankle, which apparently was not broken, but badly sprained, and will be out of action for a few weeks.

School, County Tax Rates Are Lowered

Tahoka Independent School District board of trustees did a bit of wrangling over how much to lower taxes for the coming year but finally settled on a 14-cent reduction at a called meeting Saturday.

After two motions to set tax rates, first at 70 cents, then at 74 cents, failed, a motion to set the rate at 72 cents per \$100 valuation was passed by a vote of 3-2. President Joe Hays did not vote and board member Nedra Young

was not present.

The tax rate for the school has been 86 cents for the last several years, with 8 cents of this set aside for paying off bonded indebtedness. The last outstanding bonds were paid off during the last year and this automatically would lower the rate by 8 cents. The school has been operating on 78 cents and now will operate at 72 cents.

Present were members Hays, Billy Davis, Mike Huffaker, Robert Smith, Jim Wells, and J.E. Nance Jr.

Lynn County Commissioners also voted to lower the county tax rate after adopting a budget for the coming year at Monday's regular meeting. The county will levy taxes at 25.94 cents per \$100 valuation, down less than one cent from the former rate of 26.63 cents. The reduction was made possible, according to County Judge J.F. Brandon,

because total valuations in the county are slightly higher than they were prior to this year's reappraisal of property values.

The county adopted a budget calling for expenditures of about \$1,281,000.

The budget is about \$70,000 higher than last year's. Present at Monday's meeting were commissioners Boyd Barnes, Eldon Gattis and Bart Anderson. Commissioner J.T. Miller was ill and could not attend.

Lynn County Hospital District has set taxes at 15 cents per \$100 valuation, the same as last year, and the City of Tahoka recently lowered its rate to 45 cents, 4 cents less than before.

The school board also voted Saturday to hire Sherri McCord as elementary teacher, and voted to seek bids on re-roofing of Tubb elementary and cafeteria and for repair of the Gardner Elementary roof.

Krey Named President Of Bank Here

John Krey, who has been acting president of the First National Bank of Tahoka since Aug. 15, has been officially named as president of the bank effective Sept. 1, in action taken at a meeting of directors Aug. 27.

Krey has a degree in general business with a minor in agricultural economics from Texas Tech. He graduated from Shallowater High School. He is president of Tahoka Rotary Club and a former director of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce.

He and his family attend First Baptist Church of Tahoka; the family includes his wife, Cheryl and children Connor, 10, and Kalie, 5.

Krey was in the Naval Reserve and served two years active duty in the Mediterranean and Caribbean, finishing as a petty officer 2nd class in 1970. He came to First National Bank in 1982 after four years with Production Credit Assn. in Lubbock. Since 1985 he has been senior vice president and loan officer at the bank.

Tahoka Girl Among Program Semifinalists

National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) today released the names of some 15,000 young men and women across the country who are being honored as semifinalists in the current Merit Program. Academically talented high school seniors in all of the 50 states have qualified as semifinalists and will have an opportunity to advance in the 1987 competition for about 6,000 Merit Scholarships worth more than \$21 million.

In the fall of 1985, more than one million juniors in 19,000 U.S. secondary schools entered this competition by taking the PSAT/NMSQT, the qualifying test for the Merit Program. The top scorers in every state, representing about half of one percent of the state's high school graduating class, are included in the nationwide semifinalist pool.

Swing Bed Program Now Offered Here

Lynn County Hospital is in the process of starting another program of providing additional care to medically ill patients during their convalescence, administrator John Brooks said this week. The hospital recently was surveyed by Medicare for implementing a "Swing Bed" program in the hospital. The Swing Bed program works in this way: When patients admitted to hospital improve enough to be discharged from the hospital, but have no one at home to help care for them, they may be discharged as hospital patients and admitted to the Swing Bed program without being removed from the bed or room they had occupied. Service and care provided will almost be the same as patients in hospital receive. The rate per day will be less expensive than a private or semi-private room charge. They will be allowed to move around the hospital with more freedom than when they were a patient.

The service being offered now of medical, surgical, obstetrical and emergency care will continue to be available to all patients that need this service without interruption.

"The Swing Bed" program is just another service Lynn County Hospital is attempting to offer the public for health care in your local hospital," Brooks said. There is also a Home Health Service owned and operated by Lynn County Hospital that provides home care to patients who do not have to be in the hospital or Swing Bed program, but who need skilled nursing care and hospital attention at home under the supervision of their doctor.

School. Miss Hays already is enrolled at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and if her application to be a finalist in the Merit Scholarship program is approved, could receive scholarship help in her studies at MIT.

To be considered for Merit Scholarships, these semifinalists must advance to finalist standing by documenting high academic performance, being endorsed and recommended by their high schools, taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test and confirming their qualifying test performance, and submitting information about their school and community activities, personal interests, and goals. About 90 percent (or 13,500) of the semifinalists are expected to meet the rigorous standards required to become finalists in the Merit Program and to compete for one of several types of Merit Scholarships to be offered in 1987. About 40 percent of the distinguished finalists will receive an award and all Merit Scholars will be chosen from the finalist group.

Every finalist will be considered for one of 1,800 single-payment National Merit \$2000 Scholarships, allocated on a state representation basis in proportion to each state's total of U.S. high school seniors. Winners in each state will be chosen by a selection committee.

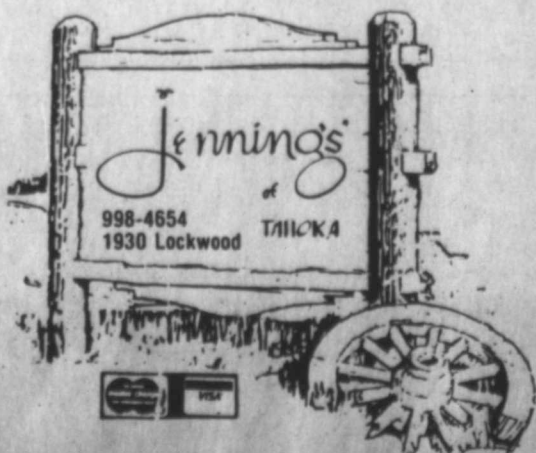

Record Number Jailed Here On Liquor Charges

ATTENTION: GTE CUSTOMERS IN WILSON

General Telephone will offer an optional customer exchange program to all Wilson customers. This exchange program will be in effect Thursday, June 5, through Friday, September 5, 1986.

The exchange program is being offered to single line residential and business customers with leased equipment who wish to exchange their present rotary dial for touch dial equipment. These customers may do so by bringing their telephones to the Tahoka Local Service office, located at Murray's Florist, 1537 Avenue J, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The equipment exchange is on a voluntary basis, and any customer who wishes to continue with current rotary equipment may do so.

The current rate for single line residential service is \$8.55 plus Extended Area Service (EAS) \$1.35 and \$2.00 access charge. For single business line service, the rate is \$22.15 plus EAS \$3.55 and \$2.00 access charge. Depending on the style of equipment the customer selects, the monthly customer rental rate may vary. Regulated customers (those customers who have not changed any service since January 1, 1982) who turn in their equipment will change automatically to a deregulated rate base, since all regulated equipment stocks have been depleted. Deregulated customers see a slightly higher monthly rental charge. During this special 90 day period, between June 5 and September 5, 1986, the usual handling fee for touch call service of \$8.00 for residential customers or \$13.50 for business customers has been waived. The monthly rate for touch call dialing is \$2.00 for residential customers and \$2.50 for business customers.

This exchange program is being offered in conjunction with the May conversion of the Wilson central office to computerized switching. The switch, which is designed to process touch call dialing, requires rotary dialing to be converted into touch call dialing signals, with the result that rotary dialing is much slower and more expensive than touch call dialing. General Telephone would like to offer the opportunity to Wilson customers to upgrade their telephones with as little inconvenience and cost as possible.

PUBLIC NOTICE
 BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
 Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
 Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment would also eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
 House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
 Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

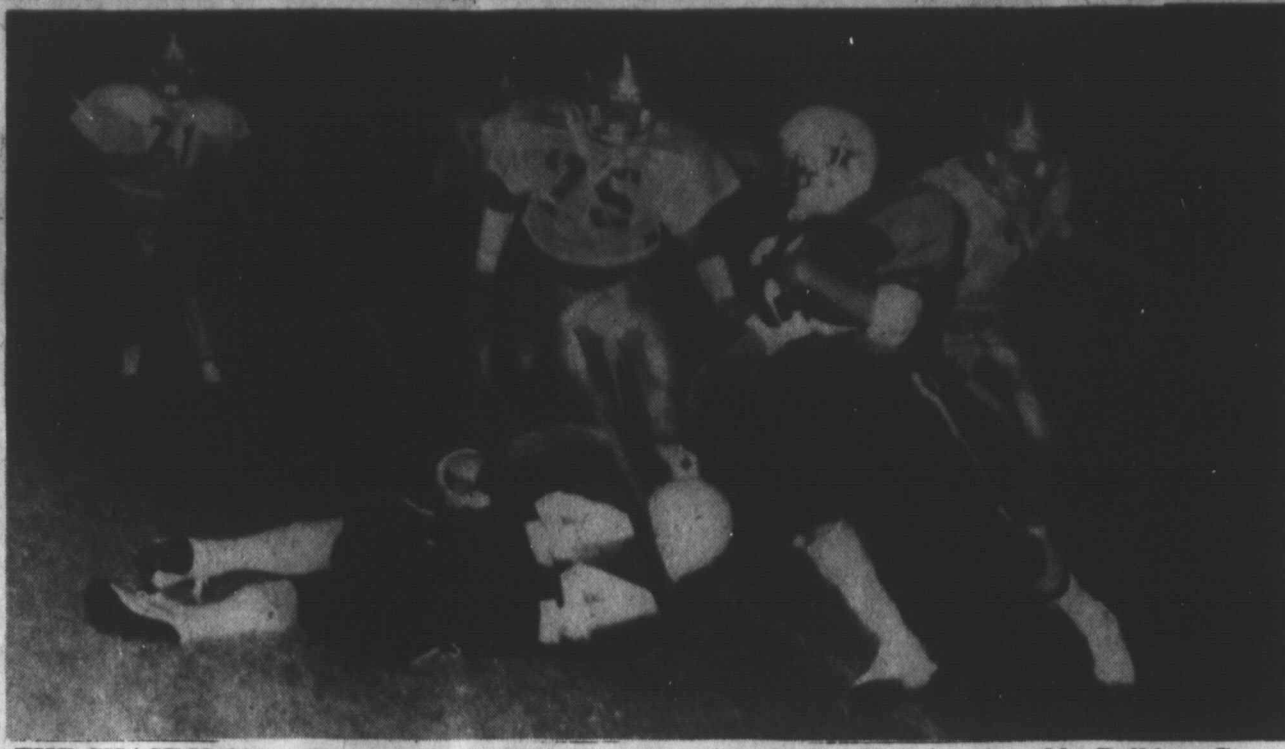
