



But that isn't the unusual thing. Their wives have formed a similar organization.

San Antonio now has bunch of quick draw girls who can pull a single action from its holster and fan off a shot in about 1/30 of a second. That's fast work.

They shoot twice a month in the basement of the Tiner Sporting Goods Store, at a cutout known as Pistol Pete. Some are working girls. Others are housewives and






