Bulldogs Crunch Chiefs 62-14

The Tahoka Bulldogs exploded for nine touchdowns last Friday night at Crosbyton in a 62-14 wipeout of the Chiefs which gave the Dogs their second victory in a row and third win of the season. It was the most points scored by a Tahoka team since 1972, when Tahoka beat Levelland 62-13. This ties that game with the most points scored by a Tahoka team since 1945 when the Lynn County News started keeping records. It also left Tahoka at 3-6 for the year and 3-3 in district.

This week the Bulldogs travel to New Deal for their final game of the season, and if they play with the intensity shown in the last two games, will have a chance to upset the tough Lions, who last week bombed Spur 55-0. Credit the offensive line of center David Brooks, guards Mark Vega and Rusty Jennings, tackles George Morin and Gary Daniell and tight end Anthony Justice with much of Tahoka's success, as they have been blocking well in the last few games to give the backs time to develop

their offensive moves. And just about everybody who played defense Friday did it well, keeping Crosbyton bottled up deep in their own end of the field most of the game.

Two touchdowns each were scored by running backs Todd Nance and Mike McDonald and one each was by QB Ramiro Rodriguez, Marty Hammonds, Angel Hernandez, James Antu

nearly 200 votes over Bobby Cox and Jack Miller, who were running on the ballot as independent candidates.

New Mail Schedule Offered In Tahoka

The Tahoka Post Office is offering a new schedule for outgoing mail of all classes. The mail will leave the post office at 11:30 a.m. by truck.

Express mail for next day delivery on special zip codes needs to be in before 11:30 a.m. The same service is offered on Express Mail as Lubbock if mailed before 11:30 a.m.

This mail collection will last for 90 days or longer according to Leonard Dunn, postmaster.

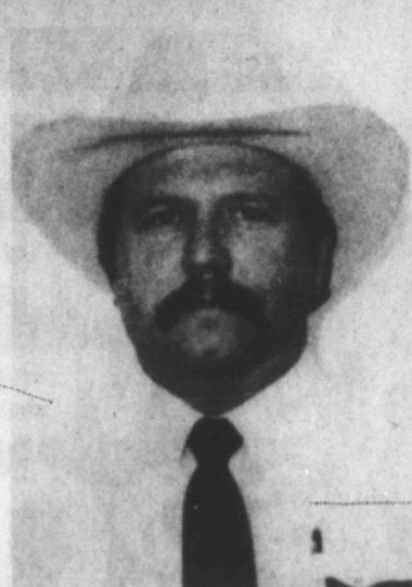

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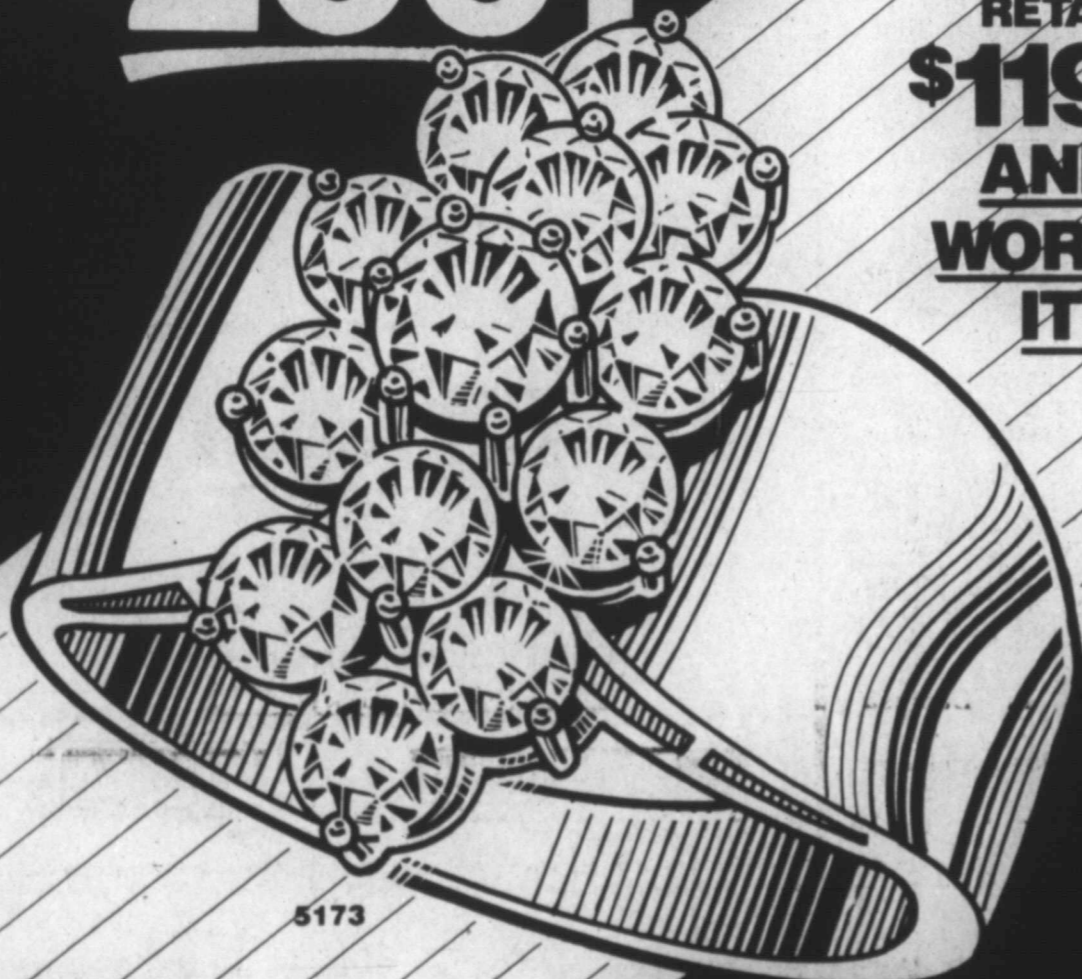

Phebe K. Warner Study Club News

The Phebe K. Warner Study Club sponsored the program "Operation Con Game" on Tuesday, Oct. 28, at the Methodist Church. This program is the first phase of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Project "Stop Elder Abuse". It is estimated that 110,000 elderly or disabled will be victimized this year by fraud.

Because of their physical vulnerability and the fact that many elderly persons live alone, they have a special susceptibility to criminals. The average loss to the victim of fraud is \$2,000. The film "On Guard Bunco" was shown to depict four of the more common fraud schemes. In a question and answer session following the film, Police Chief Gary Morrison stated that the scheme to especially beware of in a community the size of Tahoka is the home repair scam. Be suspicious if someone comes to your door offering you a big discount on roof or driveway repairs with leftover materials from another job he has just completed in the neighborhood.

Citizens are advised to deal only with reputable and preferably, local firms. Door-to-door salesmen (with the exception of local community organizations such as Boy Scouts) are required to have a license issued by the Police Department.

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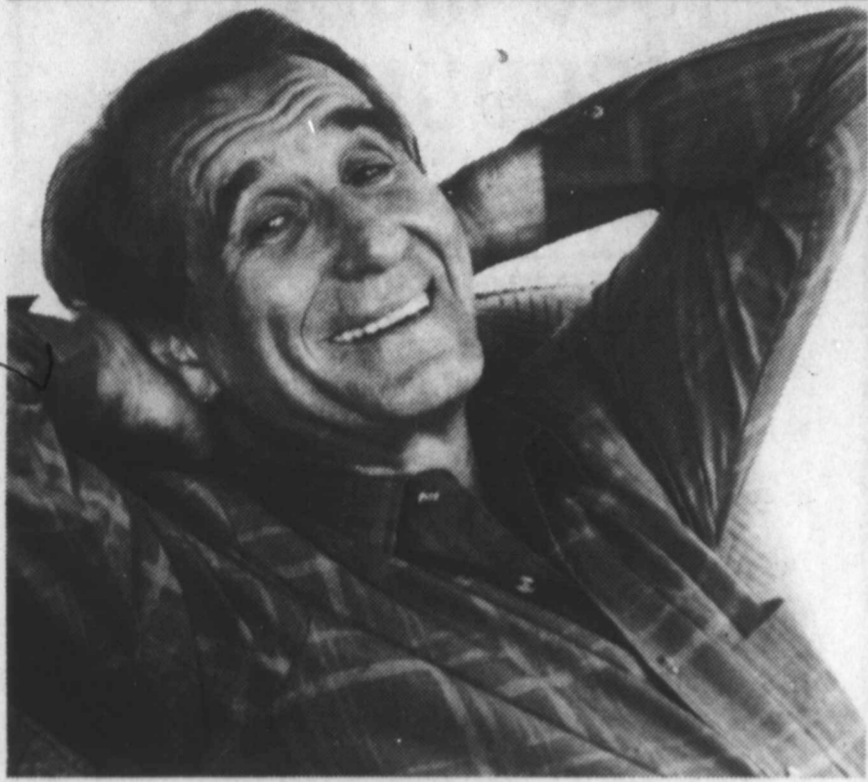

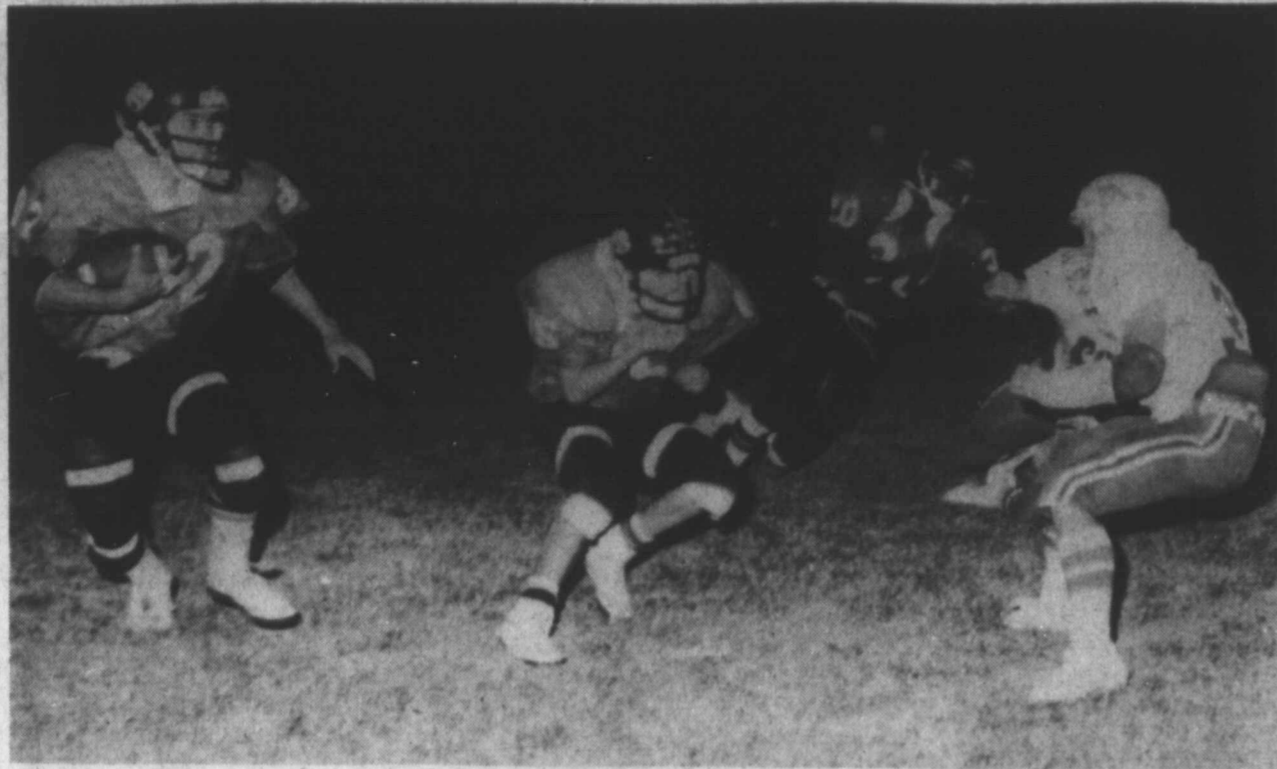
