## Police nab suspects In Drug Raid; More Arrests Expected

Tahoka Police raided two residences in northeast Tahoka last Wednesday, arresting three men and confiscating a quantity of drugs including marijuana and what is believed to be cocaine.

Officers from other departments assisted Tahoka Police in the raids which were the result of a Crime Line tip and information received at the same time by an undercover officer who has been working on drug cases here for the last eight months. Tahoka Police Sgt. Elton Childress obtained from Lackland AFB through a government program a dog trained to sniff out drugs.

Police Chief Gary Morrison said a house on N. 6th was raided after a search warrant was obtained and a 36-year-old man was arrested and officers seized marijuana and the white powder believed to be cocaine.

Shortly after this raid, Morrison said, another search war-

rant was served at a residence on N. 5th and a 23-year-old suspect arrested. Morrison said an undercover Tahoka Police officer had purchased marijuana a short time before, and officers recovered five bags of green plant substance believed to be marijuana.

A third man, 25, was arrested and later paid a fine to the city on charges of failure to identify to a police officer. The 36-year-old suspect and 23-year-old later were released from jail after posting bond on charges of

possession of marijuana and possession of narcotics paraphernalia, plus a charge against the younger man for delivery of marijuana, all of which are misdemeanor charges.

Felony charges against the two are pending analysis of materials seized in the raids, officers indicated.

In related activity, city officers testified before a Lynn County grand jury Monday in reference to several drug related cases, and Morrison said arrests of at least eight more persons who live in Tahoka are anticipated, on charges including sale of cocaine, sale of methamphetamine and sale of marijuana.

Morrison said he also is working with postal authorities in an effort to press charges on one person arrested in the raids who police said had a large amount of homosexual pornographic material.

"It is our intention to continue to fight hard against the sale and use of drugs in Tahoka, and it takes the cooperation of citizens and law officers to effectively combat this nationwide problem," said Morrison.

In other activity this week, a Tahoka residence was burglarized, a battery was stolen off a tractor and the pickup of the county attorney was stolen from in front of his office during daylight hours Monday.

Christy Peasley of 820 S. Ave. L reported to police on Nov. 4 that her residence had been burglarized sometime between Oct. 26 and 31. Reported stolen from a guest bedroom was a silver tool box with red trays that contained one set of Craftsman combination wrenches, two vise grip pliers, one set of drillbits, screwdrivers and numerous other tools. Total value was set at \$500.

County Atty. Jimmy Wright reported a brown 1981 Chevrolet pickup stolen from in front of his office at the corner of Main and Harper Monday. It had not been located by Wednesday morning.

Jack Scott, Rt. 4, Tahoka, reported theft of a battery and a 12-inch Crescent wrench from a John Deere 4020 tractor parked 10 miles west and a mile south of Tahoka on FM 1328 sometime since Nov. 3. Total value of the stolen items was set at \$80.

Police gave tickets for exhibition of acceleration and defective equipment.

### Five Persons Indicted By Grand Jury

Felony indictments were returned against five persons by a 106th District Court grand jury Monday in Tahoka. Those indicted were:

Jose Juan Vasquez, accused of driving while intoxicated on Oct. 26, with two prior convictions.

Mary Lou Brooks of Tahoka, charged with theft over \$750 in connection with currency reported stolen from Summit Venture Foods in January, February and March of 1986.

Manuel Garcia of Tahoka, aggravated assault, with the charges stemming from an incident where he allegedly struck another person intentionally with a motor vehicle on Oct. 2.

Ivory Joe White of Tahoka was charged with delivery of a controlled substance, cocaine, on Sept. 17.

Martin Rodriguez, who had been accused of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle in connection with an incident involving a tractor owned by Nolan Jones of O'Donnell, was cleared of that charge when the grand jury no-billed him.

Name of one person indicted Monday for a felony was withheld by request of officers, since the suspect was not in custody by Wednesday morning.

U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm, Lynn County's representative in Congress, will conduct a town-hall type meeting in Tahoka at noon Monday in the

Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church.

Tahoka Chamberettes will serve the noon meal at \$4 per plate, and Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon said he hopes for a good turnout by persons wanting to hear the popular congressman and ask questions. Stenholm is expected to touch on economic and other issues.

"It's important for the citizens of this community to show up in force Monday and demonstrate that we're all concerned about what's happening—that we're not apathetic," Solomon said.

Stenholm is scheduled to conduct similar meetings in Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell Monday. He will be in O'Donnell at Wayland Taylor, Inc. at 10 a.m., in Wilson at 2 p.m. in the Green Building, and about 3:15 p.m. at the New Home Co-Op Gin.

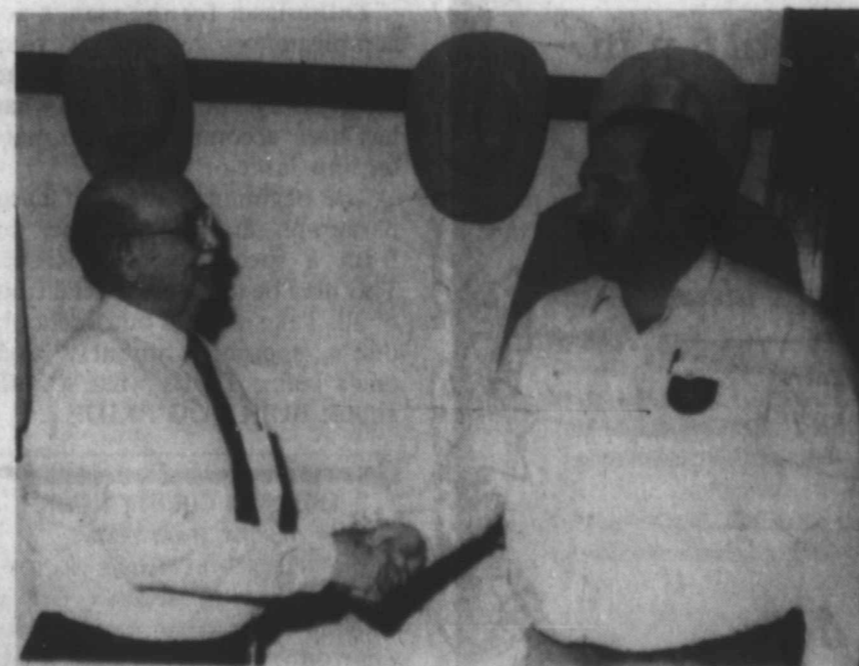

### Sales Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$104.6 million in local sales tax to 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1986 payments to date were down 1.7 percent as compared to the payments to date in November of last year.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and reported to the Comptroller by Oct. 20.

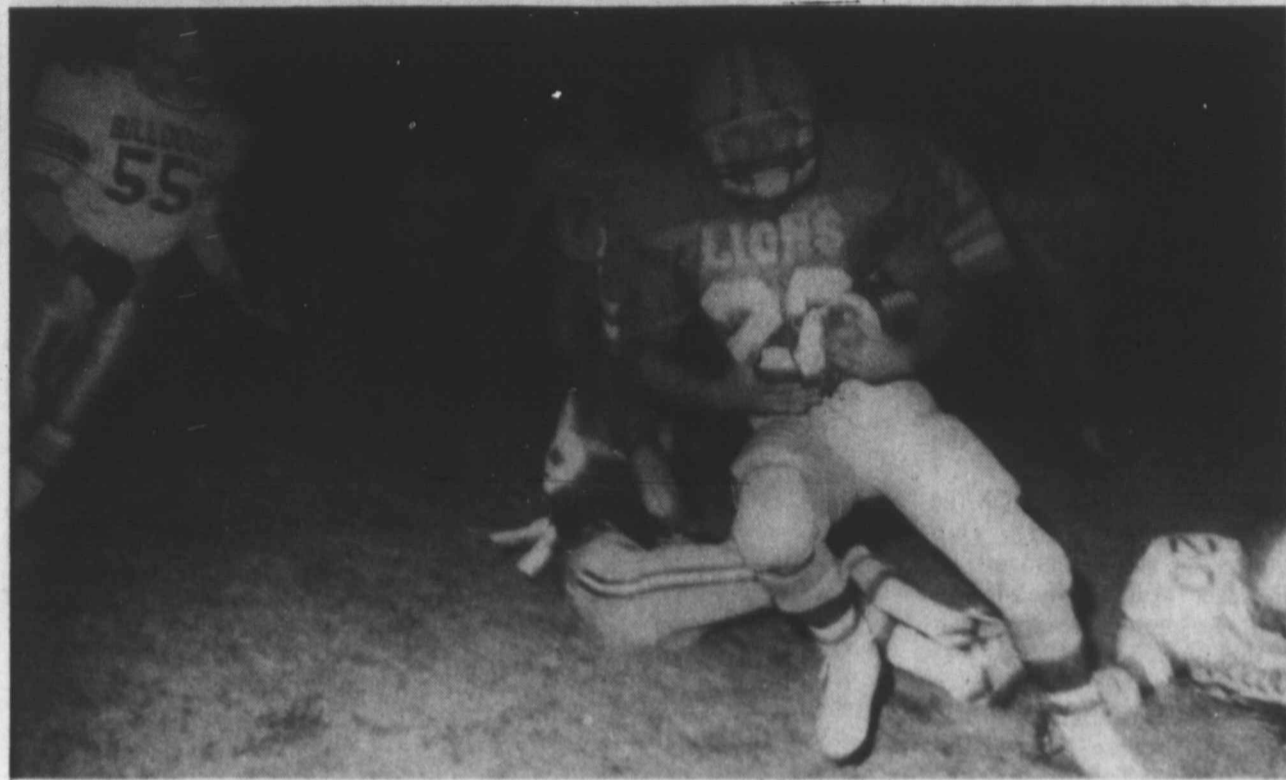

## Lions Devour Dogs In Season Finale

The Tahoka Bulldogs wound up an in-and-out football season on an out note last Friday as the tough New Deal Lions handed Tahoka its worst defeat of the year 57-7.

Despite the big loss and despite the record of 3 wins and 7 losses for the year, it still was the best football season for Tahoka in five years. The three wins were the most in one year since 1981. Alfredo Ramirez rushed for

207 yards and scored two touchdowns, Michael Stephenson scored three times and Shane Boyd twice for New Deal, which started out with 14 points in the first period.

There was one bright spot for Tahoka in the second quarter as sophomore Thomas Glisson intercepted a pass and raced 90 yards for Tahoka's only score. Mike McDonald kicked the point. But Tahoka could never

get any semblance of offense going, making only three first downs in the entire game.

McDonald did have 58 yards in 9 carries, and Todd Nance gained 55 yards in 14 carries. On defense Rusty Jennings at middle linebacker got in some good licks.

Seagraves won district, and Shallowater also gets into the playoffs by virtue of beating Morton last week. Ralls wound up winless for the year as Crosbyton beat Ralls 14-12 Friday for the Chief's second win of the season. Tahoka finished fifth in the 8-team district 4-AA, ahead of the three teams the Bulldogs defeated.

## Hang Gliders To Fly In Tahoka Airshow

Several pilots from throughout Texas will be on hand to demonstrate the sport of hang gliding at the "Tahoka Silent Airshow" on Saturday, Nov. 22. The pilots will "take-off" with the help of an innovative truck-towing system designed by Jerry Forburger of Airtime Of Lubbock. Forburger will also pilot his hang glider in the show.

The show, sponsored by Tahoka Chamberettes, will be from 12 noon until 4 p.m. at the Tahoka T-Bar Airport, located a mile west of Tahoka on U.S. 380 and then a 1/2 mile north. Admission will be a 50-cent donation per car.

The show will be a very informal and casual event, and the public is encouraged to watch the demonstration and talk to the pilots about the sport of hang gliding.

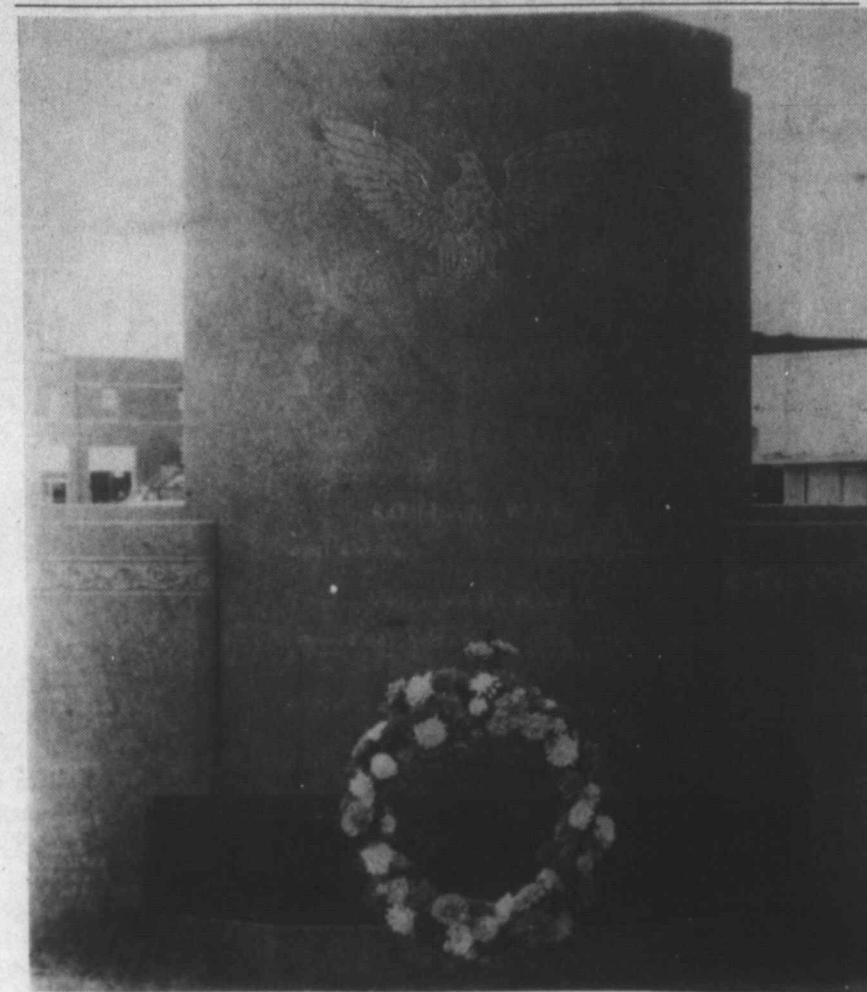

## Information Needed On Playa Lakes, Seeps In County

Free flowing seeps in cropland fields where none were before and playa lakes that are getting larger and covering more acres of land, are becoming a real and increasing problem in Lynn County, according to Norman Ledbetter, Chairman of Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Two examples of playa lakes getting larger are on the Dan Thomas farm southeast of Tahoka and B.W. Edwards farm east of O'Donnell.

Two examples of seeps are on the Steve Greer farm southeast of Tahoka and W.C. Huffaker farm southeast of Draw.

The Lynn County SWCD Board feels there are other land owners and operators having the same problem. If so, please contact the District Technician Helen Saldana in Tahoka at 998-4622 or write to Box 328, Tahoka, Texas, 79373.

The District Board is preparing a letter to the Texas Resource Department in Austin requesting their assistance to determine the cause of seeps and rising playa lakes. The more people we know about who have these problems, the better assistance we can provide.

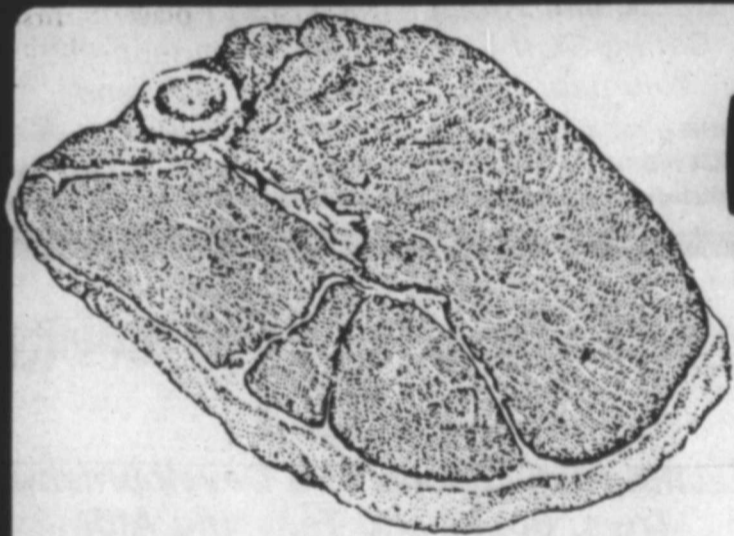

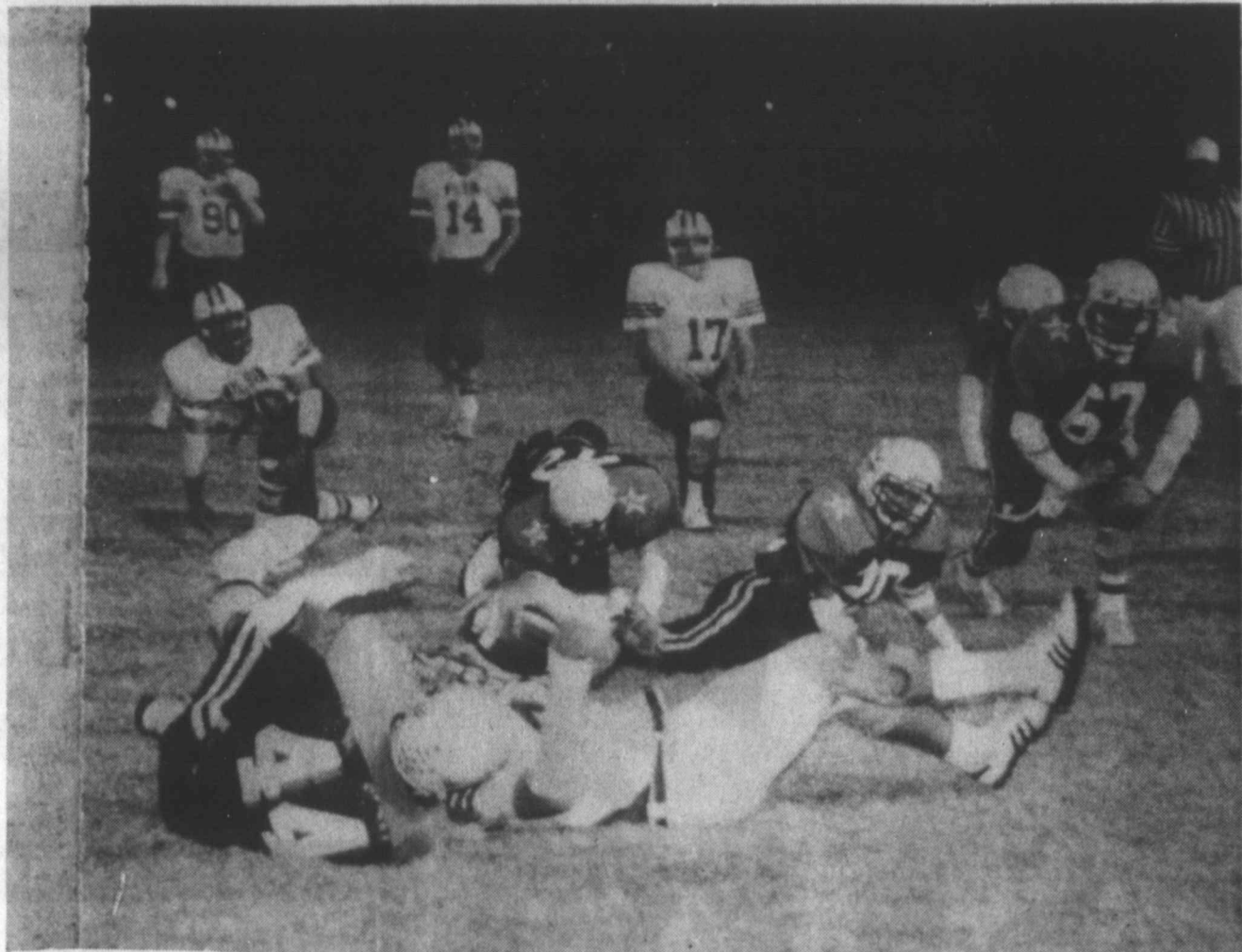

## Wilson Wraps Up District Title

The Wilson Mustangs wrapped up District 3-1A championship Friday night at Plains with a 38-15 win over the Cowboys. The win gave Wilson a perfect 5-0 mark in district and 8-1 overall. The Mustangs will have to wait and see what happens this Friday night to find out who their first opponent will be in the playoffs.

Plains fell to a 5-5 overall and 4-1 in district, so they will go to the playoffs as the district runner-up.

Wilson took the ball 80 yards in 18 plays to score on its first possession. Quarterback Greg Spears capped the mark with a 1-yard sneak to put Wilson up 6-0 with 2:06 in the opening period. The extra-point try by Bednarz failed.
