## 'Tahoko' Mural Depicts Scene Of Area History

The importance of Tahoka Lake as a campsite for Comanche In-
dians about 136 years ago is depicted in the recently-finished mural 'Tahoko' by respected Tahoka artist Bill Craig, whose oil painting in the southeast corner of the new portion of Pioneer Museum will be
unveiled and officially dedicated Sept. 20 in conjunction with the Harvest Festival.
The oil painting on plaster is 8 feet high and 23 feet 6 inches wide, going approximately 12 feet along each wall from the corner, It took Craig 300 hours to complete the work. It is his first mural, although he is weli-known as a painter and sculptor of western art in the Southwest
region.
'Tahoko', which is the title of the painting, is a derivative of a Comregion.

Craig did considerable research on the history of the lake and after photographing the terrain, did the painting showing his conception of what would have been going on at the site around 1850 . There are Indians, horses, other animals and wildlife shown in the mural. "The
terrain today is just about like it would have been in 1850," Craig terrain today is just about like it would have been in 1850," Crais
said, "except it would have been clear where it now is grown up in
mesquites."
David Murrah, director of the Southwest Collections at Texas Tech,
provided a chronological outline of Tahoka Lake over the years, calling the lake an "important campsite for Indians, buffalo hunters, the Murrah's sheepherders and ranchers.

New Mexican Sheepherders, 1860s - 1880 -these people drove herds out of New Mexico to the plains during the summer and fall and were here when the Texas cattiemen began to push into the region;
U.S. Army - first penetrated th U.S. Army - first penetrated the region in 1871 and comphater in 1874 and 1875. Mackenzie camped at Tahoka Lake on Nov. 4, 1874 and on Dec. 4, 1874 . In July 1877, a unit of the 10 Cavalry under Nicholas Nolan camped at Double Lakes, and then chased Indians into New Mexico,
only to become lost and spend 86 hours on the South Plains without water. This was the famous "Lost Nigger Expedition," so named because all of the soldiers except Nolan were black.

a watering place for trail herds moving south to north. C.C. Slaughter used it frequently in 1886 when he sold 10,000 head of cattle to the XIT Ranch and drove these cattle from his ranch near Big Spring north to the XIT Once his herd stampeded into the dry lake bed, sending up yesight. In 1898, C.C. Slaughter acquired the Tahoka
and Lake Ranch and operated it until he lost his leases in 1902 . The Tahoka Lake Ranch was the target of farmer J.E. Ketner's suit against Slaughter and the Texas Land Com-
nissioner which resulted in the loss of the ranchers' ability missioner which resulted in the loss of the ranchers' ability
to continue leasing public lands. The Ketner suit caused the state to allow filing for title on public school land and
directly contributed to the breaking up of the big ranch directly contributed to the breaking up of the big ranch empires on the South Plains. From other sources, Craig gathered more information about the
lake site. He noted that the City of Tahoka was organized near the
location in 1903, and that the alkaline lake is four miles northeast of location in 1903, and that the alkaline lake is four miles northeast of
town and a mile east of FM 400 . The scene shown in the mural is looktown and a mile east of FM 400. The scene shown in the mural is look-
ing to the east on the right and to the north on the left, showing an ing to the east on the right and to the north on the left, showing an
area approximately a half mile wide and three miles long. The lake is filled with runoff water and has several small springs along the west side which still are good drinking water.
side which still are good drinking water.
The property shown in the painting is mostly now owned by Meldon
Leslie and Auda Norman of Tahoka.
"Many kinds of wildlife lived in the draws, gulleys and on the
plateaus surrounding the lake," Craig said. The lake water is not good for drinking, so wild life including antelope and hundreds of buffalo drank from the springs along the lake. The buffalo provided the main means of survival for the Indians, who ate the meat and used the skins
for clothing and shelter. or clothing and shelter.
Just a few hundred yards from the scene in the mural are definite re-
mains of a large buffalo wallow. Numerous Indian artifacts have been found in the area and some are on display in the museum.
On top of the large hill to the left are several gravesites of Comanche Indians. In the 1850s the plains around the lake were knee high
with grama grass the more arid parts were covered with mesquite grasses. Several species of cacti and a few juniper trees can be found, grasses. Several species of cacti and a the upper rim of the lake. There were few, if any, mes-
mostly quite trees during the period depicted; some think they were brought here by early white settlers.
Comanche tribes dominated the Plains region from about the 1650 s to the late 1800 s, commanding an area from Kansas south through the
Concho Valley to the Rio Grande. These nomadic tribes moved from north to south in families and groups. Spanish explorers introduced horses to the Comanches in their exploration of Texas in the 1600s. In 1800 the Comanche tribe was the largest of all and their braves
rode the best mounts. Because of their numbers and sidled rode the best mounts. Because of their numbers and skilled horseman-
ship, they were feared by the Apaches to the west, but these enemies sometimes would call temporary truces and meet and trade at the Tahoka Lake springs.
