





Under the law, some prescriptions cannot be refilled under any circumstances—even if the doctor requests



State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling; \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the onepercent city tax.



Cline Praises Farm Law: Speaking to National Cotton Council directors at their fall meeting in Memphis, President Lloyd Cline described the 1986 cotton program as "the right move at an extremely critical time." He said the program is working just as the industry designed it to work.

"It's helping our farmers maintain income while making our cotton price-competitive at home and abroad."

Cline said, however, that the program must be allowed to continue in its current form if it is to maintain its momentum. The Lamesa, Tex., producer added that retaining the farm program without further changes could be as difficult as the fight to achieve the 1985 bill.

Cotton Program Working: The 1986 farm program has dramatically reestablished U.S. cotton as a price-competitive industry at home and overseas, says Dr. Dean Ethridge, director of the National Cotton Council's economic services.

He noted that U.S. cotton exports for 1986/87 are projected at 6.5 million bales or nearly triple those for last year. Projected offtake is 13.3 million bales--up 59 percent from last season and 21 percent above the average of the spects for a larger offtake could conceivably result in ending stocks of around 6 million bales in contrast to last year's 9.4 million.

The economist said the program also has (1) moved cotton out of the government loan into the market, and (2) accelerated foreign production adjustments to lower world carryover stocks. Weevil Eradication Scores: Boll weevil eradication programs

in the Southeast and the Far West are proving to be highly successful both economically and technically, a National Cotton Council official says.

Dr. Andy Jordan, the Council's technical services director, says the typical Southeast cotton grower has gotten a return of nearly \$2.50 for each dollar he has invested in the program. This year only 35 weevils were caught in the eradicated South Carolina zone and none at all in North Carolina.

In California and Arizona, weevil populations already have been reduced 98 percent from the level they were last year when the program started.

'Grown & Made' Gets Boost: The National Cotton Council's Letter to campaign to offset the rising tide of textile imports has received a boost as the result of a \$40,000 grant to the Cotton Foundation from Union Carbide's Agricultural Products Department.







************* Social Security

Should Start Retirement Planning People in the South Plains area who are thinking about retiring at the end of the year should seriously begin making plans now.

And, these plans should include Social Security. There are several considerations.

A person who plans to retire before age 65 should know that if he or she plans to start getting Social Security benefits, these benefits will be reduced. Social Security benefits are permanently reduced for people who start getting them between 62 and 65.

The amount of the reduction depends on the number of months benefits are received before age 65. Also, benefits can be paid only for months the person is eligible throughout the entire month. This means that unless a person is born on the first or second day of the month, he or she cannot receive a benefit for the month of his or her 62nd birth-

Farm Credit Banks File Suit



Also, a person who applies for benefits before age 65 generally cannot get benefits for any month before the month he or she applies. A person who applies after reaching age 65 can get. benefits for up to 6 months before the month of application but not before the month he or she became 65.

Other factors can influence a person's decision about retirement. Availability of a company pension can influence decision. So can a person's ability to continue working.

Once a person decides to retire, he or she should contact Social Security 2 or 3 months before the month benefits are to start. And, even if a person has no retirement plans, he or she should apply for Medicare health insurance 2 or 2 months before his or her 65th birthday to arrange for this protection.


A person needs certain information when applying. This includes:

His or her Social Security card or a record of the number. Proof of date of birth, preferably an official record or birth or baptism recorded before age 5.


Form W-2 or self-employment ax return, including Schedule SE, for the previous year.

A person should not delay applying if all this information is not available. Call the nearest Social Security office. The people there may be able to suggest other evidence that may be used. 





Devotional

SCRIPTURE: Exodus 24:12-18 Matthew 17:1-9

Reading from Exodus. Moses went upon Mount Sinai. A cloud covered it six days and on the seventh day, God (Yahweh) called to Moses from the cloud, and the glory of the Lord was like a burning, devouring fire.

This scripture in Matthew is the narrative of the transfiguration of the Lord. Jesus led Peter, James and John up a high mountain apart. There He was transfigured, and Moses the lawgiver and Elijah the Prophet appeared with Jesus, a brought cloud overshadowed them and a voice said, "This is My beloved Son, listen to Him." And the three disciples were filled with awe.

The glory of the Lord settled on a holy mountain, and the human response is awe and fear. This kind of fear which gripped Peter, James and John was a reverent or holy fear of the Lord, and they fell on their faces in awe. Only when Jesus touched them, saying, "Rise, and

have no fear," did they dare to lift their eyes. Then these New Testament Christians, who loved and remembered the transfiguration found themselves again and again in clouded and windswept places, yet in every peril and agony and terrifying thing, these did not overcome them. Their heads were up and their hearts were bold. They had been to the mountain! So now they could live and serve Him down in the valley. When someone complain-

ed about life's tragedies, demanding that God give full explanation of the awfulness here, these New Testament men looked at far deeper realities and mysteries, more tremendous until they finally lead us to that Cross.

"There is God's beloved Son," they say, "That's what happened to Him in this world of God, and with God in charge. Now, listen to Him. Follow Him. He will lead you to the other side of darkness."

Christ is truly the Messiah, God's annointed One, the One who is right, revealing the final truth about the nature of God, which is perfect love.

Peter said, "We heard His voice ... we were with Him on the holy mountain."

Have you been on the mountain top in spirit with God in worship of Him? Then let us serve Him with a joy and peace that this world cannot give us - but Jesus can and does.

Let's listen and praise His name for His forgiveness of our sins, His love and acceptance of us as His church, the body of Christ.



On defense, the Eagles put up a stone wall to completely stymie the Jackrabbits.


